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# DIRECT TESTIMONY OF CLYDE SEIDLE ON BEHALF OF THE CITY OF HILLIARD, OHIO

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### I. INTRODUCTION

- 2 Q. Please state your name and business address.
- 3 A. My name is Clyde R. Seidle, Jr., and my business address is 3800 Municipal Way,
- 4 Hilliard, Ohio 43026.

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- 5 Q. Please describe your affiliation with the City of Hilliard, Ohio ("Hilliard").
- 6 A. I currently serve as the Director of Public Service and a City Engineer for
- 7 Hilliard. In my role as the Director of Public Service, I manage and have
- 8 considerable understanding of municipal services both provided to, and provided
- by Hilliard, and more specifically, the electricity services procured by Hilliard
- from Columbus Southern Power ("AEP").
- 11 Q. Please describe your educational background.
- 12 A. I graduated with a degree in civil engineering from the Ohio State University in
- 13 1982.
- 14 Q. Please describe your professional experience.
- 15 A. I have 30 years of professional experience in bridge and highway design, as well
- as construction and engineering management. Prior to becoming the Director of
- 17 Public Service for the City of Hilliard, I was a Principal/Director of Engineering
- with Moody Nolan, Inc. I also served as Chief Deputy County Engineer for
- Delaware County, as well as planning and design engineer for the City of
- 20 Columbus. I am a registered professional engineer in the State of Ohio since
- 21 September 1981.
- 22 Q. Briefly describe some attributes of Hilliard.

Hilliard is one of Central Ohio's fastest growing cities both residentially and commercially. Hilliard's infrastructure is sound and continues to achieve significant advances. Hilliard is currently constructing a significant roadway construction project dubbed the "Triangle Project," wherein Hilliard has completely re-engineered the intersections of Cemetery Road, Main Street and Scioto Darby Road. This infrastructure improvement will further enhance Hilliard's profile and should bring tremendous opportunity for economic development to Hilliard and that particular area within Hilliard.

## Q. What interest does Hilliard have in this proceeding?

Currently, Hilliard utilizes electric service from AEP to illuminate municipal traffic signals, a number of proprietary street lights, as well as to power certain municipal buildings and facilities. On an annual basis, Hilliard expends in excess of Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$500,000.00) on electric service with just the first two aforementioned electric uses. Furthermore, almost all of Hilliard's residential customers rely upon AEP for electric service. Similar to residents in many Ohio cities and metropolitan areas, Hilliard residential customers are currently dealing with high unemployment rates and low wages. Hilliard has a duty to represent these residents and ensure that they receive readily available and dependable electric services, attainable at reasonable prices in this economically challenging environment. In addition to the impact on Hilliard and on residential customers, Hilliard is also concerned about the impact of these proceedings on its commercial citizens. Any proposed cost increases and service modifications will

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1		have an economic development and job retention impact on a local economy that
2		cannot afford to lose jobs or opportunities for future growth.
3	Q.	What is the purpose of your testimony?
4	A.	The purpose of my testimony is to discuss the Standard Services Offer ("SSO")
5		submitted by both AEP and the Ohio Power Company (collectively the
6		"Companies") and the anticipated impact of the SSO on Hilliard, its residents and
7		its businesses.
8	Q.	What materials and information did you review in preparation for your
9		testimony?
10	A.	I reviewed portions of the Companies' SSO application as cited in this testimony.
11		II. PROPOSED RATE RESTRUCTURING
12	Q.	What is your understanding of the rate restructuring for electricity
13		generation as proposed by AEP in its SSO?
14	A.	My understanding is that the rate restructuring for electricity generation proposed
15		by the Companies in its SSO application will result in rate increases that will be
16		shouldered by Hilliard and its taxpayers. In reviewing page 1 of Exhibit DMR-1,
17		Hilliard's rates for electricity generation will increase in the following amounts
18		based upon Customer Class:
19		• GS1: 18.1% total increase over the life of the SSO;
20		• GS2: 17.8% total increase over the life of the SSO;
21		• GS3: 1.2% total increase over the life of the SSO; and

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• SL: 13.1% total increase over the life of the SSO.

These rate increases could result in a substantial overall cost increase for Hilliard
to procure electricity from AEP, increases that will trickle down to Hilliard's
residential and business taxpayers. Aside from the obvious financial impacts on
Hilliard's budget, the rate increases could severely hinder Hilliard's economic
development efforts, as job growth and retention will be a natural victims of these
rate increases.
III. PROPOSED RIDERS IN SSO

- 8 Q: What is your understanding of how the riders proposed by AEP in its SSO will impact Hilliard?
- It is difficult to determine at present how the array of riders proposed by AEP will impact Hilliard and its residential and commercial citizens, and this in itself is a tremendous concern. The uncertainty is attributable to many of the riders being non-bypassable riders that have no fixed dollar amount associated with them. For example, Hilliard has immense concern as to how the following riders will affect Hilliard and its residential and commercial citizens. The numbers associated with these riders are those numbers assigned in Exhibit DMR-4:

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• Phase-In Recovery Rider (19);

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- Distribution Investment Rider (20);
- Generation NERC Compliance Cost Recovery Rider (22);
- Facility Closure Rider (23);
- Carbon Capture and Sequestration Rider (24); and
- Plug-In Electric Vehicle/Tariff/Costs Rider (29).

Hilliard is also concerned about being subjected to the Rate Security Rider (28), as this rider should not be assessed to non-industrial customers. Finally, Hilliard is concerned about being subjected to the Environmental Investment Carrying Cost Rider (13) as this rider is non-bypassable. Again, there is uncertainty as to how these riders will impact Hilliard's payments to AEP as well as its residential and commercial citizens' payments to AEP. The unanticipated costs associated with these riders not only runs contrary to the traditional necessity of governmental budgeting for the procurement of services, but they could severely impact and impede economic development within Hilliard for the same reasons that generation rate increases will impact economic development – all costs flow downhill to Hilliard's taxpayers.

#### IV. EXISTING CONCERNS WITH AEP SERVICES

Do you have concerns with Hilliard's dealings/interaction with AEP?

Yes. It was challenging dealing with AEP during pre-construction planning during the Triangle Project. The Triangle Project necessitated involvement from AEP and the relocation of utilities to serve the area. On a few occasions, AEP refused to financially contribute to obvious ramifications on landowners for its relocation. If AEP is committed to supporting jobs and economic development, AEP must act as a partner to Hilliard in such projects as opposed to an adversary / inhibitor to the furtherance of these projects.

#### V. ASSISTANCE IN ALTERNATIVE ENERGY INITIATIVES

22 Q: Can AEP be of assistance to Hilliard in alternative energy initiatives?

Yes. If AEP is serious about the development of alternative energy mechanisms, AEP could assist Hilliard in Hilliard's initiative to convert all of its street lights to LED street lights. As the Companies are proposing a 13.1% increase on street light rates over the life of the SSO, it would be equitable for AEP to assist Hilliard in this endeavor.

#### VI. ECONOMIC DEVLEOPMENT OPPORTUNITIES

The Companies have stated in the testimony of Mr. Joseph Hamrock that their primary objective of this SSO is to stabilize rates and support the economic development of the state of Ohio. (Hamrock Testimony, p. 17, lines 9-11). Mr. Hamrock states in the same testimony that the Companies are committed to assisting Ohio with economic development opportunities, and that successful economic development requires a collaborative effort amongst local leaders and business developers across the state. (Hamrock Testimony, p. 40, lines 9-15). What is your reaction to this?

I appreciate Mr. Hamrock's statements and am hopeful that the Companies are genuine in their desire to work with local governments in pursuing economic development opportunities. I have concerns that the Companies have not been as active as they once were in assisting in economic development endeavors. The Companies have, in the past, been partners with Hilliard in community outreach to assist in economic development within the region. This commitment to local governments in economic development endeavors must be renewed by AEP, especially since economic development is, according to Mr. Hamrock, the core policy consideration behind this SSO.

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Mr. Hamrock has also stated in testimony that the Companies are				
establishing the Ohio Growth Fund in the amount of 25 million dollars to				
assist in economic development $-$ to support infrastructure investment and				
directly support public-private partnerships in the state and local economic				
development arena. (Hamrock, p.37, lines 4-16). What is your reaction to				
the Ohio Growth Fund proposed by AEP?				

I think the Ohio Growth Fund is an excellent idea and I believe that AEP should strongly consider supporting local governments through that Fund and say so with specificity. It is local governments who actually have a degree of control over economic development, both within their regions and in the State. Local governments are consistently working with businesses to create jobs, providing incentives to those businesses to either relocate to, or stay in Ohio. I would also hope that the Companies consider allocating more money to the Ohio Growth Fund, especially considering that economic development, is purportedly the core policy consideration behind the SSO.
