"We always try to focus on

family reunification," Sark said, "CASA has no jurisdiction until a case comes through the court. We also still try to give the accused parent (usual-ity the mother) a voice, asking what does the parent want for their child and why, but CASA acts as the voice of the child

within the court."

Sark and Ramey both agreed that drugs are everwhelmingly the biggest problem in the cases they handle. According to them, many par-ents who get clean or reform even those with the best interest of their kids in mind unforest of their kids in mind untile-tunately often choose drugs over their kids or fall back into their old destructive lifestyles, forcing CASA to intervene again, usually with a more per-

manent solution in repeat

rases.

"Recovering parents get a lot of finding for housing and hills," said Sark.
