On February 28, 2011, Columbus Southern

Power Company and Ohio Power Company, which are

operating companies of American Electric Power Ohio,

filed an application with the Commission for an

increase in electric distribution rates, for tariff

approval, and for approval to change their accounting

methods.

This local public hearing is only one aspect of the case process. Public hearings also took place in Marietta, Canton, and Lima. An evidentiary hearing is also currently scheduled to begin on November 14, at 10:00 o'clock at the PUCO offices here in Columbus.

The purposes of evidentiary hearing is

for the companies and for Commission staff, as well as other intervenors to present their expert witness testimony and provide evidence in support of their positon in these cases.

The purpose of tonight's public hearing, however, is to receive comments from the public. We will not be hearing from the companies tonight as we already have their proposal, but today is about hearing from the public, and it is your opportunity to let the Commission know what you think about the companies' application.

When you arrived, you were offered the opportunity to sign in to testify with Mr. Garry. If you missed that opportunity, you may still go ahead and sign up. The Commission staff can assist you with that, and we will take your testimony after those who have already signed the sign-in sheet. I would also ask at the end of the testimony if there is anyone else who would like to offer testimony this evening.

I will take witnesses in the order in which they signed the sign-in sheet. I will call you forward and I will ask you to stand here at the front of the aisle and face the court reporter.

I will also ask you take an oath on what

you are about to say is the truth. Your testimony this evening will be considered part of the official record in this case and will be reviewed by the commissioners before they make a decision in this case on the company's proposal.

Attorneys for the company and other intervenors who are present this evening may ask questions about your testimony if they wish. If you do decide you don't wish to testify, when I call your name, you can merely say "pass" and we will move on to the next person signed up to testify.

Also, once you are finished giving your testimony or if you are just here to observe, feel free to leave at any time you wish.

As you can see, tonight's hearing is being transcribed by a court reporter, so she is writing down everything that is said here tonight in a typewritten fashion, so if you do plan to testify, please speak plainly and clearly so that she can accurately reflect your comments.

Also, if you have prepared a written statement for us tonight, it would be helpful if you provide that to the court reporter before you leave.

The Commission appreciates your participation this evening and we want to make that

everyone who wishes to testify has the opportunity to do so. Since we don't have that many people present, it shouldn't be an issue, but please try to keep your comments to a reasonable amount of time.

Are there any questions about the procedure that we will follow tonight before we begin to take testimony?

It looks like there are no questions, so at this time I will begin calling witnesses forward. When you are called, please come here to front of the aisle and face the court reporter and give your name and address.

THE ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Thank you.

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DON CHENOWETH,

being first duly sworn, as prescribed by law, was examined and testified as follows:

DIRECT TESTIMONY

THE ATTORNEY EXAMINER: You may go ahead.

MR. CHENOWETH: I am the executive director of Andrews House, a nonprofit community service center in Delaware. We have nine different social programs and services. We have a free medical clinic, for example, free legal clinic, so on and so forth.

And I understand that the Electric Safety Plan that was submitted earlier and this Distribution Charge Plan, I understand they're controversial, but in my opinion there's no controversy about AEP's quality corporate citizenship and their philanthropic largesse, and I'd like to tell you some stories.

One of the things we do is we feed children, low-income school children, lunch during the summer. We provided 6,000 lunches to Delaware kids this summer, and there's cost recovery through the State, but it doesn't nearly cover our costs.

So we were hoping for some funds to come out of the Washington from the Emergency Food and Shelter Board, but in the infinite wisdom, it was decided that Delaware County would not receive the distributions they had received for 20 years, so we were left with a huge hole in our budget.

AEP gave us \$10,000 to help cover this shortfall and to cover food for our community meals

and other nutrition programs.

We have a free legal clinic, and these are for people who can't afford a lawyer, and before the great recession, we were seeing about 10 people per clinic. We are now seeing 25 people per clinic, and we've actually run out of room. I mean, we can't create enough space in our facility to house the attorneys and the clients in a confidential manner.

AEP, unsolicited, gave us another \$10,000 to help the clients and to create space in our facility.

And AEP has a community affairs manager. He lives in our community. He's fully integrated in the life of our community. He goes out of his way to find out what the nonprofits need. We are not just holding our hands out. AEP is actively looking for ways that they can help the disadvantaged, the disenfranchised, the unlucky, and the forgotten.

And if you look at nonprofit income sheets, you'll see AEP giving money everywhere. They have a huge philanthropic input.

So, in the end what I want to say, I trust AEP to do a number of things: To deliver service to us reliably and safely, to bill us accurately. And, frankly, I think AEP is in the best position of anybody to know what kind of revenue they

need to operate and provide electricity services to 1 2 the people of Central Ohio. 3 Thank you. 4 THE ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Thank you. 5 Next speaker I have signed up is Connie 6 Boley. 7 Please step forward. Please state and 8 spell your name. 9 MS. BOLEY: Connie Boley, B-O-L-E-Y. THE ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Could you please 10 11 give your address. 12 MS. BOLEY: 490 East Jeffrey Place, 13 Columbus, Ohio 43214. 14 15 CONNIE BOLEY, being first duly sworn, as prescribed by law, was 16 17 examined and testified as follows: 18 DIRECT TESTIMONY 19 MS. BOLEY: This is, in a way, a kind of 20 a complaint, very different from this gentleman. 21 he said that AEP is in a position to know what their 2.2 bills are. 93 million sounds excessively high, but I 23 don't know what they have to pay for what they're 24 doing. 25 And also, when we have storms and they

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have to fix things, I think they do very well, and, you know, they have to bring people in from other states and all that, so that's costly, and I realize that.
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But the thing is, what I think we do as a society is just keep raising everything. And I've been retired for a long time because I took care of parents, and I've worked all my life and I can no longer afford things.

In July my electric bill was \$189 because this year I had to use the air conditioning, which I generally don't, and I was getting sick because I didn't have it on.

Okay. I called AEP and asked them -- one lady said -- and I think she gave me misinformation -- she said that it was high now but the PUCO was going to do something and then it would be lower the rest of year. It would go down in October.

So in October I called and I said, "When will it go down? Because I wanted to use my oven."

It's electric.

And she said, "Yours is not going to go down because the other part of the year you don't use 800 kilowatts. It's just if you are over

800 kilowatts after --" I don't know what the cutoff was. But, anyway, mine was not going to go down as the first lady said.

Okay. I'm just saying that it looks like -- and I don't know a lot of what you're doing here, and I respectfully say that, and so my point is is this a place to say, you know, I can't afford any more? We need to have lower rates instead of higher rates.

I sit in the dark a lot of times, so I don't have lights on. I don't have my outside lights on at all anymore, and I think that's a safety issue and I can't afford that.

And so all I'm saying is I think that society, especially with the economy the way it is, I think as a society we need to stop having all of our wants met and stick to needs and pare that down.

And that's really all I have to say.

THE ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Thank you.

The next witness I have signed up is Yvonne Bussard.

DIRECT TESTIMONY

MS. BUSSARD: I'm on a fixed income. The economy is greatly affecting everybody's budgets, and I know there's a lot -- I have more income than a lot of people does for fixed income, and I think we have to try and solve some issues with the costs.

That's pretty much all I have to say.

THE ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Thank you very
