we're going to save over one million dollars in

a three-year period for our various county

buildings.

With the meltdown of the financial structure everyone is feeling lessening of the revenue stream. We have both our general and non-general budgets severely impacted with lack of revenue coming in from various sources. We have a justice center and juvenile justice center operating 24/7 with significant energy use. We also have our sanitary pump stations that are 24/7 usage. That is non-general and with housing permits on decline, with loans under water, revenue is not even coming in to help the non-general so this electrical aggregation program has significantly helped us

I would like to express my full support for First Energy's ESP proposal. They are an excellent community partner to our organization and many others in this region have benefited greatly under First Energy's current rate plan. FirstEnergy has pledged that its generous support will continue under the new ESP.

FirstEnergy provides much-needed financial support for low-income customers, a wide range of community projects, as well as economic development.

Through the FirstEnergy Foundation the company has already donated nearly a half million dollars to various organizations and charities in Ohio this year alone. And FirstEnergy intends to contribute more than 1.3 million to charities and the United Way chapters by the end of the year. FirstEnergy employees raised an additional 1.2 million for United Way that was contributed above and beyond the FirstEnergy foundation grant.

Under the two-year extension

FirstEnergy will continue to provide nearly 10

million dollars in economic development and

assistance to low-income customers at the levels

established in this current plan. When you do

the math this amounts to an additional 20

million dollars in benefits during the two-year

extension period. These annual investments

include: 1 million per year for economic

development funding; 4.5 million for low-income

customers from fuel fund contributions; 5

million for low-income weatherization and energy

efficient programs for local municipalities

through the Community Connection program. And that is another one of the programs the Urban League constituents benefit from a great deal. The plan also supports our community's most vulnerable electric customers, those in the Percentage of Income Payment Plan program, with a six percent discount off their electric rate. This is in addition to the affordable rate FirstEnergy provides under its existing plan which has allowed the generation rate to decrease by nine percent from a year ago.

A. My name is T-a-u-s-s-i-g, and I'm president of ROI Energy Solutions out of Hudson,
Ohio. I am here in support of FirstEnergy extending this program for another two years.

ROI Energy provides turn-key lighting retrofit projects for warehouses and manufacturers all over northeast Ohio in an effort to help reduce their energy costs. We retrofit their lighting with more energy efficient lighting.

One of the first things I do when I go in to do a light and energy audit is to look at their electric bills to see if they're shopping their energy and most typically they are shopping. There is a third-party solution they have gone to for the generation portion of that energy. So that's one of the quickest ways to actually realize some additional cost savings.

These actions alone would firmly establish FirstEnergy's credentials as a good corporate citizen. However, their largesse extends to other areas that enhance the social and cultural well-being of our campus and community.

The company has provided substantial support for the university's E.J. Thomas

Performing Arts Hall, the flagship venue for a four-county region and the fourth-largest arts presenter in Ohio.

FirstEnergy also played a leadership role in raising Akron's soccer program and stadium into the nation's premium ranks, culminating in the 2010 national championship.

The stadium annually attracts thousands of

FirstEnergy has several buildings located through the greater Akron region. The company was contemplating an expansion to their facility on Ghent Road but opted to allow their neighbors at Sterling Jewelers to acquire their facility to accommodate their expansion needs. individual business owners or homeowners could

achieve on their own but also a vote of

confidence for the FirstEnergy Corporation, as

well as FirstEnergy Solutions.

Customers know if they switch to another supplier they still will remain a FirstEnergy customer for distribution of electricity and can rely on them to answer questions and respond to power outages during a storm.

FirstEnergy wants to extend its rate for an additional two years to keep electric rates stable through 2016. Stability of these rates at these times of growing costs in other utilities is of utmost importance. I know, our

system, and solid waste management utilities. I

can't guarantee a stable rate in any of those
