The law requires police officers to complete training in identifying human trafficking, authorizes victims to sue their pimps for damages and funnels money collected from fines and property seizures into a fund for those who were abused, according to Ohio Attorney General Mike DeWine's Human Trafficking 2012 Annual Report.

The legislation designates individuals being trafficked as victims instead of sexual offenders, and that opened up diversion programs and funds. Legislation also allowed victims to have previous prostitution convictions removed from their record, said Christine Raino, policy counsel with Shared Hope International.

"That gets them back on their feet and keeps them from returning to their trafficker," Raino said.

The changes prompted the Polaris Project, a non-

profit organization that fights human trafficking, to bump Ohio to its top tier, ranking the state one of its most improved in 2012.

Even with these improvements, Ohio still received a "C" from Shared Hope International, which assesses states' response to child sex trafficking.

Raino said Ohio law should be changed to distinguish between child and adult victims of sex trafficking and impose a stiffer penalty for the sex trade of minors.

Under federal law,

children younger than 18 do not need to prove force, coercion or fraud for a trafficker to be prosecuted. Ohio should change its policies to mimic federal law, Raino said.

Another recommendation was to shield juveniles from testifying about their sex lives at their traffickers' trials, Raino said.

Proposed changes include lengthening the statute of limitations on these cases from six years to 20 years to match other sex abuse cases, imposing stricter penalties for johns and making it easier

for social workers to remove children from homes if their parents trafficked them, Sykes Haggerty said.

Information about where and how human trafficking occurred was virtually nonexistent before the 2012 Domestic Sex Trafficking in Ohio Report was released in August. The survey of 328 victims of sexual trafficking in five of Ohio's largest cities revealed that of the individuals entered the sex trade before they were 18 years old, of that number, 12 percent were sold before age 12.

Early indicators of victimization included having relatives in the sex trade, being neglected or abused, dropping out of school or experiencing depression, according to the report.

Data, especially for rural areas, should improve with the law's requirement for officers to report human trafficking incidents to the Ohio Bureau of Criminal Investigation. An annual report on the data will be compiled, starting this June.

perk up. Muskingum County's unemployment rate in November was 8.7 percent, still well above the state's 6.5 percent, but better than the double-digit showings during the depth of the

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Ohio candy maker recalls product

SEVILLE — An Ohio candy maker has recalled 492 bags of its product because it contains milk that is not declared on the label.

Island Delights Inc., of

Seville, announced the recall of the bags of Coconut Haystack candy earlier this week.

An audit by the Ohio Department of Agriculture found the candy contained milk that could be harmful to the health of

people who are allergic to it.

The company said it has not received any reports of adverse reactions or illness from the candy. The recalled product was distributed to retail stores and through mail

order in 2012 in the following states: Arizona, California, Florida, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Mississippi, North Carolina, New York, South Carolina, Texas, Virginia, Washington and Wyoming.

NOTICE OF PROPOSED MAJOR UTILITY FACILITY

AEP Ohio and AEP Ohio Transmission Company (AEP Ohio Transco) propose to construct a 4.2-acre expansion of the Ohio Central Substation, a 345/138/69-kilovolt (KV) substation in Muskingum County, Ohio.

The purpose of the project is to install eight new 345-KV circuit breakers, a new system control house, aluminum bus, control cable, communication equipment and associated support structures.

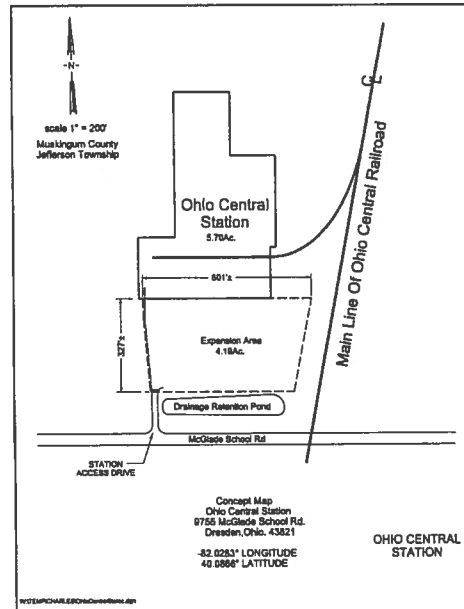
The project is known as the Ohio Central Station Expansion Project. As required by Ohio Revised Code Section 4906-11-01, AEP Ohio Transco has filed a Letter of Notification with the state of Ohio Power Siting Board.

This project qualifies as a Letter of Notification filing because it meets the requirements outlined in OAC 4906-1-01, Appendix A (8)(b). Appendix A (8)(b) applies to "constructing additions to existing electric power transmission substations where there is a greater than 20 percent expansion of the fenced area." This substation expansion is a 71 percent increase to the existing substation.

The Letter of Notification to expand the Ohio Central Station is pending before the Ohio Power Siting Board. This application has been assigned Case Number 13-0013-EL-BLN. This number should be included in all communications with respect to this proceeding.

Petitions to intervene in or comment on the Letter of Notification will be accepted by the siting board up to 10 days following the publication date of this notice required by Rule 4906-5-09(C)(1), OAC. Petitions should be addressed to Ohio Power Siting Board, 180 East Broad Street, Columbus, Ohio, 43215-3793 and must cite the above-listed case number.

The Ohio Central Substation is located on the north side of County Road 116 south of Dresden in Jefferson Township in Muskingum County and is approximately 0.4 miles west of the Muskingum River. The station is connected to two 345-KV transmission lines, eight 138-KV transmission lines and one 69-KV transmission line. The expansion will use 4.2 acres of land directly adjacent to the existing substation and already owned by AEP. The expansion site has been used for parking and as an athletic field for the last few years. This area south of



the substation is the only practicable location for this expansion due to the layout of the 345-KV and 138-KV station yards.

The substation expansion will be an approximate \$5 million investment by AEP in its transmission system in the area. The project will allow AEP to continue to provide the level of service its customers expect.

The accompanying map depicts the expansion site. It should be noted that due to the reduced scale and limited detail, this map should be used only as a general guide.
