



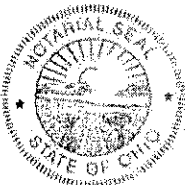

FBI divers searching for missing toddler

TOLEDO — FBI divers have been searching the Maumee River in northwestern Ohio for a 1-year-old girl who was last seen at her mother's home more than two weeks ago.

The dive team searched for a second consecutive day Tuesday. It also searched the river last week. FBI spokeswoman Vicki Anderson would only say that the agency has information that led to the river search.

Claims Steinfurth's

mother, Angela Steinfurth, 25, was charged last week with felony child endangering.

Investigators say Angela Steinfurth knew her daughter had been seriously injured but the mother didn't seek medical help. They would not say what sort of injuries the baby had or who they believe caused them.

Elsina was last seen June 2. That day, her father went to her mother's residence to pick up his two daughters, but only Elaina's 4-year-old sister was there.

CLARIFICATION

In an article in Tuesday's edition dealing with a boy who nearly drowned in a pool Sunday, Lancaster Police Detective Nick

Snyder said the police department was looking into all possibilities in the case. It has not been ruled as an accident.

path that is not paved yet," said Lancaster Law Director and Prosecutor Terre Vandervoort. "But we had used all the money we had."

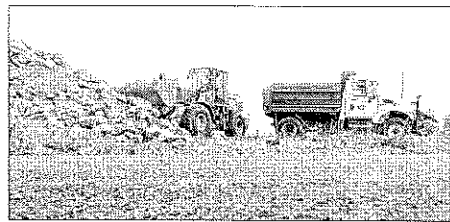
Paving the remaining portion of the bike path will cost an estimated \$80,000.

On Tuesday, Vandervoort found out the George and Dollie Zimpher fund with the Fairfield County Foundation was going to give them \$40,000 for the paving.

"The small part of the bike path that is not paved has a base that can be used until we can pave it," Vandervoort said.

In November 2012, the final bridge crossing the Hocking River to connect the Lancaster City Bike Trail to the wetlands and meadow area was in place.

Vandervoort said the bike trail has been used for recreation, sports, fundraising walks and bicycle programs such as

the Tour de Cause. About 50,000 people are using portions of the bike trail during the year, she said.

"But I often find myself looking around and seeing things that still need to be done, kind of like you do with your own house," Vandervoort said. "You always see things that could be done. Maybe now that it is near com-

pletion, I'll be able to just enjoy it."

The bike path is part of the Lancaster Parks & Recreation Department, and superintendent Steve Gayfield said that, with only some landscaping to be done, it's a great addition to the park system.

"We still have some items on the checklist we want done," Gayfield said. "But essentially, it's completed, and the city departments who have worked together to build this really deserve a lot of

credit. We just hope the people will get out and enjoy it even more now."

It's been nearly seven years since construction began on the linear park and path, and the project has been funded with the help of Clean Ohio, Recreational Trails and Fairfield Medical Center grants.

"The recession really delayed the completion of the project," Vandervoort said. "But everyone kept working together to see it completed."

electric scooter. Exact change is required because drivers are not allowed to make change. A 31-day pass is also available for \$30, which will allow for unlimited rides on the Memorial Express.

For people who meet

American Disabilities Act eligibility, LPT will allow for one stop not included on the normal route per hour at a location to three-quarters of a mile from the route. Such stops must be requested at least 24 hours in advance.

Prospective passengers should look for posted stops designated by signs or on the route map

and arrive at least two minutes before the scheduled departure time. Reservations are not needed.

"After the six months, we'll meet with the Ohio Department of Transportation to see if it's proven to be reliable," Shamblin said. "All of the federal funding we receive comes from ODOT."

The city will hold a public hearing on the new

route before meeting with ODOT to decide whether the Memorial Express will be permanent.

He said LPT used to run a similar route years ago but had to pull it because of decreased funding.

Code), LeVacy said. "It would have streamlined the whole process. The commissioners weren't opposed to it. But it was the method that was used in causing all that to happen."

Davis said the commission had to clean up a mess that Baltimore created.

"What would have been preferable was for Baltimore to act like an adult, get their problems worked out with Thurston and not have litigation and all this stuff hung up for months," he said. "All they had to do was just play by the rules in the sandbox. But they can't do that."

The area was the subject of a lawsuit filed by Thurston against Baltimore to stop Baltimore from selling water to about 25 customers on Ohio 256. Thurston has since dropped the lawsuit, and its officials now are concentrating on opening a new water treatment plant by year's end just north of the village near the fire station.

Thurston has bought

water from Baltimore for 40 years, but the agreement ends in March, and the sides have not been able to reach an extension. In response to the contract's impending expiration, Thurston wants to build the \$2.4 million water plant.

LeVacy said that because Thurston dropped the lawsuit and the water line will be good for development, there was no reason not to approve the line.

"But in the future, if anybody takes that approach, we will deal with it accordingly," he said. Davis was cryptic

about what would have happened had the commission not approved the water line.

"Oh, I don't know," he said. "Somebody would sue somebody over something."

Carroll County is served by the Akron-Canton Regional Foodbank, which is part of the Feeding America network.

"Hunger is a reality for every community in our nation, including our own," said Dan Flowers, president and CEO of the Akron-Canton Regional Foodbank. "In order to address the problem of hunger, we must first understand it. We truly value this data that provides spe-

level. This data has the potential to redefine the way service providers and policy makers address food insecurity in the communities they serve."

"A child who does not receive adequate nutrition may experience behavioral problems, have difficulty concentrating in school, and has an increased risk of medical problems. Lack of adequate nutrition in children for even a brief period of time may also cause permanent physical and developmental impairments," Gundersen said.

By analyzing household income levels, the study reveals that 88% of children at risk of hunger in Carroll County are eligible for federal nutrition programs, like free or reduced-price school lunch or breakfast; but that 12% are not. This means 12% of food insecure children and their families receive no federal assistance and must rely on programs operated by the Akron-Canton Regional Foodbank.

This is the third year the Feeding America has conducted the "Map the Meal Gap" study. The findings of "Map the Meal Gap" are based on statistics collected by the U.S. Census Bureau and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics; food price data and analysis were provided by Nielsen (NYSE: NLSN), a global information and measurement company providing insights into what consumers watch and buy. The study was generously supported by the Howard G. Buffett Foundation, Nielsen and The ConAgra Foods Foundation.

Prior to the study's first release in March 2011, food insecurity data was only available at the state level in the U.S. Department of Agriculture's annual report. The study further analyzes each county's food insecure population to determine their income eligibility for federal nutrition assistance, and also provides meal cost estimates for every county in the nation.

ODNR places hold on deer, turkey permits



YMHA to lay off four employees

YOUNGSTOWN
Youngstown Metropolitan Housing Authority is laying off four people from its 75-member staff because of federal sequester budget cuts.

The four were notified last Friday and will be leaving June 28, said Judith Carlin, a YMHA lawyer.

Two of the four are union members and two are not, Carmelita Douglas, author-

ity executive director, told authority commissioners Wednesday.

Douglas said it would not have been practical for the agency to make the cuts by imposing unpaid furlough days on all staff as some federal agencies have done.

That strategy "would not have accomplished the number that we needed," in dollars saved due to the sequester cuts, even if all employees took an unpaid day off every two weeks,

Douglas said.

In one well-known national furlough model, the IRS is making its sequester cuts by closing its offices and giving its staff an unpaid day off on five business days this year.

Although Douglas did not provide any specific figures on cost savings from the layoffs, Gary Cameron, authority finance director, said in March that sequestration would amount to "a 5 percent cut across the board for public housing."

In other business, Douglas said a formal dedication ceremony is planned for July for the Village at Aftington, which has replaced the demolished 1938-vintage Westside Terrace.

The Village has 120 rental apartments. The first phase of 60 apartments is fully occupied, and the second phase has 32 of its 60 apartments occupied and is expected to be fully occupied next month, Douglas said.

3 New Castle men plead guilty to drug charges

Three New Castle, Pa., men pleaded guilty in federal court to a conspiracy charge in a major Oxycodone distribution ring, the U.S. Attorney announced.

Christopher Klingensmith, 38, of Vine Street; his brother, Thomas Klingensmith Jr., 40, of Bellair Drive; and James Cracraft, 38, of Randolph Street, entered their pleas Tuesday before U.S. District Judge Arthur J. Schwab, who will sentence them in October.

Christopher Klingensmith was the leader of the ring, which received its Oxycodone supplies from Florida and sold the highly addictive narcotic pills to New Castle area street drug users between September 2008 and June 2011, the U.S.

Attorney said.

Thomas Klingensmith helped his brother distribute the pills, and Cracraft sold the pills and served as a lookout for the group, federal prosecutors said.

With 30mg Oxycodone tablets typically selling for \$25 to \$35 each on the street, the nearly 50,000 pills distributed by the ring had a street value between \$1.25 million and \$1.75 million, the U.S. Attorney said.

More than \$156,000 was seized from a car stopped in North Carolina in September 2010 in this investigation, which was conducted by New Castle and Pennsylvania State Police and the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration.

The defendants face up to 20 years in prison and could be fined up to \$1 million, the U.S. Attorney said.

Boardman officials: Rehire is a good deal

Boardman Township's fire chief was making about \$78,500 before he retired at the beginning of June.

When he was rehired by the township days later as a contracted employee to fulfill the duties of the fire chief, George Brown's salary went up to \$85,500.

"We wanted to keep [Brown] in that position so we can continue to grow the department," township Trustee Thomas Costello said. "We have been very pleased with his work."

He said though, on paper, it looks like the township is losing money, it's not. He noted that if the town-

ship were to advertise the position, it would have been looking at spending up to or more than \$100,000 for another chief given the size of the township and the job duties.

Costello said Brown was being pursued by "other people" for work, and Brown came to the board during its May 29 meeting and asked to retire under his Ohio Police and Fire Pension Fund.

Brown said he chose to retire because of changes made to the 10-year treasury note within his pension plan, which would have meant he'd lose money in the long run.

But, "I didn't feel comfortable leaving Boardman," he said.

A resolution was passed May 29 to accept Brown's resignation. Another resolution immediately was passed approving Brown's rehiring, according to meeting minutes.

The board devised a memorandum of understanding approved June 10, its last meeting, Costello said.

The trustees, Brown and Jason Loree, township administrator, met to discuss the memorandum.

Before Brown's retirement, Brown was an at-will employee, which means he didn't make additional overtime money; he made a set salary, Costello said.

"We believe the boss should make what the assistants make," Costello said. "[Brown] already has one year of experience. He's extremely well connected."

Brown will also be able to collect money from his pension in 60 days, Costello said.

"We felt it was a good deal for the township," Costello said.

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A barn and a little bit of fencing can be acquired for a couple of thousand dollars and a few hundred dollars, respectively, and a small herd will run about \$5,000. Daily maintenance is \$1 for the farm's alpaca and \$1.50 for the llamas, Paul said.

Ross Ranch is open by appointment, and Gail and Paul said they're always interested in visitors to the farm or to their store, which sells alpaca products and gifts items.

"People just like the animals. They like to feed them and pet them," Gail said. "You just have to give us a call."

backyard in Hubbard," Paul said.

tomped by a treat. Shortcut carrots are a favorite snack. "Like everything else in this world, you get what you put in," said Gail, who added that all the farm's animals are relatively friendly, thanks in part to extensive training. They're easily startled and don't like being grabbed, but will spit only when provoked.

Most of the animals at Ross Ranch were born and trained there, Gail said. All animals are registered — and named. The couple keeps a running list of interesting names, many

of which are from songs, movies or mythology.

For example, Charicco is an 8-year-old medium-fawn female alpaca who was named for the Aztec goddess of hearth fires. She's also for sale, available for viewing on the farm's website.

Gail and Paul have sold about 20 of their animals so far this year, and to customers as far away as Germany. Most alpacas and llamas sell for between \$1,000 and \$2,500, but pet-quality animals can go for much lower — a few hundred dollars at most.

Gail cautioned against buying alpacas or llamas from an auction, even though the lower price tag

might be more appealing. "You need to buy from a reputable farm that's going to help you, mentor you," she said. "You want to start out with a strong support system. You don't want to go to someone's liquidation sale; they're getting out of the business."

of the year, so more officers probably will be brought on to make up for those losses, Foley said.

"We're losing guys left and right," Foley said.

Foley said the 152 officer benchmark is important because it allows for enough officers on the streets to do patrol work on their beats instead of just answering calls.

"It seems to work well for our staffing levels," Foley

said of the benchmark.

Councilman L. Nathaniel Pinkard, D-3rd Ward, and head of council's Safety Committee, said he is not concerned about such a high turn over in officers because the department does a good job of bringing officers along.

"I feel the mechanism is in place to bring them up to speed because he [Foley] has been bringing them along pretty slowly," said Pinkard, former chief of Mill Creek MetroParks Police.

The department ran a

massive publicity campaign in the fall for the civil service entrance exam to attract candidates to apply for the department.

"They were looking for more candidates who are minorities, women or city residents."

Foley said just about every officer who can works the road. He said there are very few administrative jobs in the department with officers who do not have a patrol assignment.

"It's pretty much all hands on deck," Foley said.

tasks are familiar to local companies, Simon said.

There are 18 projected Trumbull County wells either drilled or planned this year in the Utica Shale play — seven for Halcon and 11 for BP. The CNX company was planning to drill a well on Warren-Sharon Road in Vienna, but it has started closing that site and apparently won't be drilling there, Simon said.

Five of the 18 already have

been drilled and hydraulically fractured, or fracked, and two more are in the drilling process.

At six of the 18 locations, the county engineer's office has a road-use and maintenance agreement that calls for 11.86 miles of roads to be repaved as part of the project, Simon said. The county engineer's office has no jurisdiction over road work on six wells on state routes.

intersection of state Route 193 and state Route 98 in Johnston Township, Simon said.

The other company drilling in Trumbull County is Halcon Resources Corp., which does not plan to install the lines under county roads and therefore won't need a permit from the county, Simon said.

Halcon is instead drilling under farm fields and other rural property, he said.

The installation of gas pipelines is one aspect of gas and oil drilling that has produced jobs and revenue for local companies, Simon noted.

Unlike the drilling and seismic-testing operations, BP and Halcon appear to be using local companies to install and provide the pipelines because those

Those caught on the camera — which will be turned on only when students are heading to school and leaving when the school day is done — would be charged with civil violations so it won't impact their driver's license or registration.

Also Wednesday, council approved a resolution allowing owners of the downtown Wick Building, vacant for about eight years, to receive a \$70,000 state loan. Council's approval was needed for the NYO Property Group,

which owns the structure at 34 W. Federal St., as well as other downtown buildings, to receive the loan.

NYO plans to spend \$16.5 million to convert the 153-year-old building into a 52-unit rental and extended-stay living facility. Inside demolition work must begin by Aug. 1 for NYO to keep \$3,687,500 in federal and state tax credits for the project. The company plans to get started next month.

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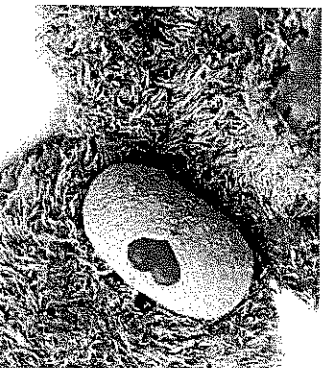
