Mr. Iddings,

Thank you for contacting the Ohio Power Siting Board (OPSB) regarding Dayton Power & Light's proposed West Milton – Eldean 138 kV (kilovolt) transmission line. Your comments will be filed in the docket for case number 14-0469-EL-BTX.

To date, Dayton Power & Light has not filed an application with the OPSB. Utilities must provide the OPSB with two viable routes – a Preferred and an Alternate route. In an application to the OPSB, the applicant must provide detailed information on the probable impact of the proposed facility, taking several criteria, including environmental and ecological impacts, public interest, and the impact on agricultural land. An enclosed FAQ sheet describes the criteria that the OPSB staff considers when investigating a proposed electric transmission line.

Dayton Power & Light will hold a public informational meeting that will give local residents the opportunity to learn more about the project and submit comments about the routing of the project. I encourage you to attend. Notice of this meeting will be placed in the local newspaper, as well as on the OPSB website (opsb.ohio.gov). I have also enclosed an FAQ sheet that describes how the public can participate in the OPSB process.

It is with great concern that I write concerning the potential 138kV transmission siting along Greenlee Road in Newton Township, Miami Co.

I am a trustee co-owner of a 160 acre quarter section with a full half mile frontage on Greenlee road, just north of Horseshoe Bend Rd. The prospect of a monstrous 138kv transmission line along the Greenlee right of way would be in horrendous contrast to our 200 year old family farm. Greenlee Road sits in the catchment of a declared scenic river and is the closest road parallel to the Stillwater River at this location on the lower edge of Newton Township. The area is sensitive beyond our undivided, eight generation farm. Bruckner Nature Center and the enduring 'Horseshoe Bend' itself would do very well without the imposition of 65-90 foot steel towers and lines as a backdrop for visitors.

As a landowner and civil engineer, I can see NO immediate reason why such a transmission line should be expected to exist within any township road right-of-way, especially if recommended easements range to 100 feet in width. Such lines belong away from residences and on back property lines of the original farms where they cause less visual harm and leave mostly undisturbed the natural beauty of the county's township roads. The public hearing for the purpose is truly appreciated.
