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ALJ AGRANOFF: The Ohio Power
Siting Board has assigned for public hearing at
this time and place Case No. 13-430-EL-BTX which
is captioned In the Matter of the Application of
AEP Ohio Transmission Company for a Certificate
of Environmental Compatibility and Public Need
to Construct the 138 kilovolt Biers
Run-Circleville Transmission Line Project.

My name is Jay Agranoff, and I am an Administrative Law Judge assigned by the Ohio Power Siting Board to preside over this local hearing.

As I mentioned previously, with me this evening are Mr. Steve Irwin, Mr. John Pauley, and Ms. Jill Coaker. And they are members of the Ohio Power Siting Board staff. And we are all available after this evening's hearing for any additional questions that you might have regarding this particular application or any other utility matters.

At this time I will take the formal appearances on behalf of the parties. On behalf

of the AEP.

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MR. SATERWHITE: Thank you, Your
Honor. On behalf of AEP Ohio Transmission
Company, Matthew J. Saterwhite, Steven T.
Nourse, 1 Riverside Plaza, Columbus, Ohio 43215.

And as I mentioned previously as well we have representatives here from the Company that are happy to talk with anyone from the public after the hearing on other questions.

ALJ AGRANOFF: Thank you. Are there any other parties that desire to make a formal appearance at this point in time?

There being none, the subject matter of this evening's public hearing and the one that was held yesterday in Chillicothe is the application filed on June 2nd, 2014 as amended on October 15, 2014 to construct a 138 kilovolt transmission line between the existing Circleville substation in Pickaway County and the Biers Run substation that is currently under construction in Ross County.

I would note that the adjudicatory hearing that is in this proceeding is scheduled to take place later this month at the offices of the Ohio Power Siting Board, which is in

Columbus, Ohio.

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This evening's public hearing, as I mentioned before, is not to address the application in case 13-429-EL-BTX, which concerns the request to construct the 138 kilovolt transmission line from the Biers Run substation to the existing Delano substation. That particular public hearing is scheduled for December 16th at 6:00 P.M. in Chillicothe.

In this case the Applicant submits that the purpose of the proposed project is to improve and maintain the quality of electric service and reliability to the south central Ohio area. This area includes, but is not limited to, the communities of southern Columbus, Chillicothe, Circleville, Highland, Greenfield, Waverly and others.

The Applicant notes that the Circleville-Chillicothe load area is currently served primarily by three 138 kilovolt lines originating from the Columbus, Waverly and Athens areas.

The Applicant states that the loss of any two of these lines can result in a system criteria violation in the area.

According to the application the project is located in a rural setting consisting primarily of agricultural parcels and open land with scattered residential areas, wood lot and minimal commercial, industrial and recreational land uses.

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175 residences have been identification as being within a thousand feet of the preferred route, and 270 residences have been identified as being within a thousand feet of the alternative route.

The Applicant plans to start construction in the first quarter of 2015 with an estimated service date of approximately first quarter of 2017.

The purpose, as I mentioned before, of this evening's public hearing is to receive comments from the public regarding AEP Ohio Transmission Company's application in this case. It is not intended to be a question and answer session, but instead it's your opportunity to let the Ohio Power Siting Board know what you think about the proposals set forth in its application.

I would also note that the Board's

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staff filed its report of investigation on
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     October 21st, 2014. This is simply a
     recommendation of the Board's staff and does not

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      address is 18681 Westfall Road, Williamsport.
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I have never done anything like this. I am on the preferred route, and I would rather you take the other route because I just can't imagine having a big aluminum pole sitting in my front yard.

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I have nine grandchildren, and on some information you gave us last year they said there was a study done in Denver that has been proven that it could cause cancer in children.

And I am concerned about that.

Plus, I am, like I asked them, I got a fence and my husband and I planted a bunch of trees back when we moved in, and don't mean to get anybody's sympathy, I lost my husband five years ago due to Agent Orange, and it has all got sentimental value. And I would hate to lose stuff that we have done.

Plus, Westfall Road, anybody that
lives on Westfall knows it's like 270 during
rush hour. People passing each going 80 miles
an hour. I have had two people knock my fence
down from -- so I wonder what would happen if
they hit one of those poles, would the pole fall
over and hit the house or one of my dogs be
outside and, you know, hurt, kill one of my

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      dogs.

MS. BURKE: My name is Ada Burke, and I live at 24100 State Route 104, Circleville, Ohio 43113.

And I am very involved in this
because one of your preferred routes either goes
right through a swamp area that I gave to the
Audubon Club about the year 2000 for
preservation. It's not an ordinary wetlands.
It's a glacial kettle lake, and I don't know
what you can do about it.

But, I just don't think that anybody that is in conservation at all would go along with this. So, then they said, well, if we can't go there bend and then they go right down through my house. Well, my house is 144 years old and I lived in it 92 years of that.

And don't want it going behind my house when I think you have other routes that wouldn't cost any more or very little more, and not cause all this trauma that you are putting me through.

And I guess that pretty well covers

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what I am thinking. There was one -- one of the

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      1455 Shagbark Street in Circleville. I am a
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Pickaway County Park Commissioner. I represent 2 the Park District.

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Looking at the alternate route it looks like it would be using our old railroad track we are turning in to a trail. That could solve some of the problems, maybe.

On the west side of Pickaway going to New Holland we already have electric lines of Dayton Power and Light that goes to New Holland.

About three years ago we bought the old railroad off the Dayton Power and Light, so we are trying to work that into a trail.

I just wanted to go on the record saying that is an alternate route that you may want to look at. I guess that is about all I have to say.

ALJ AGRANOFF: Just to clarify the record, that is not the alternate route that is proposed in the application?

MR. HARTINGER: Oh, it's not?

ALJ AGRANOFF: I am asking you.

MR. HARTINGER: Well, I believe it

looked like it was. Yes, it is.

ALJ AGRANOFF: Okay. So it would

be your preference that the --

1 MR. HARTINGER: I would leave it up 2 to you people. That would be a preference that 3 may relieve the pressure off some of the other land owners on 22 now. Since we already have it 4 at the end of New Holland. 5 6 ALJ AGRANOFF: Mr. Saterwhite, do 7 you have any questions? 8 MR. SATERWHITE: No questions. 9 Thank you. 10 ALJ AGRANOFF: Thank you, sir. Ms. 11 Joyce Hamilton. 12 (WITNESS SWORN) 13 14 JOYCE HAMILTON called as a witness, being duly sworn, testified 15 16 as follows: 17 ALJ AGRANOFF: Please state your 18 full name and address. 19 MS. HAMILTON; By name is Joyce S. 2.0 I live at 2811 Reeves Road, Northeast Hamilton. 2.1 in Warren, Ohio. I am here tonight speaking on 22 behalf of the Shelic Family Trust Farm of which 23 I am a trustee. 24 This proposed -- the preferred route 25 will impact this farm dramatically in that it is

going to use more than half of our frontage in the best land that we have to farm.

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But, the thing that concerns me as a former science teacher and lifelong ecologist is that, as was mentioned by the first lady who spoke, there is a lot of concern about exposure to high power electricity transmission and the occurrence of cancer in specially children, different kinds of cancers.

And in your region the preferred route is going to skirt a rather densely populated area that has quite a few children in it. I heard the numbers of residents compared, and I have to question that because in looking at the alternative route it appears to me that it goes in regions that are more open, away from residential areas, particularly on the Westfall Road.

We come down, impact our home, our house that we have there. And on down the road it skirts around an area of tiny homes, small homes, as trailers. I think there are about eight there.

And it's going to run within several feet, less than 100 feet of all of those

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     domiciles. That is all.

I think many of the things already said many people agree with both ways. 7 8 Both routes would impact people, and the safety, economic value, I think has to be taken into 9 consideration. 10 Definitely the aspect of our history 11 12 of our state, I think the -- I want to call it 1.3 pond, I am sorry, should be considered. All of 14 these things are important. 15 I guess that is pretty much all I 16 have to say. 17 ALJ AGRANOFF: Thank you. Mr. 18 Saterwhite, any questions? 19 MR. SATERWHITE: No questions. 2.0 Thank you very much. 2.1 ALJ AGRANOFF: Thank you, sir. 22 John Stevenson.

called as a witness, being first duly sworn, testified as follows:

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ALJ AGRANOFF: Please state your full name and your address, please.

MR. STEVENSON: John Stevenson, 24574 State Route 104, Circleville.

I guess my concerns are that I haven't really heard the answers that I think we need, and that is like how much of field area is going to be taken. The last 40 years I have had the displeasure of farming around the 765 power line going through my farm and other parts of Wayne Township.

A major displeasure. And sometimes the safety factor when you are working under it.

So, those things would have to be considered in agriculture areas and domestic areas. Can you build under them, can you build a domestic home, how close, things like that.

There are just so many unanswered things in my opinion that I am very uncomfortable with. And again the experiences that we have with the 765 knowing that this is just a portion of that power-wise, and we will have the same degradation of the community

probably, but still it's an alarming situation. 1 2 The fact that we can't be identified 3 where the poles will actually be set, that is a concern. How wide the right-of-way will be. 4 5 We know that it will be 100 feet, but we don't know from where. We don't know where the middle 6 of that 100 feet will be and the poles will be 7 8 placed. 9 So, there is concerns for my own 10 farm and my neighbors' farms and my neighbors' 11 community. Thank you. 12 ALJ AGRANOFF: Thank you, sir. Mr. 13 Saterwhite, any questions of this witness? 14 MR. SATERWHITE: Thank you, your 15 Honor. No questions. Thank you very much. 16 ALJ AGRANOFF: Thank you. The next 17 name I have is a representative from Dowden and 18 Dowden Incorporated. 19 (WITNESS SWORN) 2.0 2.1 HAROLD DOWDEN 22 called as a witness, being first duly sworn, testified as follows: 23 24 ALJ AGRANOFF: Please state your 25 full name and address for the record.

MR. DOWDEN: Harold Dowden, 2807 1 2 U.S. 22, Circleville, Ohio. Why, when you get a 3 farm you think it's yours. And you build you a 4 nice house and here comes the electric line. 5 Your 138 acre farm is probably 6 depreciated 15 percent. And if you put the house on the market, guess what? Nobody 7 8 wants it, because electric line comes behind 9 you. 10 And the way I look at it, you are 11 getting electric from Chillicothe to Circleville 12 already, so why not follow the line you already 13 got. As you can see you got a bunch of people 14 here that's not very happy with this. 15 So, I suggest you use the old 16 existing right-of-way you got and you make a lot 17 of people happy. That is all I got to say. 18 ALJ AGRANOFF: Thank you, sir. Mr. 19 Saterwhite, any questions? 2.0 MR. SATERWHITE: No questions. 2.1 Thank you, Your Honor. 22 ALJ AGRANOFF: Mr. Byron Gearhart. 23 (WITNESS SWORN) 24 25 BYRON GEARHART

called as a witness, being first duly sworn, testified as follows:

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ALJ AGRANOFF: Please state your full name and your address for the record.

MR. GEARHART: I am Byron Gearhart, 9845 Williamsport Pike, Chillicothe.

After listening to everybody here this evening it's been educational. I have an existing right-of-way. I also have a farm that is in both paths, and the third path which has already been eliminated.

I am a 7th generation farmer, No. 8 is interested and No. 9 is starting in. I understand that I own the base that everybody wants, the land. You can't build a road with utilities anywhere but land. And if you are a farmer and you own land they are going to want it.

I want electric, I want water, I want the phone, I want a road. I have been through road expansion projects, I have been through a connector link on a 7,500 line, with South Central Power. I have had water lines come up and around and through me. And now we have this.

I understand, our society needs 2.3 children per family to grow. We are growing at about 2.9 the last figure that I knew.

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So society grows, we move on, and we expand. Infrastructure that was built 50, 60 years ago will not stand up. It has to be either replaced, rebuilt or relocated.

As I mentioned, both the proposed and the preferred cross farms I either own or I farm. On Swaney Road last year I went to the meeting and realized one of the routes was right through a field that I have a pivot standing in.

Well, I unloaded the one across from Swaney Road this morning. So my plans are going and expanding.

So, I understand about the cancer issue with children. I have four of my own and two grandchildren. And we live not that far.

My son lives practically underneath a current transmission line that connects Chillicothe and Circleville.

So, it is what it is. But, we have to work together. And it's going to be tough to farm around structures, as I know Mr. Stevenson has for years. I farmed around structures until

they came along two years later and moved them out along the road.

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Rural community is very easy target because there is not many people. But with modern machinery, technology, and the size of the machinery we have we can take down very large lines by accident, very easily. Just get on Utube. There is plenty of examples.

So, as far as I am concerned it is a necessary evil. We have to have it. Am I happy about it? No. I am willing to work with you any way I can because for the greater good and the advancement of our society we need to have it.

Think about this. What would our country be like instead of 9-11 knocking down three buildings, and nearly 4,000 lives, what would we have done if they would have ran into four large power generating stations on the east coast?

We would of had tens of thousands of deaths because of no electricity, and 50,000 people per square mile in New York.

I feel very fortunate to live out here. With agriculture we support the rest of

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the world. But, in return the infrastructure has to go through us. Thank you.

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ALJ AGRANOFF: Thank you, sir. One question I do have. Between the preferred and the alternative routes do you have a preference relative to those two options?

MR. GEARHART: As they are the preferred route makes more sense. I realize it puts it in many of my friends' back yards. But, water and electricity doesn't meet very well. And safety is a large concern.

And I worked with South Central

Power on the connector line on Kellenberger Road

and we put water 26 to 27 feet in the air. We

can here the lines crackle. So, I just, you

know, we are smart enough to stay away from that

close proximity.

ALJ AGRANOFF: So your concern and belief is that the alternative route would create a larger --

MR. GEARHART: As it is currently drawn it's right through the middle of a field that has a pivot. Going down along the edge of the road it will be going through a pivot that hopefully will be built by end of the month.

And so unless you have a large checkbook and want to move my pivots or come up with another option going around the pivots that is going to be a large problem.

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ALJ AGRANOFF: And relative to how you believe the alternative route is currently constructed?

MR. GEARHART: The alternative route I understand. I don't want it in my back yard. I understand that completely.

My grandparents fought Camp Sherman, and they won. My parents fought a duck refuge which was going to take our entire operation and they won.

There is no winning this. We have to have it somewhere. Do I want it in the middle of my field where I have to farm around it like Mr. Stevenson? No.

Is it better there than 50 feet off the back of someone's house? Probably. It's a situation that has to be resolved. We have to answer questions, and we can point to lots of different studies and lots of different things.

But we need to find a way that it impacts people the least and impacts agriculture

the least. And that would be the existing right-of-ways.

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But to do that means to build a line in very close proximity to a line that is already active. That is hazardous.

And, you know, I have a current line on Kellenberger Road that is I think it's a 69. It would make sense to put that down the existing right-of-way. But do you want to put large poles up that close to a line? Because it has a 70 foot right-of-way. And you are talking about a 100.

So, I don't know. It's painful any way you do it. But if you want to create a completely new line and do with whatever the old ones, impacting people and agriculture is a challenge.

Yes, if you are going to make me choose I would prefer the preferred line down Westfall. But, I have a farm there too, and I am going to farm around it one way or another. So it affects me anywhere you go unless you find a completely different route.

ALJ AGRANOFF: Okay. Thank you.

Mr. Saterwhite, any questions?

27 1 MR. SATERWHITE: No questions. Thank 2 you, sir. 3 ALJ AGRANOFF: Mr. David Horn. (WITNESS SWORN) 4 5 6 DAVID HORN 7 called as a witness, being first duly sworn, 8 testified as follows: 9 ALJ AGRANOFF: Please state your 10 full name and address for the record. 11 MR. HORN: My name is David Horn. 12 I live at 37 Arden Road in Columbus. And off 13 the record the traffic is terrible coming down. 14 But on the record I just wanted to 15 second what Ada was saying about the proximity 16 of the preferred route to Calamus Swamp. 17 I am the conservation chair for the 18 Columbus Audubon and we manage Calamus Swamp as 19 a conservation area that has not only 2.0 conversation value as a wetland, and I am not 2.1 going to lecture anybody on that, but it also 22 has educational value and a quality of life 23 issue as well. 24 And these places that people can go to get away from it all and appreciate the 25

outdoors, there are fewer and fewer of those as our society advances.

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Here is one that is available, it's there, it's open to the public. You can go up there any old time and walk around. You can park, we have a parking lot and you can walk around the boardwalk in the mud and simply appreciate that area.

And the closer that preferred route is to that particular piece of property the more concerns we have that we are going to lose some of that quality of that particular location.

ALJ AGRANOFF: Specific to the concerns that you have relative to the society that you represent, is the alternative route more preferable?

MR. HORN: The alternative route would be more preferable because it doesn't impact the property directly, which pushes the issue off on some other people who would prefer the preferred route. I understand that.

ALJ AGRANOFF: Mr. Saterwhite, do you have questions?

MR. SATERWHITE: No questions. Thank you, sir.

ALJ AGRANOFF: Thank you. Mr. Tim 1 2 Hartsock. Are you interested in testifying? 3 MR. HARTSOCK: No, I am not interested in testifying. 4 5 ALJ AGRANOFF: Thank you. That is 6 all the names that I have been provided. 7 MR. BARTHELMAS: I am on there and 8 you skipped me. 9 ALJ AGRANOFF: I am sorry. 10 (WITNESS SWORN) 11 12 STEVE BARTHELMAS 13 called as a witness, being first duly sworn, 14 testified as follows: 15 ALJ AGRANOFF: Please state your 16 full name and address. 17 MR. BARTHELMAS: My name is Steve Barthelmas. I live at 26450 State Route 104, 18 19 Circleville. 2.0 I feel like this thing should be 2.1 over here talking to these folks here. 22 Harold stole some of my thunder and with 23 apologies to Mr. Gearhart. 2.4 Both of these lines that are 25 proposed probably affect me equally. Either one of those. But, Harold, Mr. Gearhart, touched on there is an existing line coming out of the Circleville substation going to Chillicothe.

And from the beginning, from the beginning they told me that line was coming out.

Now, if they told me wrong, I don't know, but they told me that old line was coming out.

And we touched on using that existing right-of-way, rather than affecting the swamp and so many people. Now, you get down about Yellow Bud you are going to have people on Yellow Bud.

But, I asked from the beginning why they don't put it on that existing right-of-way since that line is coming out anyway. And nobody has given me a good answer.

And that is one point that I want to make. The other point I want to make was you invite all these people in here and you all came down and you don't have too many answers for us, to our questions. I guess that is it.

ALJ AGRANOFF: Mr. Saterwhite.

MR. SATERWHITE: No questions.

ALJ AGRANOFF: Thank you, sir.

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31 Appreciate it. 1 2 (WITNESS SWORN) 3 4 HESBE MIEDEMA 5 called as a witness, being first duly sworn, testified as follows: 6 7 ALJ AGRANOFF: Please state your 8 full name and your address. 9 MIEDEMA: My name is Hesbe Miedema. 10 I live at 24376 State Route 104. 11 ALJ AGRANOFF: And what community? 12 MS. MIEDEMA: In Wayne Township. 13 ALJ AGRANOFF: Is that Circleville? 14 MS. MIEDEMA: Yes. On 104. We have 15 a dairy on 104 and both routes will affect us. 16 One goes on the back and one goes on the side 17 along Mrs. Burke's. 18 And both Ms. Burke and we don't like 19 those routes, but we would like to see that it 2.0 would go along the 104 so we don't cut through 2.1 the countryside to us. 22 And I know the swamp is there, but 23 there are electric lines already and it would 24 make sense if it would go along 104 because of

the existing lines. And that way it would not

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affect our farm, and our future plans.

If we have to chose out of both options we would prefer the preferred, preferred route, because that is further away from our buildings. And we are scared that the other route will be to close to our buildings and to our equipment and to our cows.

And there are reports that it might affect the health, fertility of cows, and for that reason we preferred the red route. But, our preferred route would be along the 104.

12 ALJ AGRANOFF: Thank you.

13 Mr. Saterwhite.

MR. SATERWHITE: No questions.

15 Thank you.

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16 ALJ AGRANOFF: Is there any other
