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1	HEARING OFFICER: All right.
2	Let's go on the record.
3	The Ohio Power Siting Board has
4	assigned for public hearing at this time
5	place, Case Number 14-1717-GA-BLN, which
6	is captioned: In the Matter of the
7	Application of NRG Ohio Pipeline
8	Company, LLC, for approval of a letter
9	of notification for the Avon Lake Gas
10	Addition Project in Lorain County, Ohio.
11	Good evening. My name is Sarah
12	Parrot. I am the administrative law
13	judge that's been assigned to hear this
14	case. I work in the Board's legal
15	department. I will be presiding at this
16	hearing this evening. In addition,
17	there are a number of board staff
18	members that are here this evening.
19	They're mostly out in the hallway here.
20	There's a table out there with some of
21	the Board's information. I believe
22	there's a list of frequently asked
23	questions about this project that's out
24	there. If you haven't seen that, you
25	might want to pick up a copy. But if

1 you do have questions, the Board staff 2 is available this evening. 3 At this time, I wish to get started with appearances. We will start with 4 5 the company, NRG Ohio Pipeline. MR. O'BRIEN: Thank you, Your 6 7 Honor. On behalf of NRG Ohio Pipeline, Bricker and Eckler, LLP, by Thomas 8 O'Brien and Dylan Borchers, 100 South 9 10 Third Street, Columbus, Ohio, 43215. 11 Thank you. 12 HEARING OFFICER: Thank you, Mr. O'Brien. 13 14 Is counsel present for Ohio Edison 15 Company, the Cleveland Electric 16 Illuminating Company, and American Transmissions Systems, Incorporated? 17 Let the record reflect counsel for 18 First Energy is not present this 19 20 evening. 21 Is counsel for the Lorain County 22 Property Owners that have been granted intervention in this proceeding present 23 24 this evening? 25 MALE AUDIENCE MEMBER: Yes.

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1 HEARING OFFICER: Counsel? 2 MALE AUDIENCE MEMBER: Oh. Never 3 mind. HEARING OFFICER: All right. Let 4 5 the record reflect that counsel for the 6 Lorain County property owners that have 7 been granted party status in this proceeding is not present this evening. 8 The subject of today's hearing is a 9 10 letter of notification application filed 11 by NRG Ohio Pipeline Company for the 12 purpose of constructing the Avon Lake Gas Addition Project, which consists of 13 14 a proposed natural gas pipeline, 15 metering station and regulating station 16 in Lorain County, Ohio. NRG pipeline filed its letter of 17 notification application on December 19, 18 2014. I would also note that the Board 19 20 staff filed a report of investigation on March 27th, 2015. This is a 21 recommendation of the Board staff and 22 does not necessarily reflect what the 23 24 Board's final determination in this case 25 will be.

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1 The purpose of this evening's local 2 public hearing is to receive comments regarding NRG's pipeline letter of 3 notification application from interested 4 5 persons in the local community who are affected by the proposed project but who 6 7 are not party to the case. Tonight's local public hearing is 8 not a question-and-answer session but is 9 rather an opportunity to let the Board 10 know what you think about the proposed 11 12 project. Tonight's local public hearing 13 is only one aspect of the process in this case. An evidentiary hearing is 14 15 scheduled to commence on April 23rd, 2015 at the Board offices in Columbus. 16 The purpose of the evidentiary 17 18 hearing is for the parties: NRG Pipeline, First Energy, and the property 19 20 owner interveners, as well as the Board 21 staff to provide testimony and other 22 evidence regarding the project. Tonight's hearing is being 23 24 transcribed by a court reporter. If you 25 plan to testify, please speak clearly so

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1 that the court reporter can accurately 2 reflect your comments on the record. 3 Also, if you have prepared a written statement, it would be helpful if you 4 5 provide a copy to the court reporter. When you arrived, you were offered 6 7 the opportunity to e sign up to testify. After I finish with my 8 introduction, I will begin calling 9 10 witnesses forward that have signed the 11 sign-up sheet and ask you to come up to 12 the podium and face the court reporter. 13 Before you give your comments, I will ask you to state your name and your 14 15 address. Before you present your 16 testimony, I will ask you to take an oath or affirmation that what you're 17 about to say is the truth. Your 18 19 testimony will then be considered part 20 of the official record in this case, and 21 it will be reviewed by the Board before a final decision is made on the 22 23 application. 24 Additionally, the parties to the case and I will be permitted to ask you 25

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1 questions about your statement. Should 2 you decide that you do not want to 3 testify when I call your name, you can merely pass to the next witness. Also, 4 5 once you finished testifying, or if you are just here to observe, you may leave 6 7 at any time you wish. 8 The Board appreciates your 9 participation in tonight's hearing, and we want everyone who wishes to make a 10 11 statement to have the opportunity to do 12 so. At this time, I will begin to call 13 witnesses forward, and I apologize in 14 15 advance if I mispronounce any names, 16 which I'm sure to do. 17 Our first witness this evening is Michael Bertolone. 18 How did I do? 19 20 MR. BERTOLONE: You did it. 21 _ _ _ 22 MICHAEL BERTOLONE, 23 After having been first duly sworn, as 24 hereinafter certified, was examined and testified 25 as follows:

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1 HEARING OFFICER: Please state your 2 name and address. 3 MR. BERTOLONE: Michael Bertolone. 3515 Prospect Avenue, Cleveland, Ohio. 4 5 I am here to represent the Operating Engineers Local 18. On behalf 6 7 of our 15,000 current and retired members, I'm here to let the Board know 8 9 that the operating engineers are in full 10 support of the Avon Lake Gas Addition 11 Project. 12 This project will provide great 13 jobs for our members who install this 14 pipe and perform future integrity and 15 maintenance work on the pipeline. 16 This project will help fund our members health and welfare, pension, and 17 18 our apprenticeship program training 19 book. 20 We have a commitment from NRG to 21 utilize our members on this project, and 22 this will ensure that the safest, most qualified operators are utilized on the 23 24 project. 25 We urge the Board to take into

1	account the operating engineers and the
2	other trades that will also benefit from
3	this project when deciding to approve.
4	Thank you.
5	HEARING OFFICER: Thank you very
6	much.
7	Any questions from the company?
8	MR. O'BRIEN: No questions, Your
9	Honor.
10	HEARING OFFICER: Our next witness
11	is Paul Harvey.
12	At this point, I'm just going to
13	make a general announcement. There are
14	quite a few of you in the room that are
15	wearing blue T-shirts with NRG's logo.
16	In light of that, I do need to ask you,
17	if you're wearing one whether you are an
18	employee of NRG, and if so, what the
19	purpose of your testimony is. We may
20	need to and I see that. So please
21	answer the question, are you an employee
22	of NRG?
23	MR. HARVEY: Yes, I am an employee
24	of NRG.
25	HEARING OFFICER: In what capacity

are you testifying this evening? 1 MR.HARVEY: Well, I'm testifying 2 from the fact that I'm a new resident of 3 Ohio. I previously lived in New York, 4 5 and while I was there, I experienced the blackout of 2003. 6 7 HEARING OFFICER: Well, let me cut you off there. Are you testifying in 8 your official capacity as an employee of 9 10 the company this evening? MR. HARVEY: No. 11 12 HEARING OFFICER: All right. So 13 you're testifying purely as a citizen of 14 the -- or an individual of the State of Ohio? 15 MR.HARVEY: Who lives in Ohio in 16 Avon Lake. 17 HEARING OFFICER: All right. We'll 18 see how it goes from there. Please 19 20 state your name and address. 21 MR. HARVEY: My name is Paul 22 Harvey. I live at 264 Moore Road, Avon Lake, Ohio. 23 24 Back in 2003 I lived and worked in 25 upstate New York, and we experienced

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1 what we call a catastrophic blackout to 2 pretty much the entire northeastern 3 seaboard of the country and definitely sections of the midwest. That was due 4 5 to many reasons, but they could not stabilize the grid. 6 7 Avon Lake's generating station has a very critical role to play in 8 stability of the grid and the supply of 9 electricity to the residence who receive 10 11 power from the station. 12 During that 2003, people don't realize how important electricity is 13 until you don't have it. Simple things 14 15 such as pumping gas, can't do it. 16 People with relatives in the hospital on electric-powered life-saving equipment, 17 their lives became at risk. 18 19 This power station stabilizes the 20 grid. No questions about it. No doubt. When I look at Avon Lake -- I 21 22 live here in Ohio. I don't just look at 23 it as a gas line coming to the plant, 24 but something that's going to have an effect on the quality of life in the 25

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1 region. The importance of this plant in 2 terms of being able to go home and know 3 that the light will come on and stay on, very important. It's an established 4 5 fact. That's all I have to say. HEARING OFFICER: Thank you, 6 7 Mr. Harvey. MR. O'BRIEN: Mr. Harvey, I just 8 have a quick question for you. 9 10 Could you clarify for the record 11 who your employer is? 12 MR. HARVEY: NRG. MR. O'BRIEN: NRG? 13 14 MR. HARVEY: Avon Lake Generating 15 Station. MR. O'BRIEN: Avon Lake Generating 16 17 Station. Thank you. 18 HEARING OFFICER: Thank you, 19 Mr. O'Brien. 20 Our next witness is the Honorable 21 Greg Zilka. 22 MAYOR GREG ZILKA, 23 24 After having been first duly sworn, as 25 hereinafter certified, was examined and testified 14

1 as follows:

2	HEARING OFFICER: Please state your
3	name and address.
4	MR. ZILKA: My name is Greg Zilka.
5	I'm the Mayor of the City of Avon Lake.
6	My residence is 375 Creekside Drive.
7	Obviously, Avon Lake, Ohio.
8	Madam Chair and Members of The Ohio
9	Power Siting Board, thank you for coming
10	to Lorain County to hear the testimony
11	of the people on the proposed NRG
12	Natural Gas Pipeline.
13	On February 29, 2012 GenOn Energy,
14	Incorporated announced that it would
15	close the coal-powered electrical
16	generating plant in April of 2015 due to
17	the rising costs associated with newly
18	established EPA regulations. The
19	overwhelming costs associated with
20	complying with the new Mercury and Air
21	Toxic Standards (MATS,) it was
22	determined, could not be recovered by
23	continuing to operate the plant, which
24	is an older coal-powered plant.
25	In March of 2012 I was contacted by

1 a staff member of the House of 2 Representatives Committee of the 3 Judiciary to come to Washington to testify to a subcommittee about these 4 varying standards. In lieu of my going 5 there, I did ask our Environmental 6 7 Committee Chairman Rob James, who is our environmental lawyer through that 8 instead. He also would testify several 9 10 months later at a U.S. Senate Committee 11 on the environment, again, a subcommittee, testifying about the 12 economic impact of the plants closing. 13 The loss to the city of income tax 14 15 revenues and property tax due to the 16 closing of the plant by themselves may seem high, which is approximately 17 \$580,000. But to repair -- to compare 18 that loss to the revenue with the 19 20 substantial loss of revenue of the local 21 government funds and the estate tax totaling approximately one million 22 dollars creates a substantial burden on 23 24 the city's operating costs. Those are 25 the numbers that we calculated two years

1 ago. They pretty much hold.

2	Mr. Scott, the superintendent of
3	Avon Lake City Schools, I'm sure, will
4	tell you more, more harrowing story
5	about what the schools are facing.
6	We're proud of our schools. We're proud
7	of our city services. Both entities
8	bring a quality of life which we all
9	enjoy.
10	In July of 2012, NRG Energy,
11	Incorporated and GenOn announced that
12	they would combine the two companies,
13	and in December 2012 the merger was
14	completed with NRG as the successor
15	company.
16	In June of 2013, NRG announced it
17	was planning to keep the Avon Lake
18	facility open contingent upon the
19	ability to install an 18-mile long
20	natural gas pipeline from south of
21	Grafton, Ohio to the shores of Lake
22	Erie.
23	On March 9th of this year the Power
24	Siting Board met and scheduled a public
25	hearing on the construction of the

1 proposed pipeline, and that brings us 2 here this evening.

3	The power plant has been in
4	existence since 1920, and the region has
5	benefited not only from its electric
6	power, but also from the substantial tax
7	dollars which have funded our schools,
8	the quality services performed by the
9	City of Avon Lake, our public library,
10	our vocational school and community
11	college and other various county
12	programs that have met the needs of the
13	residence of Lorain County.
14	Industrial giants, such as Ford
15	Motor Company and BFG Goodrich chose
16	Avon Lake in the past in part, due to
17	the supply of electrical power. The
18	latter has evolved into three different
19	industrial entities, PolyOne with its
20	corporate headquarters in Avon Lake. A
21	branch of Lubrizol and Mexichem all on
22	the former B.F. Goodrich site. Other
23	smaller industrial firms have also
24	provided employment that have supported
25	the solid middle class in Northern Ohio,

1 including Lorain County. All can trace 2 their history back to the plentiful 3 electrical power on the shores of Lake Erie. It is in the best interest of 4 5 Northern Ohio that the plant continue to 6 provide power to the grid so that we can 7 maintain what we have now and to grow, also, in the future. 8

It's evident that without the 9 natural gas pipeline and the tax revenue 10 11 that it would be generated, city 12 services and academic programs would be put in jeopardy. Some residents of our 13 community initially found comfort in the 14 15 prospect of the plant's closing. Cleaner 16 air and the use of the site for luxury housing and shopping and upscale 17 18 restaurants would be very appealing to 19 some. But the alternative to the plant 20 staying open would be a large industrial 21 structure surrounded by a fence, as NRG 22 has no plans to tear it down and it 23 could sit idle for many years. Very few 24 tax dollars generated and a very large facility in a condition that would be 25

1 much less appealing than what we see 2 right now will be the likely result. 3 Even if the plant were to be sold, the prospect of clearing the site of 4 5 hazardous materials from almost 90 years of use when it was common practice in 6 7 the past to dump waste chemicals onto the ground and other unforeseen concerns 8 9 would be a huge challenge. 10 In closing, we have a constructive 11 dialogue with the representatives of 12 NRG. We have a common purpose, but we have different masters. We have an 13 ongoing difference of opinion as to what 14 is the fair level of tax revenue to be 15 16 generated by the power plant and the surrounding infrastructure. We 17 18 represent the residence of the city, and 19 they answer to their shareholders. We 20 are both committed to keeping the plant 21 open, and we will continue to work 22 toward a common goal, a natural gas pipeline generating electricity using a 23 24 cleaner fuel that provides jobs and a 25 fair rate of taxes to allow for quality

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1	city services and an excellent school
2	system to continue. We offer our full
3	support and cooperation in making the
4	pipeline a reality.
5	Madam Chair, thank you for this
6	opportunity to present our views and
7	concerns. Your decisions will affect or
8	future. Thank you.
9	HEARING OFFICER: Thank you, Mayor
10	Zilka.
11	Any questions from counsel?
12	MR. O'BRIEN: No questions, Your
13	Honor.
14	HEARING OFFICER: Thank you.
15	Our next witness is Councilman
16	Dan I apologize, Dan. Bucci?
17	MR. BUCCI: Perfect.
18	
19	DAN BUCCI,
20	After having been first duly sworn, as
21	hereinafter certified, was examined and testified
22	as follows:
23	HEARING OFFICER: Please state you
24	name and address for the record.
25	MR. BUCCI: Thank you. Dan Bucci,

1 B-U-C-C-I. Address is 31904 Fieldstone 2 Circle, Avon Lake, Ohio 44012. 3 Madam Chair, thank you for holding this hearing in Lorain County, and thank 4 5 you for the opportunity to appear this 6 evening. 7 My name is Dan Bucci, and I have the honor of representing over 22,000 8 residence of Avon Lake as one of their 9 at-large members of City Council. I've 10 been on council for five years and chair 11 12 our Economic Development Committee, as well as the Human Resources Committee. 13 I'm also the co-chair of the West End 14 15 Redevelopment Commission, which I will 16 tell you a little bit more about later 17 in my testimony. 18 Avon Lake, I'm biased, but it's a beautiful town a little east of here on 19 20 the shores of Lake Erie. It's a very 21 friendly and welcoming place to raise a 22 family and eventually retire. Madam Chair, you just heard from 23 24 our mayor, Greg Zilka, so I will not belabor the points that he made, or the 25

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1	points that representatives of the
2	school board will make. However, this
3	hearing is about the ever-important
4	issue of if and how and when the
5	proposed pipeline can be sited and
6	constructed; in other words, deciding
7	the fate of the Avon Lake plant. With
8	no pipeline, there is no plant.
9	Closing of the plant would
10	certainly have a negative impact on the
11	City of Avon Lake. First and foremost,
12	the city would be left with the ruins of
13	a century-old power plant. As I said, I
14	co-chair the West End Redevelopment
15	Commission as a group of elected
16	officials, but more importantly,
17	business owners and residents that are
18	working to revitalize the entire west
19	side of Avon Lake, including the general
20	vicinity of the plant. Our goals would
21	be considerably easier to accomplish if
22	we could work with a thriving
23	participant of the business community
24	rather than a vacant mass of steel. Of
25	course there would be the loss of jobs,

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1 as well. Obviously, this reduces the 2 amount of tax revenue coming into the 3 City that pays for vital services, most notably, our fire and EMS service relies 4 5 heavily on property taxes. While we oppose NRG's continued 6 7 efforts to reduce its tax valuation, we were well aware that a closure of the 8 plant would foster the steepest 9 10 reductions possible. But the plant shuttering its doors also has a human 11 12 toll on the men and women that will be out of a job. The stress and pain of 13 being out of work and worrying about how 14 15 one will provide for his or her family 16 has an immeasurably negative impact on families, neighborhoods, and communities 17 18 in general. 19 The impact on the Avon Lake Schools 20 would be even more pronounced. Well 21 over 90 percent of our graduating 22 seniors go on to either a two- or a four-year college or out to serve our 23 24 country in the military. The school system is a major reason why people 25

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1 choose to move or remain in Avon Lake. 2 It is everyone's best interest, 3 students, parents, and homeowners, to maintain those high standards. Denying 4 5 this pipeline and causing the plant to close would make this a near 6 7 impossibility. Not too long ago, the residents of 8 9 Avon Lake very generously passed a major tax levy -- major tax levy to make up 10 11 for the lost revenues from the power 12 plant. They simply cannot be asked to 13 give more. In conclusion, Madam Chair, I want 14 15 to make it clear that Avon Lake City 16 Council is willing to work with you, the Power Siting Board, and the Public 17 Utilities Commission, NRG, and the 18 19 surrounding communities to ensure this 20 pipeline is safely constructed in 21 accordance with all equipable laws and 22 regulations to everyone's benefit. 23 Thank you. 24 HEARING OFFICER: Any questions 25 Mr. O'Brien?

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1 MR. O'BRIEN: No questions, Your 2 Honor. 3 HEARING OFFICER: Thank you very 4 much. 5 Our next witness is Adrian Peyton. - - -6 7 ADRIAN PEYTON, 8 After having been first duly sworn, as hereinafter certified, was examined and testified 9 10 as follows: 11 HEARING OFFICER: Please state your name and address. 12 13 MR. PEYTON: My name is Adrian Peyton. I live at 932 Fairwood 14 15 Boulevard, Elyria, Ohio. 16 I'd like to take this opportunity 17 to speak on behalf of the President of Local 270, myself as chairman of Local 18 270, Avon Division, as well as the 19 20 general membership of the workers of the 21 plant. We represent the union craft, 22 the workers of the Avon Lake Power 23 Plant, and I am speaking today in 24 support of the proposed energy pipeline 25 at the Avon Lake Plant.

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1 For years the public has asked for 2 clean power, cleaner air. This pipeline 3 will allow the plant to remain open and be fueled by natural gas to meet new 4 5 environmental regulations. This means continued well-paying jobs for our union 6 7 members, as well as tax support for the local economy of Lorain County. Our 8 other union brothers and sisters at 9 other area plants, at Lake Shore, East 10 Lake, Ashtabula are not being afforded 11 this opportunity. Those plants will no 12 13 longer be generating on coal. They're not given the chance as we have been 14 15 given to run on gas. So in this 16 environment where other plants are being shut down, we appreciate NRG Energy's 17 18 work to keep our plant open. And I would request that the Ohio Power Siting 19 20 Board grant a quick approval of the NRG 21 Ohio Pipeline Application. 22 HEARING OFFICER: Any questions? MR. O'BRIEN: No questions, Your 23 24 Honor. 25 HEARING OFFICER: Thank you,

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1 Mr. Peyton. 2 Our next witness is Mike Sweeney. 3 MIKE SWEENEY, 4 5 After having been first duly sworn, as hereinafter certified, was examined and testified 6 7 as follows: HEARING OFFICER: Please state you 8 9 name and address. 10 MR. SWEENEY: Mike Sweeney, 572 Bridgeside Drive, Avon Lake, Ohio. 11 12 There appears to be a war on coal in this country, and while other forms 13 of electrical generation may have 14 15 environmental benefits, they're not 16 viable to best opportunities at the present time. And I'm concerned as we 17 18 keep shutting down all these power 19 plants how we're going to maintain the 20 grid. It's one thing to talk about 21 improvement, but you have to have an alternate solutions. 22 I strongly urge that this power 23 24 plant be kept open so that it be part of 25 the grid, especially converting to a

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1 more beneficial, cleaner-burning power 2 source. Thank you. 3 HEARING OFFICER: Any questions? MR. O'BRIEN: Yes, Your Honor. 4 5 Mr. Sweeney, I just want to clarify for the record, you don't work for NRG 6 7 Ohio Pipeline, do you? MR. SWEENEY: No. 8 MR. O'BRIEN: Thank you. 9 10 HEARING OFFICER: Thank you, Mr. O'Brien. 11 12 Our next witness is Susan Poole. 13 All right, Miss Poole, you know what question I'm going to ask you. Who 14 15 is your employer? MS. POOLE: It is not NRG. 16 HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Is it the 17 18 generating station? 19 MS. POOLE: No. 20 HEARING OFFICER: Okay. 21 _ _ _ _ _ 22 SUSAN POOLE, 23 After having been first duly sworn, as 24 hereinafter certified, was examined and testified 25 as follows:

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1 HEARING OFFICER: All right. 2 Please state your name and address. 3 MS. POOLE: My name is Susan Poole, and I live at 415 Crestwood Drive in 4 5 Avon Lake. I am the director of a local 6 7 organization in Avon Lake called 8 Community Resource Services. Our agency provides basic needs assistance to 9 10 low-income households living in the communities of Avon and Avon Lake. 11 12 I am here to say a few words about what an outstanding corporate citizen 13 that NRG is, as I've seen firsthand how 14 15 concerned they are about the community 16 around them. First, they responded to our 17 18 requests in a variety of the ways. For starters, they've been the primary 19 20 corporate sponsor for our major fund 21 raiser each year. But they also host 22 food drives throughout the year to help keep our pantries stocked throughout the 23 24 year. And they send employee volunteers 25 to our office whenever we give them a

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1 call and say we're shorthanded, we need 2 some help. They send people over and 3 they help us stock the shelves and sort through cans. 4 5 Holiday times they're more than willing to help our clients by having a 6 7 giving tree in their office so that we can provide gifts to needy families. 8 I also see NRG as a very proactive 9 10 corporation in terms of how much they 11 care about their community as well. For 12 instance, back in 2012 when there was a 13 major storm, they gave us a call and said, how can we help people in our 14 15 local community that might be suffering from the effects of this storm. That 16 also came with a very nice support and 17 18 some manpower to help us do some things, 19 too. 20 So as a private, non-profit 21 organization, we really couldn't do any 22 of what we do without generous corporations in our community, like 23 24 NRG. We're very lucky to have them in 25 our community and to have them support

1 our mission and to understand what we 2 do. The hundreds of low-income families 3 that we serve each year at CRS have 4 5 truly benefited from the support that we've received from NRG, and we're very 6 7 grateful. Thank you. HEARING OFFICER: Any questions? 8 MR. O'BRIEN: No questions, Your 9 10 Honor. 11 HEARING OFFICER: Thank you, Miss 12 Poole. 13 All right. Our next witness is Michelle Seary? 14 15 MS. SEARCY: Searcy. HEARING OFFICER: Searcy. Got it. 16 Are you an employee of the pipeline 17 18 or the generating station? 19 MS. SEARCY: The generating 20 station. 21 HEARING OFFICER: The generating 22 station. 23 _ _ _ 24 MICHELLE SEARCY, 25 After having been first duly sworn, as

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1 hereinafter certified, was examined and testified

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as follows:

3 HEARING OFFICER: Please state your name and address. 4 5 MS. SEARCY: My name is Michelle Searcy. My address is 325 Main Street, 6 7 I live in Luckey, Ohio. HEARING OFFICER: Miss Searcy, I'm 8 9 sorry. Before you start, are you testifying in an official capacity as an 10 11 employee of the generating station this 12 evening or as a personal -- you have a 13 personal interest in the project? MS. SEARCY: It's more personal 14 15 interest in the project. 16 HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Then 17 please proceed. 18 MS. SEARCY: I've been employed at the generating station for about a year 19 20 and a half. I have to say, Avon Lake is 21 an awesome community. I actually drive 22 90 miles each way to come to work. I 23 have a ten-year old son. And I know 24 that the plant has been around since 25 1926. I can't imagine it being closed.

1 And I know that they've supported the 2 schools. And I really think that that's 3 what's important for our young people, as well. But that's really what I 4 5 wanted to say. Thank you. HEARING OFFICER: Questions 6 7 Mr. O'Brien? MR. O'BRIEN: No questions, Your 8 9 Honor. 10 HEARING OFFICER: Thank you, Miss 11 Searcy. 12 Our next witness is Scott Cameron. All right. Let's go ahead and swear you 13 14 in first. 15 16 SCOTT CAMERON, 17 After having been first duly sworn, as hereinafter certified, was examined and testified 18 19 as follows: 20 HEARING OFFICER: And Mr. Cameron, 21 before we start, are you an employee of 22 the generating station or pipeline, either one? 23 24 MR. CAMERON: Generating station. 25 HEARING OFFICER: The generating

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1 station. Are you testify in an official 2 capacity? 3 MR. CAMERON: No. HEARING OFFICER: The company 4 5 hasn't asked you to testify? MR. CAMERON: No. 6 7 HEARING OFFICER: Please state your name and address. 8 MR. CAMERON: My name is Scott 9 10 Cameron. I live at 9604 State Route 60, 11 Wakeman, Ohio. 12 I don't have a lot to say. I've been an employee of the plant for 25 13 years. It's helped -- the earnings I've 14 15 made there put two of my kids through 16 college and, you know, it's been a great place to work. And it's -- you know, 17 18 the plant's been there 90 years. It's 19 supported a lot of the community. It's 20 provided, you know, income for a lot of 21 people over the years. And it would sure be a shame to see it close down 22 when there is a cleaner fuel out there 23 24 that's available to run the plant. So 25 I'd just like to ask the Board to, you

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1 know, really consider passing this. HEARING OFFICER: Thank you. 2 3 Any questions? MR. O'BRIEN: No questions, Your 4 5 Honor. HEARING OFFICER: Thank you, 6 7 Mr. Cameron. All right. Our next witness is 8 9 the Honorable Terry Boose. 10 _ _ _ 11 TERRY BOOSE, After having been first duly sworn, as 12 hereinafter certified, was examined and testified 13 14 as follows: 15 HEARING OFFICER: Please state your 16 name and address. MR. BOOSE: Terry Boose. 5054 17 State Route 601, Norwalk, Ohio. 18 19 Thank you very much for being here 20 tonight. I really appreciate you coming 21 to Lorain County. To the members of the Ohio Power 22 Siting Board and the people of Lorain 23 24 County, my name is Terry Boose. And I 25 represent the southern townships of

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1 Lorain County, as well as parts of North 2 Ridgeville and all of Avon. I speak to 3 you today to voice my support for the proposed NRG Pipeline for the Avon Lake 4 Power Plant. 5 First, the proposed route of the 6 7 pipeline has been crafted with careful consideration. No portion of the 8 pipeline would significantly alter 9 10 existing land use, as the pipeline has already been routed per landowner 11 12 negotiations. 13 A portion of the pipeline would travel through existing utility 14 15 corridors, meaning the project is 16 designed to avoid high population and traffic locations. The pipeline would 17 18 not break up any parts of wetlands, ensuring a minimal impact on wildlife. 19 20 Next, the benefits of building the 21 pipeline are important to the economic 22 health of the region. The construction of the pipeline would ensure that Avon 23 24 Lake Power Plant can remain open and 25 make the transition from coal power to

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1	more environmentally friendly gas
2	power. This move would not only
3	maintain good paying jobs and a reliable
4	tax base for the City of Avon Lake, but
5	would help contribute to the existing
6	power grid diversity in our region,
7	ensuring that we do not have to rely on
8	distance sources of power.
9	Finally, it should be noted that
10	NRG has gone above and beyond the
11	qualifications mandated when planning
12	the construction of the pipeline.
13	Besides sending letters of notification
14	to local governments and public
15	libraries, NRG hosted two public
16	hearings and made themselves available
17	to interested parties to field questions
18	and alleviate concerns. Their pipeline
19	construction would follow all federal
20	and state safety guidelines and would
21	use state-of-the-art materials to
22	maximize reliability.
23	In conclusion, the NRG pipeline
24	project can be an economic boom to Avon
25	Lake and the surrounding region. NRG

1 has worked diligently to mitigate any 2 potential long-term costs the project 3 may cause. The jobs created by construction and maintained by 4 5 continuing operations at the Avon Lake Power Plant are a much better 6 7 alternative to a dormant plant and no jobs at all. I urge the favorable 8 9 support of the pipeline project from the 10 Board and the public. 11 HEARING OFFICER: Thank you. Any 12 questions? 13 MR. O'BRIEN: No questions, Your 14 Honor. 15 HEARING OFFICER: All right. Thank 16 you very much, Representative Boose. All right. I think I'm going to 17 mispronounce the next one. James 18 19 McManameo. 20 21 JAMES MCMANAMON 22 After having been first duly sworn, as hereinafter certified, was examined and testified 23 24 as follows: 25 HEARING OFFICER: And I'm going to

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1	ask, are you an employee of either the
2	generating station or the pipeline?
3	MR. McMANAMON: No, I'm not. I'm
4	the Business Manager of the Cleveland
5	Boilermakers.
6	HEARING OFFICER: Very good.
7	Please state your name and address.
8	MR. McMANAMON: I'm James
9	McManamed, 1435 East 13th Street.
10	HEARING OFFICER: Please proceed.
11	MR. McMANAMON: Okay. Good
12	evening. My name is James McManamon. I
13	am the business manager, secretary
14	/treasurer of Boilermakers Local 744.
15	We cover 17 counties in Ohio, four in
16	Pennsylvania, and Lorain County. I
17	began my career 37 years ago and have
18	personally worked at Avon doing clean
19	air work and boiler work.
20	My local was charted on November 8,
21	1920 in Cleveland, Ohio, and their
22	members are vital to the heavy
23	industry.
24	The Boilermaker trade consists of
25	highly-skilled craftsmen and women, who

1 specialize in new construction and 2 maintenance of industrial plants such as 3 the Avon Lake Power Plant. Boilermakers are thoroughly trained 4 5 in special skills such as TIG/MIG welding, oxyacetylene burning, arc 6 7 gouging, plasma arc cutting, tank erection, fitting, blueprint reading, 8 and other relating aptitudes. Members 9 10 of Local 744 arrive on the job site with OSHA safety training, drug tested, and 11 12 ready to meet the needs of the 13 construction industry's owners and contractors. Our goal is to provide 14 15 highly-skilled workers that help ensure 16 projects are completed on time and on or under budge. 17 Additionally, I serve as a trustee 18 for the Cleveland Building Trades 19 20 Council which has over 10,000 members 21 that live and work in this region. 22 Finally, my local belongs to the Affiliated Construction Trades Ohio 23 24 Foundation, ACT Ohio, which structurally 25 has 14 regional council and 137 local

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1 affiliates in total.

2	ACT Ohio is proud to represent more
3	than 90,000 building tradesmen and women
4	across the State of Ohio. ACT Ohio was
5	create to facilitate economic and
6	industrial development, promote
7	industries best practices for Ohio's
8	public and private construction.
9	On behalf of these organizations, I
10	am here with my members this evening in
11	support of the proposed pipeline
12	submitted to the Ohio Power Siting Board
13	by NRG Ohio Pipeline. This is an
14	important project for the region and the
15	state, and will certainly benefit my
16	members and their families. By enabling
17	the Avon Lake Power Plant to stay on
18	line, this project will allow the
19	facility to remain a viable economic
20	benefit to this community for years to
21	come.
22	Since the inception of the Clean
23	Air Act of 1970, the amendments in 1977
24	and 1990, it has become increasingly
25	difficult to bring existing coal-burning

1 boilers into compliance with these 2 standards. I couldn't have said it any 3 better, there is a crusade against coal. 4 5 Many of the boilers in our area have had to shut down operation due to 6 7 the increase costs of compliance. These are decisions that the utilities have 8 had to make in their systems. 9 Unfortunately, our area of northeast 10 11 Ohio has been negatively effected by these shutdowns, causing loss of jobs to 12 the area. Boilermakers have had to seek 13 work out of our jurisdiction and other 14 15 states. So as far as you can see, that 16 not only are the lives of the plant 17 people who work at the facility unsafe, but also others, such as boilermakers, 18 19 other craft trades, tooling, machinery 20 and other suppliers are also affected by 21 loss of jobs which affect the economy 22 and the area. Hundreds of construction workers 23 24 have benefited from the employment opportunities afforded the area by 25

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1	virtue of the plant being located here.
2	In closure, deactivation would cut
3	deep in the fabric of this community. I
4	am grateful for this proposal and the
5	opportunity to speak, as it has the
6	potential to instill much needed
7	longevity in this plant.
8	If the plant is forced to close
9	its doors completely and unable to
10	operate, then the loss of tax dollars to
11	the area would also enter into the mix.
12	As stated by NRG in its
13	application, the project will bring
14	environmental, economic, employment and
15	electrical supply reliability benefits
16	to the State of Ohio. The project will
17	contribute significantly to the local
18	economy through jobs and taxes. NRG
19	Ohio Pipeline anticipates hiring local
20	construction workers with a requisite
21	experience for the installation of the
22	proposed pipeline where possible.
23	Revenues from construction employment,
24	as well as local expenditures by both
25	the construction companies for

1 construction materials and nonlocal 2 construction workers for temporary 3 housing, food and entertainment will benefit the local economy. To me it's 4 5 simple, if this proposal results in dozens of job opportunities for our 6 7 members and others, longevity for this 8 key power producing facility, increased promotion of economic industrial growth, 9 10 supply stabilization, then the proposal is a winner across the board. 11 12 I strongly urge you to closely consider -- close consideration on all 13 14 that you have heard today and approve 15 the proposal from NRG Ohio Pipeline 16 Company. Thank you. 17 HEARING OFFICER: Any questions? 18 MR. O'BRIEN: No questions, Your 19 Honor. 20 HEARING OFFICER: Thank you very 21 much. 22 SCOTT HOEIRLE, 23 24 After having been first duly sworn, as hereinafter certified, was examined and testified 25

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1 as follows:

2	HEARING OFFICER: Before we get
3	started, are you an employee of the
4	generating station or the pipeline
5	company.
6	MR. HOEIRLE: No. I am not.
7	HEARING OFFICER: Very good. State
8	your name and address.
9	MR. HOEIRLE: Scott Hoeirle. 1971
10	Sexton Road, Austinburg, Ohio. That's
11	out in Ashtabula County. So I do travel
12	quite a ways to come to this plant to
13	work. And I want to reiterate what the
14	boilermaker said, the peripheral jobs
15	that you're going TO lose, if this does
16	not go through, is going to be
17	substantial. Not only the people in
18	this plant themselves, but like, I
19	stay out here at least two nights a
20	week. So I'm paying for hotels. I'm
21	going to your restaurants. Stopping t
22	buy gas here. So when you start losing
23	that base of the people that actually
24	support the plant, then it's not only
25	the people that work at the plant that

1 are going to lose. It's all that 2 peripheral business that's you're going 3 to have a problem with. So yeah, I think you ought to do the pipeline, 4 5 personally. Thank you. HEARING OFFICER: Questions? 6 7 MR. O'BRIEN: Yes, Your Honor. Mr. Hoeirle, what do you do at the 8 9 plant? 10 MR. HOEIRLE: Oh, I'm sorry. I should have said. I'm a pipe fitter 11 12 with Local 120. MR. O'BRIEN: So a pipe fitter? 13 14 MR. HOEIRLE: Yes. And I been at 15 that plant for about seven years now. 16 MR. O'BRIEN: Thank you, Your 17 Honor. HEARING OFFICER: All right. Thank 18 19 you. 20 Our next witness is Mr. Craig? 21 Matt Craig? 22 MR. CRAIG: I'll pass. 23 HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Next we 24 have Chester Kantosky? 25 MR. KANTOSKY: Yeah. I'll pass,

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1 Ma'am. 2 HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Dan 3 Rogatto. 4 5 DAN ROGATTO, After having been first duly sworn, as 6 7 hereinafter certified, was examined and testified as follows: 8 9 HEARING OFFICER: And before we get 10 started, are you an employee of the generating station or the pipeline? 11 12 MR. ROGATTO: Generating station. HEARING OFFICER: Are you 13 14 testifying in your official capacity as 15 an employee of the company this evening? 16 MR. ROGATTO: As an employee. HEARING OFFICER: You are 17 18 testifying as an employee? 19 MR. ROGATTO: Yes. 20 HEARING OFFICER: Then I'm going to 21 have to ask you not to testify this 22 evening. You are a party to the case, and you will have -- the company will 23 24 have a full opportunity at the 25 evidentiary hearing.

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1 MR. ROGATTO: Okay.

m. Roomito. Okay.
HEARING OFFICER: All right. At
this point, I just want to make a
general announcement. For those of you
who have a written copy of your
statement this evening, if you could
please provide a copy of that to the
court reporter, that is extremely
helpful for her in preparing the
transcript of this evening's hearing.
Shes's sitting here in the front
row in the nice brown jacket. So if you
have that, please bring that to her.
At this point, I'm going to take a
brief break. I do think I have another
page of a sign-in sheet, so I'm going to
go collect that. I would like anybody
in the audience that hasn't yet signed
up to testify that wishes to do so to
use this opportunity to go sign up now.
And one other thing, I need to see Gary
and Kathleen Conlyn here please.
Off the record for a few minutes.

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1 2 HEARING OFFICER: All right. Back 3 on the record. Our next witness is Martha Walter. 4 5 _ _ _ 6 MARTHA WALTER, 7 After having been first duly sworn, as hereinafter certified, was examined and testified 8 as follows: 9 10 HEARING OFFICER: State your name 11 and address. 12 MS. WALTER: Martha Walter. 12791 Indian Hollow Road, Grafton, Ohio. 13 HEARING OFFICER: Okay. 14 Thank 15 you. MS. WALTER: I hear all these 16 things where Avon is supportive of NRG 17 18 and the employees are supportive of NRG. But if you're a landowner and you 19 20 feel like you're being raped, which we 21 do, because they're not -- they're 22 actually taking land value from us. And I understand the taxes in Avon. Our 23 24 taxes in the last four years have almost 25 doubled, not because of NRG. It's the

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1 laws and everything. They just did it. 2 So we're pushing close to 10,000 a year 3 now. NRG is coming across our land. 4 5 They want to pay you per linear foot. They're not -- it's not square footage. 6 7 It's linear foot. And they're going 8 across our road front property. Road front property is your most expensive 9 10 property. We already have the utility -- the electric company running 11 12 through there. That's taken, approximately -- I believe it's 90 13 14 feet. NRG wants to add -- not in to 15 electric power lines. They butt up 16 against it and come out. Once they do that, that land is totally devalued. 17 You would think that NRG would want to 18 come in and actually pay you for the 19 20 value of that land. Do you think they've actually offered that? No. 21 They offered you, like, \$10, \$12 a 22 linear foot, when they're devaluing your 23 24 property 600,000. 25 I go on their website. They have a

1 website there talking about integrity. I saw absolutely -- I'm sorry. I'm 2 3 nervous. I saw absolutely no integrity throughout the last year. The people 4 5 they hired to come there, there was no integrity. You would ask them 6 7 questions. They'd tell you they'd get back to you. They never got back to 8 you. They couldn't answer anything. 9 10 And, you know, NRG contributes to the schools and everything. Every time I 11 12 write check to pay my taxes, I'm 13 contributing to the schools, 911, the college, the NORD Center. We all do 14 15 that. There is nothing exceptionable 16 about that, really. So I don't know what to tell you. 17 Some of the land owners are comfortable 18 with it. Their house is already built. 19 20 It's in the back part of their 21 property. They're making money. That's 22 not the case in our situation. We are losing a large sum of money. NRG -- and 23 24 we had to hire an attorney -- there's 25 another thing. We hired an attorney

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1 which cost us more money. We never 2 asked NRG to come on our property. And 3 we don't get a choice. So we're literally being raped. But everybody 4 5 wants to think that's good. It's not 6 good. 7 Thank you. That's all I have to 8 say. HEARING OFFICER: Thank you. Any 9 10 questions? 11 MR. O'BRIEN: Miss Walter, I just 12 have to ask you a question for 13 clarification. Have you retained an attorney to represent you in this case? 14 15 MS. WALTER: Yes, we have. We didn't have a choice. 16 MR. O'BRIEN: Okay. Thank you, 17 Your Honor. 18 19 HEARING OFFICER: The next witness 20 is the Honorable Bryan Jensen. 21 MR. JENSEN: I don't know if I want to follow after that. 22 _ 23 _ 24 BRYAN JENSEN, 25 After having been first duly sworn, as

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1 hereinafter certified, was examined and testified

2	as follows:
3	HEARING OFFICER: Please state your
4	name and address.
5	MR. JENSEN: Bryan Jensen, Mayor of
6	the City of Avon, 2542 North Long Road.
7	Just as a disclaimer, in terms of mayors
8	of Avon and then also Avon Lake, that
9	sometimes I don't even like Mayor
10	Zilka. So I'm not here on behalf of the
11	City of Avon Lake, but I'm on behalf of
12	the residents of Avon, the residents of
13	Avon Lake, and also Lorain County.
14	We've gone through and we've seen
15	that with all the different plants, with
16	gas and with coal, trying to stop that.
17	And I can tell you the truth, the
18	residents of Avon that we've talked to
19	and I've talked to have never said
20	anything bad about NRG. You know, the
21	thing that they are asking for is just
22	fair value for their land. But in terms
23	of what Avon residents have given up is,
24	every time there is an opportunity to
25	help, they step up. And the residents

1 of the back property, there is a forest 2 sewer line that goes along the back of 3 the property, the natural gas line will go back behind that piece of property 4 5 that they've already given up pieces of. So our residents, I can honestly tell 6 7 you, are in support of what this will do for Avon Lake if it benefits them. I'm 8 in support of the pipeline in terms of 9 what it's going to do, for the plant 10 itself and what it will do for helping 11 out the residents of Avon Lake and also 12 the grid for the county. The only thing 13 that our residents ask is just fair 14 value for their land. I think that's 15 16 been stated numerous times. And I think 17 that NRG understands that. I hope they 18 do. We haven't settled, in terms of a 19 20 dollar figure because, again, we're 21 dealing with Avon property that we need 22 to make sure that we get fair value for 23 those tax payers, that we have the money 24 for it. But I can tell you through the 25

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1 workings of NRG, I have not had any 2 issues at all with them. We've had a 3 great working relationship back and forth. And I really want, with the 4 5 support of the community on this, is to support what value this brings. And I 6 7 know that we've heard different rumors about the natural gas, saying that it 8 can only be used for one thing. You 9 know, I would like to look at the Board 10 11 and say, at some point if that natural 12 gas can be used to support the area. I know as a greenhouse owner, the Lorain 13 County area and parts of it are -- we're 14 15 kind of what's called a restricted use in terms of natural gas. I think there 16 is opportunity, if there is a lull in 17 18 the natural gas in terms of what the power plant uses, because I heard it's 19 20 just for emergency -- or for -- the 21 natural gas can be spread around the 22 area and able to get more gas to the 23 area than what we can afford. But, you 24 know, again, I -- I feel bad. And, you know, if they treated you that way, I 25

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1 know that they have not treated the 2 community of Avon that way. And, again, 3 from our standpoint, we want to do what's right for -- for the surrounding 4 5 communities. Lorain County has been our home for forever. And we want to see it 6 7 that way. And if this can benefit the 8 Avon Lake Plant, you know, Avon is 100 percent supportive of it. We still want 9 to beat Avon Lake next year in football, 10 11 but I can tell you that we have always said, "hey, we want to do what's 12 right." Just asking for fair value for 13 those residents' land. Thank you. 14 15 HEARING OFFICER: Questions, Mr. O'Brien? 16 17 MR. O'BRIEN: No questions, Your Honor. 18 HEARING OFFICER: Thank you very 19 much. 20 Our next witness is Charles 21 Froehlich. 22 23 CHARLES FROEHLICH, 24 After having been first duly sworn, as hereinafter certified, was examined and testified 25

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1 as follows:

2	HEARING OFFICER: Please state your
3	name and address.
4	MR. FROEHLICH: Charles Froehlich.
5	387 Sycamore Circle, Avon Lake, Ohio.
6	And I don't work for NRG. I actually
7	work for a ceramic company that operates
8	in Strongsville. I'm a plant manager
9	there. And I would like to comment.
10	I believe NRG is important for the
11	area. Our electrical rates are going
12	through the roof. And just by keeping
13	this plant open is going to help
14	suppress the electrical rates and what's
15	going on. As more and more coal plants
16	shut down, our electrical costs are
17	going up and up, and that's going to
18	hurt jobs in Ohio.
19	Second point is, I am the president
20	of the Avon Lake City School Board. And
21	as looking at NRG, I would like to ask
22	NRG to slow down a little bit their
23	request for tax reduction. If they are
24	going to keep this plant open and it's
25	going to be a viable plant, it should

1 have a value. And they've gone to both 2 the Public Utility Commission and to our Real Estate Commission here in Lorain 3 County and asked for property reduction 4 5 both on the personal property and on the land value. It's going to hurt our 6 7 schools quite a bit if they're successful in achieving everything that 8 9 they're asking for. 10 And then, the last item from an 11 overall support, a question to NRG. We heard someone earlier today talk about 12 stabilizing the grid. I'll put my 13 engineering hat on for a minute. I 14 15 don't understand how a peaker plant, 16 which is what this is supposed to be when it's completed, supports the grid. 17 That's all I have. 18 19 HEARING OFFICER: Questions, Mr. O'Brien? 20 MR. O'BRIEN: Yes, Your Honor. 21 22 Mr. Froehlich, what's the basis of your understanding that this is going to be a 23 24 peaker plant? 25 MR. FROEHLICH: That's what we've

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1 been told in public meetings in Avon 2 Lake. MR. O'BRIEN: All right. I just 3 wanted to have that clarification on 4 record. Thank you. 5 MR. FROEHLICH: Documented, I 6 7 believe, when Marcy Kaptur announced the 8 plant was going to stay open. HEARING OFFICER: Thank you. 9 10 Mike Foor. 11 12 MIKE FOOR, After having been first duly sworn, as 13 hereinafter certified, was examined and testified 14 as follows: 15 16 HEARING OFFICER: State your name 17 and address. MR. FOOR: Mike Foor. 3333 Grafton 18 19 Road, Grafton, Ohio. 20 We negotiated and worked out a deal 21 with NRG. It was very positive on our 22 They revised the drawings at land. least a half dozen times to save a tree 23 24 that my wife wanted here or there, and 25 they moved it around and re-engineered

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1 it to make it work to fit our needs and 2 do as little damage to our property as 3 possible. So, so far I can say it's been a positive experience. Thank you. 4 5 HEARING OFFICER: Any questions? MR. O'BRIEN: No questions, Your 6 7 Honor. 8 HEARING OFFICER: Thank you. 9 We have Chauncey Miller. 10 11 CHAUNCEY MILLER, 12 After having been first duly sworn, as hereinafter certified, was examined and testified 13 14 as follows: 15 HEARING OFFICER: Please state your 16 name and address. 17 MR. MILLER: Chauncey Miller. 36480 Kinzel Road, Avon, Ohio. I just 18 want to make a brief statement that I'm 19 20 all for the environment and the jobs of 21 the people, the employees at the power 22 plant and all the tradesmen. I'm a retired tradesmen myself, but -- for the 23 24 environment. But I think everybody 25 involved with property should get

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1 reasonable compensation for their 2 property. You know, it will be a 3 benefit to everybody if they can make it work. And everybody will gain from it. 4 5 We do need the power grid. So that's all I have to say. 6 7 HEARING OFFICER: Questions? 8 MR.
