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6 1 MICHAEL SCHNEIDER 2 being first duly sworn, as prescribed by law, was 3 examined and testified as follows: 4 DIRECT EXAMINATION 5 By Mr. Margard: State your name, please. 6 Q. 7 Α. Michael Schneider, S-C-H-N-E-I-D-E-R. 8 And by whom are you employed, Ο. Mr. Schneider? 9 By the Ohio State Highway Patrol. 10 Α. And in what capacity? What's your title? 11 0. 12 Α. I am a Motor Carrier Supervisor. 13 0. And what's the business address? 14 It's -- our address up there is 3424 U.S. Α. 15 422, Southington, Ohio, and the zip code is 44470. 16 And what are your duties as a supervisor? 0. 17 My job is a Supervisor, Motor Carrier Α. 18 Section, in northeastern Ohio and also conduct motor 19 carrier inspections alongside the roadway. 2.0 How long have you been performing that Q. 2.1 job? 22 I've been in this job since 19 -- well, Α. I've been inspecting trucks since 1992. I've been in 23 24 this status since about 2010.

About how many inspections a year do you

personally perform?

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- A. Me personally, about 300 a year.
- Q. Do you have any special certifications or trainings to perform your job?
- A. I am certified in North American

 Standards level 1, 2, 3 and 5 inspection levels.

 I've been through -- I maintain my 32 level 1

 certification every year and my hazardous material

 certifications each year.
- Q. And in fact, you're responsible, are you not, for performing training for other officers?
- A. Right, I am a level 3 instructor for the National Training Association which is the federally based program which gives the Part A and Part B instruction to the new inspectors.
- Q. Thank you. Officer Schneider, were you on duty on May 22nd of 2015?
 - A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Do you recall what your job assignment or what your duties, what your responsibilities were on that date?
- A. We were working on -- I was assigned to work Interstate 76 in Portage County on that day.
- Q. In the course of your duties on that day, did you have an opportunity to inspect a vehicle that

was operated by the Respondent, Mr. Bundschuh?

- A. Yes, sir, I did.
- Q. As a result of that inspection, did you generate a report?
 - A. Yes, sir.

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MR. MARGARD: Your Honor, may I approach?

THE EXAMINER: You may.

MR. MARGARD: Your Honor, I'll let the record reflect that I've marked for purposes of identification as Staff Exhibit No. 1 a two-page report labeled Driver Vehicle Examination Report, Report No. OH1239001658.

THE EXAMINER: So marked.

(EXHIBIT MARKED FOR IDENTIFICATION.)

- Q. Officer Schneider, do you have before you what is marked as Staff Exhibit 1?
- 17 A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Can you identify that document for me, please?
- A. It's a vehicle inspection report that I
 generated on the driver of the vehicle. It's a level
 3 inspection.
 - Q. And this is the report of the inspection that we were talking about a moment ago?
- 25 A. Yes, sir.

- Q. As you testify today, do you have any independent recollection of that inspection? Do you remember the inspection?
 - A. Yes, sir.

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- Q. And your findings and observations on that date are accurately recorded in this report?
 - A. Yes, sir, it is.
- Q. And have you reviewed this report prior to your testimony today?
 - A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Now, it says that you performed a level 3 inspection. Can you tell us what that entails, please?
- A. A level 3 inspection deals only with the driver himself. What we look at is the driver's license record, the logbook, the registration of the truck, the trailer. We review the bills, look at the carrier authority to conduct the inspection.
 - Q. What caused you to inspect Mr. Bundschuh?
- A. I was sitting in a stationary patrol on Interstate 76 just west of State Route 225. When I observed the defendant driving westbound on Interstate 76, as I observed him, I noticed that he was not wearing a seatbelt at the time. Immediately pulled out behind the suspect or the defendant and

pulled him over just short of the rest area there on 76 westbound at Mile Post 47.

- Q. You observed he wasn't wearing a seatbelt as he was driving past?
 - A. Right.

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- Q. How were you able to observe him?
- A. Well, I sitting in stationary patrol facing traffic so I could get a good observation of the traffic as it was passing by, and I noticed the driver drive by. He was wearing an orange shirt at the time, and I did not observe any type of belt crossing his shoulder when he went by.
- Q. You had an opportunity when you stopped the vehicle to approach it and to speak to

 Mr. Bundschuh; is that correct?
 - A. Yes, sir, I did.
- Q. Did you observe the seatbelt at that time?
- A. Yes, I did. He had it underneath his arm at that time. He admitted to wearing it that way all the time. And I instructed him at that time that the proper way to wear the seatbelt was over the top of the shoulder the way it was designed to be worn.
- Q. He had a lap belt on; it wasn't just over the shoulder?

A. Yes, sir.

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- Q. Now, as a result of your inspection, you cited as a violation Section 392.16?
 - A. Right.
 - Q. And do you know what that violation is?
- A. Yes, it's dealing with a driver required to wear a safety belt at all times.
 - Q. To properly wear a safety belt?
- A. And properly wear it and wear it the way it was designed to be worn by the manufacturer.
- Q. And in your opinion, this seatbelt was designed to be worn across the shoulder?
- A. Right. Any three point seatbelt harness, yes, it must be worn across the shoulder and across the lap at the time.
- Q. In fact, Mr. Bundschuh was not wearing the seatbelt in that fashion?
 - A. Right.
- Q. Do you have any other recollection of this inspection that you think is important for the Commission to know and evaluate in this case?
- A. Other than the driver admitted to not wearing the seatbelt properly when I discussed it with him, no.

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1	TOM PERSINGER
2	being first duly sworn, as prescribed by law, was
3	examined and testified as follows:
4	DIRECT EXAMINATION
5	By Mr. Margard:
6	Q. State your name, please.
7	A. Name is Tom Persinger.
8	Q. And by whom are you employed,
9	Mr. Persinger?
10	A. I'm employed which the Public Utilities
11	Commission of Ohio.
12	Q. And in what capacity?
13	A. In the Transportation Department,
14	Compliance Division as a Compliance Officer.
15	Q. How long have you worked as a Compliance
16	Officer?
17	A. Just over four years.
18	Q. And the address of your employer is the
19	address of the location of the hearing today?
20	A. Correct.
21	Q. Tell me briefly what your duties and
22	responsibilities are as a Compliance Officer.
23	A. Some of my duties include assessing fines
24	on violations that were conducted at roadside by

members of the Ohio Patrol, as well as the PUCO field

staff, as well as answer technical calls on various regulations and such.

- Q. Are you the individual who was responsible for determining what forfeiture should be assessed in this case?
 - A. One of them.

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- Q. And have you had an opportunity prior to your testimony today to review the Commission's file with respect to this case?
 - A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Can you briefly describe for us how a civil forfeiture is determined, how it's calculated for violations of this sort?
- A. Among nonhazardous material violations, they are determined by a forfeiture chart that has been determined. And what the violation goes under depends upon what group violation it is. And depending upon what group it is in, that determines any applicable fine amounts.
- Q. And this procedure you described is consistent with the recommended civil forfeiture penalty procedure adopted by the Commercial Vehicle Safety Alliance?
- A. Yes, sir.
 - Q. Is this procedure the same for all

carriers and drivers?

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- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. In your review of this case for purposes of assessing the forfeiture and for purposes of your testimony today, what did you ascertain the appropriate forfeiture in this case should be?
 - A. Based on what the chart says, \$100.
- Q. Was that \$100 properly determined in your opinion?
 - A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Did you also in reviewing the Commission file in preparation for your testimony today have an opportunity to review the various notices that were provided to the Respondent?
 - A. Yes, sir.
- Q. And in your opinion, did the Respondent properly receive all of the notices that were required to be served upon him?
 - A. Yes, sir.
- MR. MARGARD: I have no further questions of this witness. Thank you. Your Honor.
- THE EXAMINER: Thank you.
- Do you have any questions, Mr. Bundschuh?
- MR. BUNDSCHUH: No, sir. Is there any

TED BUNDSCHUH

being first duly sworn, as prescribed by law, testified as follows:

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DIRECT TESTIMONY

THE WITNESS: Well, I remember I was going down 76 heading westbound. Got pulled over.

Officer come up, I told him the door was open. He wouldn't -- He didn't want to open the door. So I stretched over, flicked the handle and then he opened the door.

I had my seatbelt on. Yeah, it was under my arm once I got back over because I had to stretch over and hit the door. But that truck's designed to pull out a few inches and flip a thing up. And it was laying over here (indicating), but that many inches shouldn't make a difference, a couple inches.

He come up and said I had a loose belt on. There's nothing in that green book that we got to go by that says it can't be loose. I was wearing it the way the truck was designed. If it wasn't designed to pull that down and flip that thing up... you know what I mean? It's loose. It was loose.

I never did admit to him that I was in the wrong. I didn't want to argue with him when he gave me the ticket, so I just told him, "If you say

it's wrong, you say it's wrong," you know. I never knew that.

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I've been driving trucks since 1998. I'm getting close to 2 million safe miles. My driver's record is clean. I've always wore a seatbelt. I wore it the way the truck was designed to wear it or you couldn't be -- or you couldn't pull it down and flip it up to wear it loose so it don't rub on your neck.

It might have been over here

(indicating), but that thing still went across here

(indicating) and it was latched. I had my seatbelt

on. I lost a job because of it and -- because they

just thought I just wasn't wearing my seatbelt.

I mean, if you look at my DAC report, I got, like I say, close to 2 million safe miles, and I know how to follow the rules. I had my belt on.

There's nothing in that book that says you can't wear it loosely, and I wore it the way the truck was designed. I don't think I should have to pay anything or have anything on my record.

You know, if I didn't wear it, didn't have it on, I would just have paid the \$100 and wouldn't have went through all this trouble, but I had it on, I was safe. I wore it the way the

manufacturer had it, just like he said, you know, and that's about all I have to say about it.

THE EXAMINER: Thank you.

Mr. Margard, any questions?

MR. MARGARD: I have no questions, your Honor, but I would like the record to reflect that as the witness was indicating "across here," he was indicating across his upper arm as opposed to across his shoulder.

THE WITNESS: Two or three inches shouldn't make a difference. From up here rubbing on your neck to right here (indicating), that is why that thing is put on there to pull down and flip so it don't rub on your neck all day when you're in that truck 10, 12 hours a day, you know. I was wearing it the way it was designed.

Even on your campaign, it says "Click It or Ticket." It was clicked and it was on and I was secured, I wasn't going anywhere. I don't think I should have to pay anything or have that on my record.

THE EXAMINER: Okay. Anything else?

MR. BUNDSCHUH: No.

THE EXAMINER: Thank you. You may

25 step-down.

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Anything further? MR. MARGARD: Let me just have a moment, your Honor. Nothing further, your Honor. Thank you. THE EXAMINER: Thank you. The Commission will take this case under advisement, and they will issue a ruling. And thank you all for your time. MR. BUNDSCHUH: Thank you. MR. MARGARD: Thank you. (The hearing was concluded at 10:20 a.m.)
