- Q. And so how long have you been doing inspections of commercial motor vehicles?
 - A. Approximately five years.

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- Q. Okay. And what equipment is issued to you for you to do your job?
- A. First I drive a marked Patrol truck, marked Ohio State Highway Patrol. I have a creeper if I have to get underneath any vehicles.
- I have brake measurement devices, chamber mates to determine the size of the brake chamber, and that sort of thing. Depth gauges and air gauges.
- Q. Okay. And what is your jurisdiction?
- A. I have jurisdiction within the State
 of Ohio and -- anywhere basically in the State
 of Ohio.
 - Q. Are you assigned to a certain area?
- 20 A. I am assigned to the Cleveland
 21 District, which incorporates seven different
 22 counties in the State.

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marked as Staff Exhibits 1 and 2 on the stand in front of you. And the first one being the Driver/Vehicle Examination Report. Do you see that?

A. Yes.

- Q. And that is Staff Exhibit 1. And I want to ask you, were you on duty on the date of September 21st, 2015 and have the occasion to stop a Mr. Radu Fotea for an inspection?
 - A. I did, yes.
- Q. And could you, please, describe the circumstances under which that inspection occurred?
 - A. I was sitting in Brunswick on Interstate 71 and it was just north of the Brunswick rest area. And the way I operate, and specifically on in this day, what I do is I generally when I pull into a cross-over I watch for every 10th truck, unless I have an obvious violation, or if I have a traffic violation that cuts into that.
- So, I got the first truck that pulls in front of me, I count 10 trucks. And on the 10th truck if I don't have anything that cuts in like a flat tire or light violation,

something obvious or a traffic violation, then I will conduct the stop on the 10th truck. And in this case the defendant was the 10th truck.

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- Q. Okay. And so then you counted 10 trucks, you end up stopping Mr. Fotea. Why don't you pick up from that point as to what happened at that point?
- A. After Mr. Fotea passed I pulled out of the cross-over, which I normally sit, and I conducted a traffic stop trying to get him into the southbound Brunswick rest area. And it was, for all intents and purposes, it was a perfect traffic stop.

I pulled out, activated my pursuit lights, Mr. Fotea went into the rest area. No glitches. We pulled in, and at that point I made contact with Mr. Fotea and stated to him that I am Trooper Melicant with the Ohio State Highway Patrol and I stopped him for the reason of conducting a safety inspection for a commercial vehicle.

- Q. And you were on duty at this time?
- A. Yes. I work 6 A to 4:00 P.M.
- Q. And you had the uniform on at that time?

A. Yes.

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- 2 Q. And a marked cruiser?
- 3 A. Yes.
- Q. Okay. Let's go through your report
 here, Staff Exhibit 1. The first block of that
 information has information pertaining to a
 report number. Where does that come from
 and what does it represent?
 - A. The report number?
- 10 Q. Yes.
- 11 A. It's just generated by the 12 sequential numbers through the computer.
- Q. Does that happen to contain any information that is relevant to identifying you as the officer?
- A. It does. It has my unit number in the first four numerical digits.
- Q. And then, of course, then there is the date of the inspection. And then how much time did this inspection take?
- A. From the time that you enter in the Aspen, which was 9:50 to 10:15, so 25 minutes.
- Q. And this was a Level 3 inspection.
- 24 What does that mean?
- 25 A. Just driver only inspection.

- Q. Okay. And then there is another block of information that identifies Smart Express Logistics. Who is that?
- A. That is the carrier that Mr. Fotea was driving for.
 - Q. How did you identify the carrier?
- A. Through the DOT number and the company listings on the side of the vehicle.
- Q. So Mr. Fotea was the driver identified operating for the carrier by the name of Smart Express Logistics?
- A. That's correct. Yes.
- Q. Okay. And you have other
 information here as to Mr. Fotea. How did you
 get the license number and so forth of Mr.
- 16 Fotea?

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- A. As soon as Mr. Fotea pulled in the
 rest area I went ahead and made contact, knocked
 on the driver's door. And I always ask
 the driver if it's okay to open the door, for a
 couple reasons.
- One, I can see the driver, and it's an officer safety issue.
- Two, I can usually identify the gross vehicle rating of the vehicle by

the federal VIN plat on the side of the door.

So, there are just a couple reasons I always knock on the door and ask the driver if it's okay. And 99 percent of the time they comply, so they open the door.

Plus, I hate having to move driver license and paperwork out through the window because you never know, slip on something or blow away, or get lost.

So, I opened the door, talked to Mr. Fotea, identified him by his driver's license, his CDL. And one thing I always do is I always ask the driver is this your current home address just so that I can put it, you know, properly in the Aspen program.

And I always ask for driver's license, medical certificate, and a log book if it pertains.

- Q. And so the person you had stopped that day driving that commercial motor vehicle at that location is the person you describe as Mr. Fotea is in the courtroom today?
 - A. Yes, he is.
- Q. Could you please point out where he is at and describe what he is wearing?

A. He is just off to your left, to the right of his person with him. And he has got his blue suit with a purple tie.

MR. JONES: Your Honor, can the record reflect the witness has identified the driver, Mr. Radu Fotea?

ATTORNEY EXAMINER: It may.

MR. JONES: Thank you, Your Honor.

- Q. So, as to the documentation you received then from Mr. Fotea having made contact with him to include the medical certificate, what did you discover as to any restrictions being involved here?
- A. I asked Mr. Fotea for his driver's license, medical certificate, and when he did hand me his medical certificate. I always look at it to, A, match the driver that I have. Two, I make sure that it's current. And, three, to make sure there is no restrictions on the medical certificate itself.

Once I review all those I hand the medical certificate right back to the driver.

- Q. Okay. And was there any restrictions as far as lenses or anything?
 - A. Yes. Mr. Fotea was required

corrective lenses per his medical certificate.

- Q. And what did you observe then from Mr. Fotea as to seeing that restriction?
- A. As soon as I saw the restriction on his medical certificate I asked him, you know, is he wearing contact lenses, because at the time of the stop he was not wearing his eyeglasses.

So any time if I stop a driver and he is required to wear corrective lenses I always ask him, you know, do you have contact lenses in, and almost unequivocally drivers are going to say yes, I do, and they will want to show you, they will open their eyes and look around and they will want to make sure that you can see that they are wearing their corrective contact lenses.

Q. So, let me understand what you are saying. You are saying that you identified a restriction from the medical certificate that required corrective lenses for him to operate his commercial motor vehicle, and you identified that he was not wearing any corrective glasses on his face.

And also you identified that he, or

he identified that he was not wearing any contact lenses to comply with that restriction?

- A. That's correct.
- Q. And did you ask him if he was wearing contact lenses?
 - A. Yes, I did.

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- Q. And you didn't see any glasses on his person at that time?
- 9 A. That's right. He wasn't wearing any 10 glasses at all.
- Q. Any glasses. All right. Did Mr.

 Fotea make any acknowledgments as to not

 complying with the restriction?
 - A. Yes. When I asked him where are your glasses, I asked him if he was wearing his -- if he had contacts and he said no. And I asked him where are his glasses, and he said he had them, but he just wasn't wearing them because he just left Parma.
 - Q. Okay. Did he admit that he was not wearing his glasses when he was operating the commercial motor vehicle?
- A. Yes. He said he had them, but he wasn't wearing them just because he had just left Parma.

Q. All right. And we have here -- and the stop was made in Medina County on Interstate 71. And where did this -- where did he originate from when he started his trip, and where was his destination?

- A. I am not exactly 100 percent sure where in Parma he came from, but he said he left Parma. And I conducted the stop in Brunswick Hills, or Brunswick in Medina County, which is approximately 15 miles.
 - Q. Okay. And what was his cargo?
- A. He was empty at the time. He said he was heading from Parma to Lima to pick up a load.
 - Q. Okay. And so, then, for the violations that are noted in the Staff Exhibit 1 here with this report you identified a code violation. Would you, please, identify and describe what you have there for code violations here for your report?
 - A. The violation Code is 391.11 (b)(4), "Driver not physically qualified, operating a commercial vehicle without corrective lenses as indicated on the driver's medical certificate."
 - Q. Okay. And this is a code of the

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Federal Regulations provision?
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- A. Yes.
- Q. And I see there is some information here under State Citation. Would you, please, describe what that information is?
 - A. For the State Citation number --
- 7 Q. Under that whole area there I guess,
- 8 | the unit?

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- 9 A. Unit.
- Q. 002, Verify, Crash, all that information.
- A. For the violation code, is this section, same as the section, and the Unit D equals the violations being addressed to the driver.
- Out of service, 00S, or out of service, violation is that section. An out of service violation, yes, it is.
- The State Citation number is a column if I were to cite him for traffic violation.
- Verify, either yes or no, that
 the driver corrected the out of service
 violation at the scene.
- 25 And Crash in the column, it's an N

for no. So there was no crash causing
violations.

- Q. So, you made contact, you identify this violation. Then what did you do next?

 Did you then generate some paperwork?
- A. Yes. I printed it out on the Aspen program and handed it back to Mr. Fotea.
 - Q. Okay. And at that time were there any signatures obtained for the report?
- A. Yes. The report prepared by, I always sign, and then I always have the driver receiving a copy and sign at the bottom where it says copy received by.

And then I explained to him that the driver has 24 hours to report to the motor carrier. And then in turn then send it down to the Public Utilities Commission.

- Q. Very good. So, is Staff Exhibit 1, although this is not the signed version that you just testified to, is this an accurate representation of the Drive/Vehicle Examination Report that you generated on the day of the inspection on September 21st, 2015 for Mr. Radu Fotea?
- 25 A. Yes, sir.

- Q. And is this a record kept in the ordinary course of business for the State
 Highway Patrol?
 - A. Yes.
- 5 Q. So this report was served on Mr.
- 6 Fotea at that time?
 - A. Yes, sir, it was.
- 8 Q. And did you explain the report to
- 9 him?

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- 10 A. Yes.
- 11 Q. And you also placed him out of 12 service at that time as well?
- A. Yes, until he complies with his medical.
- Q. How did you do that? Did you -- how did you explain to him that he was out of
- 17 | service?
- A. On the Aspen report, it has a block
 stating that the driver may not drive any
 commercial motor vehicle, nor may any carrier
 permit or require the driver to drive any
 commercial vehicle until the driver is compliant
 with the medical certificate.
- So, not only do I mark that in the block, the dropdown blocks for a driver being

- placed out of service, I also tell the driver,
 you know, you are not driving, you are out of
 service until you are compliant with your
 medical.
 - Q. And so then after the inspection then did you transmit this document, this Staff Exhibit 1, to any agency?
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. And where did you send it to?
- 10 A. To the Public Utilities Commission 11 through Safer program.
- Q. And did you do that on the day of the inspection?
- 14 A. Yes.

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- Q. I skipped over a piece of information on the report. The vehicle identification has units 1 and 2. What information is provided there?
- A. Unit No. 1 is always the truck-tractor the way I operate there. And the make was a Volvo, year 2005. And I have the State, which is Ohio. Plat number, which was assigned to the truck. Then the unit number, and then the vehicle identification number.

 And then the gross vehicle weight rating of

the truck.

And then Unit 2 is the trailer, same thing, semi-trailer, SD. It's a Walbash, it's a 1998 registered in the State of Ohio. No equipment identifier was listed for the trailer.

Then the vehicle identification number. And then the gross vehicle rating of the trailer itself.

- Q. So is it your recommendation to the Commission then based on your training, experience, and the fact that you were the inspector on this day of September 21st, 2015, involved in this inspection and make contact with Mr. Fotea, that he was -- as the driver he was not physically qualified to operate his commercial motor vehicle because he was not in compliance with his driver's medical certificate by having corrective lenses for operating that vehicle?
 - A. That's correct.

21 MR. JONES: Your Honor, I have no 22 further questions of this witness.

23 ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Does the
24 Respondent have any questions for this witness?
25 MR. FOTEA: Yes, sir.

ATTORNEY EXAMINER: 1 Now, let's go 2 off the record here briefly. 3 (DISCUSSION OFF THE RECORD) ATTORNEY EXAMINER: 4 You can ask 5 questions of this witness. 6 MR. VADUVA: May I ask the question 7 as well? Have him relate it to me? ATTORNEY EXAMINER: 8 Yes. He can

MR. VADUVA: Sure.

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CROSS-EXAMINATION

tell you what questions to ask, and you can --

By Mr. Fotea through Mr. Vaduva:

Q. I spoke with Mr. Fotea, have been friends for may years and he asked me to -- he speaks English, but he wants to make sure that everything comes across clearly.

And one of the things that we want -- we were talking about driving in here this morning, we are very grateful for what you do, for what the State Troopers do. I speak on my behalf and on his behalf as well because we understand the need for safety. Very appreciative.

I am a father of five, he has two children. And anybody going out there and does

your kind of work, I have the greatest respect for because I understand the need for safety.

ATTORNEY EXAMINER: What is the question now?

Q. That's the first statement that we have.

ATTORNEY EXAMINER: We don't need statements now, we need questions.

- Q. The first question that he had was regarding the out of service, was he put back in service, and how was he put back in service at the end of the stop?
- A. I explained to Mr. Fotea once he was being placed out of service for not operating a commercial vehicle with his corrective lenses, or, you know, glasses, at that point he said he had his glasses with him. And nothing more than just putting his glasses on. At that point he is good to drive. He is now compliant as long as he is wearing his corrective lenses.
 - Q. And did he do that?
 - A. I don't know.
- Q. You are not sure if he put his glasses back on? If you are put out of service how does he get back in service to be able to --

- A. Just merely putting his glasses on.
- Q. And do you know, do you have knowledge if he did that with you there?

- A. I can't recall if he put them on at that time, you know, after he was told. But I went back to my truck and I don't know if he continued on with his glasses or not.
- Q. And what's customary with that scenario if a driver is put out of service, how would he be allowed to leave the scene without being put back in service?
- A. As soon as he complies with his medical certificate.
 - Q. On his own without having to be verified by you?
- A. Yes, that's correct. That's correct. At that point once he complies with his medical certificate either by putting his glasses on or putting contact lenses in, at that point he is compliant with his medical and he is good to leave at that point.
- Q. And you did not see glasses at all, him putting on his glasses?
- A. I don't recall if he put them on or not.

Q. The other question that he had regarding the Level 3 inspection, driver only inspection, was that the only inspection that you did?

2.2

- A. For Mr. Fotea, that's correct, yes. Because there was nothing more to raise my suspicion to look at the actual vehicle itself.
- Q. Did you walk around the truck and inspect the vehicle at all?
- A. Yes. You do an initial walk around to see if you have low tire or flat tire or anything -- anything that you would see like obvious violation that would step the inspection up from a Level 3 driver only to a Level 2 or possibly a Level 1, which is a full inspection.

But by my initial contact with the vehicle and Mr. Fotea, my suspicion wasn't raised to amp the inspection up to a Level 2 or a Level 1.

- Q. So everything else was in good order besides the glasses not being on, or corrective lenses, everything else was in good order?
 - A. That's correct, yes.
- Q. In your conversation with him did
 you mention at all you would not put him out of

service?

- A. No.
 - Q. Was that clearly communicated verbally to him that he would be put out of service?
 - A. I explained clearly without him complying with his medical certificate that he will be placed out of service.
 - Q. One of his questions that was pertaining to your conversation with him that he would not receive any violation or being put out of service. Do you recall that at all, in that conversation with him? Because the fact that he had the glasses, he put them on, do you recall having a conversation with Mr. Fotea that you stated that you would not give him a violation?
 - A. Absolutely not.
 - Q. Do you recall saying words that if you would give him a violation he would have to go to Court and go through all sorts of trouble, but you would be gracious with him and not give him a violation or citation? Do you recall that at all?

- Q. And what is your job title and responsibilities?
- A. My job title is Compliance Officer in the Transportation Department, Compliance Division. My duties include determining any applicable fines resulting from roadside inspections.
- Q. And you heard the testimony of
 Trooper Melicant this morning as to transmitting
 the document before you that is marked as Staff
 Exhibit 1 to the Public Utilities Commission of
 Ohio. Did you have an opportunity to review
 that report for this case?
 - A. Yes, sir.
 - O. You reviewed that case file?
- 17 A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Okay. And as a result of the
 Commission receiving documentation from the
 field like that and report of inspection, what
 does the Commission Staff do with that
 information?
- A. We take that information and
 depending upon what the violation code is a fine
 is determined for that particular violation.

Q. And explain the process, what you used to determine that calculation.

2.2

A. For any 300 level violation, once the inspection is uploaded into the Safety Net database where all the inspections are kept the data gets imported into another computer system that we call OPOSIS that has preset fine amounts attached with different violations.

And in this case the OPOSIS program generates the \$250 fine for this 391.11(b)(4) violation.

- Q. And once the calculation is made as to a forfeiture amount based on the process you just described, is there any other paperwork generated then?
- A. We will send out a letter to the Respondent for those particular violations and then any applicable fines.
- Q. And I have there before you a Notice of Preliminary Determination I would like to have marked as Staff Exhibit 2.

(EXHIBIT MARKED FOR PURPOSES OF IDENTIFICATION)

Q. Could you, please, describe and identify what that document is?

1 Α. This is a Preliminary Notice of 2 Determination. It is generated after 3 the inspection has been made, and if the Respondent requests a conference to discuss the 4 5 case, and we cannot come to a resolution on it, 6 and it simply indicates that the fine was 7 initially issued at, in this case, \$250. And we 8 couldn't come up with some sort of agreement or 9 resolution on the matter.

And upon sending this Notice of
Preliminary Determination letter the Respondent
is given an opportunity to request a hearing on
the matter.

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- Q. And how does the Staff Exhibit 2 cross-reference information from Staff Exhibit 1?
- A. On the inspection report there is a report number. The report number on the inspection report and the case number on the Notice of Preliminary Determination letter are essentially one and the same.
- Q. And how about the address where the letter is sent to?
- A. In this instance since this is considered a driver violation it was sent to

- whatever address was put in the fields on the roadside inspection for the driver.
- Q. And so the information described for the addressee for the letter matches the information from Staff Exhibit 1?
- A. Yes, sir.

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- Q. Okay. And what was the date of the Notice of Preliminary Determination being sent to Mr. Fotea?
- 10 A. That was November 10th of 2015.
- Q. And Staff Exhibit 2, would also
 then -- does it also repeat the violation that
 is indicated in Staff Exhibit 1?
- 14 A. Yes, sir.
- Q. And is Staff Exhibit 2 a record kept in the ordinary course of business by the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio?
 - A. Yes, sir.
- Q. And is Staff 2 an accurate
 representation of information contained in the
 Notice of Preliminary Determination that you
 reviewed in the case file of the Commission?
 - A. Yes, sir.

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called as a witness, being first duly sworn, testified as follows:

ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Now, if you want to join him and interpret his answers, bring a chair up and you can sit by him if you want to.

Now, go ahead and I will let you present your testimony in a narrative style.

And if you want to consult with your interpreter first and have him speak after you tell him what you want to say, that is fine. Go ahead.

Tell us what transpired on the day of the inspection.

MR. FOTEA: First I want to thank for the officer and staff that work on the road and be safe. I really appreciate these jobs that they do.

That day I was pulled out by Officer Melicant, pulled over. And when I brought in the parking he came, present, he presented himself and he asked my paper, driver license, medical card certificate, these two.

And he told me he pulled me out because he suspect I have a flat tire. And he requested me to come down and go around the truck with him, in front of him, that I did

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right away. And before go down I was with him.

He look at the paper and he told me I should

have eyeglasses, and right away I said, yes,

it's true, it's near me, I just left from

parking and forgot to put them on.
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But it's near me. Right away I put on my glasses. He asked me if I wear corrective lenses, and I said, no, because I don't have contact lenses. Sorry. I am sorry. Contact lenses. And I said no.

But I have with me all the time, and I wear my eyeglasses, and to put right away on my eye. And I explained, I just started from the parking lot and I forgot to put on.

And I made a little explanation, I told him I don't need to wear eyeglasses, but I forgot because I know the law to wear because the law request both eyes to have minimum 20-40. And one eye it's normal and one eye it's a little less than 20-40. And usually when I didn't wear home to read, look at TV, do any stuff, I don't need to wear eyeglasses or corrective lenses.

But because right now I am the driver, and the law requests if it's less than

20-40 to wear it. And I told him, yes, I know, is my fault, I forgot put -- it's near me and right away I put on.

After that I go down and take around the truck. He look in the front of the truck, he looked on the right side of the truck and the back of the trailer. All the tires, he checks, he looks at the other things.

And after that he told me go up in the truck and wait there because I need to do the report.

After that go in his truck and he called me, told me make sign to go. And he told me, I understand you, I thought he told me to go. My fault. But I wear usually, it never happen, these things.

And he told me, you know, if I give you a ticket you are going to Court, and you have problem with your driver's license. But I understand you have put on and I will not give you any ticket.

And I said thank you very much.

He told me go back in the truck and wait there.

I wait another few minutes and he come to the truck and gave me the paper and told me again I

didn't give you any ticket. And I said thank you, sir, I appreciate it. And he left and I left also.

After a while, few days, few weeks, when I was home I received the paper with the fine. And I was very frustrated because he told me very clear, not be any ticket. And I didn't know the rules because he can or can't. I am not sure. Should issue the ticket right away.

Anyway, the paper would go in the center place and they will issue the fines. I didn't realize in that moment and until the first hearing that I had on the phone I realized I was also out of service. I didn't know I was out of service when I received the paper and the driver examination report.

I saw here driver violation, and for me it's not an out of service violation. And I go right away, I sign the paper and send because I received and complying with the request.

And after that I received a fine.

I realized I was out of service. And then was very frustrating for me because told me, very clear, not be any ticket. And not issue any ticket. And so would not be a fine, would not

be any other consequences.

I understood, misunderstood. I don't know. It's like a warning, like a warning, the paper. Because he saw I put right away, he saw was next to me. I explained why, just left from the parking and was maybe 10 miles, it's true.

And I wear eye wear usually because I was stopped on the road so many times, never happened to be -- I don't have the eyeglasses.

And there I want to come and plead my case because, first of all, I don't think was fair to, don't know which are the next steps.

Second, the out of service, it's very important in this business, the insurance and other factors are based on this out of service. And this out of service was issue after I put on the glasses. It's true when he stopped me I didn't wear. But I fix the problem right away.

And I consider it's not correct to issue an out of service for this. Also, I was interested about the fine was \$250. Maybe have been, maybe less, but for them. Who can make payments? Yes, it's true. But for them, and I

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     asked in these two other phone calls, you don't
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     have for the first violation a warning? I was
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     honest, I said I don't have corrective
     eyeglasses, I don't have corrective lenses. And
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     I fix the problem right away.

A. Yes.

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- Q. Okay.
- A. The eyeglasses, and I told him, yes, it's true, I didn't wear. I just left from the parking lot and I forgot to put on. Usually I have there because I don't use another -- only for driving because required by the law. Not because I need it. And if I need it -- it's nothing missing, but --
- Q. You understand, Mr. Fotea, that the way that that would have been corrected is that you would only have to put your glasses on to go ahead and continue then to operate following the violation. Do you understand that? That is how you get back in service?
- A. Yes. But I already put the glasses when he stop me. The paper, didn't fill out yet and I already correct the problem, corrected the problem. I realize the mistake after, correct right away.
- Q. After you were cited for the violation?

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- A. After he asked me if I wear the corrective lenses.
 - Q. Yes.
 - A. Yes. Right away I put on.
- 5 Q. Right away after he informed you of the violation?
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. Okay. Okay.

MR. VADUVA: Can you repeat that question one more time, sir?

- 11 Q. Yes. Mr. Fotea, you are saying that 12 after you were cited for the violation --

 full question. But I put the eyeglasses right

 after he come to my truck and he looked at the

 paper and he asked me about the eyeglasses. And

 I put right away. Not after the -- sorry, I

- Q. But you understood that is how you would go back in service is having your glasses to continue your travel?
- A. No, I already put it right away.

Didn't told me I need to -- I didn't know, I didn't realize. I didn't understood any time I 3 was out of service. I didn't realize from the moment. And if you look at the paper, I saw 4 here, there, not out of service or driver out of 5 6 service violation. And I didn't realized I was out of service because it's -- that's marked 7 And after that when I have the first down. phone hearing I realized, just a second, it's 10 here, out of service, now it's not out of service. 11

And for me was very confusing at that moment. And the gentleman who speak on the phone confirm me, yes, I was out of service.

- Ο. Well, Mr. Fotea, I just want to direct your attention to Staff Exhibit 1 which I believe you are holding in your hands there.
 - Yes, sir. Α.

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And there is a declaration on the form itself at the bottom. You will see it says "I hereby declare Radu P. Fotea out of service. This driver, " and in capital letters, "may not drive any commercial motor vehicle nor may any carrier permit or require this driver to drive any commercial motor vehicle until compliant

with medical certificate."

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Do you see that on that?

- A. Yes, now I see that, but at the moment, now I see that.
 - O. You see that?
- A. But the moment didn't, but didn't state to read everything. I read if telling what violation was, and I didn't realize I was out of service.
 - Q. He did provide this form to you?
 - A. Of course, sir.
- 12 Q. Okay.
- 13 A. Right away when he finished the inspection and the paper.
- Q. And he explained the form to you?
- A. No, no, sir. He told me when I

 didn't issue any ticket for you and give me the

- A. He told me when he stopped me, you know, on the medical certificate you have

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restriction for eyeglasses and I said, yes. And right away I put on. Now you can operate. I know. Next to me. But, I forgot to put on.

At the beginning he told me you know you need to have it. Yes, I need to have it. It's very clear. I know what I have restriction on the driver's license and I wear it. But that moment I explain to him I forgot.

- Q. But Trooper Melicant made clear to you that you couldn't move that vehicle unless you put your corrective lenses on; correct?
- A. No. I didn't understood this. I understand you need when you driving the commercial motor vehicle you have to wear eyeglasses, and said yes, I know. It's my fault, and I am sorry for this, and I put right away on.

I didn't realize you can leave here because you are out of service. I already have on the eyeglasses, so I already fixed before he proceed to finish to check the truck and trailer. I already put it on.

MR. JONES: I have no further questions, your Honor.

point do you have anything more to add?

2 MR. FOTEA: Sir --

ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Anything in addition to what you already stated on the record?

MR. FOTEA: No. For the record, I didn't -- nobody -- any time -- he didn't tell me I am out of service. I didn't realize I was out of service in the moment. I didn't know I was out service.

And I also look also on the paper,
but I didn't realize I was out of service. And
I request respectfully if possible to remove
this out of service because it's so much
implication, and I fix the problem right away
before he starts filling out the paper.

And the implications are so hard for the rating of the company and also for the insurance because the insurance is based on this. And there are consequences on this out of service.

And because the violation I request remove also the fine, if it's possible, and to receive a warning. I know I was at fault, I fix the problem right away, and if it's possible
