Case Number 16-253-GA-BTX. I am opposed to the proposal of the green route to run behind my property along Glendale Milford Road. I live within the Park Hills community in Evendale. There is already an existing pipeline running north and south through Park Hills. An emergency management plan must be developed. If the Green Route is selected and the pipeline is sited on the south side of Glendale-Milford, the impact on the Park Hills homeowners who live along Glendale-Milford Road would be quite serious. It is my understanding no trees are allowed to

grow in a space 30 feet wide over the top of the buried pipeline. This would mean removal of all the trees that currently exist on the berm between Park Hills property owners and Glendale-Milford Road. Thus, if the pipeline were to be sited along the south side of the road instead of the north, homeowners there would lose most if not all of the privacy they currently enjoy, and there would likely be significant loss of property value. And, of course, these trees are the public face of the entire Park Hills subdivision, so loss of the trees makes the whole area much less appealing.
