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## PROCEEDINGS

A.L.J. JENNINGS: The Ohio Power Siting

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Project.

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Board is assigned for public hearing at this time and place Case No. 16-534-EL-BTX, and that case is captioned as In the Matter of the Application of AEP Ohio Transmission Company for a Certificate of Environmental Compatibility and Public Need for the Dennison-Yager 138 Kilovolt Transmission Line Rebuild

There is also another case in this proceeding, Case No. 16-535-EL-BTX, and it is captioned as In the Matter of the Application of AEP Ohio Transmission Company for a Certificate of Environmental Compatibility and Public Need for the Yager-Desert Road 138 Kilovolt Transmission Line Rebuild Project.

My name is Doug Jennings, I'm an administrative law judge with the Ohio Power Siting Board, and I've been assigned to preside over this local public hearing.

As I indicated before we went on the record, there are staff members from the Board who will make themselves available for questions that you may have.

At this point in the proceeding, I will ask the parties to enter an appearance on the record.

MR. AGUIAR: Thank you, Your Honor. My name's Ryan Aguiar, I'm counsel for AEP Ohio Transmission Company.

A.L.J. JENNINGS: Thank you. And are there any other parties?

(No response.)

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A.L.J. JENNINGS: Okay. Just to give you a brief overview of the subject matter of these cases, in Case No. 16-534, the Company plans to install a new 138 kilovolt overhead electric transmission line between the existing Dennison substation in Tuscarawas County to the Yager substation which is currently under construction in Harrison County. There is a preferred route, which is 7.2 miles long, and it parallels the existing Dennison Desert Road 69 kilovolt transmission line. The Company has also proposed an alternative -- an alternate route that follows the existing transmission line.

In Case No. 16-535, the Company plans to install a new 138 kilovolt overhead electric transmission line between the Yager substation and the existing Desert Road substation. The preferred

route of the new transmission line is 6.8 miles long, and with some deviations parallels the existing

Dennison Desert Road 69 kilovolt line. The alternate route proposed by the Company follows the 69 kilovolt Dennison Desert Road transmission line.

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The existing 69 kilovolt transmission line was constructed way back in 1926. The intent of this project is to meet projected load growth so as to enhance reliability.

I will note that there will be an adjudicatory hearing in this case on January 25th, 2017, at 10:00 o'clock, and that will be held in the Board offices in Columbus, Ohio.

The purpose of this evening's hearing is to receive comments from the public regarding the applications in these cases. I need to emphasize that this is not a question-and-answer session, it is your opportunity to let the Ohio Power Siting Board know what you think of the proposals set forth in the applications. It is also an opportunity to voice your opinion over the preferred versus the alternate routes.

You should be aware that the Board staff filed Reports of Investigation in these cases on December 27th, 2016. Staff has made copies available

outside of the room. If you don't have one, feel free to get one. There are two staff reports; one for 534 and one for 535, so you need -- you may need both. The reports contain recommendations of the Board's staff, they do not necessarily reflect what the Board will ultimately do.

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We appreciate your participation in this hearing, and we want everyone who is interested to have an opportunity to testify. As I indicated before we got started, I will be calling names from the signup sheet. If some -- at some point during the process you have not signed up and you wish to testify, raise your hand, let me know, and I'll give you an opportunity to make a statement. I will have you sworn in, take an oath before testifying. Those of you who wish to affirm instead, let me know, I will accommodate that.

If there are no questions, I will call the first witness. Struggling with the handwriting here. Is it Donald Rostad?

MR. ROSTAD: Yeah.

A.L.J. JENNINGS: Let's go off the record for a moment.

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A.L.J. JENNINGS: Okay.

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MR. ROSTAD: Getting close to two years ago, but I -- if that power line comes through there, I assume that it's going to take the whole piece of property, business and all. It will have to, I would think. I just wanted to know if it's going to take me out of business.

The other concern I have is I moved here from Wisconsin, and they put a power line in like that up there at Portage, Wisconsin. A classmate of mine's father was a farmer. The -- they started that power station up -- I can't remember the kilowatts, but it's a big one. When they started it up by only going east of Portage, Wisconsin on highway -- on Highway 51, and when they started it up the cattle on certain farms quit -- quit milking, they quit growing, pigs wouldn't grow. It went down into a water line and followed the path of the water.

The State came in there and sprayed the barns and anyplace the cattle were, and then they shaved the top of the cattle's back and they put volt meters on top of their back even standing on rubber, and it didn't do any good because it came right up through the rubber and right up into the cattle. So that -- that guy was a classmate, his name was Elgin

Paskey, I graduated with him.

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And there's several farms in that area that were just sold, the State bought them up, and then all the homes around, they -- the people -- I don't know what they did, because I have a nephew that lives there in one of them, and they said,
"Well, we'll make it easy for you. You just -- you can -- you can have your brand new home on there and your land won't cost you anything and you don't have to pay any taxes." So my nephew lives underneath one of them in that power -- where that high power is, but I -- I'm concerned about this is going to take me out of business.

A.L.J. JENNINGS: Okav.

MR. ROSTAD: That's all I have.

A.L.J. JENNINGS: Okay.

MR. ROSTAD: I just don't want to go out of business unless, you know, unless you want to buy the business and you can have it. Anything I've got's for sale.

A.L.J. JENNINGS: Is it your concern that the location of the property lines will require you to shut down the business, or are you concerned -- the health concerns of your -- like your classmate in Wisconsin?

MR. ROSTAD: I'm not concerned about the 1 2 health concerns as much, because up there it followed the water underneath the property way down deep and 3 then came back up. You probably understand that 4 better than I do, I don't. 5 6 But, no, I just think that by the -- by 7 reading that, you get another 100 foot right-of-way on my property, that will go right through the center 8 9 of the house and the tractors and every display I've 10 got. But that's all I've got to say. It's for sale 11 if you want it, it's --12 MS. ROSTAD: It's No. 534, that route. 13 MR. ROSTAD: No. 534. 14 A.L.J. JENNINGS: Okay. A.L.J. JENNINGS: Excuse me, off the record.

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(Discussion held off the record.)

A.L.J. JENNINGS: Brad Hillyer.

(Witness placed under oath.)

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A.L.J. JENNINGS: Thank you. State and spell your name for the record, please.

MR. HILLYER: Brad Hillyer, business address is 201 North Main Street, Uhrichsville, Ohio. I'm a private attorney, but I'm also here on behalf of a number of clients affected by the line, as well as I am the president of the holding company that owns Bowerston Shale that's directly affected by the proposed line.

I -- I think a lot of folks -- I know many of these people in the room are concerned that the -- you know, that if the line is built -- and I don't think anybody is opposed to increasing economic development for our area -- but they want to be treated fairly. And I think the issue that probably most concerns them is they do not want their properties taken by eminent domain by American Electric Power.

We have -- we are -- in our area, we have a tremendous amount of pipeline activity. There are nine different companies that are building pipelines right now, and for the most part I think they're treating people very fairly with the compensation they're paying to acquire those

pipelines. But American Electric Power so far in my dealings with them is not treating individuals where they're attempting to get eminent domain or lines from near the compensation level that -- that the competition, the pipeline companies, are paying.

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So I think my concern is that if -- if there's a grant of eminent domain, that the -- you know, that our local residents are going to be pounded by defending lawsuits to -- to take their property. A lot of these -- we understand that this is a rebuild of a line, but they are -- they are seeking 50 more feet for the most part on what already exists on the line that's being rebuilt; so that is -- that is as wide as the pipeline companies are taking. But the -- like I said, the compensation that I've seen so far is offered at probably 20 percent of the rate that the pipeline companies are paying.

So I think what we're concerned about is that, you know, people are treated fairly, that if there are situations that impact their property, that they can't have the line where AEP wants it, that they're willing to move it or relocate it and that it's not taken from them, that they are entitled to negotiate a price and not have their property taken,

because the line that's in there, nobody has seen any compensation from that line for 90 years. So I just think people want to be treated fairly. So that's all I have to say.

A.L.J. JENNINGS: Mr. Hillyer, you find

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that the issue of compensation relates to both cases?

MR. HILLYER: Yes. Well, the -- the -obviously if American Electric Power could build this
line in their existing 50-foot line, they wouldn't
need to -- they wouldn't need to be here, they could
simply get the necessary permits and -- because they
already have the right-of-way.

Well, we have a very hilly area, and I think that it's going to be very difficult to build without acquiring the additional 50-foot wide they need to get their equipment up and down the hills in eastern Ohio. So the -- I just -- I just think that, you know, the lines that are there, if they're going to be acquiring more property, that it should be on an arm's-length transaction between the landowners and it shouldn't be taken by an eminent domain proceeding.

A.L.J. JENNINGS: Do you know if the alternate route provides some less level of -- fewer issues than the preferred route?

MR. HILLYER: Well, the -- the -- as I understand it, the alternate route is primarily what's already there, but it's -- obviously from the maps I see that they want to go in a more direct line from Dennison to the Yager substation. So, you know, I'm not in a position to tell whether widening where it is is better than -- than building a new route, I don't -- you know, I don't have any impact on that.

In the Bowerston Shale case, leaving the line where it is will be better because we mine clay

In the Bowerston Shale case, leaving the line where it is will be better because we mine clay there, and where they want to go across is across our mine area. So in that case, it's not a -- the alternate route is better than the new route.

That's all I have. Thank you.

A.L.J. JENNINGS: Thank you.

Next witness is Sharon Rostad.
