

More than half a million people have visited the Museum of the Bible since Washington, D.C.'s newest museum opened near the National Mall six months ago, the museum, which opened in November with splashy attractions such as a walk through Old Testa-ment and a motion ride, was funded largely by the Green famly, the evangelical Chris funded largely by the Green family, the evangelical Chris-tian owners of the Hobby Lobby crafts chain. Justice rescinds opioid sales suspension order

Bioomberg News The Justice Department on Friday rescinded its opi-oid sales suspension order against a Louissan drug dis-tributor it accused of failing to report nusually large shipments of narcotics to independent drugstores. The New Section 2016 Enforcement Administra-tion had immediately sus-pended opioid sales by Mor-ris & Dickson, a 177-year-old company in Shreveport, three weeks ago, accusing it of failing to "properly iden-tify large suspicious orders for controlled substances sold to independent plasma-cies." The DEA alleged that, in some cases, the company was sending out six times a drugstore's normal order of oxycodone and hydroco-dome without notifying fed-py law, a claim the country

eral drug officials as required by law, a claim the company instantly disputed. "This is a striking vindi-cation for our family com-pany," said Paul Dickson, Morris & Dickson's pres-ident. "This proves what we've said all along – that DEA's hasty action was unjus-tified. We have always taken our responsibility to prevent diversion seriously." The Justice Department's

The Justice Department's embarrassingreversal comes as Attorney General Jeff Sec-sions has vowed to com-bat the nation's opioid epi-demic, which kills tens of thousands each year, and aggressively prosecute drug-related cases.
