9		University, and a Ph.D. in real estate economics from The Ohio State University.
10		I was on the finance faculties of Ashland University from 1981 to 1983 and the
11		University of North Texas from 1991 to 1993. Following graduation from the doctoral
12		program, I was research coordinator for Rickenbacker Port Authority from 1995 to
13		1999 and vice president of economic analysis for the Columbus Chamber from 1999 to
14		2011. My position at the Chamber entailed conducting regional economic and
15		demographic analysis in support of the Chamber's economic development mission and
16		developing policy implications from my findings. I left the Chamber in 2011 to start
17		Regionomics, which focuses on neighborhood, community, and regional economics,

workforce development strategy, and fiscal analysis. I have undertaken 78 economic

1		impact studies over the past 15 years, including 27 during my time at the Columbus
2		Chamber and 51 since founding Regionomics.

6	Q.	WHAT IS THE PURPOSE OF YOUR TESTIMONY IN THIS CASE?
7	A.	The purpose of my testimony is to provide a summary of the model and data analysis
8		employed in the economic impact study (the Study) developed to address the potential
9		economic impacts of the two renewable energy projects proposed by AEP Ohio in this
10		filing.

18	<u>ECO</u>	NOMIC IMPACT ANALYSIS
19	Q.	WHAT IS AN ECONOMIC IMPACT ANALYSIS?
20	A.	Economic impact analysis refers to the formal analysis of various measures of economic
21		performance such as the impact on the value of goods and services produced, earnings,
22		employment, and value added, which is a formal measure for the impact on gross
23		domestic product, or GDP. The Study also includes estimates for fiscal impacts, which in

this case refers to taxes collected by Ohio and various local communities throughout the state.

Q. IS ECONOMIC IMPACT ANALYSIS WIDELY USED AND ACCEPTED?

- 4 A. Yes, economic impact analysis is widely used and accepted. In addition, the specific methods employed in the Study to measure the direct, indirect, and induced economic effects are widely used and widely accepted.
- Q. PLEASE EXPLAIN THE MODELING SYSTEM USED TO DETERMINE THE
 ECONOMIC IMPACTS OUTLINED IN THE STUDY.
- 9 A. Indirect and induced output, earnings, and employment impacts can be estimated by 10 applying an economic impact model to the direct spending increase. Several generally-11 accepted models are available to estimate these impacts; the Study uses the Regional Input- Output Modeling System (RIMS II) multipliers from the U.S. Bureau of Economic 12 13 Analysis. These multipliers are derived from a framework called an input-output table. 14 For a given industry in a given geographic area, the input-output table shows the increase 15 in purchases from other local firms by industry and the sales to other local firms by 16 industry resulting from a one-dollar increase in the original industry's output. Thus, the 17 input-output table can be used to derive the impact on those other local firms of an 18 increase in production within a specific industry.

19 Q. PLEASE DISCUSS THE VALUES WITHIN THE INPUT-OUTPUT TABLES.

A. The values within the input-output table are unique to Ohio. RIMS II summarizes the information in Ohio's input-output table by calculating a set of unique impact factors

(multipliers) for each of 369 detailed industries and 62 generalized industries within the state. Because of their origin in the input-output table, the factors implicitly reflect the structure of Ohio's economy and the presence or absence of specific types of suppliers within the state. This permits revenues, receipts, or expenditures to be multiplied by factors for output, earnings, employment, and value added to generate the impacts directly. However, an important point is that the results of even the most carefully-constructed economic impact analysis represent only the order of magnitude of the true impacts.

Q. HOW ARE THE EMPLOYMENT ESTIMATES DEVELOPED?

Α.

Employment estimates in an economic impact analysis must be interpreted particularly carefully. First, these are not all full-time jobs. Instead, a RIMS II analysis provides a mix of full-time jobs and part-time jobs (i.e., headcount) that is typical for the industry in question. While it is legitimate to refer to the direct jobs in a new activity as "created," the same cannot be said for indirect and induced jobs. The implication of an estimated employment impact is that additional activity exists to increase the headcount to the specified extent, but the model cannot determine whether this need is filled by new hiring or by existing workers increasing their hours and/or effort. Therefore, it is more appropriate to refer to these jobs not as created but as sustained. Note, however, that even if no new workers are hired, the effort and income of existing workers would increase. This alone would give rise to additional induced activity.

Q. DOES THE RIMS II MODEL CALCULATE TAX IMPACTS?

A. No. RIMS II does not provide tax impacts; these are estimated by a separate model developed by Regionomics and calibrated to Ohio's tax structure. Commercial Activity

Tax can be estimated fairly directly from the RIMS II output estimates. Given information on the wages and salaries of the direct, indirect, and induced jobs; tax rates; and expenditure patterns, the taxes paid by households can be estimated as well. Further, the calculation of state and municipal income taxes is based on the sector-specific employment impacts and the average wage for each sector. State and county sales taxes are estimated by classifying typical household purchases according to their taxability, using this classification to estimate the share of income spent on taxable purchases, and applying this percentage to earnings.

A.

Businesses located in taxing municipalities also pay income taxes on their net income and in many cases sales taxes on their purchases. While direct sales taxes can be roughly estimated, the outputs from the RIMS II models do not include the information that would allow other taxes to be calculated.

ARE YOU AWARE OF A CONTRACTUAL PROVISION IN THE HECATE SOLAR REPA THAT CONTAINS AN ADDITIONAL COMMITMENT FOR FULL-TIME PERMANENT JOBS?

Yes, it is my understanding that the Hecate solar REPA makes a commitment to maintain at least 113 full-time, permanent jobs that are not related to the construction or operation of the solar facility, which is enforceable through price reductions in the REPA for five years. That contractual provision was finalized after the time of the economic impact study and was not considered as part of the study. Any benefits associated with that jobs commitment would be separate and in addition to the benefits in the economic impact study. These jobs, like the ones that are considered, would also have indirect and induced impacts over and above the contractually-mandated 113 jobs.
