DIRECT TESTIMONY OF JIM HAID ON BEHALF OF COMPLAINANTS

October 26, 2018

- 1 Q. Please state your name and address.
- A. My name is Jim Haid. I live in Symmes Township. Specifically, I reside at
 11994 Paulmeadows Drive, Cincinnati, Ohio 45249.
- 4 Q. Please describe your educational background.
- 5 A. I have a Bachelor's degree in business from Bucknell University and a Master's
- 6 degree in business from the University of Connecticut.
- 7 Q. Are you currently employed?
- 8 A. Yes. I own a small business called The Goddard School. Previously, I spent 25
- 9 years working in the corporate world.
- 10 Q. When did you purchase your home?
- 11 A. My wife, Laura, and I purchased the property in 2008.
- Q. When you purchased your home, were you aware that Duke Energy Ohio,
 Inc.'s (Duke) transmission lines were located near the property?
- 15 A. Yes. At the time, however, I was not aware that Duke had an easement on the
- 16 property. I now know that Duke does have an easement on our property, which is
- 17 attached to my testimony as Attachment A.
- Q. When you purchased your home, were you aware that Duke would need to
 perform vegetation management on your trees as a result of the presence of
 the transmission lines?
- 22 A. Although I was not aware of Duke's specific easement at the time, I generally
- 23 understood that Duke would need to conduct trimming and pruning on our
 24 property in order to ensure that trees or other vegetation would not come into
- 25 contact with the transmission lines.
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1 **Q**. Did you have any reason to expect that Duke would need to completely 2 remove trees or other vegetation on your property when conducting its 3 vegetation management? 4 5 Α. No, of course not. The trees are mature on our property and in our neighborhood 6 so I had no reason to believe that Duke would begin removing or clear cutting 7 along its transmission lines instead of trimming and pruning. Over the years, I 8 have seen Duke trim other trees in the neighborhood every few years. On our 9 property, Duke has not even done any trimming of trees or other vegetation for 10 the 10 years that we have owned the property. 11 **Q**. Since you have resided at the property, have trees or other vegetation on 12 your property come into direct contact with the transmission wires near your 13 property? 14 15 Not that I know of. Α. 16 Q. To your knowledge, has Duke's previous vegetation management on or near 17 your property effectively prevented trees and other vegetation from causing 18 outages or otherwise impacting electric service? 19 20 A. As I mentioned before, Duke has not conducted vegetation management on our 21 property in the past ten years, but to my knowledge, no trees on our property have 22 ever contacted a transmission wire directly and caused an outage or impacted 23 electric service in any way. 24 0. Are you aware of any outages that have occurred or other concerns with the 25 provision of electric service as a result of the trees and other vegetation on 26 your property? 27 28 Α. No. Since we have owned our property, I am not aware of any outages or other 29 concerns being raised by Duke or anyone else regarding trees or other vegetation 30 on our property affecting the safety and reliability of Duke's electric system. 31 Given that Duke has trimmed our neighbors' trees several times since we have

1	owned the property, but has not trimmed our trees even once, I believe it is fair to
2	assume that Duke was not concerned with the trees on our property causing
3	problems with its electric system.

4 **O**.

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Q. How did you become involved in this case?

- A. During the summer of 2017, I received a door hanger from Duke. This door
 hanger is attached to my testimony as Attachment B. Included with that door
 hanger were documents stating Duke's purported policies for vegetation
 management. I contacted Duke to discuss.
- 10 Q. Were you able to speak with anyone from Duke about the documents that
 11 you received?
 12
- 13 A. Yes, Steve Holton came to our property to discuss my concerns with me.
- 14 Q. What did you learn from your meeting with Mr. Holton?
- A. He explained to me that it was Duke's intention to raze all the trees and bushes in
 a 100-foot path along their easement. He also said that they would be applying
 herbicides to make sure that nothing grew back. Throughout this conversation, he
 displayed an overly arrogant attitude. I was shocked that Duke would so
 aggressively try to bully their customers. He became incredibly difficult to deal
 with, so I asked him who were the decision-makers on the implementation of
 these new policies and practices, so that I could contact them to discuss.

How did Mr. Holton respond?

- 23 A. He told me that he was the decision-maker.

1 2 3 **Q**.

What trees on your property would be impacted if Duke is able to implement its plan as it was explained to you by Mr. Holton?

4 I prepared a diagram of our property showing the three affected trees. That Α. 5 diagram is attached to my testimony as Attachment C. The diagram shows our 6 three trees-one ash tree, one plum tree, and one shorter pear tree. I estimate that 7 the two trees in the "wire zone" are 20 feet tall or less. Even though they have not caused any issues in the past, I would be willing to have them trimmed if doing so 8 9 was necessary to maintain an appropriate clearance from the transmission lines. 10 The third tree is taller, but is barely within the easement at all, so I believe that it 11 poses no threat of contacting the wires, even if it were to fall. The Ash tree is the 12 tallest, and is barely within the easement. The pear tree is helping to contain 13 erosion on the lake's edge. I have attached photographs of these trees to my 14 testimony as Attachment D.

Q. To your knowledge, did Steve Holton or any other Duke employee or representative conduct an analysis or assessment on your property to determine whether your trees currently come into direct contact with the transmission lines or are anticipated to come in contact with the transmission lines within the next six years?

A. No, not that I am aware. To my knowledge, there was no assessment done as to
what the clearance was between each tree or bush and the transmission lines.
Steve Holton stated that Duke's polices had changed and that Duke was clear
cutting all vegetation within Duke's 100-foot easement. Additionally, it is my
understanding that Duke responded to discovery, stating that it has not conducted
individual assessments on the Complainants' properties.

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1Q.To your knowledge, did Steve Holton or any other Duke employee or2representative conduct an analysis or assessment on your property to3determine whether the removal of your trees and other vegetation is4necessary for the safe and reliable provision of electric service?5

A. No. Again, Steve Holton stated that Duke's polices had changed and that Duke
was clear cutting all vegetation within Duke's 100-foot easement. Therefore, I do
not believe that there was any assessment or analysis completed to determine
whether the removal of vegetation on our property was actually necessary to
provide safe and reliable electric service. Additionally, it is my understanding
that Duke responded to discovery, stating that it has not conducted individual
assessments on the Complainants' properties.

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Did you file a complaint against Duke?

15 Α. Yes, I filed an individual complaint against Duke on October 23, 2017. I have 16 since joined the Citizens Against Clear Cutting (CACC) customer group. I am a 17 named Complainant who filed and participated in the Second Amended 18 Complaint against Duke, which included allegations regarding the unjust and 19 unreasonable vegetation management practices and policies of Duke; the unjust, 20 unreasonable, and unlawful implementation of Duke's vegetation management 21 practices, policies, and plan, which includes the clear cutting of trees and 22 vegetation on customers' properties and the use of dangerous herbicides to 23 remove or destroy trees and vegetation; the adequacy and lawfulness of Duke's 24 vegetation management plan; and defects in how Duke's vegetation management 25 plan was modified, including deceptive and misleading statements and filings by 26 Duke.

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- 1 **Q**. If it were determined that Duke needed to maintain a certain amount of 2 clearance between trees and other vegetation and the transmission wires, 3 would you object to Duke or its contractors trimming your trees and/or other 4 vegetation to attain the clearance determined to be necessary to ensure safe 5 and reliable transmission of electric power? 6 7 Α. No. I would not object. A practice of trimming trees and vegetation to attain an 8 appropriate clearance would be a reasonable practice. I believe that this was 9 Duke's practice prior to 2017. What I oppose, however, is Duke's choice to 10 pursue these unreasonable, draconian measures of clear-cutting and the use of 11 herbicides to remove vegetation as part of their vegetation management plan. 12 **Q**. **Does this conclude your testimony?**
- 13 A. Yes.

Duke Energy has identified vegetation that needs to be controlled by herbicide. Duke Energy's contract crews will be in the area in the near future applying approved herbicides.

To ensure safe and reliable electric and gas service for you and your neighbors, a Duke Energy contract mowing crew will soon be mowing right-of-way corridors in your area.


