As a physician and former associate professor of medicine while in California, I have long been attuned to environmental and public health issues. I now am a lecturer on energy systems, the climate system and re-engineering the electric grid, including an occasional adjunct teaching position at Western Washington University here in Bellingham.

I am in the process of reviewing a report by our Energy Information Administration from January, which includes the simple summary statement that wind generation generated 7% of our nation's electricity in 2018. Add to that the projection that by 2020 wind should be responsible for 9% of our electricity. Growing by leaps and bounds, but not because of an environmental argument alone. Simple economics instead explain the steady demise of coal, consumption in the United States being down 5% last year and likely to drop another 8% this year. Concurrently nuclear has plateaued in spite of huge state and federal subsidies and is clearly an industry on the precipice of steep decline as well.

Time to read the handwriting on the wall. I know that our daughter and her family living in Wooster are enthusiasts as well as sharing a clear-eyed vision of the future for themselves and their children. Let's get these offshore wind turbines built in Lake Erie.
