

West End residents at risk of displacement

Study: Rising rents, years of neglect threaten area

More than 4 in 10 West End residents risk losing their homes as a result of rising rents and real estate prices as the neighborhood, adjacent to gentrified Over-the-Rhine, risks displacement.

That's the result of a study released Thursday on housing in the Cincinnati neighborhood.

After years of little to no investment in the historically black neighborhood, it has been thrust into the spotlight as the site of the new FC Cincinnati stadium.

The study, paid for by the team as part of its written agreement to invest in the neighborhood, didn't directly address how the stadium would impact people living there now. Instead, it's a snapshot of current issues. And they're numerous. All told, 1,592 West End households were at some risk of displacement, according to the study.

The solution:

■ There is a need for 550 rental units that a family of four earning \$65,000 or less could afford.

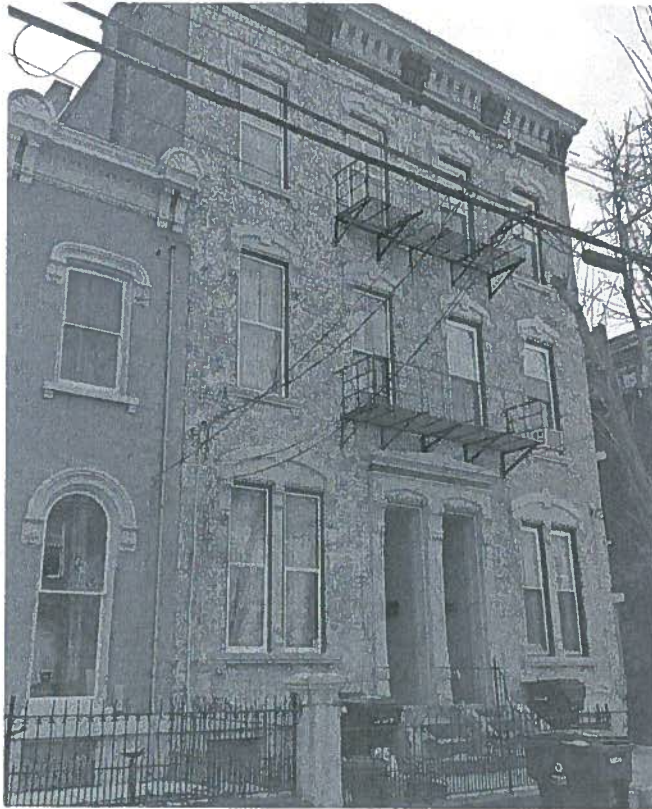
■ There is a need for 148 homes for a family of four earning \$100,000 or more.

"Overall, this new study shows that, if the West End is going to retain its cultural legacy as a thriving center of economic and ethnic diversity... (it) requires all stakeholders at the table," said Alexis Kidd-Zaffer, executive director of Seven Hills Neighborhood Houses.

To help, the Port is investing \$727,000 this year to stabilize six properties, four of them market rate, two for Habitat for Humanity families. It's revitalizing the Regal Theater and using a \$5 million loan fund to help small business thrive in the neighborhood.

The study was initiated as part of a Community Benefits Agreement between The Port, FC Cincinnati and West End Neighborhood Association.

The study found the majority of

West End residents live in subsidized housing, and therefore are protected from gentrification. But those subsidized properties need to be protected.

"If we just sit back and let things happen, we all know what that's going to look like," said Laura Brunner, president and CEO of The Port, alluding to the rapid pace of displacement that could occur if speculators were allowed to buy up most of the available housing.

Brunner acknowledged a need for more affordable housing in West End. The Port, she said, is working to stem the tide of gentrification by building more market-rate homes and apartments.

"The study highlights what we have believed; that the West End has experienced disinvestment for decades," said FC Cincinnati President Jeff Berding. "We recognized that

housing was an issue in the neighborhood before we began our project, which is why we contributed \$150,000 for this study to guide future redevelopment in an equitable way."

What the study found:

■ Of all 3,579 total occupied housing units in West End, about 27% of those households were "extremely threatened" by displacement.

■ The households were comprised of low-income renters earning less than \$31,350 a year who simply could not withstand a major rent increase, according to the study.

■ Another 17% of West End households potentially facing displacement were middle-income renters earning \$31,350 to \$50,150 a year, and homeowners with incomes ranging from \$18,000 to just over \$50,000 a year.

■ Those households were labeled "very threatened" or "threatened" because they could better withstand an increase in rents or property taxes than the extremely threatened group.

■ All told, 1,592 West End households were at some risk of displacement, according to the study.

The numbers in the final report are slightly lower than preliminary figures reported in April by The Enquirer that showed 1,491 renters and 352 homeowners in the neighborhood were at risk.

Representatives of Navistar did not respond to a request for comment as of Thursday afternoon.

Navistar builds medium-duty GM trucks on its main line in Springfield and outway vans for the company on its line two. Some of the parts for those vehicles are sent to Navistar by GM suppliers.

United Auto Workers authorized a strike against GM that started on Monday amid contract negotiations between the union and the vehicle manufacturer. The parties failed to reach an agreement on a new four-year contract, and approximately 50,000 workers across the country are taking part in the strike, according to the Associated Press.

Blizard said all of the workers here represent in Springfield are Navistar employees.

He said they are not participating in the strike called by the chapters of the UAW that represent GM workers. However, he said it is unclear how long the strike will last or when production

will resume on the assembly lines affected by the shortage in parts.

"This is all subject to change. We have no way of knowing how long this could affect production.

This all depends on when the UAW and GM reach an agreement," read a bulletin sent to UAW members at the Springfield plant this week.

Navistar recently decided to ramp up production of GM vans in Springfield. The increase in production started earlier this week, Blizard said.

Navistar announced last month that it would be reducing production on its main line in Springfield due to truck production exceeding orders industry-wide. The reduction resulted in 126 workers being laid off.

The layoffs started earlier this month and will end today. Originally 136 assembly production workers were scheduled to be laid off. However, officials with Navistar alerted local union representatives of the change on Wednesday.

must put aside their differences and come together to support Gov. DeWine's initiatives to help reduce gun violence.

Dayton Mayor Nan Whaley, a Democrat and co-founder of the Ohio Mayors Alliance, said the sheer number of mass shootings and gun deaths is leading the country to a tipping point.

"More and more, it's becoming that everyone knows someone who has died at the hand of a gun. 100 people die every day in this country from a gun. That's unacceptable. I think we are seeing a sea change, really," she said at a press conference at the Ohio Statehouse. "Voters are demanding a change. I think it happened in the 2018 election. I think it'll affect the 2020 election if nothing is done."

State Sen. Peggy Lehner, R-Kettering, who is co-sponsoring multiple gun control bills, said it's a myth that

politicians who oppose gun control are beholden to the National Rifle Association's campaign contributions; instead, NRA endorsement drives its members to vote for candidates, which can be enough to determine who wins.

"There is nothing that speaks louder to politicians than the fact that they're going to win an election. To counter that, we have to make it very, very clear that for every voter who votes for the NRA's agenda, there is 10 of you who vote against it," said Lehner.

Behind the scenes, DeWine is building a coalition to apply political pressure to conservatives in the Ohio General Assembly who oppose gun restrictions. The governor and his allies are reaching out to local elected officials, law enforcement leaders, children's hospitals and other health care organizations, faith leaders, labor organizations, business groups and others.

In the coming weeks, DeWine is expected to unveil

specifications on his 17-point plan, including bills that would expand and strengthen gun purchase background checks and would create a "safety protection order" to allow police or family to get a court order to seize firearms from those deemed to be a danger to themselves or others.

Gun rights groups generally oppose such laws, saying they're ineffective and infringe on both 2nd and 4th amendment constitutional rights.

The debate over gun control comes six weeks after a gunman killed nine people and injured 27 in a mass shooting in Dayton's Oregon District, the deadliest mass shooting in modern Ohio history. Dayton police on routine patrol are credited with stopping the shooter in 32 seconds.

Dayton Police Chief Richard Biele said "Even with virtually instantaneous engagement, swift, decisive, courageous action - ending a mass shooting in 32 seconds. Still, nine killed, 16 additional gun shot victims, another

20-plus flight injuries. It's not enough ... More is needed to be done, and it's not by law enforcement."

In 2006, Ohio legislators changed state law to preempt local jurisdictions from having their own firearms regulations.

Middletown Mayor Larry Mulligan Jr. said gun violence isn't limited to mass shootings but includes homicides and suicides. He noted that a study shows that gun violence costs Ohio \$2.7 billion a year in health care, law enforcement and other expenses.

Wiley Austin, who survived being shot 12 times in the mass shooting in downtown Cincinnati on Sept. 6, 2018, said: "We need to not give up. We need to work hard on these legislators that are just not there with us yet. And who knows why they are not but we need to bring them into the fold and do everything we can to save lives."

Life Insurance Awareness Month

life insurance professional when determining the most appropriate coverage for each family's unique needs."

Upon the insured's death, life insurance proceeds could help replace the deceased's income, fund ongoing expenses, pay the mortgage, car loan, and other debts left behind, as well as cover the deceased's funeral expenses and estate taxes.

The amount of life insurance a person should purchase to protect their loved ones depends on many factors, including life stage, family picture, and financial standing. Important questions a person should consider include:

- How much of the family income do I provide?
- How would my survivors, especially my children, get by?
- Does anyone else depend on me financially, such as a parent, spouse, grandparent, brother, or sister?
