ALJ SEE: Good evening and welcome, everyone. My name is Greta See, and with me is Matt Sandor that just indicated I was muted. We are the Administrative Law Judges in the Legal Department of the Ohio Power Siting Board. As the assigned Attorney -- I'm sorry. As the assigned Administrative Law Judges, our duties include conducting the public hearing in this matter, Case No. 19-1880-EL-BGN, which involves the application filed by Atlanta Farms Solar Project, LLC, for a certificate to construct a solar-powered electric generation facility in Pickaway County, Ohio. Throughout this evening you may hear Judge Sandor and I, as well as others, refer to Atlanta Solar Farms as the project.

Due to the COVID-19 emergency that remains in effect under Executive Order No. 2020-01D issued by the Governor of Ohio and consistent with Amended Substitute House Bill 197, tonight -- today's hearing is being held through Webex which enables interested persons to offer testimony on the proposed project by telephone or video over the internet. The

hearing is also being live streamed at www.youtube.com/user/pucohio.

Before we get started with the public hearing, I would -- I would like to address some preliminary matters. First, if you experience technical difficulties during the hearing, there are several options to address the issue. As it appears that there are no questions

tonight, I will turn it over to my Co-Judge, Matt
Sandor.

ALJ SANDOR: Thanks, Judge See.

The Ohio Power Siting Board has scheduled for hearing at this time and place Case No.

19-1880-EL-BGN which is captioned in the Matter of the Application of Atlanta Farms Solar Project, LLC, for a Certificate of Environmental Compatibility and Public Need to Construct a Solar-Powered Electric Generation Facility in Pickaway County, Ohio.

As I mentioned -- or as mentioned earlier, my name is Matt Sandor. And assigned to this case with me is Greta See. We are Administrative Law Judges in the Board's Legal Department, and we will be conducting today's hearing.

Also presiding with us today is the Chairman of the Ohio Power Siting Board, Sam Randazzo. I believe that the Chairman has some words to share with us, so I will turn it over to him.

Chairman.

Greta, both of you, and also to Matt Butler for his helpful comments to get this started. As Matt indicated, the purpose of this hearing this evening is to allow parties in the locality that may be affected by the project to provide us with their views on the project. And we know this is important to all of you so it's important to us. And we will turn it over to the -- to the rest of the hearing so that we can get started with the more important part of this process. Thanks, Matt and Greta.

ALJ SANDOR: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

In addition to the Chairman,

Administrative Law Judge See, and myself, there are
other staff members from the Board assisting with
various aspects of the hearing including Mary
Fischer, Matt Butler, Jill Coker, and Brittany
Waugaman who will be overseeing the event on Webex
and YouTube.

At this time we will take the appearances

by counsel of the parties to this case. We will begin with the Applicant.

MS. PIRIK: Thank you, your Honor. On behalf of the Applicant Atlanta Farms Solar Project, LLC, the law firm of Dickinson Wright by Christine Pirik and William Vorys, 150 East Gay Street, Suite 2400, Columbus, Ohio 43215.

ALJ SANDOR: Thank you.

We have one Intervenor in the proceeding.

It's the Ohio Farm Bureau Federation. And we also have Board counsel for Board Staff.

Thank you. I'll note that while counsel for Ohio Farm Bureau Federation and Board Staff may not be participating in this proceeding, non-counsel representatives of the Federation and Board Staff may be attending.

The subject of today's hearing is an application filed -- filed by Atlanta Farms Solar, LLC, for the purpose of constructing and operating the solar-powered electric generation facility. Specifically, the proposed project would occupy up to 1,375 acres within a 2,276-acre project area in Deer Creek and Perry Townships in Pickaway County. The project will generate 199.6 megawatts. Atlanta Farms' application was filed on January 31, 2020, and

was supplemented on March 3, 2020, and March 17, 2020.

2.1

I would also note that the Board's Staff filed a Report of Investigation on October 7, 2020. This report is a recommendation from the Board Staff and does not necessarily reflect what the Board's final determination in this case will be.

The purpose of today's public hearing is to receive testimony regarding Atlanta Farms' application from entities and persons and the local community who are affected by the proposed project but who are not parties to the case. The public hearing is not a question and answer session but is an opportunity to let the Board know what you think about the proposed project.

Today's public hearing is only one aspect of the process in this case. And the evidentiary hearing is scheduled to begin on Wednesday,

November 4, 2020, through Webex. The purpose of the evidentiary hearing is for the parties in this case, including the Applicant, the Intervenor Ohio Farm Bureau Federation, and the Board Staff to provide testimony and other evidence regarding the project.

Tonight's hearing is being transcribed by a court reporter, Karen Gibson, from Armstrong &

Okey. If you plan to testify, please speak clearly so that the court reporter can accurately reflect your comments on the record. Please make sure that you verbally respond to all questions asked in order that they can be properly transcribed.

After I finish with this introduction, I will begin by calling individuals on the registration list to testify about the proposed project. Each person who registered to testify will be permitted to speak once -- once about the project.

We will ask you to take an oath or affirmation that what you are about to say is the truth. Your testimony will then be considered as part of the official record in this case, and it will be reviewed by the Board before a final decision is made on the application.

Additionally, counsel for the parties in this case, as well as the Chairman, Judge See, and myself will be permitted to ask you questions about your testimony. Should you decide that you do not want to testify, when I call your name from the registration list, you can pass to the next witness.

Also once you have finished testifying or if you are merely here to observe, you may leave the hearing at any time that you wish. If individuals

wish to supplement their testimony with an exhibit for the Board's consideration, a copy of the document, along with a reference to Case No. 19-1880-EL-BGN, must be provided to the Board no later than October 28, 2020, by electronic mail to contactopsb@puco.ohio.gov, or by mail to Ohio Power Siting Board, 180 East Broad Street, Attention: Docketing Division, Columbus, Ohio 43215.

The Board appreciates your participation in tonight's hearing, and we want everyone who is registered to testify to have the opportunity to do so. At this time we are going to begin with the testimony. Both Judge See and myself apologize in advance if we mispronounce your name, but we'll try our level best to get it right.

Township, and now that we are working from home, I am working in the township at least three days a week, but my office is actually in Columbus, Ohio.

ALJ SANDOR: Okay. Thank you. Do you work/reside within the project area?

MR. SCHEIN: I live in the project area.

I live in Deer Creek Township.

ALJ SANDOR: Okay. Correct. All right. Go ahead.

MR. SCHEIN: I just want to start by thanking everyone tonight who is providing comments, and I'm here to speak in general in support of the project.

And my first argument is a conservative argument, which for those of you that know me know that I'm not very likely to give usually, but that is the conservative argument in support of the project just based on property rights. So I just think that, you know, who are we to prevent our neighbors from maximizing the profits of their private property. This seems like an issue that conservative voters in the area can get behind. I'm a bit confused by those who seem opposed, although I'm willing to come towards tonight with an open mind and be convinced otherwise.

But notwithstanding that open mind, my general opinion is that people should be able to do what they want with their property so long as it does no -- does no harm to their neighbors which leads me to my second point.

2.1

I don't understand that these solar panels do cause any harm to neighbors, neighboring landowners. They don't cause air pollution. They don't cause sound pollution. They also do not harm the waterways which is more than can be said for the chemicals and the fertilizers, pesticides, and weedkillers used by most farmers in the area today.

My third point is on the financial benefits. Not only will the individual property owners benefit financially but that added income will eventually be recognized in local tax revenue. From what I understand, and I don't have hard numbers, but the local school system stands to benefit substantially from the added revenue from these solar farms; and, in fact, the school system is Westfall High School which is, you know, asking for a levy at this time specifically because they need more money for construction to update their buildings. In addition, the township stands to benefit financially as well, although, from what I understand, it's to a

smaller extent.

My fourth point is on esthetics. I hear people say these will be visually ugly. It will cause visual pollution. And I have driven and -- done some research and driven by some of these solar farms in Indiana, and they don't seem like monstrous eyesores to me. They are generally fenced in and surrounded by trees, and they look like any other open field, just that the crops on top of them are a bit larger.

And this is sort of a rhetorical question but if we can stop these projects just because our neighbors think that they are ugly, can I also go around and call the yard police on every property owner in the township with a horribly kept lawn and broken down, rusted out cars on blocks in the front yard?

My fifth point is the environment. Not only are these solar panels not bad for the local environment but they are also good for the global environment. Climate change is real, and CO-2 emissions are the main cause. As a country, we need to continue to move away from coal and oil and eventually natural gases towards more renewable energy. This is an opportunity for local property

owners to help in that endeavor.

And then my final point is very much a broad, big picture perspective and that's independence in general. Aside from the environmental arguments is the energy independence argument. As a country, the less we rely on oil rich countries in the Middle East to supply our energy, the less we will need to involve ourselves in the politics of foreign countries in order to secure energy resources. This will, in turn, hopefully lead to a less militarily aggressive foreign policy which could ultimately save our country in terms of lives lost as well as tax dollars spent oversees.

That concludes my testimony for this evening. I appreciate everyone's time. Thank you very much.

ALJ SANDOR: Thank you. And before we excuse you, are there any questions for the witness from Chairman, counsel, or the Bench?

All right. Hearing none, thank you for your testimony and you are excused.

All right. So our next witness, registered witness, is Jane Harf who, I believe, we're having the same potential issue as we did with Mr. Funk. She might not be connected through the

Ginghamsburg-Frederick Road in Tipp City, Ohio, and I

do not live in the project area, but I have been

enlisted to work in the project area.

ALJ SANDOR: Okay. Proceed with your testimony.

MR. DAVIS: Yeah. My name is Ray Davis, and I am president and a partner of OGW Energy Resources. We're a company that's been around for over 12 years in Ohio. We are a design-build renewable energy company with a core focus on solar and lighting.

I have two main points I want to give tonight. No. 1 is that Savion with the Atlanta Farms project has enlisted us for something that I have not seen before which is a good neighbor solar residential program. And when I said that I've been enlisted to work in the area, we've been knocking on doors in the local proximity of the project for the Good Neighbor Solar Residential Program. I'm extremely proud of that project because it's been quite some time in the making, and we collaborated

with Savion on it to make it come to fruition for the Atlanta Farms project.

2.1

But the real reason for my testimony is that I want to share with everybody how I got involved with solar in the first place. And I'll be brief because I know time is of the essence here. In 2004, my first son was born, and in the delivery room right after he was born the nurse does her normal check and something — something was wrong. The entire NICU staff came in and took my son away from us. And come to find out that he was struggling breathing.

For many, many months after that, he slept in a bassinet with -- next to our bed with monitoring, and every time that alarm would go off for the monitor, it meant he stopped breathing. And I would jump out of bed, I would shake him, and I would kind of revive him, kind of like jump start him, and he -- he's a severe asthmatic, so taking him to the hospital, taking him to emergency centers, taking him to the doctor when his oxygen levels are -- are low, checking it daily.

Pulmicort, Singulair, Prednisone,

Flovent, and a whole host of other drugs were a

blessing and a curse. They are a blessing because I

don't think he would be here today without those drugs. They are a curse because of the side effects that I became aware of. Obviously you are giving that to your child. The bottom line on that is that through that suffering, you know, as a parent when you see your child can't breathe, you want to fix it.

And so I started doing some crazy amount of research. Come to find out the year he was born in 2004, sulfur dioxide, we were the most -- the worst emitter. We were ranked No. 1 as the worst emitter of sulfur dioxide. Sulfur dioxide, or SO-2, is horrible for asthmatics. The particulates basically attack the lungs, and when you learn that your asthmatic son, who is struggling to breathe, struggles to breathe the air, what's left to do?

So at that point in time I decided to start a renewable energy company. Every solar array that we install is a point of pride so the next Aaron that's born that's struggling to breathe, it's just a little bit better. We are doing a little bit better, but we are ranked No. 3 now. In the last data that I have seen is No. 3. And when you consider that there's 320 million Americans, the EIA outlook, the projections for the next 25 years say that we need more and more energy. We're going to 400 million

Americans. As a state, as a country, we must do better. We not only need to replace old sources of energy; we need to keep expanding all sources of energy, particularly solar which does not have lead, arsenic, and particularly sulfur dioxide which, as I said, hurts my son.

So with that I give my personal endorsement for the project, and as president and a partner of OGW Energy Resources, I absolutely wholeheartedly give my endorsement for the project.

ALJ SANDOR: Thank you, Mr. Davis.

Any questions from Chairman, counsel, or Bench?

CHAIRMAN RANDAZZO: Yes, Judge Sandor, I do have a question.

Mr. Davis, thank you for your testimony.

This is Sam Randazzo speaking. The -- I'm curious,

can you give us just sort of a quick overview of what

the Good Neighbor Solar Residential Program is?

MR. DAVIS: Sure. What I can talk about is that I am given a priority list. That priority list from the Atlanta Farms project, from Savion, has the people that are the closest in proximity to where the project is. I have already been out and about with Sarah Moser, who is, I'm sure many of the panel

     less than one-half mile from the proposed power

     plant. I attend church in the area and visit my mom

daily in the area of the proposed development.

At meetings with the developer, I have asked questions, as have others with concerns. I have listened to the responses from the developer which did not answer my questions but instead were about what they see as the benefits of the proposed power plant, of thinking progressively, and in generating revenue for the community.

Their stance is that there is no reason to be opposed to an energy plant being placed on the farm ground and that the benefits are huge, their claims for huge revenue coming into the community, keep energy being available, creation of jobs for local people, money for the schools.

They've indicated being opposed to this power plant as being opposed to prosperity and growth. This is not the case for me. I, along with many others who question this development, am a lifelong resident of Pickaway County, and I want good things to happen but not at the expense of losing farm ground and changing the landscape to that of a power plant for 30 years to come.

What has been asked but not answered by the developer, first, what is the long-term effect of a power plant on fertile farm ground? Second, what

is the actual energy savings benefit to the community as far as the electric that is generated from this power plant? Third, what guarantee exists that protects the community from misuse of, neglect of, or damage from the power plant? And, fourth, why wasn't a location chosen for the power plant that is already paved or developed and why place the power plant on fertile farm ground?

Without answers from the developers, other conclusions are reasonable. One is that there is no history to draw on about what happens to the farm ground after 20 to 30 years of an energy plant being located on it. Two is that residents in the area probably won't be the guaranteed consumers of the electrical energy from this power plant. the protection from the neglect or damages doesn't exist and wouldn't occur. Concerned residents who experience the impact from damage or neglect associated with the project will have no support readily available to fix the problem. And, fourth, that locations other than this farm ground, those that are already paved or developed, were not chosen probably because they were not close to the electric towers that already exist on this farm ground. weren't as easy to procure as the farm ground, and

they were more costly to develop than this farm ground.

2.1

Some of the property owners under contract with the developer are absent from the area. Because they do not live in the area, they will not see or be a part of the change in the landscape that will be in place for 30 years.

The people who will use this energy are likely far from here, but they are also consumers of food. The existing farm ground here is needed for crop or livestock production. This proposed power plant could be located somewhere else that is already paved or developed; and if that happened, the power plant could be built, the electric could be produced as clean energy, and the farm ground protected. There are other ways to accomplish the creation of clean energy power plants without using thousands of acres of farm ground.

That concludes my testimony.

ALJ SANDOR: Thank you. First, any questions from Chairman, counsel, or the Bench?

Hearing none, thank you, Ms. Riddle.

And I suppose my specific concerns regarding the project are the unknown environment factors for the soil and the surrounding areas of the lease of 30 years, the effect on the local township, and the use of the good, viable farmland. As these solar farms are still young in the age of actual environment factors are unknown, they have not existed that long, what will be the long-term effects of these — of these actual projects in the neighbors' land? Will the batteries that store the electricity be disposed of correctly?

And there are many factors out of our control that can affect our community. As the panels are anchored into the ground, this could cause damage to the field tiles. This could also affect many farms around the area and can infect the substance in other surrounding farms and our water streams. And living in rural Ohio, we do not have city water, only well water, and no one knows what kind of chemicals could be potentially harmful that could be filtered into our home.

In regards to our local township, there has been much research done that indicates the solar panel farms can give off bad reflection. And as it

appears in the property outline, the solar panels will be located close to the roadway in Deer Creek Township.

2.1

We only have volunteer fire fighters.

Are these properties close by high risk for fires,
and will our property insurance increase?

I personally love living in rural Ohio so I can see wildlife out in the fields and endure our quiet community, and I live personally on a dead end road. This is exactly why we moved here and I hate to think that we can no longer enjoy watching deer eating the corn in the field at harvest.

Another concern is the use of viable farmland. And every day the United States loses farmland to development. Why -- while we depend on electricity for everyday life, we are also dependent on food, and if our farmland continues to decline, farmers will be unable to produce crops to fill our table. And why can't these solar panels be placed in the area where there's desert land or that -- on top of properties and not good, viable farmland?

And that concludes my testimony. Thank you.

ALJ SEE: Okay. Go ahead with your testimony, please, Ms. Davey.

MS. DAVEY: Okay. I would like to voice my concerns regarding the proposed solar project near Atlanta in Perry Township. The OPSB has on file a written letter from me dated November 25, 2019, and an e-mail sent on April 26, 2020.

My main concern is the using of fertile farm ground for this type of project. According to the American Farmland Trust, 3 acres of farmland are lost every minute to development in the United States. 41 percent of the lost acres comes from development in rural areas like ours.

In the April 2020 Ohio Country Journal, it's stated there are 12 solar energy projects being built or in the planning stages covering about 16,000 acres in the State of Ohio. This should be a concern for the OPSB that all of these projects are permitted to proceed for the next 25 to 40 years taking all of this ground out of crop production as well as income from the farmers who would have been paid by landowners to farm this land if they were not

the owners themselves.

2.1

In the February 15, '16 Circleville
Harold, Donna Dente, vice president of Savion, said,
quoting, "Pickaway farmers have been proudly farming
family land for many generations and now have an
opportunity to utilize their land to harvest another
stable crop, the sun." However, according to the
list of tracts listed as leased to the OPSB by
Savion, the two largest tracts are owned by people
not living in Ohio, one in Monterey, Louisiana, the
other in Morrisville, North Carolina.

These tracts have been farmed through cash rent, custom farming, or some other arrangement with the landowners that live out of state. If you don't want to consider the number of bushels of grain lost to these types of projects for 25 to 40 years, then consider what would happen to the farmer who did have income from these acres through cash rent or some other means now in the future.

Sarah Moser, Senior Development Manager to Savion, was quoted in the Circleville Harold December 4, 2019, saying "A big thing people say to me is taking prime farmland out of production, but I always tell these people it's not out of production and there is no concrete in the ground. When we're

done, these -- those come out like fenceposts, and you are back to normal." I would like to ask how normal would be defined in 25 to 40 years and what will taxes look like for the landowner/farmer who may choose to go back to farming this ground instead leasing it for solar projects?

2.1

Alex Baker, the Development -Development Manager for Savion, commented on the cost
savings to families and businesses in the Circleville
Harold on June 14, 2019, saying "From a community
standpoint, it will help lower costs at the hub. The
utility companies own the power lines that bring the
electricity from our projects to homes and businesses
and are responsible for pricing of electricity."

Sarah Moser was asked at the December 18, 2019, public meeting if this project will lower electric costs and replied it may not. Savion is projecting \$1 million of income to the county townships and school, but in a March 9, 2020, Columbus Dispatch article Jill Hall, who is the Brown County Auditor, where a project is underway by Hillcrest Group, said "It's degrading the roads, ditches, and culverts going into driveways. It's a mess she said. I'm terribly concerned." When asked about the new revenue the county hopes to receive,

she said "At this point I'm just hoping we break even."

2.1

Our county has a proposed Atlanta project and another proposed solar project near Yellowbud.

Do we really as a farming community want these types of projects taking farmland out of use for 25 to 40 years when the electricity generated may be sold to the highest bidder and not offer any or little savings on electricity to the local residents?

Please consider my concerns and I do

thank you for the time to be able to speak. That ends my testimony.

ALJ SEE: Thank you. Are there any questions from counsel, the Bench, or the Chairman?

Okay. Thank you very much.

MS. DAVEY: Thank you.

ALJ SEE: Our next witness is Tyler

Duvelius. If the host could promote Mr. Duvelius.

MS. FISCHER: Mr. Duvelius, you have been promoted to a panelist position, unmuted.

MR. DUVELIUS: Wonderful. Can you see me, Judge?

ALJ SEE: Yes, we can, Mr. Duvelius. If you would raise your right hand.

ALJ SEE: Please provide us your address.

Road, Apartment No. 148, in Columbus, Ohio 43228.

ALJ SEE: And do you live or work in the project area?

MR. DUVELIUS: I do not.

MR. DUVELIUS: Thank you, Judge See,
Judge Sandor, Chairman Randazzo. My name is Tyler
Duvelius. I serve as the executive director of the
Ohio Conservative Energy Forum, or as I may refer in
my testimony tonight OSEF.

I am here tonight to speak for the approval of the Atlanta Farms solar project. I'll keep my remarks brief and try not to repeat points that have already been made this evening. I do know there is a presidential debate many of us are interested in seeing.

OSEF was founded in 2015 to provide a

forum for conservatives to discuss the diverse all of the above energy portfolio, one that includes not only existing sources of energy generation such as coal and natural gas and nuclear, also seeking to expand the development of clean and renewable energy sources like solar energy. We view clean energy as raw power harvested from God's creation, an opportunity to lower costs for our families, for our farmers, and for our job creators. It can strengthen both our economy and our national security.

2.1

Currently Ohio's an importer of energy.

That means we have to rely on other states to fulfill our energy requirements and that's precisely why approving projects like Atlanta Farms is so vital.

We need more made in Ohio energy generation.

But I'm not here tonight to talk about the potential of solar energy -- industry in Ohio but rather to specifically discuss the jobs, community benefits, and landowner assets that would accompany the approval of the Atlanta Farms solar project in Pickaway County. The clean energy industry already has over 114,000 jobs in the state of Ohio.

11.3 percent of these jobs, approximately 13,000, are filled by Ohio veterans, and a little over 8,700 of these jobs are from the solar industry.

Now, the Atlanta Farms solar project would add to these numbers by creating almost 600 construction jobs and nearly 30 long-term jobs in Pickaway County. And we're all aware of the unplanned, unprecedented economic effects of the COVID-19 crisis. We've all felt that tension one way or another.

2.1

And the clean energy is no exception.

Ohio has lost over 200,000 clean energy jobs during this pandemic period and that makes it ever more important to approve this project as our economic recovery for Ohio continues. We certainly know local governments have had to tighten budgets in the wake of coronavirus.

Like with most other energy generation projects, the approval of the Atlanta Farms by this committee would bring over \$41 million to local economies in Pickaway County. That includes around \$28 million in payments to the Westfall School District, over \$7 million to the Pickaway County general, and over \$6.5 million to be split between the township governments of Deer Creek and Perry Townships. And in a year when Pickaway County stands to lose significant revenue to the cancellation of at least my beloved Circleville Pumpkin Show which was

scheduled to begin today know that the approval of this project was certainly welcome news to local communities in Pickaway County.

2.1

And, finally, it's important to note the benefits to landowners should Atlanta Farms be approved. As farmers lease, not sell, their land, the money received from those lease agreements provide a buffer against shifting commodity prices and barren crop fields. This buffer is particularly important as Pickaway County farmers are emerging from a growing season that featured moderate drought conditions.

If approved, the Atlanta Farms project would provide over \$32 million in new solar payments. This revenue will ensure that family farms can be secure in their operation and continue to operate for generations to come. It keeps farms -- and I come from Warren County, a rural county. It keeps farms from becoming subdivisions.

To quickly summarize my testimony, in a year that has thrown a number of challenges to all of Ohio, the Atlanta solar farm project promises to be a ray of good news to Pickaway County by creating jobs, generating local revenue, and supporting those in the agricultural community. There are a number of

stakeholders that stand to benefit from the approval of this project.

Thank you for your attention to my testimony. I am happy to answer any questions there may be.

However, I do represent electrical workers that do live in the project area and hopefully soon will be able to work on this project in the project area.

ALJ SEE: Okay. Go ahead with your testimony, sir.

MR. SHIREY: All right. Thank you for allowing me to speak tonight. I serve as business manager for IBEW Local 575 which has jurisdiction in 10 counties in Ohio including Pickaway County.

I come before you today to give full support of the Atlanta Farms solar project. Not only would this project provide approximately 200 good paying jobs for local workers, it would also provide increased tax revenue for the local communities, not to mention clean, renewable energy that has obvious

benefits for the environment.

2.1

In my opinion, you know, diverse selection of energy generation is the best solution to address energy needs of the 21st Century. And Atlanta Farms solar project would provide substantial benefits to the workers, communities, and environment in the Atlanta community and general Pickaway County area.

I urge the Ohio Power Siting Board to approve this application. Thank you.

ALJ SEE: Are there any questions from any of the other panelists, the Bench, counsel, or Chairman Randazzo?

Hearing none, we would like to thank you very much, Mr. Shirey. Thank you for your testimony.

Our next witness this evening is Taylor

Christian. If the host could promote Taylor

ALJ SEE: Hello, Mr. Christian.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Hey, how's it going? I wanted to make sure my camera was on and everything.

The 18 Land & Liberty Coalition is a project of the Ohio 19 Conservative Energy Forum, OSEF. OSEF focuses 20 primarily on state-level policies while the Land & 2.1 Liberty Coalition engages on local energy issues 2.2 across the State of Ohio. 23

As an Ohioan myself, I encourage you to approve the Atlanta Farms solar project. project has a number of benefits that include

increased resilience for Ohio farmers, more energy independence for our state, and additional development here in Ohio.

2.1

Farmers in Ohio and across the country must navigate through varying commodity prices and shifting property rights. Renewable energy projects like the Atlanta Farms solar project come with leaseholder payments for the landowner, many of whom are farmers. The nearly \$33 million paid to leaseholders will provide a long-term fixed income that could provide a buffer against the challenge farmers face day in and day out.

This fixed income can help to secure loans as well. A potential lender wants to ensure the loan will be repaid. Seeing this long-term steady cash flow can provide reassurance to lenders allowing farmers to take out loans in order to improve their operations.

In some cases leaseholder payments can help farmers retain control of their farms. The money from harvesting wind on some portion of the property allows the farm to make a steady enough profit that the rest of the land can be used to grow crops. Yes, some of the land will be temporarily taken out of agricultural production.

The alternative, selling this land to be turned into housing developments or other nonagricultural uses would permanently remove this land from agricultural production. Atlanta Farms overall will help to retain farmland in the long term.

2.1

Farmers aren't the only beneficiaries of solar projects. Our stable benefit as a whole by approving this project and others like it, Ohio can diversify its energy portfolio. As Tyler said earlier, we are currently energy importers on the net, and I would personally like to see Ohio turn into a net energy exporter. The more energy that we produce here, the better we can navigate future energy challenges that may occur. With more energy produced here from a plethora of sources, Ohio can be better insulated from fluctuations in price and availability.

Finally, Atlanta Farms, and renewable projects like it, will increase economic development here. They did this in a number of ways in the case of Atlanta Farms. The construction phase will create almost 600 jobs. Afterwards, there should be around 30 long-term jobs created in the community. If that's not enough, Atlanta Farms stands to provide

around \$28 million for the Westfall Local School
District without requiring additional school
spending. The project will provide over \$7 million
in Pickaway County's general fund without requiring
additional infrastructure spending and will also
provide over \$6-1/2 million to be split between Deer
Creek and Perry Townships and again without requiring
additional spending for our local governments.

2.1

It's also important to note how vital renewable energy development is to attracting a business here. Companies like Google, Facebook, Amazon, and many others want renewable energy when looking to site new facilities and thereby creating jobs. They are going to be attracted to areas that can provide the renewable energy they want. The more that we generate here, the better our chances of attracting businesses. If Ohio doesn't take the lead in renewable energy development, it could be losing out on a lot of opportunity for its workers.

In sum, I encourage you to approve the Atlanta Farms solar project. Among the benefits for doing so are increased resilience for our farmers, increase energy independence for the state of Ohio, and additional economic development here.

are a multifaceted company with a pipeline -pipeline division, Efficient Pipeline; a construction
company, Efficient Construction; and Efficient
Services of Ohio. We are a complete erosion control
company. Notoriously a majority of our work has been
with the energy companies, oil and gas, and probably
50 percent of our work now is out of state.

2.1

We are in a position to transition to all of our erosion control devices and erosion control work into the State of Ohio and we support transitioning and we want to transition our work into the solar energy. If solar energy is on the horizon, then we want that work in the State of Ohio.

Without being too redundant on all the testimony that's been provided, that's our stance in -- on this project. That concludes my testimony.

ALJ SEE: Okay. Thank you, Mr. Drake.

Are there any questions from Chairman Randazzo, counsel for the Applicant, or the Bench?

MR. FUNK: Well, actually I'm just concerned. I'm a ham operator. I work from 10 meters clear up to 10.5 gigahertz. I'm wondering what the clock speed on your converters for the solar panels is going to be. Because if it's going to interfere with my ham operation, I'm afraid I'm against it.

ALJ SEE: Sir? Mr. Funk?

MR. FUNK: Yes, ma'am.

2.1

ALJ SEE: Tonight is not a question and answer section. I am going to recommend that you contact the Applicant or if you -- to get your question answered directly, or if you have a question about the process, you can contact the Board, and I will provide you that number if you need it, but at this point if you have some additional testimony to offer, please go ahead.

MR. FUNK: Well, actually I'm curious.

There's farmland up by Deer Creek State Park that is leased. Couldn't the project be built there?

ALJ SEE: Is that --

MS. PIRIK: Your Honor.

ALJ SEE: Yes, Ms. Pirik.

MS. PIRIK: Your Honor, I would just like to offer on behalf of the Applicant, we would be

happy to talk with Mr. Funk and contact him if he could maybe give you all his -- his either e-mail or contact number, we would be able to reach out to him. I know we don't want to do that formally on the record, but if he has a phone number, and then we could somehow get his contact, we would be happy to talk with him about his question.

ALJ SEE: Mr. Funk, this is Greta See. I am an AL -- an Administrative Law Judge with the Ohio Power Siting Board. If it is okay with you, we will provide counsel for the Applicant, Ms. Pirik, the phone number that you provided us in association with your testimony. Is that okay with you?

MR. FUNK: Yes, ma'am, it is.

ALJ SEE: Okay. I will provide -- see to it that information is provided to Ms. Pirik so that she can contact you and address your question.

MR. FUNK: Thank you very much.

ALJ SEE: Do you have any other testimony to offer this evening?

MR. FUNK: No, ma'am, I do not.

ALJ SEE: Okay. Are there any questions from counsel, the Bench, or Chairman Randazzo?

CHAIRMAN RANDAZZO: Your Honor, just a comment from Sam Randazzo here. I just want to thank

Ms. Pirik for offering to reach out to Mr. Funk.

He's got a technical issue related to his ham operations, and it should be readily -- it should be something that's readily answerable based upon the conversion -- the converters that are being used to -- at the solar arrays. So thank you, Ms. Pirik, for doing that.

MS. PIRIK: You're welcome.

ALJ SEE: As there is no questions for the witness, I would like to thank you, Mr. Funk.

I note that that concludes the individuals that registered for tonight's hearing. The Board appreciates your participation in the public hearing, and we also thank all of those who took the time out of their day to listen or to observe the hearing.

If there is nothing further, any words from the Chairman?

CHAIRMAN RANDAZZO: No. Again, your Honor, thank you for your efforts, both you and Judge Sandor, as well as the folks that are working behind the scenes to allow this virtual hearing to take place. It's an important part of the process, and we appreciate everybody's effort to share their views with us this evening. I just, as an ongoing

reminder, everybody that works at the PUCO or Power Siting Board hears me say this quite often, do what you can to help manage the risk of the virus spread by following the commonsense protocols that we are all very familiar with right now, and we will all be better for it.
