ALJ ADDISON: Good evening and welcome, everyone. My name is Megan Addison and with me is Matthew Sandor. We are Administrative Law Judges in the Legal Department of the Ohio Power Siting Board, and we've been assigned by the Board to this proceeding.

One of the duties as the Administrative
Law Judges assigned by the Board includes conducting
a public hearing in Case No. 19-1881-EL-BGN which
involves the application filed by Madison Fields
Solar Project, LLC, for a Certificate to Construct a
Solar-Powered Electric Generation Facility in Madison
County, Ohio. From now on I will just refer to the
project as the project.

Due to the COVID-19 emergency that remains in effect under Executive Order No. 2020-01D which was issued by the Governor of Ohio and consistent with Amended Substitute House Bill 197, today's hearing is being held through Webex which enables interested persons to offer testimony on the proposed project by telephone or video via the internet. The hearing is also being live streamed at

www.youtube.com/user/pucoh.

2.1

Before we get started with the public hearing, I would like to address some preliminary issues. First, if you experience technical difficulties during the hearing, there are several options to address the issue. If you -- if your internet connection drops at any point, you can try to join Webex again by video, or you can participate by phone. If those options are unsuccessful, please call the Board's Legal Department at (614) 466-6843 immediately for assistance.

As indicated by the entry of September 28, 2020, witnesses were to register to testify. Individuals who have registered to provide testimony should be ready to speak when we read their name from the registration list. Individuals who are commenting by video will be unmuted by a Board staff member when it is time for their testimony. If you are providing your testimony by telephone, a Board staff member will call you at the phone number you provided when it is your turn to testify.

Please bear with us as we work to queue up each individual which may take some time. It also may divert our attention at times from what is happening in the hearing. If this happens, please be patient and know that we are working to ensure that everyone has an opportunity to participate today.

Consistent with the entry of
September 28, 2020, we ask that you keep your
testimony to 5 minutes in length and avoid repetitive
comments. To avoid unnecessary background noise, we
ask that you keep your microphone on mute unless you

are commenting. Again, if you have questions about this process as the hearing proceeds, please use the chat function. Are there any questions before we officially start with today's proceeding?

Okay. Hearing none, I will pass it off to my Co-Judge, Matt Sandor.

ALJ SANDOR: Thank you, Judge Addison.

The Ohio Power Siting Board has scheduled for hearing at this time and place Case No. 19-1881-EL-BGN which is captioned in the Matter of the Application of Madison Fields Solar Project, LLC, for a Certificate of Environmental Compatibility and Public Need to Construct a Solar-Powered Electric Generation Facility in Madison County, Ohio.

As mentioned earlier, my name is Matt
Sandor and with me is Megan Addison. We are
Administrative Law Judges in the Board's Legal
Department, and we will be conducting today's
hearing. Also presiding with us today is the
Director of the Ohio Department of Natural Resources
Mary Mertz, who is also a member of the Ohio Power
Siting Board.

At this time, Director Mertz, do you have any comments you would like to add?

DIRECTOR MERTZ: Thank you. No, just

looking forward to hearing the comments and feedback on the project. Thank you very much.

2.1

ALJ SANDOR: Thank you, Director Mertz.

In addition to Director Mertz,

Administrative Law Judge Addison, and myself, there are other staff members from the Board assisting with various aspects of the hearing including Micah Schmidt, Mary Fischer, Matt Butler, Jill Coker, and Brittany Waugaman who will be overseeing the event on Webex and YouTube.

At this time we'll take the appearances by counsel of the parties to this case. We will begin with the Applicant.

MS. PIRIK: Thank you, your Honor. On behalf of the Applicant Madison Fields Solar Project, LLC, the law firm of Dickinson Wright, 150 East Gay Street, Columbus, Ohio 43215, Christine Pirik and Will Vorys.

ALJ SANDOR: Thank you. We have one potential Intervenor in this case, the Ohio Farm Bureau Federation. Hearing none. And Board Staff. Hearing none as well.

I'll note that while counsel for Ohio Farm Bureau Federation and Board Staff may not be participating in this proceeding, non-counsel

representatives of the Farm Bureau and Board Staff may be attending.

2.1

The subject of today's hearing is an application filed by Madison Fields Solar Project, LLC, for the purpose of constructing and operating the solar-powered electric generation facility. Specifically, the proposed project would occupy up to 1,000 acres within a 1,932-acre project area in Pike Township in Madison County. The project will generate 180 megawatts. Madison Fields' application was filed on July 17, 2020, and was supplemented on July 23 and August 3, 2020.

I would also note that the Board's Staff filed a Report of Investigation on November 18, 2020. This report is a recommendation from the Board's Staff and does not necessarily reflect what the Board's final determination in this case will be.

The purpose of today's public hearing is to receive testimony regarding Madison Fields' application from entities and persons in the local community who are affected by the proposed project but who are not parties to the case. The public -- the public hearing is not a question and answer session but is an opportunity to let the Board know what you think about the proposed project.

Today's public hearing is only one aspect of the process in this case. An evidentiary hearing is scheduled to begin on Thursday, December 17, 2020, through Webex. The purpose of the evidentiary hearing is for the parties in this case, including the Applicant, the Intervenor Ohio Farm Bureau Federation, and Board Staff to provide testimony and other evidence regarding the project.

2.1

Tonight's hearing is being transcribed by a court reporter, Karen Armstrong from Armstrong & Okey. If you plan to testify, please speak clearly so that the court reporter can accurately reflect your comments on the record. Please make sure that you verbally respond to all questions asked in order that they can be properly transcribed.

After I finish with this introduction, I will begin by calling individuals on the registration list to testify about the proposed project. Each person who registered to testify will -- will be permitted to speak once about the project. We will ask you to take an oath or affirmation that what you are about to say is the truth. Your testimony will then be considered as part of the official record in this case, and it will be reviewed by the Board before a final decision is made on the application.

Additionally, counsel for the parties in this case, as well as Director Mertz, Judge Addison, and myself will be permitted to ask you questions about your testimony.

ALJ SANDOR: Okay. Thank you. Also,

MR. SASSON: Good evening. My name is Anthony Sasson. I'm providing this testimony on behalf of the Darby Creek Association in the following areas concerning the proposed Madison Fields Solar Project. These are: Stormwater management and groundwater recharge; encouraging native plant species establishment and management; and invasive species management.

I'm providing an abbreviated version of these comments, and a longer version, as has been stated, has been e-mailed to the Board.

2.1

Thank you for your attention. The Darby Creek Association is willing to provide further comments at a later time. The Darby Creek Association was founded in 1972 as a nonprofit organization to protect the ecological integrity of the Big and Little Darby Creeks and tributaries and outstanding natural features of the watershed.

We have the following preliminary recommendations we believe would make this a more environmentally sound and appropriate project for the area in which it is located, the Big Darby Creek watershed, and specifically within the Little Darby Creek watershed and the Darby Plains. Both the Big Darby Creek and Little Darby Creek are National and State Scenic Rivers, and designated as Exceptional Warmwater Habitat and Outstanding State Waters by the State of Ohio.

These streams support 37 rare and sensitive species of fish and mussels that are state and federally listed, including federally-listed species downstream of this project in Little Darby Creek. And it's recognized locally and statewide as

an Ohio natural resource treasure. Efforts to protect the ecological integrity of the streams in this watershed are among the most extensive in Ohio.

2.1

The Big Darby Creek watershed, including Little Darby Creek, where this project is located, includes some of the highest aquatic life scores ever recorded by Ohio EPA in addition to harboring the fish and mussels mentioned above. These species include five federally listed mussel species, two of which are found in Little Darby Creek near the proposed site.

Concerning stormwater management and groundwater recharge: In the DCA's written comments we provide recommendations on enhancement of the stormwater management that will benefit the natural environment at and near the proposed project. DCA requests that the site's stormwater permit application establish a groundwater recharge restoration goal for the entire site, significantly exceeding minimum requirements in the stormwater permit, and not just meeting the permit minimum, but reaching a goal, to the maximum extent possible, equivalent to that of the woods/forest, brush, or meadow categories in the storm table. For any streams on the site, we strongly encourage the

applicant to significantly exceed the minimum riparian setback requirements found in the stormwater permit, establish native vegetation in this riparian setback area, and encourage groundwater recharge to help protect these streams.

2.1

Concerning encouraging native plant species establishment and management: While DCA generally agrees with the recent OPSB Staff Report for this proposed project, we find that many of the plant species described in reports and guidance (such as this Staff's Report referenced Ohio Pollinator Habit Initiative) are not plants native to the Darby Plains, and some are not native to Ohio or the U.S. DCA strongly encourages that all areas at the proposed site should be planted species native to Darby Plains, and avoid plant species not native to the area.

The DCA has a list of Darby Plains prairie plant species, including glasses, forbs, trees, and shrubs, which we can provide to the applicant and others. These were determined from a botanical survey referenced such as from Charles King (1981). We note that the Ohio Department of Natural Resources Scenic Rivers Program staff and the Madison Soil and Water Conservation District have supported

planting of native species, species native to the Darby Plains, such as prairie forbs and grasses, and are more adapted to the soil and climate of the area, helping to preserve the natural heritage.

2.1

Concerning the invasive species
management: We expect invasive species control to be
problematic. For example, honeysuckle, autumn olive,
and callery pear grow readily in Madison County, and
are found nearby along Little Darby Creek and
threaten nearby nature preserves. DCA expects these
will become problems at this site. We ask that the
facility diligently manage invasive species and
maintain the native vegetation, especially when
invasive species are common and can dominate the
vegetation in the general area.

We believe these recommendations would make this a better project if it is approved and proceeds. Attention to these recommendations would recognize the unusual but outstanding nature of the site and go beyond basic compliance -- compliance with OPSB and other permit requirements. These should help to improve the protection of the natural heritage of the site, vegetation, and the National Scenic River, Little Darby Creek.

Thank you for your attention. Please see

1 DCA's written testimony and summary. Thank you.

ALJ SANDOR: Thank you. Are there any questions for this witness from counsel, Director Mertz, or the Bench?

MS. PIRIK: No questions, your Honor.

ALJ SANDOR: All right. Hearing none, you are excused. Thank you.

So our second -- second registered witness, Tyler Duvelius, informed us just prior to tonight that unfortunately he won't be able to make it to testify. However, he did submit written comments which will be filed in the public comments section on the case docket.

So moving onto the third witness, Steve Taylor, can the host please promote Mr. Taylor to a panelist role.

TAYLOR: Okay. Thank you for the 25 opportunity to speak to you today.

I'm a lifelong resident of Rosedale,
Ohio. My home is located near the southeast side of
the project area between the project area and Baron
Creek in a small subdivision of homes. There are 11
homes in the subdivision. It's been there about 20
years. All of the lots in the subdivision are
5 acres or more.

2.1

My primary concern with the Madison
Fields project is the potential for year round
flooding in the area. The other homes in my
subdivision and other homes in the -- in the drainage
path of the project may also be subject to flooding.
One of the primary drainage paths from the project
site is Baron Creek. Baron Creek originally in the
project area crosses under Rosedale-Milford Center
Road and travels behind the homes of my subdivision.
This creek does not flood very often. However, the
drainage tiling to get the stormwater from the
project area to the creek is inadequate, and we have
occasional flooding issues.

Exhibit 1 which I submitted, which is the very first photo, is actually a photo taken on April 3 of 2018 by my wife through our kitchen window of our backyard, the 4 acres behind our home. That picture depicts basically a river running through our

backyard. It's about 20 feet wide running towards
Baron Creek. That usually occurs after a heavy rain.
It's not regular, but it's not unusual either. This
type of flooding usually occurs once a year. Our
neighbors, of course, have similar problems.

2.1

The flooding always occurs when there are new crops actively growing on the project site. The project will eliminate a thousand acres of corn or soybean growth and that's going to occur for the next 30 years. A little bit of research, an Iowa State University study determined that 200 bushel per acre corn production, which is what we have around here, uses 20 inches of rainfall during the growing season through photosynthesis and evaporation of the plant.

So according to the USGS, 1 inch of rainfall on 1 acre is 27,154 gallons of water. So for the 20 inches of rainfall during the growing season on that thousand acres, it's 583 million gallons of water that we're talking about. This has to be dealt with in one way or another. This is going to be additional water on top of what we already deal with now.

The project will turn this land, the project land, into meadow and many impervious areas including hundreds of thousands of solar panels,

8 miles of gravel road, a construction area, and maintenance buildings. Section T of the application is a hydrologic and scour evaluation done by Langan Engineering. Part of the application packet, the summary for this section reads, in part, in the proposed conditions there will be an increased -- increase in impervious areas associated with the access driveways, electrical equipment, and substation, and there will be a change in ground cover from agricultural to meadow.

2.1

Stormwater management practices will need -- need to be incorporated to provide stormwater -- water treatment to the new impervious areas, and the stormwater basin may be required to mitigate potential increases in the stormwater runoff as a result of development.

This is part of the packet. This firm also found multiple ponding locations documented in the report. There is sections of property where groundwater is found as little as 3 feet below the surface.

Section U of the application packet characterizes the history of Pike Township as having a few early set -- having a few early settlers due to its swampy nature before adequate tiling and ditches

were constructed. So we have water problems here anyway.

2.1

My wife asked a question during one of the public information meetings about this problem. And we were contacted by Savion. On June 24, 2020, we had a 25-minute conference call with the Savion team. The team consisted of Sarah Moser, the project leader, an engineer, an attorney, and one other individual. We explained our concerns. They offered no solutions. Sarah stated at the end of the call we already have occasional flooding issues, so Savion would not be liable for any future flooding issues and this was a local government problem.

I contacted our township trustees, one of whom is a landowner in the project, and they told to us contact the county engineer. I called the county engineer and left a message. I then e-mailed the county engineer in early July twice, sent him Exhibit 1, that photo, and got no response whatsoever from him.

So potential flooding in the long run is going to lead to failed septic systems, flooded basements, and eroded foundations for all of us.

Now, the application has no details concerning mitigation of stormwater runoff off of the site. It

talks about mitigation of stormwater runoff for the site itself but not about what happens to the neighbors. So I just feel the lack of concern from Savion and our local officials is alarming and believe that it's indicative of how we are going to be treated in the future when there are problems that come up as a result of this project.

2.1

Now, this isn't an unsolvable problem.

That's what's so -- so irritating about the whole thing. Exhibit 2, which is a picture I submitted, is actually a picture of a ditch in the Hardin County Solar Farm site that is cut very deep, has very big culverts, and is obviously much better than what we have out here.

Exhibit 3 is a picture of our current ditches in the area on Rosedale-Milford Center Road. There are better pictures other than Exhibit 3 in the application packet in section T. Deeply cut ditches with large culverts, the dredging of Baron Creek, all the way to Little Darby, the dredging of Spring-Ford, and cleaning up some of the other drainage paths would basically solve this issue.

So I'm at a loss as to why it's not being addressed, so I thank you for your attention. And that's all I have for you.

ALJ SANDOR: Okay. So do you work or reside within the project area?

MR. CHRISTIAN: I do not.

ALJ SANDOR: All right. Please proceed with your testimony.

MR. CHRISTIAN: Good evening, members of the Ohio Power Siting Board. As I mentioned before, my name is Taylor Christian. I am the Field Operations Director for the Ohio Land & Liberty Coalition. The Land & Liberty Coalition is a product of the Ohio Conservative Energy Forum, OHCEF. OHCEF focuses primarily on state-level policies while the Land & Liberty Coalition engages on local energy issues across the state of Ohio.

As an Ohioan myself, I encourage you to approve the Madison Fields Solar Project. This project has a number of benefits that include increased resilience for Ohio farmers, more energy independence for our state, and additional economic development in our state. Farmers in Ohio and across the country must navigate through shifting commodity prices and varying crop yields. Renewable energy

projects like Madison Fields Solar Project come with leaseholder payments for the landowners, many of whom are farmers. The roughly \$24 million paid to leaseholders will provide a long-term fixed income that can provide a buffer against the challenges the farmers face day in and day out.

2.1

This fixed income can help secure loans as well. Potential lenders want to ensure that the loan is going to be repaid, and seeing this long-term steady cash flow can provide some reassurance to the lenders allowing farmers to take out loans in order to improve their operations. In some cases leaseholder payments can help farmers retain control of their farm. The money from harvesting sunlight on a portion of the property allows the farm to make a steady profit while the rest of the land can be used to grow crops. Yes, some of the land will be temporarily taken out of the agricultural production.

The alternative is selling this land and turning it into whether it's housing developments or other nonagricultural uses that personally removes this land from agricultural production. So the Madison Fields Solar Project overall will help to retain farmland in the long term.

Farmers obviously aren't the only

beneficiaries of solar projects or this project. Our state will benefit as a whole by approving this project and others like it. Ohio can diversify its energy portfolio. It's even possible to flip Ohio's status from net energy importer to net energy exporter. The more energy we produce here at home the better we can navigate future energy challenges that may occur. With more energy produced here at home from a plethora of sources, Ohio can be better insulated from fluctuations in both price and availability.

2.1

Finally, Madison Fields and other projects like it increase economic development at home. They do this in a number of ways. In the case of Madison Fields, the construction phase will create almost 500 jobs. Afterwards, there will be about 20 long-term jobs created in the community. If that's not enough, Madison Fields stands to provide over \$26.5 million for the Fairbanks Local School District without requiring any additional school spending. The project will provide more than \$12.7 million to the Madison County general fund, again without requiring any additional infrastructure spending. And it will also provide over \$3 million to Pike Township, again without requiring additional spending

from local governments.

2.1

It's also important to note how vital renewable energy development is to attracting businesses. Companies like Google, Facebook, Amazon, and many others want renewable energy when looking to open new facilities and, you know, therefore create jobs. They are going to be attracted to areas that can provide it to them. The more that we generate here the better our chances of attracting this kind of business development. If Ohio doesn't take the lead in renewable energy development, it could be losing out on a lot of opportunity for Ohio workers.

Now, in summary, I encourage you to approve the Madison Fields Solar Project. Among the benefits for doing so are increased resilience for Ohio farmers, increased energy income for our state, and additional economic development here at home.

MS. COWAN BECKER: All right. Thank you for the opportunity to testify today. My name is Cathy Cowan Becker. I'm testifying on behalf of Simply Living, a community organization that promotes sustainability, environmental awareness, and our local economy.

Simply Living works in conjunction with the Ohio Sustainable Business Council, the statewide coalition of businesses and business networks committed to public policies of the local, state, and federal levels to support a vibrant, just, and sustainable economy.

So both Simply Living and the Ohio Sustainable Business Council strongly support the Madison Fields Solar Project. This project would provide 180 megawatts of solar energy in Madison County which is enough electricity to power 34,000 homes.

As you may know, the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change has said that we must cut carbon emissions 45 percent by 2030 and to 0 by 2050 if we want -- if we want a liveable planet. Ohio is the 6th highest carbon emitting state, so our share

of these emissions is significant, and we must move
Ohio to a clean energy economy, and projects like
Madison Fields will help us get there.

2.1

So if approved, the project would offset 31,500 tons of carbon emissions each year equal to planting over 741,000 trees and -- or removing 5,581 cars from the road each year. Over the 30-year lifespan of the project, Madison Fields would avert 945,000 tons of carbon emissions equal to planting 22 million trees or taking 167,000 cars off the road.

So poll after poll has found widespread support for renewable energy in Ohio. A March 2018 poll found that 7 in 10 Ohio voters favored a goal of generating 100 percent of the state's electricity using clean and renewable sources like solar and wind by 2030. A February 2019 poll found two-thirds of Ohio conservatives believe that the state should generate at least half its energy from renewable sources. And an October 2019 poll found that nearly two-thirds of Ohio voters said developing renewable energy is the most important strategy to address Ohio's energy need.

Part of the charge of Simply Living and the Ohio Sustainable Business Council is to promote the local economy and there's nothing more important

to that than locally generated power. And the Madison Fields Solar Project is a win-win for the local community.

2.1

Construction of the solar farm would inject over 30 million -- \$30 million into the Madison County economy directly and over 8 million indirectly. In Ohio as a whole, those figures are 41 million in direct expenditures and 55 million in indirect expenditures for a total of another 97 million in the state economy.

The project would also create jobs, 477 direct construction jobs and 113 indirect jobs in Madison County and 627 direct and 808 direct -- indirect jobs in Ohio.

So a recent study from Ohio University points to the importance of utility scale solar in Ohio. If our state was to aggressively move into a clean energy economy, it could create over 54,000 construction jobs, generate 9.6 million -- billion in economic impacts, and generate 2.7 billion in tax revenue. These are much needed dollars that local communities can use for schools, fire departments, infrastructure, and other necessities.

One common question about utility scale solar projects is the environmental impact, and an

entire body of lifecycle analysis research finds that solar and wind energy have significantly lower environmental footprint than fossil fuel projects like mining, drilling, or fracking. Further, solar panels are compatible with other forms of conservation such as native plants, pollinators, and even a sheep farm.

2.1

My understanding is Madison Fields is working with the county solar and water -- soil and water agency to plant native grasses on site, and when the project is at the end of its lifespan, the solar panels can be reused, recycled, or disposed, and the land can be restored to the original condition.

So for all these reasons, Simply Living and the Ohio Sustainable Business Council support the Madison Fields Solar Project, and we urge you to approve it.

This project will directly benefit the farming family and residents of our community. This project will directly benefit families in this area through the construction jobs.

It is my hope that these are good union construction jobs. The local union is ready to work with Madison Fields and provide the workers they need to complete this project, and I am excited for the opportunity to be one of those workers.

farmers not to farm. And this program this soil gets to be preserved and serve and generates tax dollars. So that's kind of the way we go about it so and look at it.

And then a couple other topics I wanted to highlight on is the native grasses and the drainage. This whole project is systematically tiled, and it does have very good drainage from across the county, and with the native grasses growing year round that will help that drainage situation because it will be there year round instead of only having crops, you know, for our crop season that we typically do with corn and soybeans and wheat today.

And the other couple topics I guess I have would be, you know, the tax dollars that are going to come back to this local community and what it will be able to do with it at the school district. And there is just a lot of great things in the future for this community having this project Madison Fields pulled off, so I give my support for it. And, you know, we will be able to use those tax dollars to make drainage better for some of the residents around that are maybe not pleased with the way it is and that kind of stuff.      central -- the proposed solar project,
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19-1881-EL-BGN, is very concerning in many aspects. I've never dealt with the OPSB or any invasive projects that dealt with planting glass and posts in an agricultural area. I have spent decades enjoying agricultural farming of which I can see from a distance. I know what field and I know what roads are being traveled as well as glare off vehicles at sunset.

2.1

The public has been restricted from OPSB public events, yet the OPSB project -- and project can have site meetings to see a harvested bean field allowing participants to travel from counties that are red into and through counties that weren't red without social distancing and masks as well as out of state vehicles in the spring of 2020 during a state of emergency. Rules for us, none for them.

This project should be placed on hold until the public isn't restricted and -- restricted from and excluded as the virtual outreach isn't working. Neither is blocking the public. From reading the project numerous applications, data requests, Staff investigation findings, the elephant in the room is missing. It's the environment within and around the project.

1997 Department of Interior Fish and

Wildlife Services made a study for a new national wildlife refuge. 1991 the same area around the project was trying to plan a landfill which seems similar to what this project proposes. With the 1997 study county and townships passed resolutions against the wildlife refuge proposal and was described as a land grant which seems the same as to consider a commercial utility project in the middle of an agricultural property.

2.1

Further, it should be considered hazmat as the project application outlines leaving cables in the ground below 36 inches. Solar energy will not save the world when it uses sand, and sand can't re -- reproduce itself taking away from the microorganisms that call it home. Glass takes a million years to decompose or longer in the landfill.

The project outlines these PV panels won't fly -- won't break or fly away which is questionable since over three electric poles in Madison County over two weeks ago were laid down, and they had no resistance surface. Unless the PV panels lay flat on the ground they won't survive. Neither did a barn on Rosedale Road just last January 2020 in the project area.

I love birds, wildlife, agricultural

fields, and all the tributaries to the Little and Big Darby Creeks. The Department of Interior Fish and Wildlife Services outline as to Spring-Ford Creek which is located across the road from 3370 Rosedale Road, just look for the side and the -- on the south side, in their final report that the extremely high quality of this tributary and the stream it confluences with, Little Darby Creek, deserves the maximum protection possible under the law, unpublished Ohio EPA report 1992-93. There needs to be an environmental study done as to the effect of boring 81 holes over two aquifers as groundwater is part of Bear Run and Spring-Ford Creek.

It also was brought to my attention this week at least as an amendment for a well or wells for the use of the project filed 11-24-20 and the Staff Investigation Report filed 11-18-20, page 30, verbatim says the project didn't need much water as did the project application.

Cloak and dagger with the leases not being filed with the Recorder's office as the -- as the second data request doesn't have all the leases filed with the recorder's office, I question why the project needs a 2 acre building as there wasn't an interior plan to this building.

The project needs to confirm the location of the project prior to approval as the project is saying 300 acres for the array. The application map shows differently. These solar projects are too new for Ohio and make the locals as well as the environment into lab rats.

The bentonite clay safety data sheet actually says it can have adverse effect to the environment, and the environmental studies need to be done. Natural or not it's more dangerous than silt to the eco watershed. Placing flowers around the solar panels will only promote the birds and insects getting burned by the hot PV surfaces. Further, birds can cause hotspots on PV panels with their waste. Dewatering will be a must as of the 81 holes bored 44 counted water at 6-foot or less.

This project holds for me no public interest nor a necessity. I will post my additional issues on the public post. I do not wish to be contacted by the project or associates.
