Officials said 1,800 total aggregate doses of the COVID-19 vaccine for the week of Feb. 1-7 are expected in Trumbull County. will receive 600 doses, with each of the six county pharmacies receiving 100 doses; St. Joseph Warren Hospital will get 100 dos-Trumbull Regional Medical Center, 200 dos-County Trumbull es: Combined Health District, 800 doses: and Warren City Health Department, 100

doses. Officials noted those registering for vaccinations must understand that all vaccinations in Trumbull County are by registration and appointment only. Those attending vaccination clinics are asked to have been registered with an appointment

prior to arrival.

Officials said than 7,000 residents have registered in the Trumbull County Combined Health District's COVID-19 vaccination registration portal. People who have registered and have not yet been contacted by the agency are asked to be patient. It could take up to several weeks after registration to receive a call.



NOTICE OF PROPOSED MAJOR **UTILITY FACILITY**

American Transmission Systems, Incorporated ("ATSI"), a FirstEnergy company, is proposing to construct the Highland-Magellan No.2 138 kV Transmission Line Project ("Project"), in a Letter of Notification Application submitted to the Ohio Power Siting Board ("Board") for a Certificate of Environmental Compatibility and Public Need.

The Project is located within new transmission line right-of-way in the Village of Lordstown, Trumbull County, Ohio. The new transmission line, which will be named the Highland-Magellan No.2 138 kV Transmission Line, will provide a third 138 kV source to Ultium Cells LLC, the customer served from Magellan Substation. The new transmission line will utilize approximately 2 miles of open arm position on the existing steel lattice towers that support the Highland-Lordstown No.1 345 kV Transmission Line and approximately 1.5 miles of new construction on steel and wood structures. The new transmission line will connect the Magellan and Highland Substations.
