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ALJ DAVIS: Good evening and welcome, everyone. My name is Jesse Davis, and with me is Michael Williams. We are the Administrative Law Judges in the Legal Department of the Ohio Power Siting Board, and we've been assigned by the Board to this proceeding. This is Case No. 20-1288-EL-BGN.

One of our duties as the assigned Administrative Law Judges is conducting a public hearing in this case which involves the application filed by Hecate Energy Highland 4 LLC for a Certificate to Construct a Solar-Powered Electric Generation Facility in Highland County, Ohio.

Due to the COVID-19 emergency that remains in effect under Executive Order No. 2020-01D that was issued by the Governor of Ohio, today's hearing is being held through Webex which enables interested parties to offer testimony on the proposed project by telephone or video via the internet. The hearing is also being live streamed at youtube.com/user/pucohio, so pucohio.

Before we get started with the public hearing, I wanted to address some preliminary issues. The first if you experience technical difficulties during the hearing, there are several options to address the issue. If your internet connection drops at any point, you can try to rejoin Webex via the same way you joined the first time, by video, or you can participate by phone. Finally, if you merely wish to listen to the hearing using your phone instead of accessing via Webex on the internet, you can view the live stream on the You Tube Channel at that same URL, youtube.com/user/pucohio, and you can listen there. Or you can dial in at 1-408-418-9388 and then enter the meeting number which is 173492744.

More information about Webex technical help options can be obtained through the chat feature which will be available through the hearing. You can click the chat button at any time to obtain technical assistance or to ask procedural questions during the hearing.

But it's noteworthy the chat feature should only be used for these purposes, not for any other purpose such as to offer commentary about the

project or testimony that's the subject of today's hearing. Please be aware that the chats are recorded and should not be considered private. Chats are also not part of the official record for the case.

As indicated by the entry of November 18, 2020, witnesses were to register to testify.

Individuals who were registered to provide testimony should be ready to speak when we read their name from the registration list. Individuals who are commenting by video will be unmuted by a Board staff member when it's time for their testimony. If you are providing testimony by telephone, a Board staff member will call you at the phone number you provided when it's your time to testify.

Please bear with us as we work to queue up each individual which may take some time. It also may divert our attention at times from what's happening in the hearing. If this happens, please be patient and know that we are working to ensure everyone has an opportunity to participate.

Consistent with the entry from

November 18, 2020, we ask that you keep your

testimony to 5 minutes in length, to avoid repetitive

comments. To avoid unnecessary background noise, we

ask that you keep your microphone on mute unless you

are commenting. Again, if you have any questions about this process as the hearing proceeds, please use the chat function.

Are there any questions from anyone before we officially get started?

Okay. If not, we will proceed to the formal hearing. The Ohio Power Siting Board has scheduled for hearing at this time and place Case No. 20-1288-EL-BGN which is captioned in the Matter of the Application of Hecate Energy Highland 4 LLC, which I'll sometimes refer to simply as Hecate, for a Certificate of Environmental Compatibility and Public Need to Construct a Solar-Powered Electric Generation Facility in Highland County, Ohio.

As I mentioned at the start, my name is

Jesse Davis, and with me is Michael Williams. We are
the Administrative Law Judges in the Board's Legal

Department. We will be conducting today's hearing.

In addition to Judge Williams and myself, there are
other staff members from the Board assisting with
various aspects of the hearing that includes Micah

Schmidt, Brittany Waugaman, Jill Coker -- sorry, so
sorry if I mispronounced your name -- Matt Butler,

Anna Perry, and Aubrey Barker who will be overseeing
the event on Webex and YouTube.

At this time we will take appearances by counsel of the parties to the case, and we will begin with the Applicant.

MS. WINTERS: This is Karen Winters. I am with the law firm of Squire Patton Boggs. The address is 41 South High Street, Columbus, Ohio 43215. And I am here on behalf of Hecate Energy Highland 4 LLC who is the Applicant in the case.

MS. GAGLIARDI: Co-counsel Daniel
Gagliardi is here as well, Squire Patton Boggs,
counsel for the Applicant Hecate Energy Highland 4
LLC.

ALJ WILLIAMS: Any other parties on the line? Okay.

ALJ DAVIS: Okay. With no other parties entering appearances, I would note that while counsel for the Ohio Farm Bureau Federation and Board Staff may not be participating in the proceeding, non-counsel representatives of these entities may be in attendance.

The subject of today's hearing is an application filed by Hecate for the purpose of constructing and operating the New Market solar project, a solar-powered electric generation facility. Specifically the proposed project would

occupy approximately 824 acres within a 1,114 acre project area in Clay and Whiteoak Townships in Highland County. The project will generate 100 megawatts. Hecate's application was filed on September 2 and 3, 2020, and was supplemented on October 15, 20, 23; November 10; and December 10, 2020.

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I would also note that the Board Staff filed a Report of Investigation on January 4, 2021. This report is a recommendation from the Board's Staff and does not necessarily reflect what the Board's final determination in this case will be.

The purpose of today's public hearing is to receive testimony regarding Hecate's application from entities and persons in the local community who are affected by the proposed project but who are not parties to the case.

The public hearing is not a question and answer session but is an opportunity to let the Board know what you think about the proposed project.

Today's public hearing is only one aspect of the process in this case. An evidentiary hearing is scheduled to begin on Monday, January 25, 2021, through Webex. The purpose of the evidentiary hearing is for the parties in this case, including

the Applicant, the Intervenor which is the Ohio Farm Bureau Federation, and the Board Staff to provide testimony and other evidence regarding the project.

Tonight's hearing is being transcribed by a court reporter which is Karen Gibson from Armstrong & Okey. If you plan to testify, please speak clearly so that the court reporter can accurately reflect your comments on the record. Please make sure that you verbally respond to all questions asked in order that they can be properly transcribed. And I would reiterate please be calm and speak slowly. It very much helps the court reporter.

After I finish this introduction, Judge Williams and I will begin calling individuals on the registration list to testify about the proposed project. Each person who registered to testify will be permitted to speak once about the project. We will ask you to take an oath or affirmation that what you are about to say is the truth. Your testimony will then be considered part of the official record in the case, and it will be reviewed by the Board before a final decision is made on the application.

Additionally, counsel for the parties in the case, as well as Judge Williams and myself, will be permitted to ask you questions about your

testimony. Should you decide that you do not want to testify when I call your name from the registration list, you may pass to the next witness. Also once you've finished testifying or if you are merely here to observe, you may leave the hearing any time you wish.

The Board appreciates your participation in tonight's hearing, and we want everyone who is

registered to testify to have the opportunity to do so.

At this time we are going to begin testimony. Judge Williams will call our first witness.

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ALJ WILLIAMS: Thank you, Judge Davis.

Excellent job and I will let you catch your breath while I call our first witnesses. I will note from the witness list that was published in the case as amended earlier today on January 19, there have been three changes so I will highlight these in the beginning in case it impacts your preparedness thinking you have another person ahead of you. Mayor John Cranley will not be testifying tonight nor will Sharon Dodson who was listed as witness No. 6, I believe, nor will Witness Ron DeLyons who I believe was listed as witness No. 8.

So with those changes, I will begin, and I will call Daniel Shirey, please.

MR. SCHMIDT: Mr. Shirey, you've been promoted. Please enable your audio and video.

MR. SHIREY: Can you hear me?

23 ALJ WILLIAMS: I can hear you. I can't see you, sir.

MR. SHIREY: Okay. How about now?

13 ALJ WILLIAMS: Perfect. I am going to 1 2 begin by swearing you in. Would you raise your right 3 hand. (Witness sworn.) 4 5 ALJ WILLIAMS: Could you please state and 6 spell your name. 7 MR. SHIREY: My name is Daniel L. Shirey. That's S-H-I-R-E-Y. 8 9 ALJ WILLIAMS: Could you please provide 10 your address including the township. 11 MR. SHIREY: My address is 2602 Tick 12 Ridge Koenig Hill Road, that's in Otway, Ohio 45657 13 and that's in Brushcreek Township. 14 ALJ WILLIAMS: And do you live in the 15 project area? 16 MR. SHIREY: I do not live in the project 17 area. 18 ALJ WILLIAMS: Okay. Thank you, sir. 19 Please proceed with your testimony. 20 MR. SHIREY: Okay. You have to excuse 2.1 I got the phone in my ear because I can't hear 22 through the computer for some reason. 23 ALJ WILLIAMS: I hear you loud and clear. 24 You are not the first one to take part, but it's 25 coming through very clearly.

MR. SHIREY: Okay. Good. Good evening.

Again, my name is Dan Shirey. Although I do not live in the project area, I do represent electrical workers in the area that also live in the area. And I do hope that the project will be done by those electrical workers that I represent.

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You know, in addition to them, there are probably 100 good paying construction jobs. I believe this project would estimate, you know, a lot of tax revenue for the local communities. I believe it would be good for the economy. And I also believe that this is one step toward energy independence that would be good for national security. I urge the Board to permit this project.

And in summation on behalf of IBEW, I lend my full support on all the positive impacts that it would create on the community, environment, and also the nation. Thank you for your time.

ALJ WILLIAMS: Mr. Shirey, before you go,
I want to make sure there are no questions from the
parties who are at tonight's hearing, so I will open
it up. Does Applicant have any questions?

MS. WINTERS: No questions here, your Honor.

ALJ WILLIAMS: Thank you, Ms. Winters.

1 Mr. Shirey, thank you for your testimony 2 and you are free to stay on or to leave. That's your 3 choice, okay? Thank you, sir. Our next witness is Karla Bolser. 4 5 MR. SCHMIDT: Ms. Bolser, you've been promoted. If you can enable your audio and video. 6 7 ALJ WILLIAMS: Can we go off the record, Karen? 8 (Discussion off the record.) 9 10 ALJ WILLIAMS: Karen, can we go back on? 11 Thank you. 12 We called Karla Bolser before we took a 13 brief break from the record, and Ms. Bolser is having 14 some technical issues it appears, so staff is going 15 to reach out to her via phone, and we will put her 16 back in line as soon as she's available. 17 Our next scheduled witness is Ms. Mary 18 Davidson. 19 MR. SCHMIDT: Judge Williams, we heard 20 from Mary Davidson that she is unable to connect for 2.1 the next two hours due to a prior commitment, so we 22 can skip over her and move down the list. 23 ALJ WILLIAMS: Make a note here. Okay. 24 Our next scheduled witness is Trevor Neal.

MR. SCHMIDT: I had Mr. Neal on Webex

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earlier, but he seems to have dropped off. It seems like we are on a roll tonight.

ALJ WILLIAMS: Can someone from staff reach out to Mr. Neal as well and make sure if he inadvertently dropped off that we make every effort to include him tonight.

7 Our next scheduled witness is Dale 8 Davidson.

MR. SCHMIDT: Mr. Davidson, you've been promoted. Can you enable your audio and video?

MR. DAVIDSON: Yes. My audio is on.

12 Let's see here. Get my video going here. Oops.

14 ALJ WILLIAMS: Good evening,

DAVIDSON: I don't live within the 8 9 project area. 10 ALJ WILLIAMS: Thank you, sir. Please 11 proceed with your testimony. 12 MR. DAVIDSON: I am on behalf of 13 Davidson -- are you still there? 14 ALJ WILLIAMS: I lost you a bit there. 15 Could you start over, sir? 16 MR. DAVIDSON: Oh, sure. I was calling 17 to testify on behalf of the Davidson Property Trust 18 with my sister and parents. The adjoining 19 property -- we have an adjoining property, farm 20 property that's been in the generation -- family for 2.1 three, going on four generations. So that's why I am 22 calling. 23 We actively have the farm -- farmland 24 farmed, and we actively -- the property -- wildlife 25 we use for it. So I wanted to make some comments,

As much as I don't want to put you through 11 it, if you want to begin your testimony anew, that 12 would probably be the best way to clean up the 13 record. 14 MR. DAVIDSON: Okay. All right. Yeah. 15 I was stating, you know, we don't -- I don't actively live on the property, but I am calling to represent 16 17 the Davidson Property Trust, my sister, and my 18 parents. We own land that adjoins the proposed 19 project. It's land that's been in the family for 20 three, going on four generations. So that's why 2.1 we're calling about it. 22 In general, we are basically against the 23 project for several different reasons and being that 24 I think there is a lot of negatives that come out of 25 permits and, you know, try to go through most of

them, probably run out of time, but in general,
we -- the project effectively permanently changes the
landscape, the agricultural heritage of the area, and
basically changes it for all intents and purposes
effectively their commercial use for our lifetimes
and generations and probably for permanently.

I know if anybody has ever driven through and examined the similar project going up nearby at the Brown County line can see what change it has had. I know not only is it an eyesore but also there is a lot of other negatives that go along with it. And I know we had planned on building and living and retiring down there but now probably won't if this project goes because it is not something we want to be -- have to see and look at and deal with everyday.

A few things, one was the developer provided a lot of rosy statements and claims and benefits of the project, while most of them which could probably be debated and refuted.

Unfortunately, there has never really been an open dialogue or chance to do that. It seems like anything you ever hear from the developer, officials, or media, it's all rosy and all the positives, and they never really talk about the consequences of the project.

The biggest No. 1 thing is farmland is in short supply, productive farmland, especially short supply for our younger farmers. You know, it's hard to buy. There's nothing available to buy and there's hardly any available to rent.

Between the projects that's been approved in Highland County and the very nearby Brown County border, there's already upwards of five -- from my understanding and research I have gathered 5 to 6 thousand acres of farmland, of productive farms and productive farmlands that's been taken out of commission.

And then southern Ohio that even goes up greater. This project will just add another 1,100 or so acres being taken out for that. And, you know, our concern is when does it stop, you know? And when do we lose so much farmland?

Nearly all the jobs that will be created by this are all going to be very stress temporary jobs. Once the thing is built and constructed they are gone, and the few remaining permanent jobs that will remain which are pretty minimal, I think, isn't really much of a gain because I am not sure anybody has really evaluated, but by taking that farmland out, you lose revenue and taxes from businesses such

as feed and further -- fertilizer, seed companies, implement, fuel companies, and the lost revenue and taxes from those businesses and services are losses that have to be considered. It's -- you know, anything I've ever seen and anything that's ever been presented has never really talked about that.

Again, I will just reemphasize the open landscape will be changed. You have a prison like fence that's going to go around all those properties. That changes the openness including changes to rural agriculture and landscape. One concern we have that fencing will definitely restrict the natural movement and interfere with the wildlife, particularly the bigger wildlife, deer, foxes, coyotes, and realistically could cause a change, an increase in density for these species and neighboring farms and farmland could result in more nuisances and damage to their farm and crops by those wildlifes.

Really this needs to be really looked at hard, whether it's, you know, a study by Department of Wildlife or some other appropriate organization, to see what kind of impacts that will have.

I am not sure really my order of comments here. You know, I know one thing, OPSB is supposed to show that there is a need for the project. Well,

we have a hard time believing there is a need when the Hillcrest, the Highland County project which they are supposed to be building, has already been approved, and it's been stalled. So if there is really a need, why isn't that one being constructed first before approval for the others?

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I suppose it has something to do with saying, well, we got different customers for these. Cincinnati, I understand, is buying electricity. If there is really a need, you know, there could be a way they could talk to AEP, whoever was behind the other project, and buy it there. So I don't see that there is a real need.

And it feels like they are trying to push these two projects by the community before the other one is actually built so they really see what it's like. That's another comment.

I request that if the project moves forward, that there is a decommissioning plan submitted and a bond to hold the counties and parties or the owner responsible in the event sometime this is abandoned or defunct. I know it's all intents and purposes. I hope it would be the intent of the company to always operate as long as they can. But the life of the panels are what? 20, 30 years?

Nobody can have a future ball and predict the future. You know, the bottom may fall out of solar, and other technology may come along and make it obsolete. My understanding glass panels would be hazardous materials to dispose of and not recyclable so there's costs associated with that, and we want to make sure there is assurance that, you know, plan's in place, no -- to make sure, you know, everything is taken care of and put back in use, and it doesn't fall back on the taxpayers some day to have to take care of that.

One other thing, you know, there is going to be added cost. If they ever try to put that farmland back together, it's going to take a lot greater resources to get it back to the same productive -- productivity and the time it's going to take to do that and that's going to be added costs.

I just say it seems like there's been very limited opportunity for the citizens and landowners and neighbors to provide direct feedback and COVID has been a big part of that. It just seems like anything you hear from the officials and media has all been positives and no real talk about what are the negatives and there are additional ones I am not going to get into.

But one thing I'll read that I read a statement in the local newspaper, I am not going to put any labels on the fellow, but he said it is just another crop on which land -- as far as I'm concerned, to him it is just their crop. Well, any farmer or anybody that's been closely associated with farming, we have family that's been farmers for decades, will tell you that's so far from the truth. Farming is using land and resources to grow crops. Solar projects are not farms. They are just simply a collector of sunlight, and they are generating electricity. That can be done anywhere. Farmland and farming can't be done anywhere. It needs to be done on a productive farm.

2.1

So we're really -- like I said, it's a little disappointing the number of people that are able to participate, and I think people would be more likely to direct participate in person than trying to do it over Webex and phone calls and things like that. So I would think it would be prudent to wait until COVID passes and delay this decision making until more people are readily available to attend.

I still have other concerns like the glare problem from solar panels. There is a claim made it's no worse than a glare off a pond. Well, it

is worse. I've driven around Route 286 where the Hillcrest project is and been blinded by glare off the panels. I saw spots for 3 miles. Ponds are not vertical. Ponds are hundreds of acres. So to make that comparison is like crazy.

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There is still issues with privacy sequestering. I read -- saw a really good article from research -- a couple different articles about -talking about pros and cons of solar fields. there was a really good article by Rod Heiniger. He is a North Carolina State professor and extension specialist. He talked about not -- farmland not being a good use to control land. And in his synopsis, of course, you guys are experts and have studied this, but for the general laymen, this is short and simple, the thing's talking about how it would change production of -- the productivity of the land is pretty much permanently, and the loss of those productivity and the changes in the communities will make it unlikely that land will probably ever be farmed again and basically talks about how the farmland is not a good use for solar panels. You can make the argument, oh, it's flat. You got sun -- sun exposure and all that but there's all the issues about how much sunlight is really getting captured

versus sunlight going down to create noxious weeds and components.

And but anyhow there's just too many what ifs and, you know, it's intrusive -- intrusion on our agricultural -- rural agricultural community and it just -- you know, we don't need more loss of productive farmland, things where people in the community already make a living off of, and it's going to affect a lot of their businesses. So I guess that's most of it. So I'm surprised I said that all in 5 minutes. Maybe I talked too fast.

ALJ WILLIAMS: You did very well, sir. I don't know what your time was. You were covering all new ground the entire time. I took a lot of notes from what you were saying. And, frankly, we have a relatively scant list of witnesses. I don't want you to feel you were denied more time. If you have more in your notes, please continue.

MR. DAVIDSON: No. For the most part that's it. I mean, I just know I have had discussions with neighbors and relatives that farm down there and some of the claims they say, oh, it's a big plus. There is certainly negative against that and it's just a permanent loss of farmland for all intents and purposes in my parents' generation, my

generation, and my boys' generation, and effectively nobody knows. I don't know if anybody -- any studies how much -- how they have ever actually tried to reclaim farmland because it's all new territory.

2.1

If you look what's been done in the neighboring projects with thousands and thousands of tons of rock for roadways, they are flooding the fields. Those fields can sour. These fields have been groomed and developed for productive farming, and now they are going to be lost. So it will take a very long time, even if it is attempted to put them back, to ever get there again. So I think that's it in a nutshell.

ALJ WILLIAMS: Mr. Davidson, I do thank you for your patience as we worked through the start of your technology issues. Your testimony was very clear. Before I let you go, I want to ensure that there aren't any questions from any of the parties at this meeting?

MS. WINTERS: No questions here, your Honor.

ALJ WILLIAMS: Thank you.

Mr. Davidson, again, thank you for your participation. You are welcome to stay and listen to the rest of the proceeding this evening, and I

MR. BOLSER: Thank you so much. I appreciate your time. I just wanted -- like the previous speakers I want to say some statements regarding how we came to find -- find out about the proposed project and some thoughts that we have.

With the proposed New Market I and II at 1,116 acres along with the Highland County solar farm at 3,500 acres, this will consume our entire neighborhood. We would have those — the New Market solar fields on one side of us, the Highland County solar farm on the other side of us. I don't feel this is fair to the residents of this area to be surrounded by solar fields and not be able to do anything about it.

We don't understand how one company can come in and be allowed to take over such a vast amount of property. I feel these companies are preying on the rural counties that do not have zoning

laws that you would find in larger cities and this should be illegal. As the state of Ohio employees of the Ohio Power Siting Board, you should be able to take that into consideration of how these projects impact all lives in the state of Ohio and how each of these projects will affect them. There cannot be such a great need to develop so many in such close proximity. Or is this even a consideration when those -- when you are making those choices?

2.1

Only notifying the residents of this proposed project that are physically touching the property sites and eliminating all other Highland County residents being informed or having a say I feel is unjust and a violation of our rights.

Posting an ad in a small town newspaper should not justify that notification. When notifications were sent out of the 3,500 acre solar farm, we were all sent certified letters, and everybody was notified if you live within so many feet of it.

Now, with the New Market only landowners that actually physically touch the affected properties have been notified and given opportunity to speak. I just happened to stumble upon it. Any one human being who is in view of the proposed site

or must commute through this site daily from their home should be given the notification and ability to represent themselves and their families. We are the ones that have to live every day with the ongoing noise and disruption to our community due to the construction, then the ongoing care and maintenance of the facility, not to mention the continuos noise that will come from the substations.

Per the response to the Board's Staff first data request updated noise modeling electronically filed by Karen Winters on behalf of Hecate on 11-10, my property is within that half mile circle of the project site which is their Attachment 2 on that report. This exhibit shows the sound levels in excess of ambient noise levels resulting in operations barely exceed the site boundaries. By Terracon stating the levels barely exceed the limits, they are acknowledging that they do exceed the limits, and even though it may not be significant, that will be an impact on our community. I believe all residents within that half mile circle around the site should be kept informed of any and all construction and variations to this project.

And then who gives the permission of who can ride on our county roads and how will they be

repaired once all this construction traffic is going up and down our country roads every day all day?

It's been mentioned multiple times the jobs to complete these projects would come from Highland County. They would reach actively to employ thousands in Highland County. But in the case study Cincinnati's path to a 100 megawatt solar deal by the Assistant City Manager of the City of Cincinnati, it states in conjunction with Cincinnati State and the IBEW Local 212, the City will implement a workforce skill and hiring program or project labor agreement aimed at putting Cincinnati residents to work on the project. How is that going to benefit Highland County's poverty level?

I would like to thank you for your time and hope that my concerns are taken into consideration as how this will impact our quality of life in this county.

I ask of you to have a favorable response to granting a permit for this project. It will provide meaningful employment to a large amount of people while under construction.

This project will retire yearly cropping practices with fertilizer, herbicides, and pesticides applications and be planted in cover crops with the solar panels. After construction, the truck traffic will be greatly reduced. If we have 1,100 acres of cropland and it makes 200 bushels per acre of corn, it's 220 semi loads in and out. That amount of truck

traffic will be greatly reduced once construction is over.

2.1

This site will bring much needed tax revenue to the county. At the current state and county mandates, it will generate 900,000 per year in tax revenue versus the current tax revenue of approximately 2,500. Our county needs the tax revenue. We have never had an opportunity like this in Highland County. There's a 29 percent child poverty rate in Highland County just published by the Census Bureau. Highland County ranks 80th in the state as far as poverty and income. This tax revenue is the greatest opportunity, and I think that we need to have this project happen.

My name is Michael Forrester. I'm the Director of
the Office of Environment and Sustainability for the
City of Cincinnati.

I will keep my comments brief, but I want to speak to the public interest and the many public benefits that this array will bring. First of all, I want to speak to the significant local community impact. Both projects here will pay over \$900,000 annually for the 35-year life of the project to support the local school districts and local governments. That's over \$31 million invested in the local community over the life of this project.

Approximately 130 jobs will be created during peak construction. 80 percent of the workers will be required to be from Ohio. These locally created jobs will have a significant future opportunity when looking at the 4,500 megawatts of

solar that are currently pending approval by the Ohio Power Siting Board. This project here is helping to grow a workforce in Ohio that has a lot of work that is lined up and ready to go.

2.1

Second of all, I want to talk about the use of this solar array. The City of Cincinnati is the primary off-taker for this array. The City has pledged to be 100 percent renewable by 2035, and the New Market solar projects are a key part to meeting the pledge to our Cincinnati residents.

on this project to search local renewables to -- to its electricity load since 2017. We have launched a competitive bid to build local renewable generation for the City of Cincinnati and have required that all responders must be in Ohio and within 100 miles of City Hall to support local economic development and to grow the local jobs market in the greater Cincinnati area so that our region can benefit from the jobs solar development will bring.

We've received over 15 different applications, and we selected this project to move forward. It's important to know that this project directly serves Ohioans. The first 35 megawatts is slated to support the City of Cincinnati government

and provide 25 percent of its overall electricity load. The electricity -- the electrons produced will provide electricity for Cincinnati police and fire, but it will also serve the Greater Cincinnati Water Works and the Metropolitan Sewer District. GCWW and MSD operate a regional service which provides water for over 1.1 million people in Hamilton, Butler, and Warren Counties.

2.1

Because this solar produced is a fixed price over time, this protects our ratepayers and our residents against summer swings in electricity pricing. We essentially have locked into a long-term electricity price hedge for our residents.

Also the renewable energy credits that are produced from that array will be retired on the City's behalf to ensure that we are credited with the carbon reductions that that array provides.

The second 65 megawatts will be providing 15 percent of the electricity for the Cincinnati electric aggregation program. The aggregation program is a bulk buying program where we pool the buying power of our residents and our small build -- our small businesses to select a lower rate than is available from the utility.

The aggregation program serves between 70

and 80 thousand residents and small business accounts and consumes between 750 and 800 thousand megawatt-hours annually. Our aggregation program has been 100 percent green energy since 2012. We have traditionally purchased renewable energy credits from wind resources located in Texas and Oklahoma. I am very excited to be able to provide a locally-sourced green energy to our residents for they have been requesting this for years.

We can go into the climate impacts. We can go into the impact of climate change from the City of Cincinnati which are real and severely impacting our City budget, but on that I will pause and throw it open for questions.

MS. BURKARD: I do not personally live there, but I was born and raised in the project area, and I have family that live in the project area.

ALJ DAVIS: Thank you. Please proceed with your testimony.

MS. BURKARD: Okay. So as I stated, my name is Elizabeth Burkard, and I'm speaking on behalf of my family, the Halky family and the Ire family, with more than 200 years of combined service to agriculture in Highland County. Both the Halky family and Ire family are pillars in that farming community and are in favor of the Highland solar farm.

One of the biggest benefits of the Highland solar farm is the creation of jobs, something this area is in desperate need of. Highland County's current unemployment rate is 5.5 percent according to the Ohio Department of Job and Family Services. We are in the top 30 out of 88 counties in the state of Ohio regarding our rate of unemployment. We have individuals seeking jobs that are unable to secure employment. With the high unemployment rate, growth and social cohesion are

threatened.

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According to Hecate Energy, they claim to fill nearly 300 construction jobs during the first 12 to 18 months of the project. In addition, operations and maintenance will create additional jobs which Hecate states they will seek to locally source. Solar power and careers in solar energy are the future. We can embrace this project or another county will.

Safety and health are other concerns regarding solar technology. According to Hecate the panels they are going to use contain the same materials that are used in many household products such as windows. This project's impact on the soil will be limited to the placement of the steel poles in the ground. Hecate will maintain drainage and perhaps improve it. Studies conducted have also indicated that the project will not have adverse effects on wildlife. Because the creation of solar energy is through the physical process of natural sunlight as opposed to a combustion process, solar energy does not produce emissions into the air during operation. I am more concerned with the toxic chemicals, sprays, fertilizers, weedkillers, et cetera, that's placed on our farmland and around our

53 homes that we currently breath in on a daily basis. 1 2 I hope others will consider the benefits too before making their decision regarding the 3 Highland solar farm. School District.

ALJ DAVIS: Thank you. You can proceed with your testimony.

MR. ROWLEY: Okay. I'm on behalf of the Board of Education here, whatever. They've asked me basically to speak to the positive financial impact that this project will have on our school district.

The Bright Local School District is a small district in southern Highland County. We have

685 students distributed over 120 square miles. The real estate valuation in our district consists of less than 1 percent commercial real property with the rest split equally between residential and agriculture. Market values have shown marginal increases in the last year of just over 1/2 percent and median incomes have shown little to no growth in our district. The current state funding formula has our district basically -- basic funding held stable at what it was in December of 2019.

2.1

We as a district work very hard to be good stewards of the taxpayers' money. Our newest facility, the elementary building, was put into operation about 20 years ago and portions of our high school junior high building dates back to 1938. Both buildings are well maintained but are in need of material upgrades in HVAC systems and controls.

The difficulty we are running into is that our primary revenue sources, property taxes and state funding, are both driven by three primary factors, property values, median incomes, and student enrollment, all of which have shown little growth while on the other hand cost of services and materials have continued to increase with a projected inflation rate for 2021 of 2.24 percent.

This makes the job providing a good, quality education equally to all students in our district even more difficult. If you could look at our last filed five-year forecast as required by ODE, our district is looking at losing a combined \$927,000 from our available cash balance over the next five years.

Now, obviously we as a school district cannot speak to the desires and needs of the landowners and taxpayers affected by this project.

We can only speak to the bottom line for the Bright Local School District students and the Staff we employ. This project has a potential to provide an additional gross revenue source for approximately \$380,000 annually that we do not currently have and in the end that could be a huge benefit to the Bright Local School District.
