On February 12, 2021, Birch Solar 1, LLC ("Applicant"), filed an application with the Ohio Power Siting Board ("Board") for a certificate of environmental compatibility and public need to construct a solar-powered electric generation facility in Allen and Auglaize Counties, Ohio ("Application").

The purpose of this Supplement to the Application is to provide: the coordination letter received from the United States Fish and Wildlife Service ("USFWS"). The completed History/Architecture Reconnaissance Survey Report ("Report"). These supplements to the Application are explained below.

1. <u>USFWS Coordination Letter</u>: The Applicant is committed to ensure that there will be no adverse impact to wildlife resulting from the Project. Application Exhibit R provided correspondence between the Application and the USFWS regarding the Project. Subsequent to that coordination, based upon additional input, including input from the community, the Applicant modified the Project boundary and the site layout. Therefore, as part of the Applicant's continued coordination with USFWS, the Applicant submitted the modified site layout to USFWS and Attachment 1 to this Supplement to the Application includes the correspondence from the Applicant to USFWS dated January 13, 2021, as well as the response from USFWS to the Applicant dated March 1, 2021. As found in Attachment 1, in its concurrence response regarding the modified site layout, USFWS concludes that

"[d]ue to the project, type, size, and location, [USFWS] does not anticipate adverse effect to federally endangered, threatened, or proposed species or proposed or designated critical habitat."

2. <u>History/Architecture Reconnaissance Survey Report</u>: As stated in the Application, the Applicant's consultant, Kramb Consulting, LLC, was in the process of finalizing the architectural history report at the time the Application was submitted and, upon completion, the Applicant committed to provide the report to the State Historic Preservation Office ("SHPO") for review. Attached please find that finalized Report as Attachment 2. The Report has been provided to SHPO.

To Whom it May Concern,

As provided in previous correspondence, Lightsource BP is proposing to develop a 300-megawatt (MW) alternating current (AC) utility-scale photovoltaic solar energy project in Allen County and Auglaize County, Ohio. The Project is located approximately three miles southwest of the city of Lima, Ohio. Your response to our initial threatened and endangered species review request dated September 15, 2020 (TAILS# 03E15000-2020-TA-2452) identified the potential need to clear forested habitat within the Project area that could be utilized by Indiana and northern long-eared bats and recommended summer surveys be completed to determine presence or probable absence of the species within the Project area.

Since our initial threatened and endangered species review request, the Project boundary has been modified and a site layout developed that will encompass approximately 1,410 acres of land. The site design was developed incorporating avoidance of a number of environmental features identified during field surveys for the Project, such as wetlands, streams, and forested areas that constitute high quality fish and wildlife habitat. Based on the currently proposed site design depicted in Figure 1, impacts to all forested habitat identified through our field habitat assessment survey has been avoided, thereby eliminating the need to clear trees for construction of the Project. We believe that siting Project infrastructure to avoid this habitat will result in no adverse effects to Indiana or northern long-eared bats from the Project.

Lightsource BP is committed to ensuring that the Project is developed in a manner that avoids impacts to threatened and endangered species and looks forward to continuing to coordinate with your office on this Project.

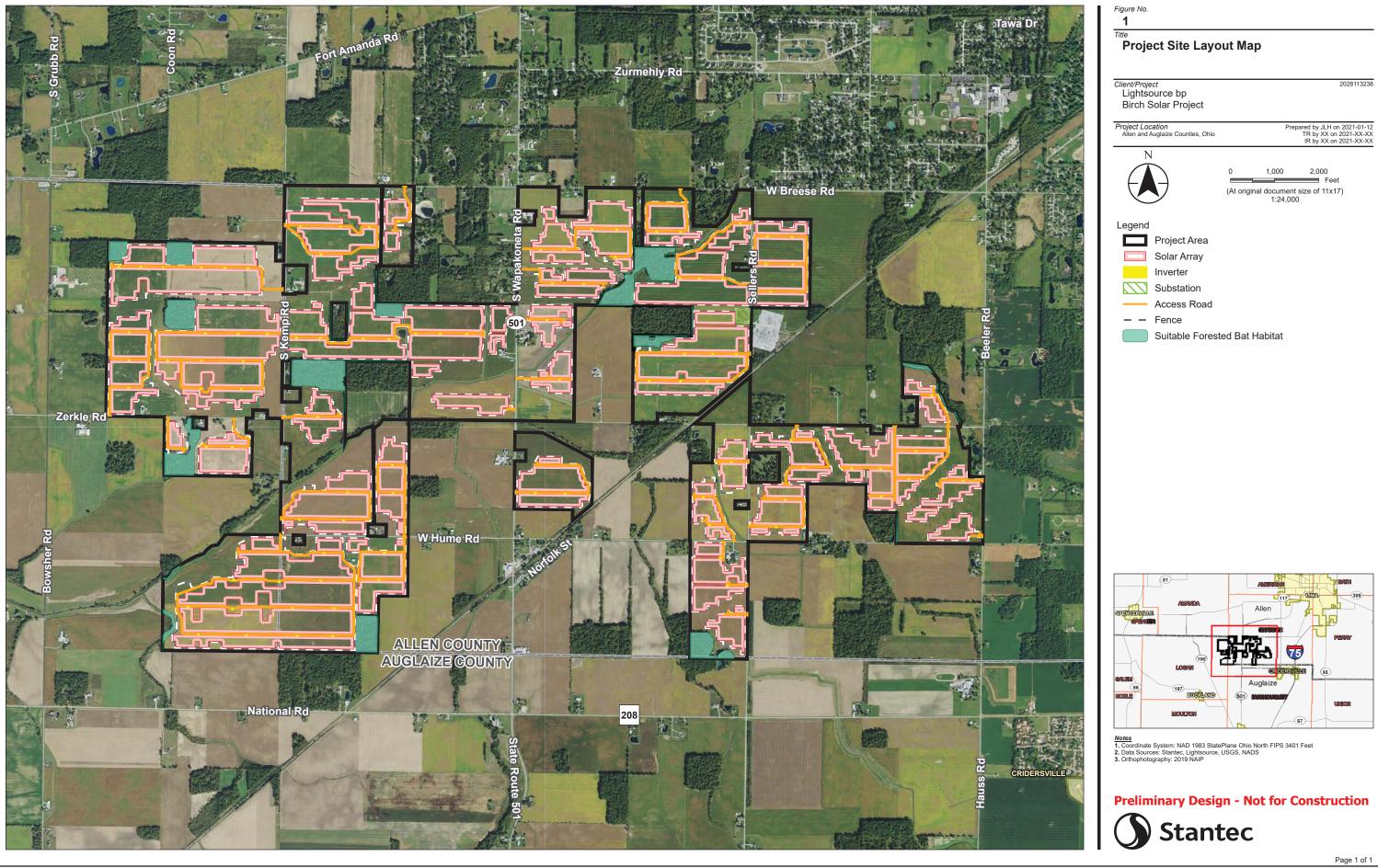

On behalf of Birch Solar 1, LLC (Birch Solar), we have worked with Kramb Consulting, LLC and Weller & Associates, Inc. to prepare the attached History/Architecture Reconnaissance Survey for the Birch Solar Project, located in Allen and Auglaize Counties (Project). This report is the culmination of our consultation efforts with your office to determine the survey effort and identification of the area of potential effect, which was agreed to in a coordination letter received on February 2, 2021.

The Project will have a generating capacity of 300 megawatts alternating current and the Project Area encompasses approximately 2,345 acres of private land (see Figure 1). Based on the current Project design, the Facility, which is composed of all components and infrastructure necessary for solar energy generation, will occupy approximately 1,410 acres of the Project Area.

As committed to in Birch Solar's Certificate of Environmental Compatibility and Public Need application submitted to the Ohio Power Siting Board on February 12, 2021, many attempts have been made to limit visibility of the Project and integrate it into the existing landscape. This has been achieved by implementing a 300-foot setback from Breese Road and areas of Wapakoneta Road, setting back from homes at a minimum 300 feet, and also limiting the boundary to the area east of Bowsher Road, south of Breese Road and north of National Road. The road setbacks allow for agricultural production along the roadways creating an additional visual buffer from the Project. Additionally, Birch Solar incorporated community and landowner feedback to identify ways to better integrate the Facility into the landscape. As a result of this effort, the Project design includes cedar post farm fencing around the external facing areas of the Project rather than the originally proposed chain link fencing. This farm fencing will better blend into the existing agricultural landscape.

In addition to the siting and fencing incorporated into the Project, Birch Solar has committed to vegetative screening in strategic locations along the perimeter of the Project to partially screen the Project in views from the nearby residences and roadways. Birch Solar proposes to plant arborvitae trees (*Thuja spp.*) or a similar evergreen tree species to provide screening of the Project from roadways and residences. The trees will be 5 to 6 feet tall at the time of planting and are anticipated to grow to a full height of approximately 8 feet. The trees will be spaced approximately 10 feet on center. A visual of what the plantings could look like, as modeled along W. Hume Road, is provided in the photosimulation below.

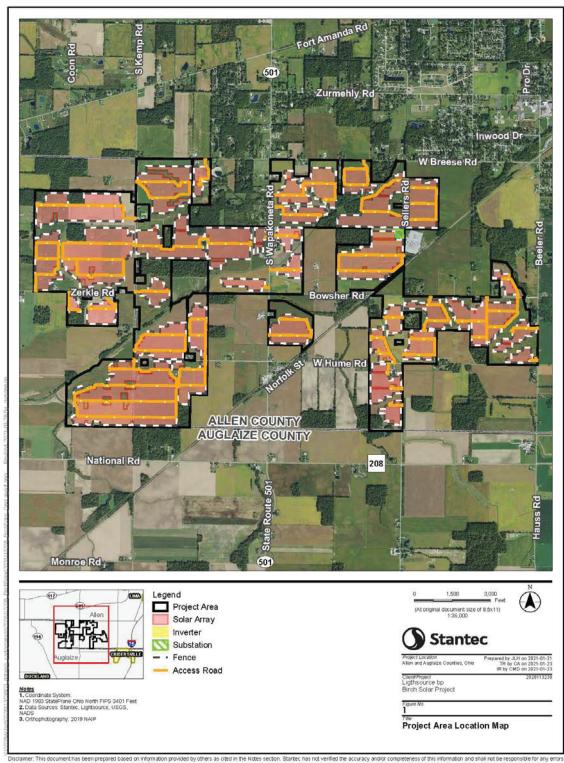

Abstract

Birch Solar 1, LLC desires to construct a solar panel farm in portions of Shawnee Township, Allen County and Logan Township, Auglaize County, Ohio. The overall project area equates to 2,345 acres. The construction area (i.e. the panels, road, and fencing) equates to 1,410 acres. The irregularly shaped construction areas are within agricultural parcels and skirt existing roadways, railroads, pipelines, residences, streams and other nature features. The proposed Birch Solar project involves mounting solar panels on metal racks configured in rows. The solar panels will not exceed ten feet in height. The arrays of solar panels will be enclosed by a fence which will not exceed seven in height. Other above ground project components within the fenced area may include: gravel roads to access the arrays; associated equipment mounted on concrete pads; and, a substation building or facility not exceeding one-story in height.

In order to construct the proposed Birch Solar project, the client is preparing an application for the Ohio Power Siting Board in accordance with Ohio Administrative Code Section 4906. Part of the Ohio Power Siting Board application process requires the client to identify history/architecture resources within the vicinity of the project. Consequently, Kramb Consulting conducted a History/Architecture reconnaissance survey to identify above-ground cultural resources within an area of potential effect (APE) that extends approximately 2-miles beyond the proposed construction areas. The APE was reduced to the northeast and southeast of the proposed construction areas where the 2-mile radius encroached upon the communities of Fort Shawnee and Cridersville; and, the APE was slightly reduced to the west where the 2-mile radius stretched west of the Auglaize River.

In summary, Kramb completed history/architecture field investigations on January 9 and January 16, 2021 to identify history/architecture resources listed on or eligible for the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) which may be impacted by the construction of the proposed Birch Solar project. During field investigations, Kramb identified 486 architectural locations with the APE. Of the architectural locations identified, Kramb **recommends that the following eight are potentially eligible for the NRHP**:

- AUG-00272-03 (AL 55): AUG-00272-03 is recommended eligible for the NRHP under Criterion C
 as a surviving example of the Morrison Patent Wrought Iron Arch Truss Bridge type built by
 Dayton's Columbia Bridge Works throughout the Midwest in the late 1800s.
- **ALL-00703-06 (AL 135):** ALL-00703-06 is potentially eligible for the NRHP under Criterion C as a significant example of a relatively unaltered late-1800s rural church with Gothic Revival elements.
- ALL-00721-07 (AL 164): ALL-00721-07 is potentially eligible for the NRHP under Criterion C as a significant representation of the US military's Quonset type building repurposed in a civilian setting.
- ALL-00726-07 (AL 198): ALL-00726-07 is potentially eligible for the NRHP under Criterion C as a significant example of a rural farmstead with a Colonial Revival style residence and a Three Bay Barn.
- **ALL-00722-07 (AL 331):** ALL-00722-07 is potentially eligible for the NRHP under Criterion C as a significant representation of a single-family residential building with Tudor style elements.
- **ALL-00723-06 (AL 432):** ALL-00723-06 is potentially eligible for the NRHP under Criterion C as a significant example of a vernacular style, Gabled Ell type farmhouse from the late 1800s.
- ALL-00724-07 (AL 484): ALL-00724-07 is potentially eligible to the NRHP under Criterion C as a significant example of a rural farmstead with a Craftsman style, Dormer Front Bungalow and a Three Bay Barn.

 ALL-00725-07 (AL 485): ALL-00725-07 is recommended potentially eligible for the NRHP under Criterion C as a unique example of a relatively unaltered residence and outbuildings with a mix of stylistic elements.

In addition to the eight architectural locations found potentially eligible as part of this survey, the APE also contains the following **seven architectural locations previously listed on or determined eligible for the NRHP**:

- AUG-01724-03 (AL 65) Determination of Eligibility (DOE) 12513 Ritchie Road
- AUG-01708-02 (AL 118) Fort Amanda Toilet Building
- AUG-01709-02 (AL 119) Fort Amanda Grill Shelter
- AUG-01707-02 (AL 120) Fort Amanda Large Picnic Shelter
- Fort Amanda Cemetery-OGS #777 (AL 121)
- AUG-01710-02 (AL 122) Fort Amanda Monument; and,
- Fort Amanda NR #70000484 (AL 123).

Furthermore, field investigations identified **one potential district within the APE**. The initial reconnaissance survey indicates that the community of Hume may be a potential historic district eligible for the NRHP under Criterion A as a significant representation of a surviving, rural, railroad community possibly associated with the oil boom in Allen County. The **community of Hume contains 35 architectural locations: AL 157-158 and AL 164 through AL 193**. However, the scope of this reconnaissance survey does not include the determination of district boundaries and the identification of all contributing and non-contributing resources within a district. Additional research on the community of Hume, its occupants, and its relation to or association with the area's oil industry is necessary in order to fully evaluate significance and integrity of buildings within the proposed district.

Of the 486 architectural locations identified within the APE, the following four were not evaluated for NRHP because the buildings were not visible from the public right-of-way due to distance and existing vegetation: AL 103, AL 109, AL 452, and AL 470.

In conclusions, it is anticipated that the following potentially eligible architectural locations may be impacted by views of the proposed solar arrays.

- ALL-00726-07 (AL 198): ALL-00726-07 will be in full view of solar arrays proposed for installation directly across the street.
- ALL-00721-07 (AL 164): There are no intervening buildings to block views of solar arrays proposed for installation about 2,400 feet west of ALL-00721-07.
- Potential District, Community of Hume (AL 157-158 and AL 164 through AL 193): Regardless
 of specifically identified boundaries, any identified historic district within the limits of Hume will have
 views of proposed solar arrays in agricultural fields about 0.45-mile west of Hume, 0.13-mile north
 of Hume, and 0.52-mile east of Hume.
- ALL-00703-06 (AL 135): Existing wooded lots at the northwest corner of this nearest proposed solar arrays should limit views of the arrays from ALL-00703-06. Without the existing trees, ALL-00703-06 may have views of the solar arrays, although views will be minimized by the intervening 3,000 feet.

Birch Solar 1, LLC will work with the Ohio State Historic Preservation Office to ensure installation of appropriate fencing and vegetative screening that minimizes visual impacts to potentially eligible resources.

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1.0 Introduction

Birch Solar 1, LLC desires to construct a solar panel farm in portions of Shawnee Township, Allen County and Logan Township, Auglaize County, Ohio. The overall project area equates to 2,345 acres. The construction area (i.e. the panels, road, and fencing) equates to 1,410 acres. The irregularly shaped project area is located southwest of the City of Lima in northwest Ohio (Appendix A: Figure 1). The northern edge of the project is bounded by W. Breese Road. The communities of Fort Shawnee and Cridersville are situated east of the project area. The Allen County and Auglaize County line bounds the southern edge of the project area. The western edge of the project area extends into Auglaize County, Logan Township, Sections 24 and 25 to the west of Kemp Road. More specifically, the proposed construction areas are located within Allen County, Shawnee Township, Sections 19, 20, 21, 28, 29 and 30 and Auglaize County, Logan Township, Sections 24 and 25. The irregularly shaped construction areas are within agricultural parcels and skirt existing roadways, railroads, pipelines, residences, streams and other nature features. See Appendix A: Figure 2.

The proposed Birch Solar project involves mounting solar panels on metal racks configured in rows. The solar panels will not exceed ten feet in height. The arrays of solar panels will be enclosed by a fence which will not exceed seven feet in height. Other above ground project components within the fenced area may include: gravel roads to access the arrays; associated equipment mounted on concrete pads; and, a substation building or facility not exceeding one-story in height.

In order to construct the proposed Birch Solar project, the client is preparing an application for the Ohio Power Siting Board in accordance with Ohio Administrative Code Section 4906. Part of the Ohio Power Siting Board application process requires the client to identify history/architecture resources within the vicinity of the project.

2.0 Secondary Source Review

2.1 Methodology

Before conducting field investigations for this project, Kramb Consulting (Kramb) completed a secondary source review to identify previously documented resources within the area of potential effect (APE). On December 29, 2020, Kramb performed a Section 106 records search using the Ohio State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) Geographic Information System (GIS) database. The records search reviewed the following resources:

- National Historic Landmark (NHL) listings;
- National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) listings;
- Determination of Eligibility (DOE) listings;
- Ohio Genealogical Society (OGS) cemetery listings;
- Ohio Historic Inventory (OHI) listings;
- Ohio Historic Bridge Inventory listings; and,
- Previously Conducted History/Architecture & Cultural Resources Management Reports.

The records search was conducted for areas with the following parameters:

- The proposed construction areas (Appendix A: Figure 3);
- The proposed construction areas plus a buffer with a 1-mile radius (Appendix A: Figure 4);
- The proposed construction areas plus a buffer with a 2-mile radius (Appendix A: Figure 5); and,
- The proposed construction areas plus a buffer with a 5-mile radius (Appendix A: Figure 6).

The results of the records search are summarized in Section 2.2, below, based on resource type. Kramb also reviewed the following sources.

2.2 Previously Documented Resources

2.2.1 National Historic Landmarks

There are no NHL locations within the proposed construction areas or within a 5-mile radius.

2.2.2 National Register of Historic Places Listings

There are no NRHP listed properties or districts within the proposed construction areas and none within a 1-mile radius. The following NRHP districts were identified within the larger search radii.

The NRHP listed West Market Street Boulevard Historic District contains thirty-five single-family residences within a densely populated area immediately west of downtown Lima. The NRHP district is over 4.5-miles northeast of the closest proposed solar arrays and would have no views of the arrays due to distance and intervening buildings.

The NRHP listed Griffith Breese Farm is located over 1.5-miles northeast of the closest proposed solar arrays. The Griffith Breese house and barn recorded as ALL-00031-07 remain intact, but the approximately 60 acres of surrounding farmland have been developed as Shawnee-Breezewood Estates subdivision which contains thirty-nine single-family residences constructed in the early 2000s.

The NRHP listed Fort Amanda site is an Ohio History Connection site managed locally by the Johnny Appleseed Metropolitan Park District. The park is located on the west bank of the Auglaize River over 1.5-miles west of the closest proposed solar arrays. The park was once the site of Fort Amanda, a major supply depot for the American army during the War of 1812. An Ohio History Marker and a granite monument mark the site where the fort once stood. Also within the park is the Fort Amanda Cemetery.

2.2.3 Determination of Eligibility Listings

There are no DOE listings within the proposed construction areas and none within a 1-mile radius. The following DOE listings were identified within the larger search radii.

As indicated in Table 3, the St. Matthews Evangelical Lutheran Cemetery (OGS #216) lies within the APE near the intersection of Shawnee Road and W. Hume Road. According to the church's website (St. Matthews Lutheran Church 2020), burials within St. Matthews Cemetery range from 1837 to the present; and, many of the founding members of the church are buried in the cemetery. The cemetery contains family members of early settlers with the surnames of DeLong, Mowery, Shappell, Bowsher, Reichelderfer, Brandt, Lower, Moyer, Crider, Spyker, Sellers, and Meffley.

The Crawford-Romshe (Wheeler) Cemetery (OGS #759) lies within the APE at the southwest corner of Ritchie Road and S. Wapakoneta Road (State Route 501). The inactive cemetery contains less than two-dozen headstones which date to the mid-to-late 1800s.

Also within the APE is the Fort Amanda Cemetery (OGS #777). Located on the west bank of the Auglaize River within the boundaries of the NRHP-listed Fort Amanda site, the Fort Amanda Cemetery contains graves ranging from 1812 to the present. For more information, see Section 3.3, below.

The Shawnee Cemetery (OGS #215) is outside of the APE but is within a 2-mile radius of the proposed construction areas. The cemetery is located at the northwest corner of Zurmehly Road and Shawnee Road on the east bank of the Little Ottawa River. According to an article in the *Lima News* (Hoersten 2015), the first burial at what would become Shawnee Cemetery took place in July 1832. The burial was that of Thomas Reed, the five year old son of the landowner Benjamin Reed. The land for the cemetery was sold in sections by Benjamin Reed, Isaac Bowsher, and Ezekiel Hover to the trustees of Shawnee Township in transactions that occurred between 1854 and 1897. The cemetery is presently maintained by Shawnee Township and remains an active burial ground.

2.2.5 Ohio Historic Inventory Listings

There are no OHI listings within the proposed construction areas. The following OHI listings were identified within the larger search radii. The information in Table 4, below, is as indicated within the SHPO GIS database. In summary, there are eighty-eight OHI listings within a 5-mile radius of the proposed construction areas and eleven OHI listings within a 2-mile radius of the proposed construction areas. There are only two OHI listings within a 1-mile radius of the proposed construction areas (Appendix A: Figure 4). All OHI forms are included in Appendix B.

To assess the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) eligibility of resources identified within the area of potential effect (APE), it is necessary to know the events and persons that significantly contributed to the history of the area. The following historic context provides that essential background for evaluating NRHP eligibility.

3.1 Project Location

Situated southwest of the City of Lima, the proposed construction areas are located within portions of Allen County, Shawnee Township, Sections 19, 20, 21, 28, 29 and 30 and Auglaize County, Logan Township, Sections 24 and 25. The irregularly shaped construction areas are within agricultural parcels and skirt existing roadways, railroads, pipelines, residences, streams and other nature features. See Appendix A: Figure 2. The APE encompasses the proposed construction areas and land within an approximately 2-mile radius as shown on Appendix A: Figure 8. In addition to the township sections mentioned above, the APE includes portions of Auglaize County, Duchouquet Township, Sections 3-6 and 31-35, and Auglaize County, Logan Township, Sections 1-2, 11-12, 22, 25-27, 35 and 36. Furthermore, the APE encompasses Allen County, Amanda Township, Sections 11-15 and almost all of Allen County, Shawnee Township except the northeast corner near Lima. Included within the APE are the communities of Hume, Cridersville and Fort Shawnee. See Appendix A: Figure 9 which approximates the APE onto the USGS 15-Minute Series topographic quadrangles from 1906-1911 and thus shows the extent of the APE in both Allen and Auglaize counties.

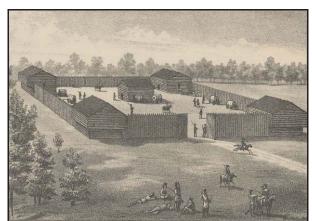
3.2 Native Americans in Northwest Ohio

In the 1600 and 1700s, Spain, France, Great Britain, and Native Americans all made claim to lands which would ultimately be part of Allen and Auglaize Counties. In 1763, after years of warring over the lands in North American, Spain, France and Great Britain signed the Treaty of Paris which gave the disputed territory to Great Britain. To pacify Native Americans, Great Britain signed a proclamation limiting western expansion of Anglo-American settlers into lands west of the Appalachian Mountains. Despite Britain's Proclamation of 1763, settlers of the original thirteen colonies continued to move west. In order to regulate the continued westward settlement, the Confederation Congress passed the Northwest Ordinance of 1787 which created the Northwest Territory and established a form of government specifying how the territory would ultimately become states. Native Americans living in the newly created Northwest Territory did not consent to American control over the land. Consequently, an ongoing battle ensued between the United States and Native Americans. In 1795, as an effort to establish peace, representatives of the United States and numerous Native American leaders signed the Treaty of Greeneville. With the Treaty of Greeneville, the Native Americans ceded much of their land claims to the United States. After the Treaty of Greeneville, Native Americans were lawfully allowed only to settle north of the treaty line in the north and west portions of the Ohio Territory, which included the future Allen and Auglaize Counties. When Ohio became a state in

1803, many Native American tribes had already moved west out of Ohio. Some Native American tribes moved to reservations established in northwest Ohio where the United States government encouraged Native Americans to become farmers and Anglo-American religious leaders pressed Native Americans to adopted Christian teachings. For example, after signing of a treaty at Maumee Rapids in 1817, the Shawnee settled in the future Allen and Auglaize Counties on Hog Creek Reserve and on Wappaghkonetta Reserve (Rusler 1921). In 1830, President Andrew Jackson signed the Indian Removal Act which forced the last Native Americans living in Ohio to move west of the Mississippi River. With the evacuation of the Native Americans, the former Native American reserve land opened to settlers of Allen and Auglaize Counties.

3.3 Fort Amanda

The NRHP-listed site of Fort Amanda is located on the western edge of the APE on the west bank of the Auglaize River. The Ohio Historical Marker present at the Fort Amanda State Memorial succinctly summarizes the history of Fort Amanda as follows. "After General William Hull's surrender at Detroit early in the War of 1812, most of the Michigan Territory came under British and Indian Control. To prevent a possible invasion of Ohio, General William Henry Harrison, commander of the Northwestern Army, called up the Kentucky and Ohio militia. Rather than moving troops and supplies across the Black Swamp, he chose to use the Auglaize and St. Mary's rivers. In November 1812, Harrison ordered Lieutenant Colonel Robert Poque of the Kentucky Mounted Militia to construct a supply depot at this site, previously an Ottawa village. Pogue, a veteran of the Battle of Fallen Timbers in 1794, named the post For Amanda after his 12year-old daughter, Hannah Amanda. Quickly built, Fort Amanda initially consisted of four two-story blockhouses connected by 11-foot palisades, occupying an area of about 160 feet by 160 feet. Captain Thompson Ward's company of Kentucky militia garrisoned the fort until February 1813, when Captain Daniel Hosbrook of the Ohio militia assumed command. Under his direction the fort was enlarged to accommodate the growing quantity of supplies stored here, which included livestock, grain, munitions, and whiskey. Large rafts were constructed nearby to transport the men and materials downriver. The camp became a key debarkation point for soldiers and supplies headed north in the effort to recapture Detroit. Fort Amanda was abandoned by early 1815 and was subsequently occupied by local settlers." Today, nothing remains of the fort itself; however, the location of the former fort is marked by a granite monument erected in 1915.

Located within Fort Amanda State Memorial Park is the Fort Amanda Cemetery (Ohio Genealogical Society #777). Interpretive signage at the cemetery indicates that between 1812 and 1814, soldiers who became sick or sustained injuries in battle were brought back to Fort Amanda where many died from their war injuries or succumbed to germ-related maladies such as dysentery, typhoid, or severe diarrhea. The Fort Amanda Cemetery contains seventy-five gravestones honoring unnamed soldiers from the War of 1812. The identity of the soldiers is unknown because their records were destroyed when the British burned the War Records Office in Washington D.C. on August 24, 1814. Local families continued to bury their dead at Fort Amanda after the US government abandoned the fort in 1815, and the cemetery remains an active burial ground today.

3.4 The Formation of Allen County, Shawnee Township, and Amanda Township

Unless otherwise noted, the following information is summarized from *Atlas of Allen County, Ohio: From Records & Original Surveys* (Harrison 1880).

In 1820, the Ohio Legislature created fourteen counties from the land in north and west Ohio ceded by the Native Americans in the 1817 treaty at Maumee Rapids (Harrison 1880). Although, Allen County was recognized by law in 1820, county and township governments were not organized until after the United States forced the Native Americans from Hog Creek and Wappaghkonetta. In 1831, land for Allen County was detached from Mercer County to form its own legal existence (Rusler 1921). The boundaries of townships changed over time, but by 1880, Allen County contained the following thirteen townships: Amanda Township organized in 1830, originally part of Mercer County; Bath Township organized in 1831; German Township organized in 1831; Jackson Township organized in 1831; Sugar Creek Township organized in 1831, originally part of Putnam County; Auglaize Township organized in 1832; Shawnee Township organized in 1834 from the former Hog Creek Reserve; Marion Township organized in 1834 with the erection of Auglaize County; Perry Township organized in 1834; Monroe Township organized in 1835, originally part of Putnam County; Richland Township organized in 1835, originally part of Putnam County; Spencer Township organized in 1848 from portions of Mercer and Van Wert Counties; and, Ottawa Township organized in 1857 around the growing community of Lima (Harrison 1880). The boundary and government of Ottawa Township was eventually incorporated into the City of Lima; and, by petition of citizens, the name of German Township was changed to American Township August 16, 1918 (Rusler 1921).

As stated above, Shawnee Township was organized in 1834. However, many of the first settlers of Shawnee Township arrived prior to the township's official formation and prior to the removal of all Shawnee from the reservation. Some of the earliest known settlers included: Ezekiel, Joseph, and Emanuel Hover; Nathan Daniels; Griffith and Robert Breese; Alexander, Philip, and George Coon; William Deniston; John Dowling; David and Isaac Decorsey; Benjamin Davison; Joseph Edwards; Samuel Fritz; Thomas Flinn; Thomas Hale; Benjamin Reed; Charles Rose; Samuel Sprague; and, Charles Adgate. As is typical, the surnames of these early settlers are used as road names throughout the APE (e.g. Coon Road and Breese Road). In 1880, Shawnee Township remained a sparsely populated rural township and its only community was the village of Hume. Hume is situated along the Lake Erie & Western Railroad line, which was completed through the APE in 1872 (Walsh 1898). In 1880, Hume contained a post-office, two stores, a warehouse, a blacksmith shop and a steam sawmill.

Amanda Township, originally part of Mercer County, was organized in 1830 and the first elections were held at Fort Amanda. The earliest settlers of Amanda Township settled at Fort Amanda around 1817 when,

after conclusion of the War of 1812, the US government abandoned the fort. Initial settlers who took up residence in the block houses at Fort Amanda included the families of Andrew Russell, Peter Diltz, and William Vanausdall. Other early settlers to come to Amanda Township prior to 1829 included: William and Dye Sunderland; Samuel Washburn; Solomon Carr; Henry and Jacob Harter; Samuel and William Stewart; Thomas Adams; George Kephart; Joseph Sutton; William, Thomas, and John Berryman; Daniel Hoak; William Cochran; James and John Crozier; Thomas, Josiah, and Frederick Clawson; John and Saul Patton; Samuel Baxter; and, Archelaus Martin. Like Shawnee Township, in 1880, Amanda Township remained a sparsely populated rural township with an 1870 census count of only 1,376 inhabitants.

3.5 The Formation of Auglaize County, Duchouquet Township, and Logan Township

Unless otherwise noted, the following information is summarized from the *Atlas of Auglaize County with Historical and Biographical Sketches* (Walsh 1898).

Auglaize County was established in 1848 with fourteen townships: Clay, Duchouquet, German, Goshen, Jackson, Logan, Moulton, Noble, Pusheta, St. Marys, Salem, Union, Washington and Wayne. The county population in 1850 was 11,341 and continued to increase each decade, growing to 28,100 by 1890. From 1850-1890, an overwhelming percentage of Auglaize County's population lived in either Duchouquet Township or St. Mary's Township. In 1890, 5,925 people were recorded in Duchouquet Township and 4,388 people were recorded in St. Mary's Township. By comparison, in 1890, the third most populous township in Auglaize County was German Township with 2,185 people and all other townships had less than 2,000 people.

Prior to the formation of Duchouquet Township, the land was part of the Shawnee reservation. Shawnee chiefs gathered at their council house in Wapakoneta. After removal of Shawnees from the reservation in the early 1830s, Duchouquet Township was established as part of the newly formed Allen County. Duchouquet Township became part of Auglaize County with its creation in 1848. Wapakoneta became the Auglaize County seat. Oil was found in Duchouquet Township and by 1898, the northern and northwestern sections of the Duchouquet Township were valuable oil territory (see *Section 3.6: The Great Oil Boom* for more information).

Wapakoneta, located in the southwest corner of Duchouquet Township, was official platted in 1833 and incorporated in March of 1849. By the end of the 19th-century, Wapakoneta was a thriving county seat with every variety of merchant and many manufacturing interests, including: the Wapakoneta Spoke and Wheel Works, the Bent Wood Churn Works, the Standard Churn Company, the Wapakoneta Handle Company, the Kreitzer Buggy Company, the Kolter and Koch Brewing Company, the J.W. Swing & Co., the Farmers' Milling Company, the Home Milling Company, and the Wapakoneta Machine Company.

Cridersville, located in the northeast corner of Duchouquet Township, was platted in 1856 by Ephriam Crider (Meyer 1917). The village benefitted from its location on the lines of the Cincinnati, Hamilton and Dayton Railroad and the Western Ohio Electric Railroad; and, the village benefitted from its location among adjacent oil fields (Meyer 1917). Portions of Cridersville fall within the APE.

Logan Township was organized in 1848 with the creation of Auglaize County. Fort Amanda, by 1848 already abandoned by the US government, is located in the northeast portion of Logan Township along the west bank of the Auglaize River. About 1.5-miles west of the proposed project, Fort Amanda falls within the

project's APE. Although Fort Amanda no longer exists, its former site is listed on the NRHP and is preserved as a state memorial park (see *Section 3.3 Fort Amanda* for more information).

Buckland is the only village in Logan Township. Buckland is located along the west bank of the Auglaize River in the southeast portion of Logan Township. Platted and organized in 1872, Buckland was originally known as White Feather. The name was change to Buckland in 1891, in honor of General Buckland of Fremont, Ohio who was one of the men that supported construction of the village's Lake Erie and Western Railroad station. By 1898, Buckland was the headquarters for oil company employees operating at the nearby Buckland Field. The oil industry brought considerable wealth to Buckland. Situated about 2.5-miles southeast of the proposed project, Buckland lies outside of the project's APE.

3.6 The Great Oil Boom

The subsequent material is summarized from *A Standard History of Allen County, Ohio* (Rusler 1921).

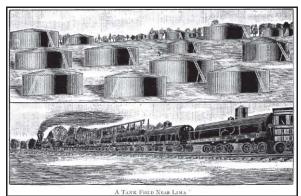
Oil was discovered in Ohio around 1819 near the Muskingum River; but, there was no market for oil and so no use was made of the product. Around 1858, oil became useful with the invention of the coal oil lamp. In 1869, George H. Bissell drilled for and tapped oil in Pennsylvania, igniting the oil industry.

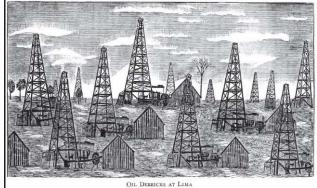
In 1885, Lima business man Benjamin Faurot brought in drillers from Pennsylvania to bore for natural gas at his factory on the east side of downtown Lima. Instead of natural gas, Faurot's drillers found oil. Within less than a year, Lima transformed from an agricultural trading center to a flourishing city founded on the oil industry.

In 1886, James A. Hover, who owned a large farm tract near Lima in Shawnee Township, leased 150 acres of his land to the Solar Refining Company. The Solar Refining Company was represented by their attorney, Mr. Keith, Frank Rockefeller, and F.B. Squires of Standard Oil. The Lima Field, as it became known, soon rivaled Pennsylvania's oil production; and, Standard Oil quickly established a headquarters in Lima.

The oil industry produced millions of dollars for Allen County, and at one time, the Lima Field was reportedly "the biggest oil territory in the world". In addition to the Solar Refining Company, Lima was home to the Buckeye Pipe Line Company and the Manhattan Oil Company. Prominent Lima businessmen in the oil industry included: Faurot, Jamieson, Brice, Baxter, Irvin, Waldorf, Metheany, and Morris. Thirty year leases were secured on nearly 5,000 acres of land in Allen County and fields were developed by Mr. Faurot, I.G. Hall, J.B. Townsend, F.E. Mead, G.P. Waldorf, and J.M Haller. The 1906 topographic map of Lima shows the concentration of oil tanks on the southwest side of Lima in Shawnee Township Sections 11-14 and 23 (Appendix A: Figure 9).

By 1921, little oil was actually being pumped from Allen County wells. But, the oil business continued to support Lima and Allen County as the refineries and oil-related businesses remained profitably operational.

3.7 A Review of Available Mapping

Prior to conducting field work, Kramb Consulting (Kramb) reviewed historical maps and atlases. For both Allen County and Auglaize County, there is an 1880 atlas which provides property owner information for each township. In addition to property owners, the 1880 atlas maps also depict the locations of buildings, roadways, railroads, streams, springs, orchards, schools, cemeteries, and other landmarks. Appendix A: Figure 10 provides an 1880 view of the Allen County, Shawnee Township sections within the APE. Appendix A: Figure 11 provides an 1880 plat of Hume which is the only community in Shawnee Township. Appendix A: Figure 12 provides an 1880 view of the Allen County, Amanda Township sections within the APE. Appendix A: Figure 13 is an 1880 view of the Auglaize County, Duchouquet Township sections within the APE. Appendix A: Figure 14 is an 1880 plat of Cridersville, which is the only Duchouquet Township community within the APE.

Kramb used information from Appendix A: Figures 8-14 to help guide field work as discussed in Section 4.2, below. Kramb also used the historical mapping to help determine the age of buildings within the APE and to help assess the NRHP eligibility of buildings within the APE. Appendix A: Figures 10, 12-13, and 15 circle buildings which are in the approximate location of existing architectural locations identified during field work that may have existed in 1880.

4.0 History/Architecture Survey Methodology

4.1 History/Architecture Survey Methodology Report

Prior to completing this history/architecture reconnaissance survey, a survey methodology report was submitted to the Ohio State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) for review and approval. The survey methodology report included the subsequent information:

- 1) A literature review for properties within a 5-mile buffer of the project area;
- 2) The results of the GIS view shed analysis;
- 3) An explanation of the project's area of potential effect (APE); and
- 4) The methodology for assessing the history/architecture resources within the APE.

The same literature review data presented in the survey methodology report is presented here in Section 2.2 above. The view shed analysis and explanation of the project's APE from the survey methodology report is summarized below.

4.1.1 Definition of the APE

Appendix A: Figure 7 is a project view shed map produced by Stantec in the fall of 2020. The mapped visibility indicates the theoretical visibility to a six-foot tall observer of solar panels ten feet in height above the existing terrain. The "more" or "less" visibility shown on the map is based solely on terrain and does not account for existing buildings, structures, or vegetation. Being that the proposed project is in northwest Ohio, the terrain is relatively flat. The topography does vary slightly along the waterways, especially along the Auglaize River which is located about 1.5-miles west of the closest proposed construction areas. The view shed analysis provided a starting point for determining the project's APE. For example, Appendix A: Figure 7 indicated that locations within and immediately adjacent to the proposed construction areas would likely be the most visible; and, within a 1-mile radius, the locations to the north and west would likely be less visible than locations to the south and east of the proposed construction areas.

The APE also considered the pattern of existing development. A review of the *USGS 7.5-Minute Series* (*Topographic*) *Cridersville*, *Ohio Quadrangle* (1961, Photo-Revised 1983) indicated that housing developments existed within 1,000-1,500 feet of some proposed construction areas (Appendix A: Figure 2). A quick search of Allen County Auditor records indicated that these housing developments contain residences constructed from the 1960s to the present. It was assumed that in these areas of suburban development, visibility of proposed solar arrays would be limited by intervening buildings.

Based on the topography only view shed analysis and existing development, the APE was expected to extend approximately ¾ to 2-miles from the proposed construction areas. Due to the density of existing housing, it was anticipated that the APE extended less than a mile north and east of the proposed construction areas. Due to the change in topography and vegetation along the Auglaize River, it was anticipated that the APE extended about 1-mile west of the proposed construction limits. The southeast corner of the APE was limited to about 1-mile from the proposed construction areas due to suburban development associated with the community of Cridersville. It was anticipated that the southern portion of the APE might extend 2-miles considering the rural development pattern and flat terrain. It was expected that the specific boundaries of the APE might change slightly during field work to account for existing development and features not otherwise known during the desktop review of available aerials and mapping.

4.1.2 Proposed Survey Methods

In a coordination letter dated February 2, 2021, the SHPO concurred with the following history/architecture survey methodology for the proposed Birch Solar project (Appendix E).

a) Identify, map, and field verify the location of all previously listed Ohio Historic Inventory (OHI) properties, all Determination of Eligibility (DOE) properties, all Ohio Genealogical Society (OGS) cemeteries, and all listed National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) properties and districts within a 2-mile radius of the proposed construction areas. Field verification will be completed from the public-right-of-way. A photograph will be taken of the resource, and a photograph will be taken towards the closest proposed solar array construction area to determine visibility potential.

- b) From the public right-of-way, conduct a history/architecture field reconnaissance of all properties with buildings over 50 years of age within the proposed APE as roughly shown on Appendix A: Figure 8. The field reconnaissance shall identify, map, and photograph all primary buildings over 50 years of age. For the suburban neighborhoods within the vicinities of Cridersville and Fort Shawnee, history/architecture resources will be looked at and photographed by neighborhood, street or geographical area (as appropriate) rather than reviewing and photographing every building within each suburban neighborhood. Generally, for these higher density areas, only the first few blocks nearest to the proposed solar arrays shall be evaluated.
- c) Complete a History/Architecture Survey Report. The survey report shall include a table of all resources with their OHI number (if applicable), address, year of construction, style/type, and a thumbnail photograph. Again, the suburban neighborhoods will be photographed and reported upon at the geographic, neighborhood or street level (whichever is most applicable) rather than on a building by building basis. The report shall include a general overview with select examples of buildings not eligible for the NRHP; but, the report will not specifically describe in detail each non-eligible property. The survey report will only describe in further detail those history/architecture resources identified as potentially eligible for the NRHP. New OHI forms will be completed only for those properties identified during the survey as potentially eligible. Existing OHI forms will not be updated unless the property has vastly changed since the original recordation. In addition to the inventory and discussion of history/architecture resources as outlined above, the completed survey report shall include an applicable historic context, the completed literature review and all other requisite sections to satisfy the SHPO and Section 106 requirements for history/architecture surveys.

4.2 History/Architecture Field Survey and Documentation Methodology

On January 9 and January 16, 2021, Kramb visited the project location and conducted field investigations employing methods outlined in the *Guidelines for Conducting History/Architecture Surveys in Ohio* (State Historic Preservation Office 2014) and the *Secretary of Interior's Standards and Guidelines for Archeology and Historic Preservation* (National Park Service, 1983). During field investigations, Kramb remained within the public right-of-way to review and photograph the exteriors of all buildings, structures, sites and objects (i.e. history/architecture resources) within the APE. Kramb photographed the existing history/architecture resources using a digital camera capturing images at resolutions and sizes in compliance with the SHPO digital imagery standards.

Kramb assigned a single architectural location (AL) number to each property within the APE which contained buildings over fifty years of age. Many architectural locations contain more than one building. In some cases, a single architectural location may be a farmstead which, for purposes of this report, is defined as a house, barn and at least one additional outbuilding like an accessory barn, garage, corn crib, or silo. All architectural locations are identified on the *USGS 7.5-Minute Series (Topographic) Cridersville, Ohio Quadrangle* (1961, Photo-Revised 1983) map sheets in Appendix C. The 1961 topographic map differentiates between buildings existing prior to 1961 (shown as black dots) and buildings existing after 1961 (shown as purple dots). Consequently, the 1961 topographic map aided in the identification of buildings over fifty years old. As noted in Section 3.7, above, the 1880 atlases also aided in the identification of buildings over fifty years of age. Furthermore, Kramb used the on-line records of the Allen County and Auglaize County auditors to verify ages of buildings within the APE.

Appendix D contains a table listing all of the architectural locations within the APE by architectural location (AL) number, address, and Universal Transverse Mercator (UTM). For each architectural location, there is at least one thumbnail photograph of the primary building. For many architectural locations, there is an additional thumbnail photograph of a barn. The table also provides a brief description of the primary building's style and type and an approximate construction date.

Due to the APE spanning an approximate 2-mile radius and containing hundreds of buildings, it was impractical to reconcile every auditor provided building date with available historical maps. When assessing the NRHP eligibility of resources (see Section 6.0, below), auditor provided construction dates were cross referenced with historical mapping if a resource was considered potentially eligible. Otherwise, the construction dates listed in Appendix D are the dates provided by the respective county auditor. In many instances these dates are slightly inaccurate, yet the dates still aid in identifying buildings over fifty years of age. For example, the Allen County Auditor applies 1920 as a generic construction date for buildings that appear "old". An analysis of historic maps and field observations reveal that many of the buildings identified as built in 1920 were more likely constructed between 1860 and 1910. In addition, the auditor's construction dates proved crucial in determining which of the APE's numerous mid-century buildings pre-dated 1971 and were thus over fifty years of age.

5.0 History/Architecture Survey Results

5.1 The Area of Potential Effect

As noted in Section 4.1.1 above, the area of potential effect (APE) was expected to extend approximately 2-miles beyond the project limits. It was anticipated that the APE may be reduced to the northeast and southeast where the 2-mile radius encroached upon the communities of Fort Shawnee and Cridersville, and that the APE would be slightly reduced to the west where the 2-mile radius stretched west of the Auglaize River. During field investigations, the APE was in fact reduced to less than a 2-mile radius in the vicinity of Fort Shawnee, Cridersville, and the Auglaize River as shown on Appendix A: Figure 8.

At the northeast corner of the APE, in the vicinity of Fort Shawnee, the APE is limited due to existing development. Appendix C: Maps Sheets F and G show areas of dense construction in this northeast corner along Shawnee Road and Breese Road. Because of these developments, most of which contain ranch type homes constructed from circa 1950-1980, the proposed solar arrays will not be visible beyond the first row of buildings in each development. Furthermore, field observations identified additional development constructed circa 1990-2020 which has occurred in former agricultural fields located between the proposed solar arrays and the circa 1950-1980 developments along Shawnee and Breese Roads. Vegetation along the Little Ottawa River also blocks views northeast of the proposed solar arrays.

At the southeast corner of the APE, in the vicinity of Cridersville, the APE is also limited due to existing development. Appendix C: Map Sheet A shows the density of construction in this southeast corner along Shawnee Road and National Road. Because of these developments, most of which contain ranch type homes constructed from circa 1950-1980, the proposed solar arrays will not be visible beyond the first row of buildings in each development. Views of the solar arrays from the southeast portion of the APE are also limited by existing vegetation which lines along the Little Ottawa River.

The Auglaize River generally marks the western edge of the APE. The distance of over 1.5-miles, the changes in elevation along the river, and the presence of dense, mature vegetation lining the river will obscure views of the proposed solar arrays from history/architecture resources west of the Auglaize River. Field investigations at the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) listed Fort Amanda confirmed the appropriateness of reducing the western edge of the APE to coincide with the Auglaize River.

5.2 Survey Approach

Architectural historian, Amy Kramb, conducted field investigations on January 9 and January 16, 2021. On January 9, 2021, fieldwork began in Auglaize County at the southeast corner of the APE in Cridersville and proceeded west along the southern portion of the APE in Auglaize County. Fieldwork moved north to complete investigations at the western edge of the APE within Auglaize County before proceeding back east through the center of the APE into Allen County. On January 16, 2021, fieldwork picked up in Allen County near the center of the APE in Hume and proceeded east before turning north and then back west to cover the remainder of the APE in Allen County. The architectural location numbers and map sheets in Appendix C align with this field survey route.

5.3 Architectural Locations Identified

Field investigations identified 486 architectural locations within the APE. A thumbnail photograph of the primary history/architecture resources at each architectural location is included in Appendix D. A summary of the types and styles of history/architecture resources identified within the APE is presented below.

5.3.1 House Types Identified

Not all homes within the APE have a discernable type, but the subsequent house types are the primary types identified within the APE. Following the brief description of each house type are a few images of typical homes of that type found within the APE.

Ranch: The ranch is a 1-story building which characteristically includes an attached garage incorporated into the main roofline. Some ranches are rectangular in plan with side-gabled roof lines while others are irregular in plan with hipped roof lines. The ranch gained popularity in the 1940s and is a style that continues to be constructed today. Most of the ranches in the APE were built between 1950 and 1980.

Duplex: Within the APE are several ranch type duplexes. These 2-unit residential dwellings are 1-story in height and have attached garages within the roofline. These duplexes were constructed between 1950 and 1980.







Cottage: The cottage is a common, post-World War II building which is 1-story in height with a rectangular plan and a side-gabled roof. The cottage is smaller in footprint than a ranch style building; and, it lacks the garage incorporated within a ranch's main roofline. Often times, garages have been later attached to the cottage type via breezeways. The cottage type was commonly constructed between 1945 and 1970.

Split-level: The split-level is similar to a ranch but has multiple levels or sections with heights varying from 1, 1.5 to 2-stories. Typically, the split-level has a lower level built partially below grade. Split-levels also commonly have an attached garage. The spilt-level was popular from the 1960s through the 1980s.







Two-Story: As the name implies, the Two-Story is two-stories in height and is a common house type constructed from the 1960s to the present.







Cape Cod: The Cape Cod is a 1.5-story building with a steeply pitched, side-gabled roof. Typically, the Cape Cod has prominent, front-gabled dormers; although, not all Cape Cod type homes in the APE have the characteristic dormers. The Cape Cod was typically constructed between circa 1925 and 1950.







Bungalow: The Dormer Front Bungalow is 1.5 to 2-stories in height and has side-facing gables. Characteristically, there is a front-facing gabled or shed roofed dormer; and, the front slope of the roof extends down to form the roof of a full-width porch. The Gable Front Bungalow is 1 to 1.5-stories in height and features a low-pitched roof with a front-facing gable. The Bungalow type was commonly constructed between 1905 and 1930.







American Four Square: The American Four Square is 2 to 2.5-stories in height and has a square (or nearly square) shape topped by a low, pyramidal hipped roof. Generally, the house has a slightly raised basement and there are stairs accessing a full-width, front porch. It is also common for this house type to have a central dormer. The American Four Square was popular between 1900 and 1925.

Four-over-Four: The Four-over-Four is 2 to 2.5-stories in height and has a rectangular plan with a side-gabled roof. As the name implies, the house generally has a plan of four rooms over four rooms. The Four-over-Four type was common between 1825 and 1870 and then again from 1910 to 1925.







Gabled Ell: The Gabled Ell may be 1 to 2-stories in height and has an intersecting gabled roof line. The cross-gable roof line is at the same height (as oppose to the Upright and Wing type house). The Gabled Ell may have an L-shaped plan or a T-shaped. The Gabled Ell is a post-Civil War house type commonly constructed between 1865 and 1885.







Hipped Ell: Throughout the APE there is a variant of the Gabled Ell which has a hipped rather than gabled roof. The house is 2-stories with an L-shaped or T-shaped plan. Like the Gabled Ell, the hipped variety was commonly constructed between 1865 and 1885.

I-House: The I-House is 2-stories in height and has a rectangular plan with a side-gabled roof. The house is typically two rooms wide and only one room deep. The Pre-Classic variety has a three-bay façade; whereas, the Classic I-House variety has a five-bay façade. The I-House was commonly constructed between 1820 and 1890.







5.3.2 House Styles Identified

Most of the buildings in the APE lack a particular architectural style. A few buildings in the APE did have some elements of various styles including: Queen Anne, Italianate, Gothic Revival, Tudor Revival, Greek Revival, Craftsman, and Mid-century modern.

Queen Anne Elements: Some homes within the APE have the characteristic asymmetrical massing and polygonal towers of the Queen Anne style.







Italianate Elements: A few homes within the APE have one or two elements of the Italianate style, such as: wide overhanging eaves with brackets, arched window openings, and tall, narrow window openings.







Tudor Revival Elements: Within the APE are a few buildings with Tudor style elements like the characteristic Tudor arch or ogee arched doorway, a prominent chimney, or a steep front-facing peaked gable extending over the entrance.







Gothic Revival Elements: Within the APE are two churches with Gothic Revival elements. Elements include: a steeply pitched gable roof, narrow lancet (pointed arch) window openings, stained glass windows, and a central tower.





Craftsman Elements: Common Craftsman style elements seen within the APE include: low-pitched roofs with projecting eaves, triangular knee braces, exposed rafter tails, multi-paned upper sash over single-pane lower sash windows, and full-width front porches with large porch columns.

Mid-Century Modern Elements: Common elements of mid-century modern seen within the APE include: low-pitched or flat roofs; roof overhangs; linear window designs; picture windows designed with operable awning, hopper, or casement type windows; and, recessed entryways







5.3.3 Barn Types Identified

Being that the majority of the APE is rural, there are numerous farmsteads within the APE. The farmsteads contain various types of barns. Thumbnail photographs of primary barns associated with architectural locations in the APE are included in Appendix D. Representative photographs of specific barn types found in the APE are included below.

Three Bay Barn: The Three Bay Barn is a rectangular building typically with a 2:1 length to width ratio. The barn almost always has central doors on the front and rear walls. Sometimes the common three bays are enlarged to four or five bays. The Three Bay Barn often has a side-gabled or a gambrel roof, but there are also examples of Three Bay Barn types with a round/arched roof in the APE.

Raised Basement Barn: The Raised Basement Barn is essentially a Three Bay Barn erected on a raised foundation. The raised foundation may be constructed of a stone, tile, or concrete and the foundation may be partially banked into a slope. Typically, the Raised Basement Barn is larger than the Three Bay Barn and often has five bays.

Erie Shore Barn: The Erie Shore Barn has a gambrel roof and off-center sliding doors on the long walls. Typically, this multi-purpose barn measures about 30 feet by 40 feet, and it usually has a characteristic hay hook protruding from one end.

Quonset: The Quonset, with its distinct semi-cylindrical form, is a pre-fabricated building produced from 1942 until about 1950. Newer variations of the Quonset form continued to be built after 1950.

5.3.4 Previously Documented Resources

National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) Listings: Within the APE is the NRHP-listed Fort Amanda (NR# 70000484). Within a 2-mile radius of the proposed construction areas, but outside of the APE, is the NRHP-listed Griffith Breese Farm (NR# 83001942).

- Fort Amanda is a district which contains four resources previously recorded on Ohio Historic Inventory (OHI) forms: AUG-001707-02 (AL 120), AUG-001708-02 (AL 118), AUG-001709-02 (AL 119), and AUG-001710-02 (AL 122). Within the Fort Amanda district boundary is also the Fort Amanda Cemetery (OGS #777). A visit to Fort Amanda confirmed that distance and the existing, dense vegetation lining the Auglaize River, will shield all views of the proposed solar arrays from the NRHP listed resources (Appendix A: Figure 16).
- The Griffith Breese Farm contains the Griffith Breese house and barn recorded as ALL-00031-07. A visit to the Griffith Breese Farm revealed that the house and barn (ALL-00031-07) remain intact, but the approximately 60 acres of surrounding farmland have been developed as the Shawnee-Breezewood Estates subdivision which contains thirty-nine single-family residences constructed in the early 2000s. The new subdivision is located south and west of ALL-00031-07, and the two-story homes shield all views further southwest towards the proposed solar arrays (Appendix A: Figure 19).

Determination of Eligibility (DOE) Properties: Within the APE is one DOE property which is located at 12153 Ritchie Road. As part of this survey, the DOE property was recorded on an OHI form as AUG-01724-03 (see Appendix B). The property was determined eligible for the NRHP under Criterion C during investigations for a proposed wind turbine project (State Historic Preservation Office Reference Number 2010-AUG-13562). A site visit confirmed that the house at 12153 Ritchie Road is extant and remains a significant example of architecture warranting NRHP eligibility under Criterion C. AUG-01724-03 is about 1.24-miles south of the nearest proposed solar array. Distance, and existing residences within wooded lots on the north side of National Road, will shield all views of the proposed solar arrays from AUG-01724-03 (Appendix A: Figure 17).

Ohio Historic Inventory (OHI) Locations: Within the APE there are nine architectural locations which were previously documented on OHI forms. The OHI forms are included in Appendix B. During the field survey, Kramb visited all previously recorded OHI properties to confirm their existence and to determine if the proposed solar arrays may be visible. Photographs of the locations are included in Table D.

- ALL-00703-06 (AL 135) was once the Antioch Church. The former church has been converted into
 a residence. ALL-00703-06 is located about 3,000-feet northwest of the nearest proposed solar
 arrays. Existing wooded lots at the northwest corner of this nearest proposed solar array should
 limit views of the array from ALL-00703-06. Without the existing trees, ALL-00703-06 will have
 views of the proposed arrays, although views will be minimized by the intervening 3,000-feet
 (Appendix A: Figure 18).
- **AUG-00255-02 (AL 93)** was a Pratt Truss Bridge constructed in circa 1902 and 1917. AUG-00255-02 is gone and a modern bridge now exists in this location.
- AUG-00256-02 (AL 80) was a Pratt Truss Bridge constructed in 1914. AUG-00256-02 is gone and a modern bridge now exists in this location.
- AUG-00257-02 (AL 96) was a Parker Truss Bridge constructed in 1913. AUG-00257-02 is gone
 and a modern bridge now exists in this location.
- AUG-00272-03 (AL 55) is a bridge constructed in circa 1874 and moved to the present location around 1920. The bridge is extant and in fair condition. The nearest proposed solar arrays are about one mile north of AUG-00272-03. Existing wooded, residential lots immediately south of the

proposed solar arrays should block views of the solar arrays from AUG-00272-03. Furthermore, the existing vegetation along Two Mile Creek shields views from AUG-00272-03 towards the project area (Appendix A: Figure 17).

- AUG-01707-02 (AL 120) is the Fort Amanda Large Picnic Shelter. The building is extant and is in good condition. AUG-01707-02 is situated within the forested area of Fort Amanda Memorial Park and is located about 1.67-miles east of the nearest proposed solar arrays. Due to the distance and the existing, dense vegetation lining the Auglaize River, there will be no view of the proposed solar arrays from AUG-01707-02 (Appendix A: Figure 16)
- AUG-01708-02 (AL 118) is the Fort Amanda Toilet Building. The building is extant and is in good condition. AUG-01708-02 is situated within the forested area of Fort Amanda Memorial Park and is located about 1.67-miles east of the nearest proposed solar arrays. Due to the distance and the existing, dense vegetation lining the Auglaize River, there will be no view of the proposed solar arrays from AUG-01708-02 (Appendix A: Figure 16).
- AUG-01709-02 (AL 119) is the Fort Amanda Grill Shelter. The building is extant and is in good condition. AUG-01709-02 is situated within the forested area of Fort Amanda Memorial Park and is located about 1.67-miles east of the nearest proposed solar arrays. Due to the distance and the existing, dense vegetation lining the Auglaize River, there will be no view of the proposed solar arrays from AUG-01709-02 (Appendix A: Figure 16).
- AUG-01710-02 (AL 122) is the Fort Amanda Monument. The object is extant and in excellent condition. AUG-01710-02 is situated within Fort Amanda Memorial Park and is located about 1.67-miles east of the nearest proposed solar arrays. Due to the distance and the existing, dense vegetation lining the Auglaize River, there will be no view of the proposed solar arrays from AUG-01710-02 (Appendix A: Figure 16).

There are two additional OHI properties that fall within a 2-mile radius of the proposed construction areas but lie outside of the APE: ALL-00031-07 and ALL-00501-07. Both of these OHI properties are located within in the community of Fort Shawnee more than 1.5-miles northeast of the proposed solar arrays. ALL-00031-07 and ALL-00501-07 were field verified and both were confirmed extant. Neither property will have a view of the proposed solar arrays due to distance and intervening buildings (Appendix A: Figure 19).

Ohio Genealogical Society (OGS) Cemeteries: With the APE, there are three previously documented cemeteries.

- OGS #759: Crawford-Romshe-Wheeler Cemetery (AL 59) is located about 1.4-miles from the nearest proposed solar arrays. Due to distance and to existing vegetation along Two-Mile Creek, there will be no view of the proposed solar arrays from Crawford-Romshe-Wheeler Cemetery (Appendix A: Figure 17).
- OGS#777: Fort Amanda Cemetery (AL 120) is located on the west bank of the Auglaize River about 1.7-miles west of the nearest proposed solar arrays. Due to the distance and the existing, dense vegetation lining the Auglaize River, there will be no view of the proposed solar arrays from Fort Amanda Cemetery (Appendix A: Figure 16).
- OGS #216: St. Matthews Lutheran Cemetery (AL 294) is located about 1,500-feet east of the
 nearest proposed solar arrays. The western end of the cemetery, which is nearest the proposed
 solar arrays, is the youngest portion of the cemetery and it continues to be used as an active burial

ground. The original, and oldest, portion of the cemetery is located about 2,700-feet east of the nearest proposed solar arrays. The St. Matthews Lutheran Church building will block views of the proposed solar arrays from within the oldest sections of the cemetery; however, portions of the cemetery on the north and west sides of St. Matthews Lutheran Church will likely have views of the proposed solar arrays (Appendix A: Figure 20).

There is one additional OGS Cemetery that falls within a 2-mile radius of the proposed construction areas, but it lies outside of the APE: **OGS #215 Shawnee Cemetery**. Shawnee Cemetery is located within the community of Fort Shawnee, on the east bank of the Little Ottawa River, about 1.75-miles northeast of the proposed solar arrays. Distance, intervening buildings, and existing vegetation will prevent any view of the proposed solar arrays (Appendix A: Figure 19).

6.0 Analysis and Recommendations

6.1 National Register Review Criteria

The National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) Criteria for Evaluation states:

"The quality of significance in American history, architecture, archaeology, engineering, and culture is present in districts, sites, buildings, structures, and objects that possess integrity of location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling, association and;

- A. That are associated with events that have made a significant contribution to the broad patterns of our history; or
- B. That are associated with the lives of persons significant in our past; or
- C. That embody the distinctive characteristics of a type, period, or method of construction, or that represent the work of a master, or that possess high artistic values, or that represent a significant and distinguishable entity whose components may lack individual distinction; or
- D. That yielded or may be likely to yield, information important in prehistory or history." (National Park Service 1990)

6.2 Assessing National Register Eligibility

Criterion A: Compilation of the historic context revealed that events which significantly contributed to the history of the area of potential effect (APE) centered upon the subsequent themes: Fort Amanda and its importance as a supply depot and transportation hub during the War of 1812; the Native American presence in the APE both before and during their settlement of the reservation; oil drilling, refining and associated industries which brought people and wealth to the APE; and, agriculture, which prior to and after the oil boom remained an important part of the APE's economy.

Criterion B: The available histories provide names of early settlers, list individuals involved in local government, and highlight prominent businessmen from the 1880s through the early 1900s. The surnames of these individuals are seen on historical maps, like those in Appendix A: Figures 10-15. Many of the surnames are also used as road names in the APE, such as, Coon Road, Breese Road, Kemp Road, and Sunderland Road. Since the reconnaissance survey recorded 486 architectural locations, it was impractical for Kramb Consulting (Kramb) to track the ownership history of every architectural location within the APE.

Therefore, if architectural locations identified in the APE retained sufficient integrity, then Kramb consulted the early histories and maps to determine if any of those architectural locations were connected to significant individuals. Appendix A: Figures 10, 12-13, and 15 are 1880 atlas maps with property owners and building locations; circled on these figures are building locations which coincide with existing architectural locations which may date to 1880.

Criterion C: As noted in Section 5.3.1, above, the APE contains about a dozen common building types and about a half-dozen building styles. Comparing the 486 architectural locations to each other and to the surrounding context, Kramb sought to identify those architectural locations which retained sufficient integrity and were unique or significant representations of architecture warranting NRHP eligibility. Many of the buildings within the APE have lost integrity of design, workmanship, and materials due to typical alterations such as: the application of vinyl siding to exterior walls, the replacement of original windows, and the attachment of additions. Many of the buildings within the APE retain integrity but are common, insignificant building types found in abundance throughout the area.

Criterion D: This reconnaissance survey focused on above-ground history/architecture resources. Archaeological investigations have commenced and will be documented in a separate report. Consequently, this history/architecture report does not address NRHP Eligibility Criterion D.

6.3 Findings

The reconnaissance survey recorded 486 architectural locations. These architectural locations are mapped in Appendix C and summarized in Appendix D. Of the 486 architectural locations, the following are either already listed on the NRHP, have already been determined eligible for the NRHP, or are being recommended eligible for the NRHP as a result of this survey.

6.3.1 National Register Listed and Eligible

Within the APE, the following six architectural locations are already listed on the NRHP (Appendix C: Map Sheet D):

- Fort Amanda (AL 123) is a NRHP district (NR #70000484) located about 1.67-miles east of the nearest proposed solar arrays. Due to the distance and the existing, dense vegetation lining the Auglaize River, there will be no view of the proposed solar arrays from within the district (Appendix A: Figure 16).
- AUG-01707-02 (AL 120) is the Fort Amanda Large Picnic Shelter listed as within the boundaries of
 the NRHP listed Fort Amanda (NR #70000484). The building is extant and is in good condition.
 AUG-01707-02 is situated within the forested area of Fort Amanda Memorial Park and is located
 about 1.67-miles east of the nearest proposed solar arrays. Due to the distance and the existing,
 dense vegetation lining the Auglaize River, there will be no view of the proposed solar arrays from
 AUG-01707-02 (Appendix A: Figure 16).
- AUG-01708-02 (AL 118) is the Fort Amanda Toilet Building listed as within the boundaries of the NRHP listed Fort Amanda (NR #70000484). The building is extant and is in good condition. AUG-01708-02 is situated within the forested area of Fort Amanda Memorial Park and is located about 1.67-miles east of the nearest proposed solar arrays. Due to the distance and the existing, dense

vegetation lining the Auglaize River, there will be no view of the proposed solar arrays from AUG-01708-02 (Appendix A: Figure 16).

- AUG-01709-02 (AL 119) is the Fort Amanda Grill Shelter listed as within the boundaries of the NRHP listed Fort Amanda (NR #70000484). The building is extant and is in good condition. AUG-01709-02 is situated within the forested area of Fort Amanda Memorial Park and is located about 1.67-miles east of the nearest proposed solar arrays. Due to the distance and the existing, dense vegetation lining the Auglaize River, there will be no view of the proposed solar arrays from AUG-01709-02 (Appendix A: Figure 16).
- AUG-01710-02 (AL 122) is the Fort Amanda Monument listed as within the boundaries of the NRHP listed Fort Amanda (NR #70000484). The object is extant and in excellent condition. AUG-01710-02 is situated within Fort Amanda Memorial Park and is located about 1.67-miles east of the nearest proposed solar arrays. Due to the distance and the existing, dense vegetation lining the Auglaize River, there will be no view of the proposed solar arrays from AUG-01710-02 (Appendix A: Figure 16).
- Fort Amanda Cemetery- OGS #777 (AL 121) is listed as within the boundaries of the NRHP listed Fort Amanda (NR #70000484) which is located about 1.67-miles east of the nearest proposed solar arrays. Due to the distance and the existing, dense vegetation lining the Auglaize River, there will be no view of the proposed solar arrays from within the cemetery (Appendix A: Figure 16).

Within the APE, the following architectural location is already a Determination of Eligibility property.

• AUG-01724-03 (AL 65): A site visit confirmed that the house at 12153 Ritchie Road is extant (Appendix C: Map Sheet B). The house remains a significant example of architecture warranting NRHP eligibility under Criterion C. As part of this survey, the DOE property was recorded as AUG-01724-03. The OHI form is in Appendix B. AUG-01724-03 is about 1.25-miles south of the nearest proposed solar arrays. Distance, and existing residences within wooded lots on the north side of National Road, will shield all views of the proposed solar arrays from AUG-01724-03 (Appendix A: Figure 17).

6.3.2 Potentially Eligible Architectural Locations

Based on preliminary research and a review of buildings from the public right-of-way, Kramb finds the following architectural locations potentially eligible for individual listing to the NRHP:

AUG-00272-03 (AL **55):** AUG-00272-03 is a bowstring bridge which was constructed in 1874 and moved to its current location in the 1920s. AUG-00272-03 is a single span of a three span bridge that once spanned the nearby Auglaize River. When the bridge over the Auglaize River was replaced in the early 1920s, AUG-00272-03 was saved and moved to its current location for use on a private farm lane over Two Mile Creek. According to the Ohio Bridge Association, AUG-00272-03 is a rare example of David H. Morrison's 1867 patent (reissued in 1871); there is only one other bridge of this design remaining in Ohio. Although in fair condition, AUG-00272-03 retains integrity of materials, design, and workmanship. Despite AUG-00272-03 being moved from its original location, the bridge has been at its current location for about 100 years. AUG-00272-03 retains integrity of setting, feeling, and association as it remains functioning as a bridge over a waterway. AUG-00272-03 is recommended eligible for the NRHP under Criterion C as a surviving example of the Morrison Patent Wrought Iron Arch Truss Bridge type built by Dayton's Columbia Bridge Works

throughout the Midwest in the late 1800s. A letter from the Ohio Bridge Association emphasizing the importance of AUG-00272-03 is included in Appendix E.

AUG-00272-03 is located on the west side of S. Wapakoneta Road (State Route 501) between National Road and Ritchie Road (Appendix C: Map Sheet B). The nearest proposed solar arrays are about 1-mile north of AUG-00272-03. Existing wooded, residential lots immediately south of the proposed solar arrays should block views of the solar arrays from AUG-00272-03. Furthermore, the existing vegetation along Two Mile Creek shields views from AUG-00272-03 towards the northwest (Appendix A: Figure 17).





ALL-00703-06 (AL 135): Constructed circa 1887, ALL-00703-06 is a wood-framed, rural church building which now serves as a single-family residence. The exterior of the building retains integrity of materials, design, and workmanship. The only addition is a 1-story, screened porch attached to the rear of the building. Despite vinyl siding applied to the exterior, the original wood trim and details remain exposed. The church's steeple with original bell is intact. ALL-00703-06 has its original lancet windows with stained glass. A new door has been installed in the front entry, but it has not altered the size or configuration of the original entryway; the entryway trim and lancet window are intact. ALL-00703-06 is potentially eligible for the NRHP under Criterion C as a significant example of a relatively unaltered late-1800s rural church with Gothic Revival elements.

Located at 7301 Fort Amanda Road, ALL-00703-06 is about 3,000 feet northwest of the nearest proposed solar arrays (Appendix C: Map Sheet H). Existing wooded lots at the northwest corner of this nearest proposed solar arrays should limit views of the arrays from ALL-00703-06. Without the existing trees, ALL-00703-06 may have views of the solar arrays, although views will be minimized by the intervening 3,000 feet (Appendix A: Figure 18).





ALL-00721-07 (AL 164): The Quonset was a building type developed for use by the US military during World War II (WW II). After the war, surplus Quonset buildings were sold to civilians. Often times, the buildings were modified and adapted for use as agricultural or commercial buildings. Since WW II, there have been numerous variations of arched/doomed buildings developed for private, agricultural and industrial uses. But, the original military design remains unique. ALL-00721-07 is an example of a WW II-era Quonset design from circa 1940s. The building has its original exterior metal walls, original windows, and original doors. There are no additions or substantial alterations to this building. Retaining integrity of materials, design, and workmanship, ALL-00721-07 is potentially eligible for the NRHP under Criterion C as a significant representation of the US military's Quonset type building which has been repurposed in a civilian setting.

ALL-00721-07 is located on the south side of Norfolk Street near S. Wapakoneta Road (State Route 501) (Appendix C: Figure E-1). The nearest proposed solar arrays are about 1,600 feet north of ALL-00721-07; however, views of the solar arrays to the north shall be blocked by existing, intervening residences. Additional solar arrays are proposed about 2,400 feet west of ALL-00721-07. There are no intervening buildings to block views of these solar arrays west of ALL-00721-07 (Appendix A: Figure 21).



ALL-00726-07 (AL 198): ALL-00726-07 is a farmstead with a Colonial Revival style residence and a Three Bay Barn. A building appears in this location on the 1880 atlas upon the property of Mary C. Bowsher. The Allen County Auditor provides a generic construction date of 1920 for the existing building on this property. The Colonial Revival style did not become popular until about 1895 and remains a popular style even today. Consequently, it is unclear whether the existing residence replaced a previous building on this location, or whether an original building at this located was altered to the existing Colonial Revival style. Regardless of a specific age, as existing, ALL-00726-07 is a significant example of the Colonial Revival style. ALL-00726-07 has the characteristic elaborate portico, a 2-story wrap-around porch, a porte cochere, large double hung windows with shutters, Palladian windows, and fanlights. The 2-story, Gabled Ell type building has a T-shaped plan. The exterior walls are clad in vinyl siding and the roof is clad in asphalt shingles. On the east elevation is an exterior, brick chimney. The associated Three Bay Barn has only one, small, shed roofed addition; otherwise, the barn maintains integrity of materials, design, and workmanship. Also associated with ALL-00726-07 are two, detached garages. View of the garages are limited from the right-of-way; although, the buildings appear to be in good condition. Compared to other farmsteads in the APE, ALL-00726-07 has a house, barn, and garages in good condition with a high degree of integrity. Materials, design, workmanship, setting, feeling, association, and location are all preserved. Therefore,

ALL-00726-07 is potentially eligible for the NRHP under Criterion C as a significant example of a farmstead with a Colonial Revival style residence and a Three Bay Barn.

ALL-00726-07 is located at 4595 W. Hume Road (Appendix C: Map Sheet E). ALL-00726-07 will be in full view of solar arrays proposed for installation directly across the street from ALL-00726-07 on the north side of Hume Road (Appendix A: Figure 22).





ALL-00722-07 (**AL 331**): ALL-00722-07 is a Tudor style residence constructed circa 1910. The non-discernable type building has an asymmetrical plan. The exterior of the 1.5-story building is clad in beveled wood siding and the roof is clad in asphalt shingles. The south façade has a steep, front-facing peaked gable extended over the protruding front entrance. The building's east side has a steeply pitched cross gable extended over a bay window. Also on the building's east side is an exterior, brick chimney. The glass-enclosed front sunroom is original. The building appears to have a variety of original window types. Associated with the residence are two garages, both of which are designed similarly to the house with a steep, front-facing gable. Complete views of the residence and outbuildings were limited from the public right-of-way; however, the property seems to retain all aspects of integrity. There are few buildings within the APE which represent a particular style and retain integrity. Most of the buildings in the immediately vicinity of ALL-00722-07 are ranch style homes constructed circa 1950-1980. Consequently, ALL-00722-07 is potentially eligible for the NRHP under Criterion C as a significant representation of a single-family residential building with Tudor style elements.

ALL-00722-07 is located at 2710 W. Breese Road (Appendix C: Map Sheet G). The nearest proposed solar arrays are about 1.17-miles and 1.38-miles southwest of ALL-00722-07. Existing, dense, residential development will obscure all views of the solar arrays from ALL-00722-07 Appendix A: Figure 23).





ALL-00723-06 (AL 432): ALL-00723-06 is a Gabled Ell type house constructed circa 1860s-1880s. The building, which has a cross-shaped plan, is two stories in height. The building has a stone foundation and brick exterior walls laid in a running bond pattern. The window openings contain replacement windows but the openings maintain their original size. The window openings also retain their original sandstone sills and lintels with stone brackets. The eaves retain their original wood molding. There are two, open porches. There is a front porch in the southwest corner of the building and a rear porch in the southeast corner of the building. Across the rear, east side of the building is a one-story, wood-framed addition. There is a brick chimney, off-center within the roof slope. Overall, the building is in good condition and maintains integrity of materials, design, and workmanship. The property has lost some integrity of setting with the demolition of various outbuildings, but the house retains integrity of feeling and association as it remains located on a large parcel in a rural setting. Compared to other buildings of similar age and type within the APE, ALL-00723-06 is remarkably unchanged. ALL-00723-06 is potentially eligible for the NRHP under Criterion C as a significant example of a vernacular style, Gabled Ell type farmhouse from the late 1800s.

ALL-00723-06 is located at 2501 Coon Road (Appendix C: Map Sheet H). The nearest proposed solar arrays are about 1.36-miles southeast of ALL-00723-06. Distance, existing vegetation, and existing buildings should block all views of the solar arrays from ALL-00723-06 (Appendix A: Figure 24).





ALL-00724-07 (AL 484): ALL-00724-07 includes a Craftsman style, Dormer Front Bungalow type residence. According to the Allen County Auditor and available mapping, the house was constructed in 1926. The front of the home faces east towards the driveway rather than south towards Fort Amanda Road. The house is 1.5-stories and has a rock-faced concrete block foundation. From a distance, the exterior siding appears to be vinyl and the windows are 1/1. Across the east façade is a full-width porch with brick columns and an enclosed brick rail. The east-facing, front-gabled dormer contains three 1/1 windows. The house has overhanging eaves with wooden knee brackets. Associated with the house is a two-car garage designed with a pyramidal, hipped roof and a front-gabled dormer that contains two, 1/1 windows. Also on the property is a Three Bay Barn designed with a gambrel roof clad in asphalt shingles. The barn is minimally altered. The original center entry doors and original windows remain intact. And, the exterior walls are clad in the original, vertical wood siding. The only addition is a 1-story, side-gabled, open-bay section at the north end of the barn. Compared to other farmsteads in the APE, ALL-00724-07 has a house, barn, and garage in good condition with a high degree of integrity. Materials, design, workmanship, setting, feeling, association, and location are all preserved. Therefore, ALL-00724-07 is potentially eligible to the NRHP under Criterion C as a significant example of a rural farmstead with a Craftsman style, Dormer Front Bungalow and Three Bay Barn.

ALL-00724-07 is located at 5490 Fort Amanda Road (Appendix C: Map Sheet H). The nearest proposed solar arrays are about 4,700 feet southwest of ALL-00724-07. Distance and existing, intervening, dense residential development will block all views of the solar arrays (Appendix A: Figure 25).





ALL-00725-07 (AL 485): According to the Allen County Auditor and available mapping, this house was constructed in 1925. The house has a rectangular plan, a non-discernable building type, and an eclectic design mixing Craftsman and Colonial Revival style elements from the 1920s with the older style of Greek Revival. The building is 1.5-stories, with a concrete foundation, exterior walls clad in aluminum siding, and a side-gabled roof clad in asphalt shingles. Centered on the south façade is a 1-story, 1-bay wide, front-gabled porch with paired, round columns. Both the main roof and the porch roof feature corner returns. The south façade has an original center entry door with original sidelights. Flanking the center entry are symmetrical, three-part, original windows which have a center 10/1 window flanked by 6/1 windows. Associated with the house is a detached garage. Although only partially visible from the right-of-way, the garage appears to be constructed at the same time and with the same elements as the house. Located at the rear of the property is a chicken coop which retains its original design and materials including its 6/6 windows. The majority of buildings in the APE lack stylistic details and many have lost integrity of materials, design, and workmanship due to alterations and additions. By comparison, ALL-00725-07 is a unique example of relatively unaltered buildings with a mix of stylistic elements. Therefore, ALL-00725-07 is recommended potentially eligible for the NRHP under Criterion C.

ALL-00725-07 is located at 5040 Fort Amanda Road (Appendix C: Map Sheet H). The nearest proposed solar arrays are about one mile south of ALL-00725-07. Distance and existing, intervening, dense residential development will block all views of the solar arrays from ALL-00725-07 (Appendix A: Figure 25).





6.3.3 Potentially Eligible District

Within the APE is the unincorporated community of Hume. Neither the 1880 nor the 1921 atlases for Allen County provide much information on Hume; both atlases mention that Hume was the only community in Shawnee Township and note that Hume is situated along the Lake Erie & Western Railroad line, which was completed through the APE in 1872 (Walsh 1898). In 1880, Hume contained a post office, two stores, a warehouse, a blacksmith shop, and a steam sawmill (Harrison 1880). The 1880 plat of Hume shows seventy-nine lots sparsely populated; there is a school and about one dozen buildings (Appendix A: Figure 11). As the first stop southwest of Lima along the Lake Erie and Western Railroad, Hume likely benefitted from the Lima oil industry which blossomed when oil was found in Shawnee Township in 1885. Hume is only three miles east of where the Solar Refining Company leased a 150-acre tract and started production which spurred the development of a Standard Oil headquarters in Lima. According to the topographic quadrangle, by 1909 Hume contained about forty buildings; one of which was a church and another of which was a school (Appendix A: Figure 26).

Field investigations found that the community of Hume remains largely intact with approximately 30 residences and a church. The school house no longer exists. And, although the railroad line remains active through the community, no railroad station or other railroad-related buildings remain. Many, small, rural communities which once existed along Ohio's early railroad lines disappeared when railroad stations discontinued. Hume, however, remains remarkably similar to the community it was in 1909.

The community of Hume contains 35 architectural locations: AL 157-158 and AL 164 through AL 193 (see Appendix A: Figure 27 and Appendix C: Map Sheet E-1). Photographs of each architectural location are included in Appendix D. Included among the architectural locations is the Hume United Methodist Church (AL 172), which was constructed in 1895 and appears on the 1909 topographic map. There are two buildings located on the east side of S. Wapakoneta Road which are later additions to the community; these buildings, although presently associated with Hume, are not within the community's original plat (Appendix A: Figure 11). AL 162 is a commercial/industrial building erected circa 1950 and AL 163 is a fire station constructed circa 1960.

The majority of buildings in Hume are in fair to good condition. Most of the buildings have lost integrity of materials, design, and workmanship due to additions and common alterations such as the application of vinyl siding to exterior walls and the replacement of windows. With the exception of ALL-00721-07 (a Quonset type building), none of the buildings in Hume are individually considered significant representations of architectural style or type. But, collectively, the buildings in Hume do retain integrity of location, setting, feeling, and association. As a whole, the buildings represent the survival of a small, rural, railroad community which originated around 1872, boomed after 1885, and continue to exist similar to its 1910 form for 110 years now.

The initial reconnaissance survey indicates that the community of Hume may be a potential historic district eligible for the NRHP under Criterion A as a significant representation of a surviving, rural, railroad community possibly associated with the oil boom in Allen County. However, the scope of this reconnaissance survey does not include the determination of district boundaries and the identification of all contributing and non-contributing resources within a district. Additional research on the community of Hume, its occupants, and its relation to or association with the area's oil industry is necessary in order to fully evaluate significance and integrity of buildings within the proposed district.

Located at the intersection of W. Hume Road and S. Wapakoneta Road (State Route 501) in Shawnee Township, Allen County, the community of Hume will have views of solar arrays to the north, east, and west. Solar arrays are proposed in agricultural fields about 0.45-mile west of Hume, 0.13-mile north of Hume, and 0.52-mile east of Hume. Regardless of specifically identified NRHP boundaries, any identified historic district within the limits of Hume will have views of proposed solar arrays (Appendix A: Figure 28).

6.3.4 Non-Eligible Locations Warranting Further Explanation

The following architectural locations warrant further explanation as to why the resources were considered ineligible for the NRHP.

OGS #759: Crawford-Romshe-Wheeler Cemetery (AL 59)

This cemetery is located at the southwest corner of S. Wapakoneta Road (State Route 501) and Ritchie Road (Appendix C: Map Sheet B). The inactive cemetery appears to be a small, family burial ground with less than two-dozen headstones. Most of the headstones, which date to the mid-to-late 1800s, are weathered and illegible. According to the *Atlas of Auglaize County, Ohio: From Records & Original Surveys* (Howland 1880), in 1880 the cemetery was on a 100-acre parcel owned by Justus Romshe (Appendix A: Figure 13). Justus Romshe was born on September 2, 1852 to George and Mary Romshe at the family farm on Ritchie Road (AUG-01724-03). In 1874, Justus married Rebecca Shaffer and they raised two children. Engaged in farming his whole life, Justus also prospered from oil found on his property. Justus dug his first well in 1887 and by 1898 had eleven producing wells on his property (Walsh 1898).

Ordinarily, cemeteries are not considered eligible for the NRHP unless the cemetery "derives its primary importance from graves of persons of transcendent importance, from age, from distinctive design features, or from association with historic events" (National Park Service 1990). The Crawford-Romshe-Wheeler cemetery does contain graves dating to the mid-1880s; however, so do most cemeteries in this area. Also, there is no indication that the persons buried in the cemetery are of transcendent importance, and the cemetery lacks distinctive design features. Therefore, the Crawford-Romshe-Wheeler Cemetery is not considered eligible for the NRHP.

OGS #216: St. Matthews Lutheran Cemetery (AL 294)

This cemetery is located on the north side of Hume Road between Shawnee Road and Beeler Road (Appendix C: Map Sheet F). The oldest portion of the cemetery appears on the 1880 atlas upon a 42-acre parcel owned by Abraham Crider (Appendix A: Figure 10). Over the years, the cemetery has expanded with newer sections located to the north and west of St. Matthews Lutheran Church. According to the church's website (St. Matthews Lutheran Church 2020), burials within St. Matthews Cemetery range from 1837 to the present; and, many of the founding members of the church are buried in the cemetery. The cemetery contains family members of early settlers with the surnames of DeLong, Mowery, Shappell, Bowsher, Reichelderfer, Brandt, Lower, Moyer, Crider, Spyker, Sellers, and Meffley. The existing St. Matthews Lutheran Church building (AL 295) on the property was constructed in 1966 and replaces the former church building identified on the 1880 atlas.

As noted above, ordinarily cemeteries are not considered eligible for the NRHP unless the cemetery "derives its primary importance from graves of persons of transcendent importance, from age, from distinctive design features, or from association with historic events" (National Park Service 1990). Additional research is necessary to learn whether or not St. Matthews Lutheran Cemetery contains "persons of transcendent importance". The cemetery does contain many older burials, but again, there are

other cemeteries in the area with burials just as old or older. For example, the burials at Fort Amanda Cemetery date back to the War of 1812. And, initial research suggests that there may be Native American burials adjacent to or associated with older sections of the Shawnee Cemetery (OGS #215) located about two miles north of St. Matthews Lutheran Cemetery. Consequently, based on initial research for this reconnaissance level survey, St. Matthews Lutheran Cemetery is not recommended eligible for the NRHP.

6.3.5 Architectural Locations Not Evaluated

During field investigations, Kramb reviewed all properties from the public right-of-way. Generally, at least two or three sides of all primary buildings were visible. In some instances, buildings were located away from the street such that views were limited. The Auglaize County Auditor did not have photographs associated with its online data; but, the Allen County Auditor did have at least one photograph of most primary buildings on a parcel. When available, Kramb used auditor information and aerial images to help locate and evaluate buildings that were difficult to view from the public right-of-way. There were, however, four architectural locations which Kramb was unable to evaluate for NRHP eligibility because there were no views of the buildings from the public right-of-way and there was minimal supplemental data. At this point in the project, access has not been granted to these four properties.

Following are the four architectural locations within the APE that were not evaluated for NRHP.

- AL 103 is located at 11252 Zerkle Road (Appendix C: Map Sheet D). The auditor indicates that this property contains a bungalow type residence constructed in 1935. The residence is situated within a densely wooded lot about 950 feet south of the right-of-way. During field investigations, the residence was barely visible among the grove of deciduous trees. Auditor information and aerial images confirm that the main building measures 28-feet by 26-feet. Attached to the building's east side is an enclosed porch addition. Attached to the east side of the enclosed porch is another addition which connects the main house to a garage. The auditor notes that the addition was constructed in 1997 and that garages were constructed in 2008 and 2012. With the existing vegetation on the parcel, the solar arrays may not be visible; however, without the existing vegetation, the solar arrays will be visible at only 950-feet away (Appendix A: Figure 29).
- AL 109 is located at 22123 State Route (SR) 198 (Appendix C: Map Sheet D). The auditor indicates that this property contains a split-level type residence constructed in 1965. The residence is situated within a densely wooded lot about 530 feet northwest of the right-of-way. Distance, existing vegetation, and intervening buildings will block views from the nearest proposed solar arrays which are about 1.4-miles east of AL 109 (Appendix A: Figure 29).
- AL 452 is located at 3180 S. Grubb Road (Appendix A: Map Sheet I). The auditor indicates that this property contains a ranch type residence constructed in 1967. A circa 2008 photograph provided by the auditor indicates that the ranch has a mid-century modern design with a flat roof and exterior walls clad in vertical wood siding. The residence is situated within a densely wooded lot about 1,200-feet west of the public right-of-way. Distance, existing vegetation, and intervening buildings will block views from the nearest proposed solar arrays which are about 1.2-miles southeast of AL 452 (Appendix A: Figure 29).
- AL 470 is located at 3333 S. Sunderland Road (Appendix A: Map Sheet I). The auditor indicates that this property contains a log cabin constructed in 1961. A circa 2008 photograph provided by the auditor indicates that the 1-story cabin has a front-gabled roof which protrudes forward over an open porch with a poured concrete deck. The cabin is situated within a densely wooded lot about 1,200-feet east of the public right-of-way. Distance, existing vegetation, and intervening buildings

will block views from the nearest proposed solar arrays which are about 1.4-miles southeast of AL 470 (Appendix A: Figure 29).

6.4 Conclusions

In summary, Kramb completed history/architecture field investigations on January 9 and January 16, 2021 to identify history/architecture resources listed on or eligible for the NRHP which may be impacted by the construction of the proposed Birch Solar project. During field investigations, **Kramb identified 486 architectural locations with the APE**.

Of the architectural locations identified, Kramb recommends that the following **eight locations are potentially eligible for the NRHP**:

- AUG-00272-03 (AL 55): AUG-00272-03 is recommended eligible for the NRHP under Criterion C
 as a surviving example of the Morrison Patent Wrought Iron Arch Truss Bridge type built by
 Dayton's Columbia Bridge Works throughout the Midwest in the late 1800s.
- **ALL-00703-06 (AL 135):** ALL-00703-06 is potentially eligible for the NRHP under Criterion C as a significant example of a relatively unaltered late-1800s rural church with Gothic Revival elements.
- **ALL-00721-07 (AL 164):** ALL-00721-07 is potentially eligible for the NRHP under Criterion C as a significant representation of the US military's Quonset type building repurposed in a civilian setting.
- ALL-00726-07 (AL 198): ALL-00726-07 is potentially eligible for the NRHP under Criterion C as a significant example of a rural farmstead with a Colonial Revival style residence and a Three Bay Barn.
- **ALL-00722-07 (AL 331):** ALL-00722-07 is potentially eligible for the NRHP under Criterion C as a significant representation of a single-family residential building with Tudor style elements.
- **ALL-00723-06 (AL 432):** ALL-00723-06 is potentially eligible for the NRHP under Criterion C as a significant example of a vernacular style, Gabled Ell type farmhouse from the late 1800s.
- ALL-00724-07 (AL 484): ALL-00724-07 is potentially eligible to the NRHP under Criterion C as a significant example of a rural farmstead with a Craftsman style, Dormer Front Bungalow and a Three Bay Barn.
- ALL-00725-07 (AL 485): ALL-00725-07 is recommended potentially eligible for the NRHP under Criterion C as a unique example of a relatively unaltered residence and outbuildings with a mix of stylistic elements.

In addition to the eight architectural locations found potentially eligible as part of this survey, the APE also contains the following seven architectural locations previously listed on or determined eligible for the NRHP:

- AUG-01724-03 (AL 65) Determination of Eligibility (DOE) 12513 Ritchie Road
- AUG-01708-02 (AL 118) Fort Amanda Toilet Building
- AUG-01709-02 (AL 119) Fort Amanda Grill Shelter
- AUG-01707-02 (AL 120) Fort Amanda Large Picnic Shelter
- Fort Amanda Cemetery-OGS #777 (AL 121)
- AUG-01710-02 (AL 122) Fort Amanda Monument; and,
- Fort Amanda NR #70000484 (AL 123).

Furthermore, field investigations identified **one potential district within the APE**. The initial reconnaissance survey indicates that the community of Hume may be a potential historic district eligible for the NRHP under Criterion A as a significant representation of a surviving, rural, railroad community possibly associated with the oil boom in Allen County. The **community of Hume contains 35 architectural locations: AL 157-158 and AL 164 through AL 193**. However, the scope of this reconnaissance survey does not include the determination of district boundaries and the identification of all contributing and noncontributing resources within a district. Additional research on the community of Hume, its occupants, and its relation to or association with the area's oil industry is necessary in order to fully evaluate significance and integrity of buildings within the proposed district.

Of the 486 architectural locations identified within the APE, the following **four were not evaluated** for NRHP because the buildings were not visible from the public right-of-way due to distance and existing vegetation: **AL 103, AL 109, AL 452, and AL 470**.

In conclusion, knowing that the height of the proposed solar arrays shall not exceed ten feet in height and the associated fencing shall not exceed seven feet in height, it is anticipated that the following architectural locations may be impacted by views of the proposed solar arrays.

- ALL-00726-07 (AL 198): ALL-00726-07 will be in full view of solar arrays proposed for installation directly across the street (Appendix A: Figure 22).
- ALL-00721-07 (AL 164): The nearest proposed solar arrays are about 1,600-feet north of ALL-00721-07; however, views of the solar arrays to the north shall be blocked by existing, intervening residences. But, additional solar arrays are proposed about 2,400-feet west of ALL-00721-07. There are no intervening buildings to block views of these solar arrays west of ALL-00721-07 (Appendix A: Figure 21).
- Potential District, Community of Hume (AL 157-158 and AL 164 through AL 193): Regardless of specifically identified boundaries, any identified historic district within the limits of Hume will have views of proposed solar arrays (Appendix A: Figure 28). Solar arrays are proposed in agricultural fields about 0.45-mile west of Hume, 0.13-mile north of Hume, and 0.52-mile east of Hume.
- ALL-00703-06 (AL 135): Existing wooded lots at the northwest corner of this nearest proposed solar arrays should limit views of the arrays from ALL-00703-06. Without the existing trees, ALL-00703-06 may have views of the solar arrays, although views will be minimized by the intervening 3,000 feet (Appendix A: Figure 18).

Birch Solar 1, LLC will work with the Ohio State Historic Preservation Office to ensure installation of appropriate fencing and vegetative screening that properly shields solar arrays and minimizes visual impacts to potentially eligible resources.

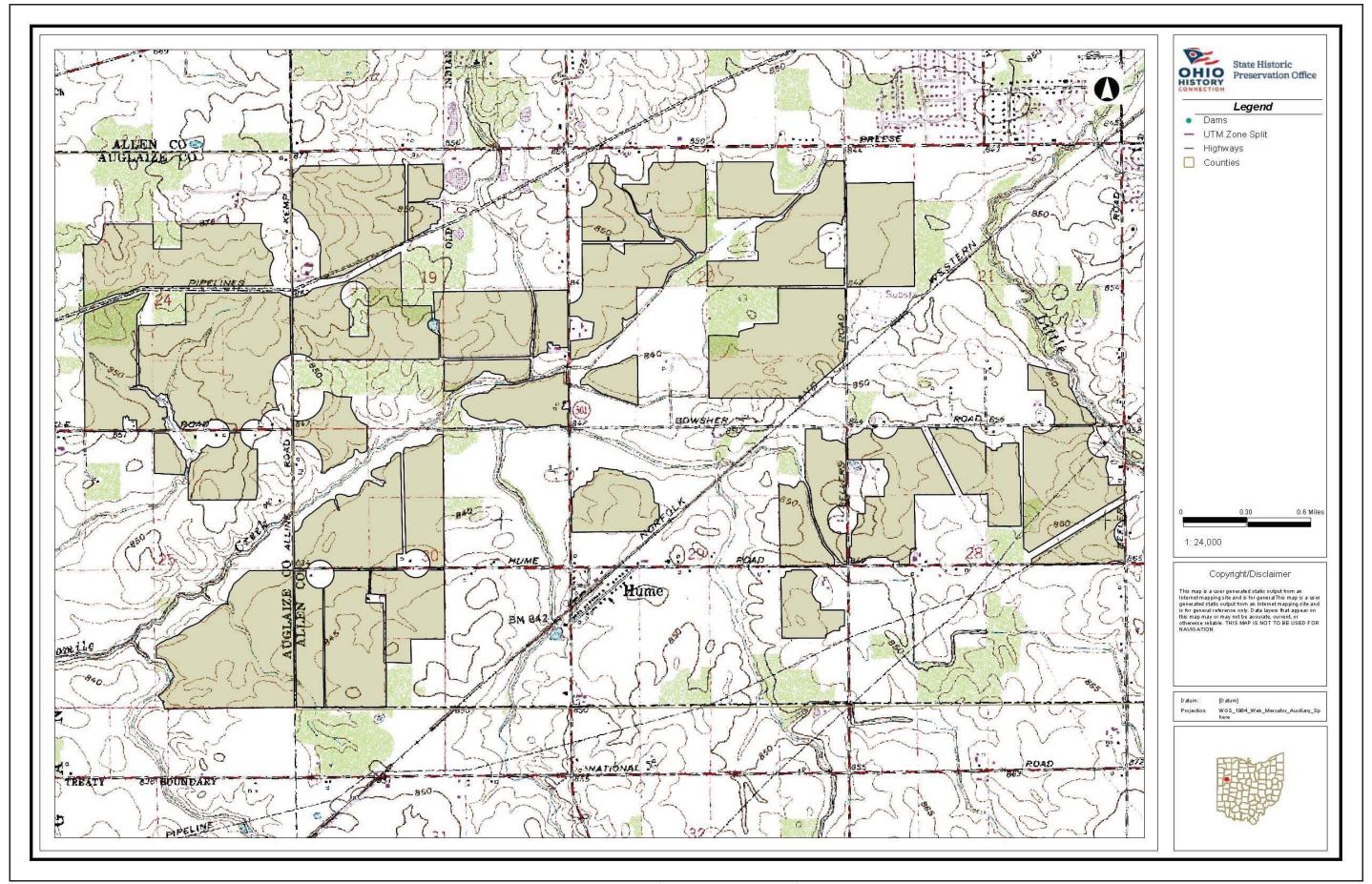


Figure 2: Portion of the USGS 7.5-Minute Series (Topographic) Cridersville, Ohio Quadrangle (1961, Photo-Revised 1983) highlighting construction areas for the proposed Birch Lima Solar Panel Farm

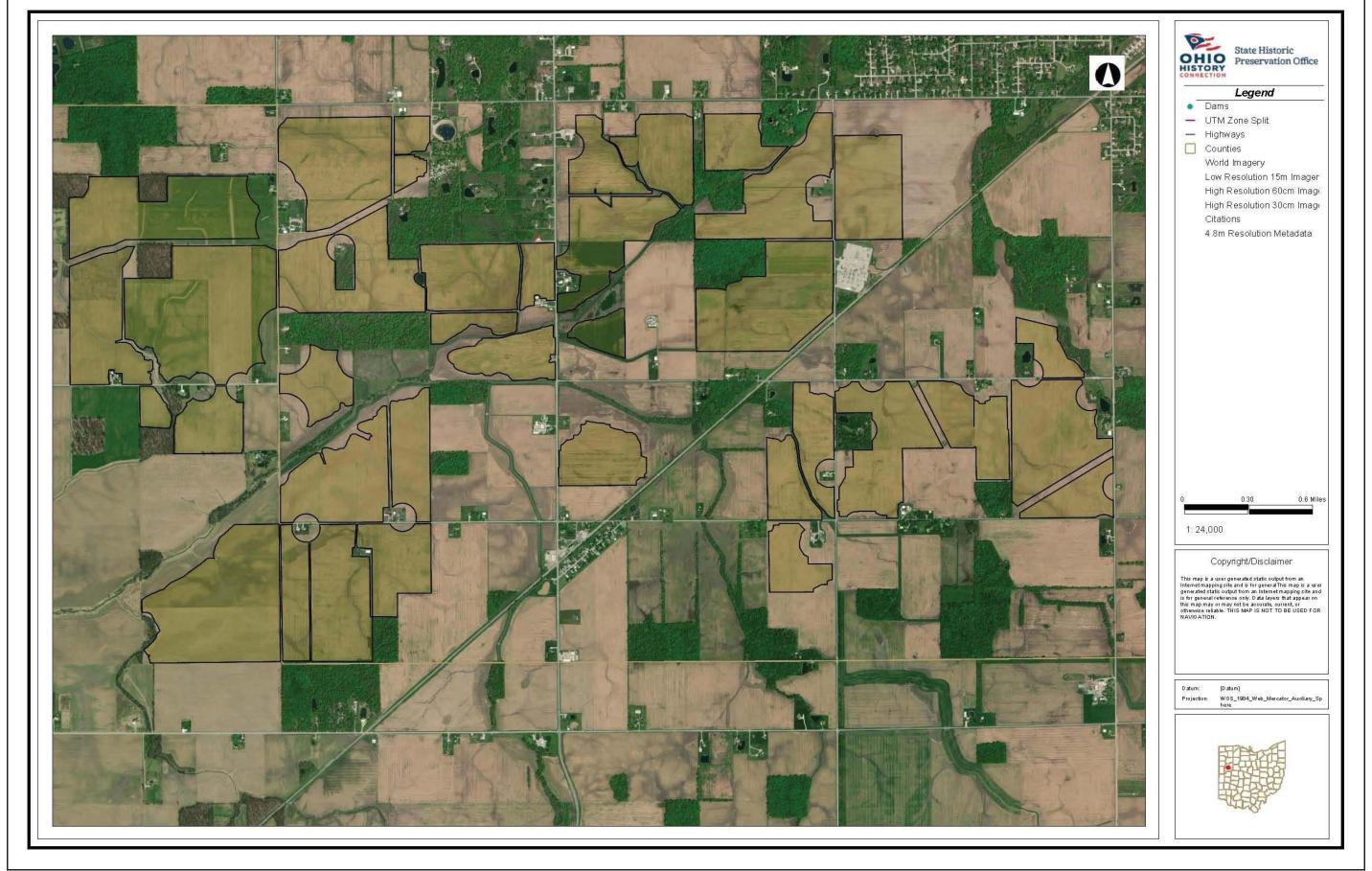


Figure 3: Aerial image highlighting construction areas for the proposed Birch Lima Solar Panel Farm

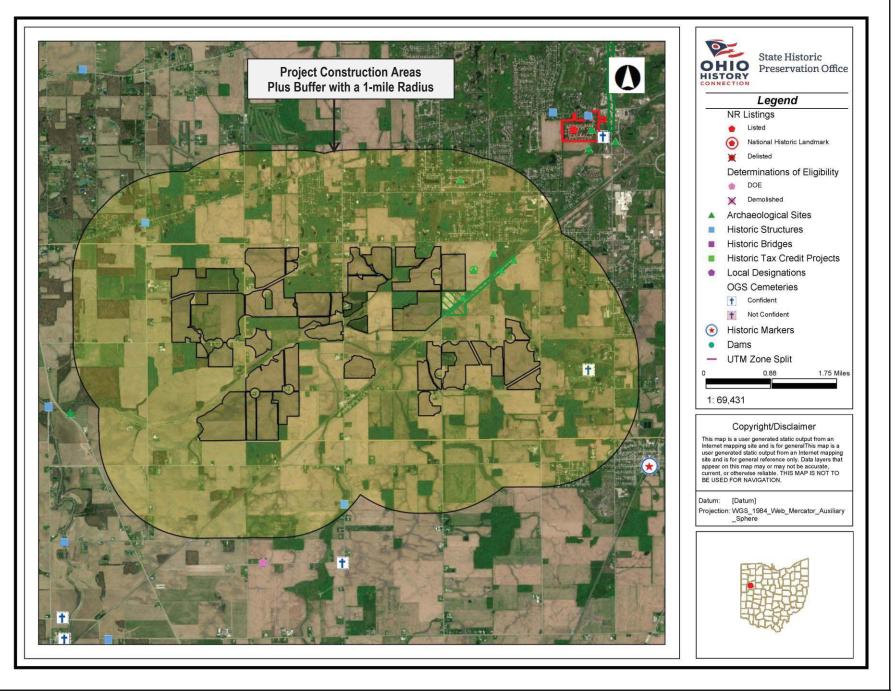


Figure 4: SHPO GIS mapping showing previously documented resources within a 1-mile radius of the proposed Birch Lima Solar Panel Farm

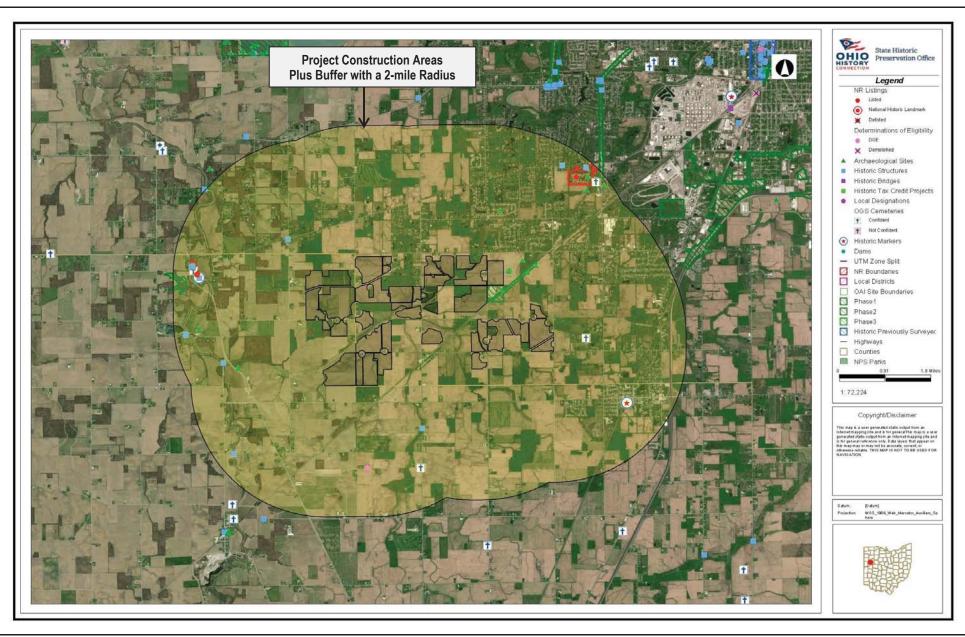


Figure 5: SHPO GIS mapping showing previously documented resources within a 2-mile radius of the proposed Birch Lima Solar Panel Farm

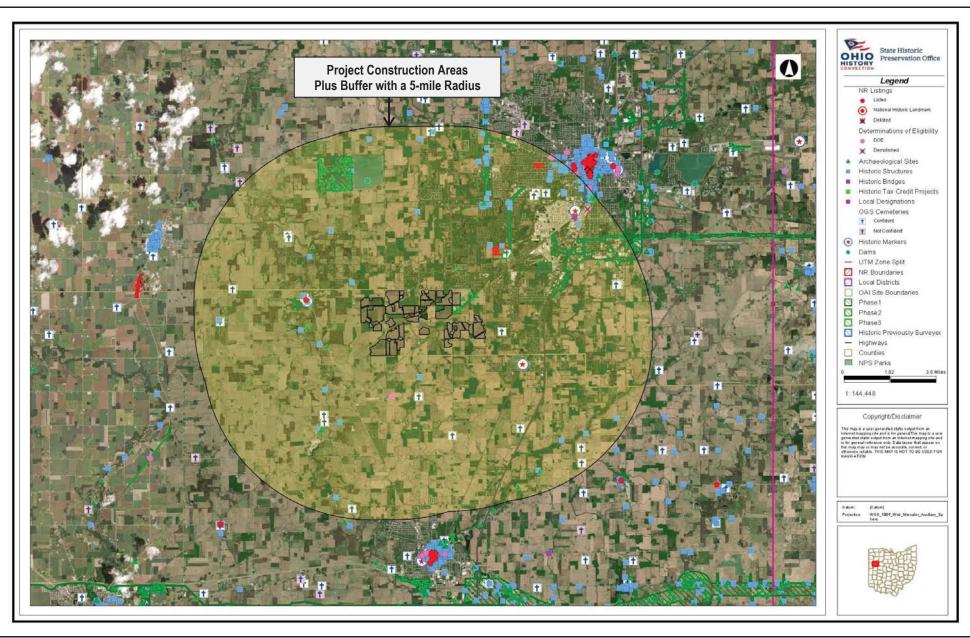


Figure 6: SHPO GIS mapping showing previously documented resources within a 5-mile radius of the proposed Birch Lima Solar Panel Farm

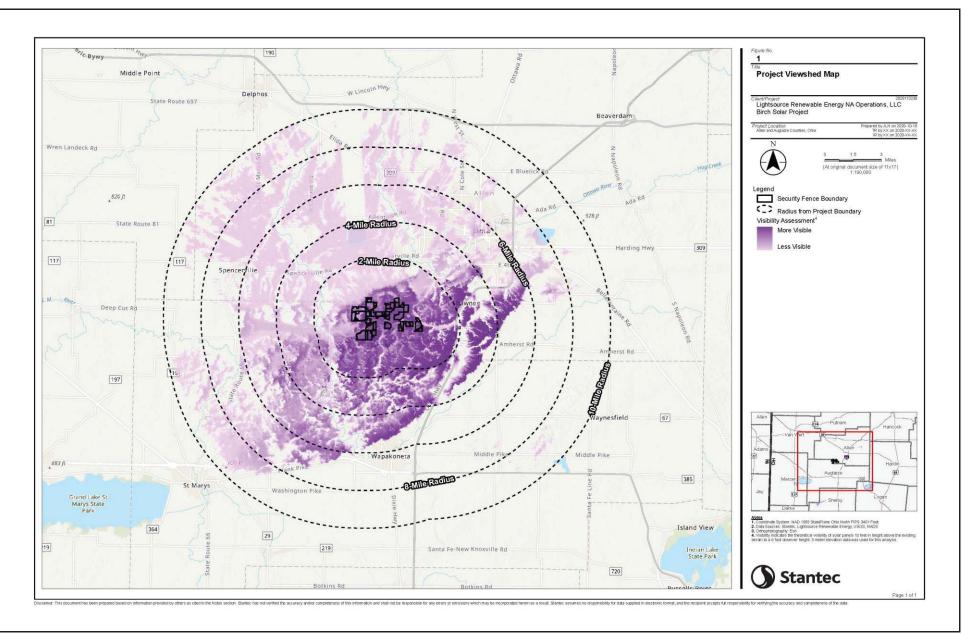


Figure 7: View shed map for the proposed Birch Lima Solar Panel Farm

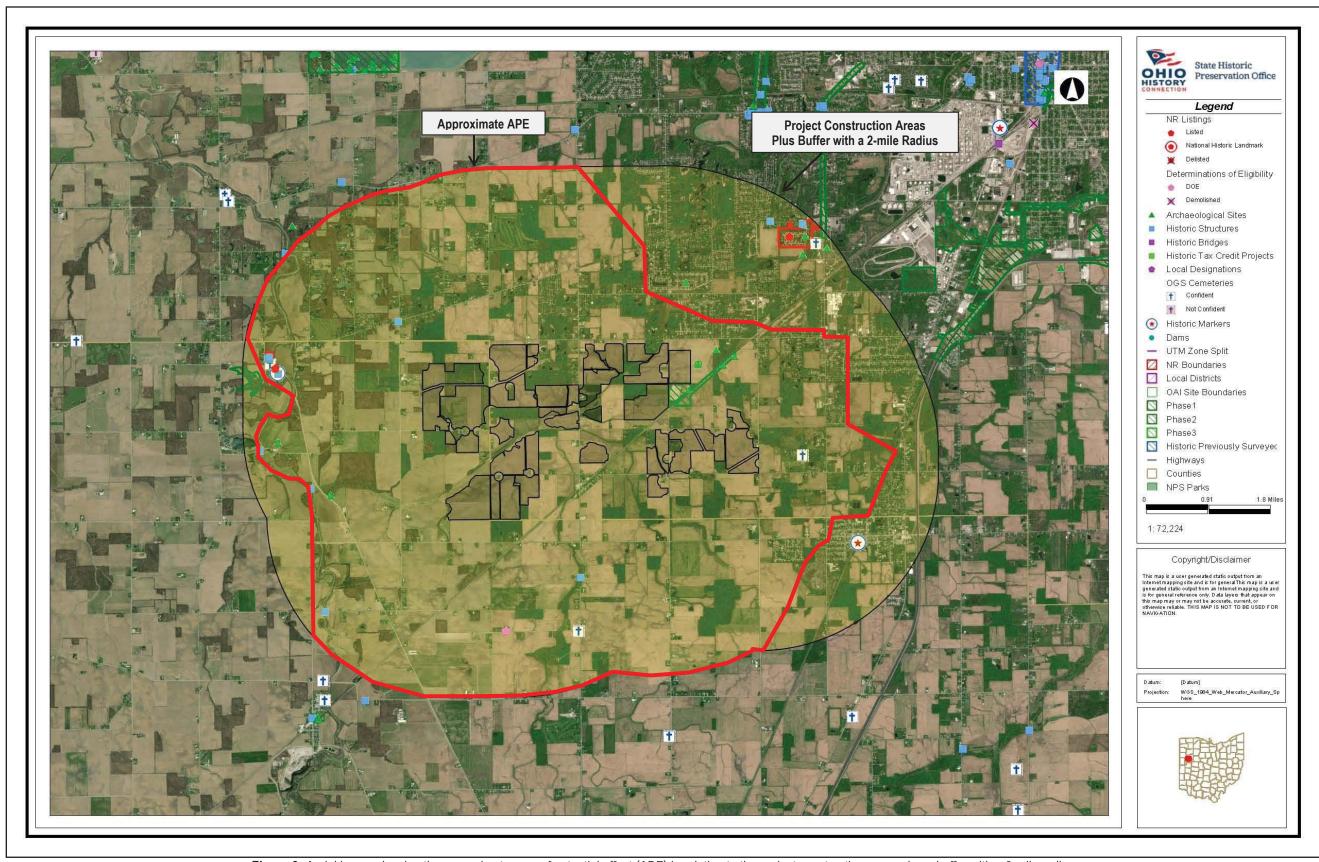


Figure 8: Aerial image showing the approximate area of potential effect (APE) in relation to the project construction areas plus a buffer with a 2-mile radius

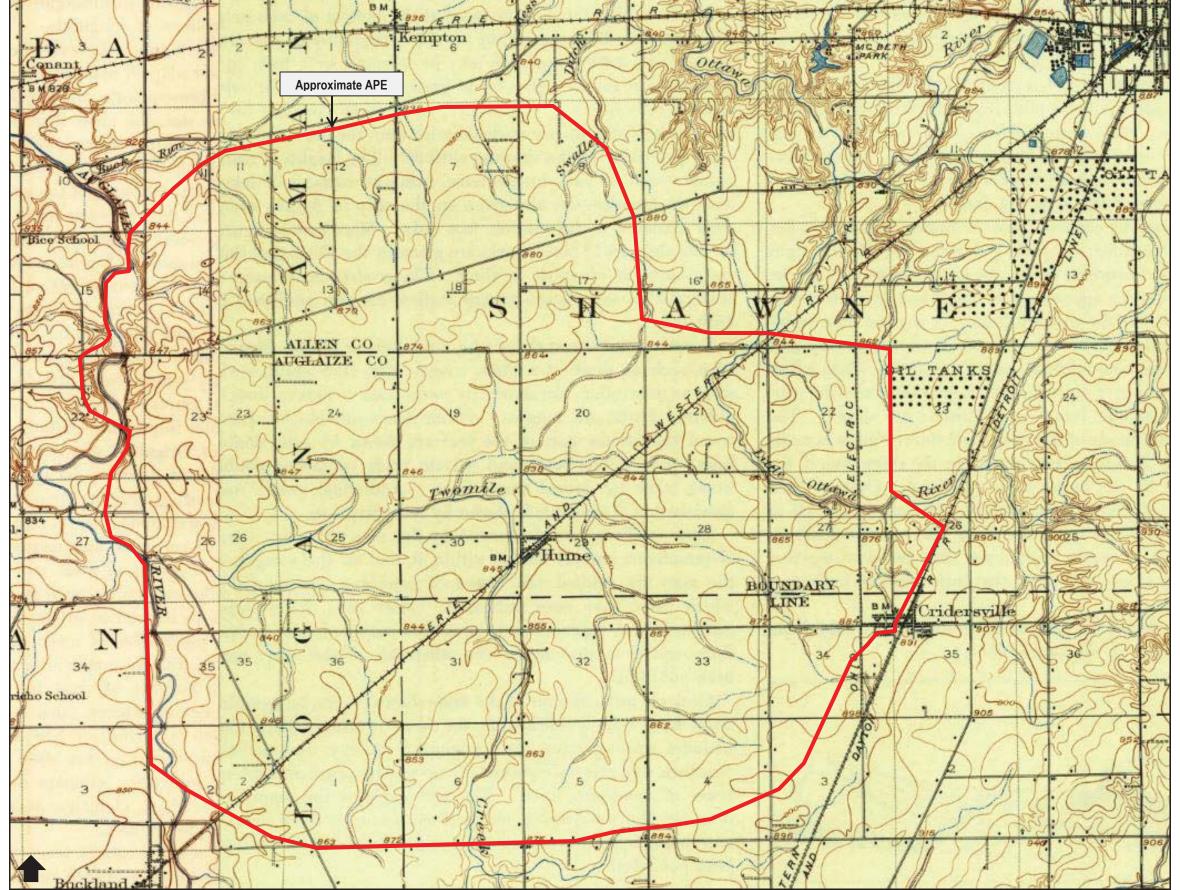


Figure 9: Portions of USGS topographic quadrangles showing the approximate area of potential effect (APE) in portions of Allen County, Shawnee Township and Auglaize County Logan and Duchouquet Townships

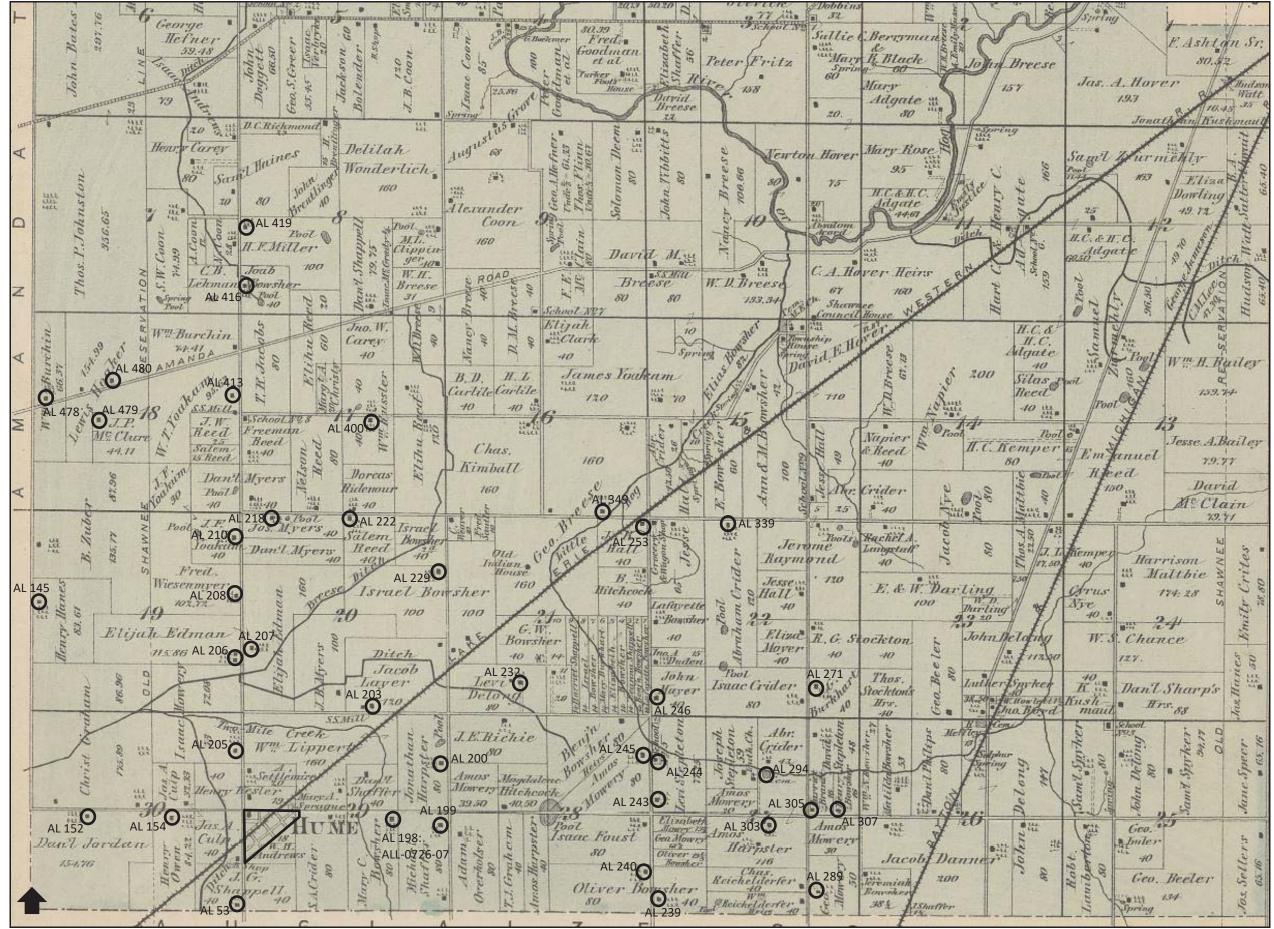


Figure 10: Portion of the Atlas of Allen County, Ohio: From Records & Original Surveys (Harrison 1880) showing Shawnee Township sections within the APE

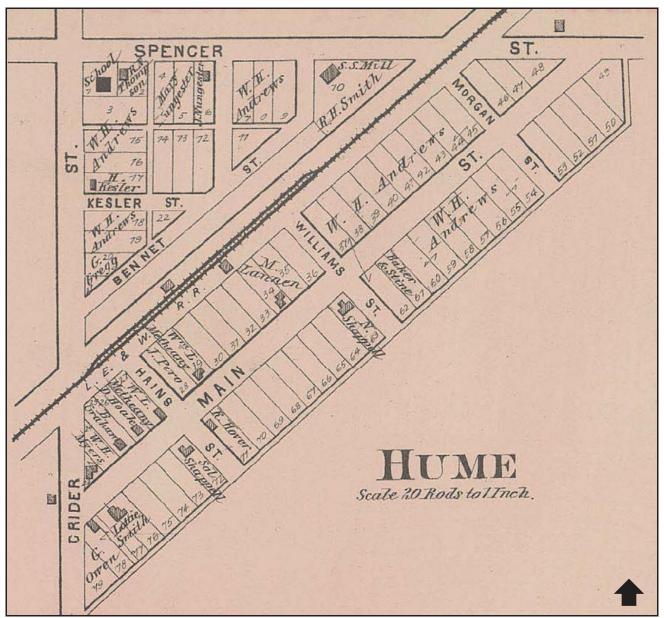


Figure 11: Portion of the *Atlas of Allen County, Ohio: From Records & Original Surveys* (Harrison 1880) showing the community of Hume within the APE

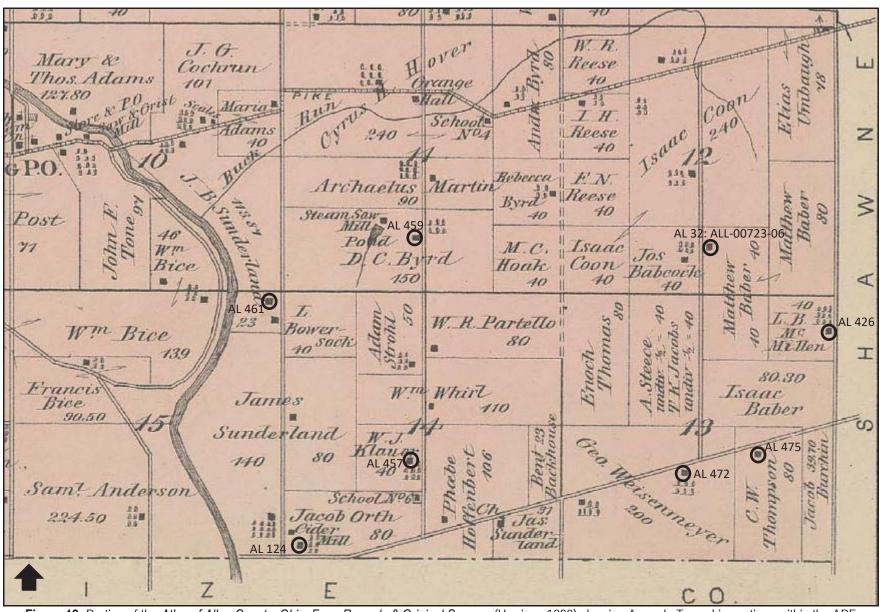


Figure 12: Portion of the Atlas of Allen County, Ohio: From Records & Original Surveys (Harrison 1880) showing Amanda Township sections within the APE

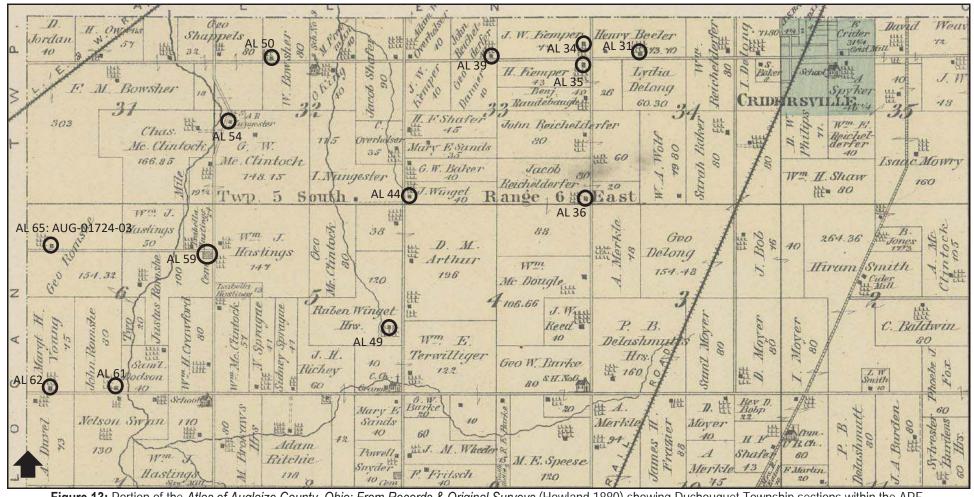


Figure 13: Portion of the Atlas of Auglaize County, Ohio: From Records & Original Surveys (Howland 1880) showing Duchouquet Township sections within the APE

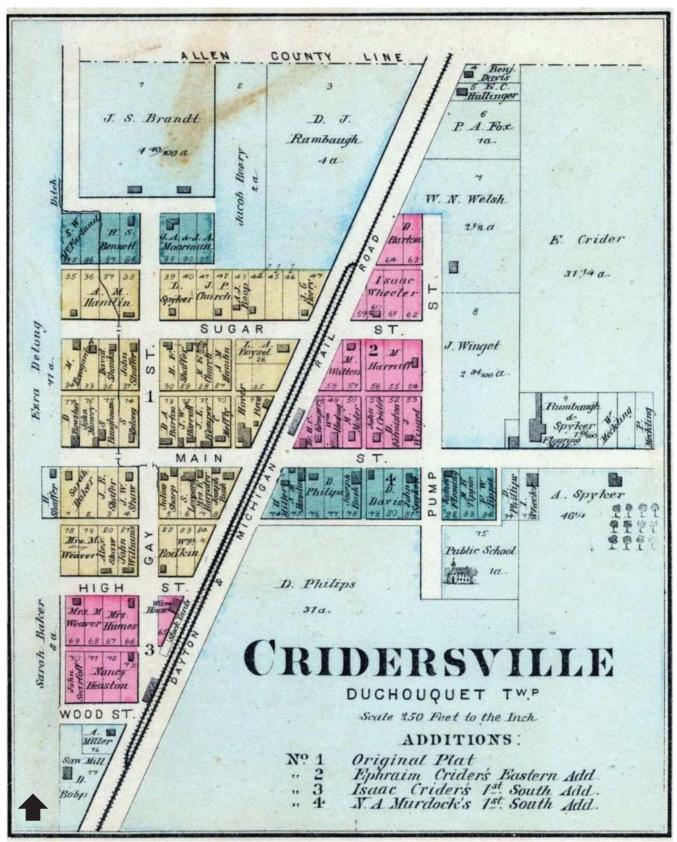


Figure 14: Portion of the *Atlas of Auglaize County, Ohio: From Records & Original Surveys* (Howland 1880) showing the community of Cridersville within the APE

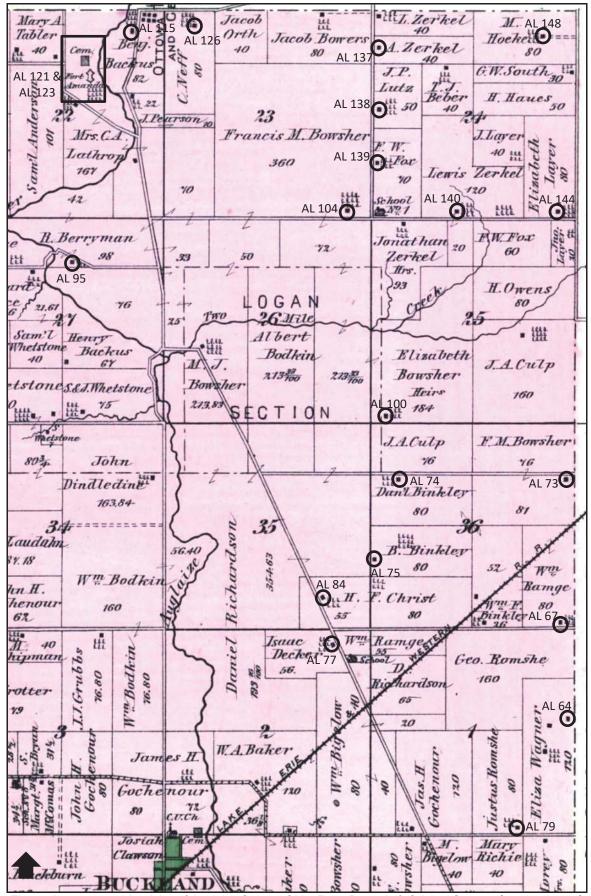


Figure 15: Portion of the *Atlas of Auglaize County, Ohio: From Records & Original Surveys* (Howland 1880) showing Logan Township sections within the APE

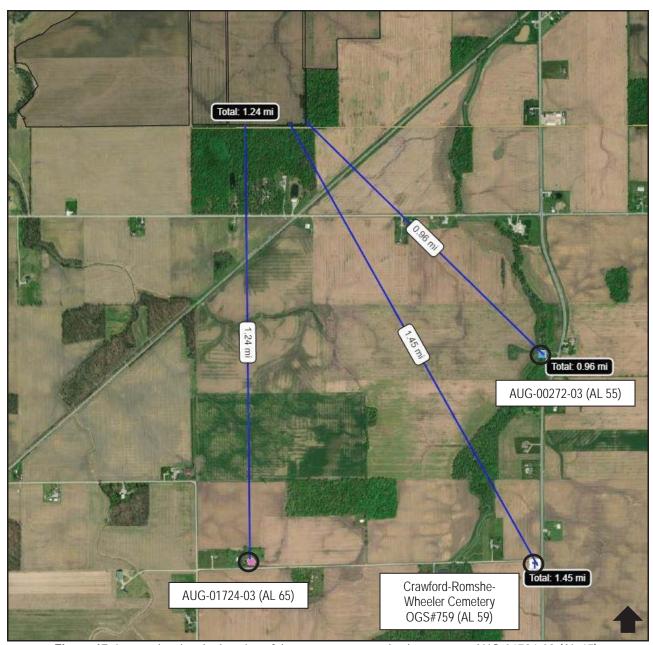


Figure 17: Image showing the location of the nearest proposed solar arrays to AUG-01724-03 (AL 65), AUG-00272-03 (AL 55) and the OGS #759 Crawford-Romshe-Wheeler Cemetery (AL 59)

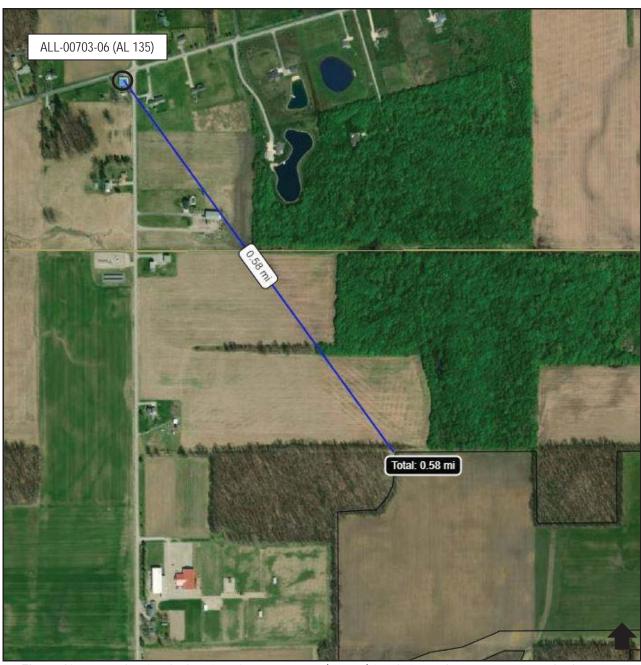


Figure 18: Image showing the location of ALL-00703-06 (AL 135) in relation to the nearest proposed solar arrays

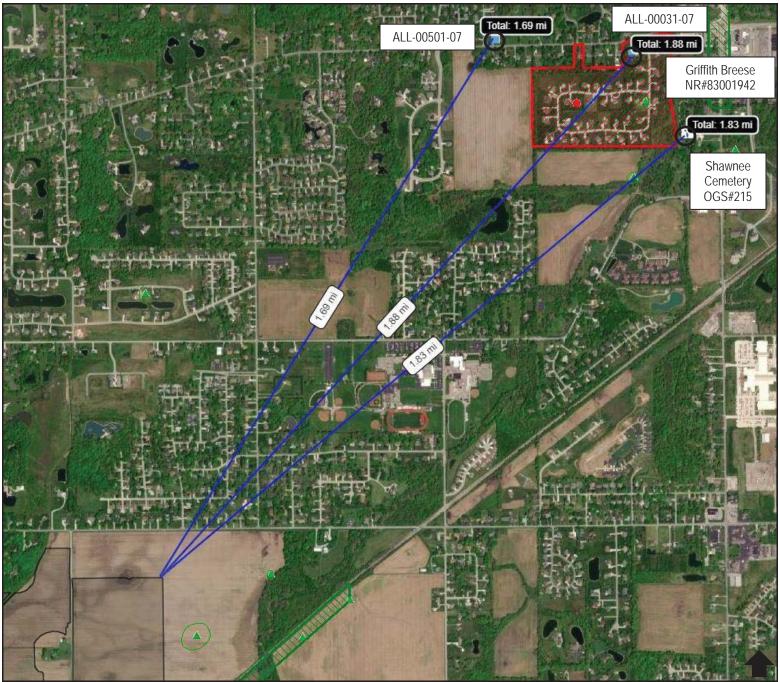


Figure 19: Image showing the location of the nearest proposed solar arrays to the NRHP Griffith Breese Farm, AUG-00031-07, ALL-00501-07, and the OGS #215 Shawnee Cemetery

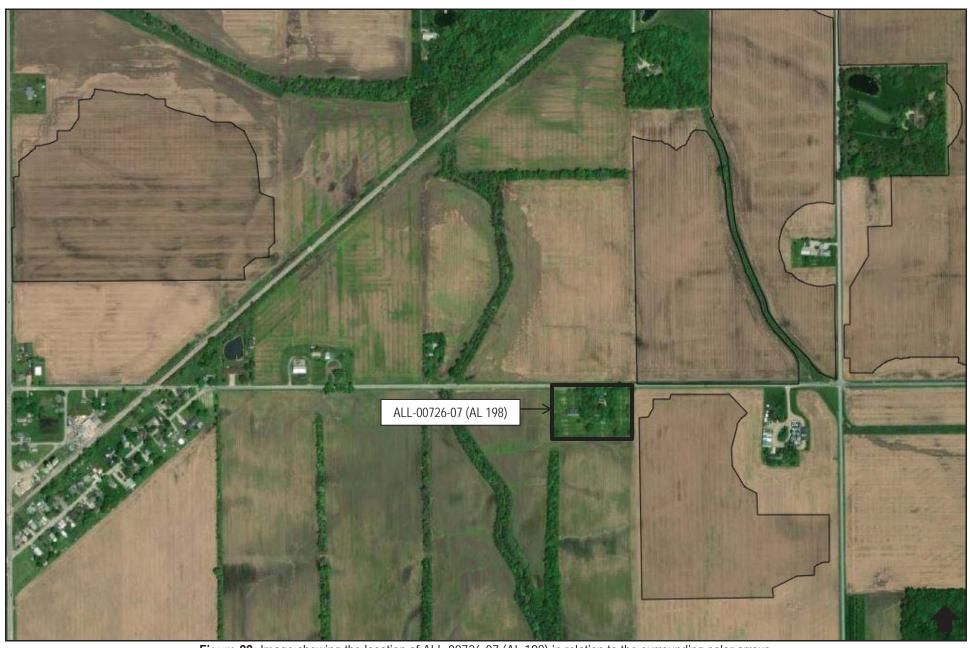


Figure 22: Image showing the location of ALL-00726-07 (AL 198) in relation to the surrounding solar arrays

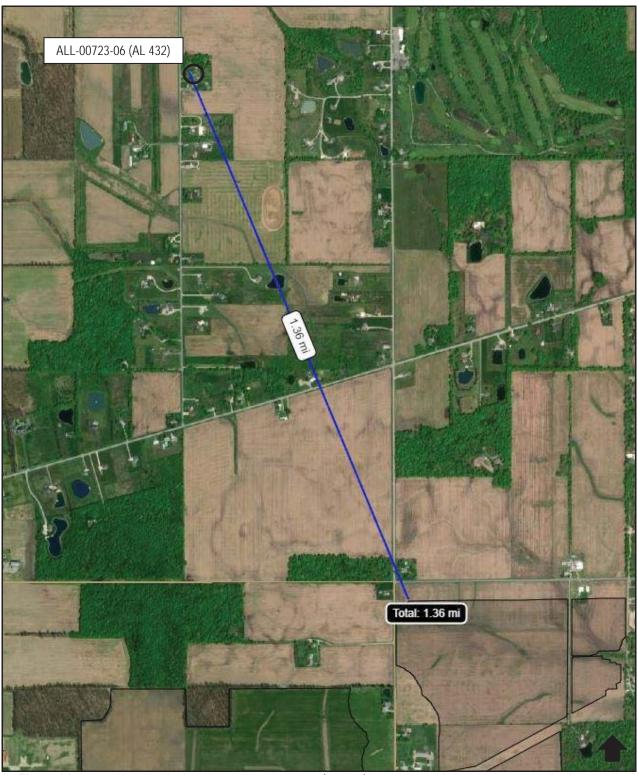


Figure 24: Image showing the location of ALL-00723-06 (AL 432) in relation to the nearest proposed solar arrays

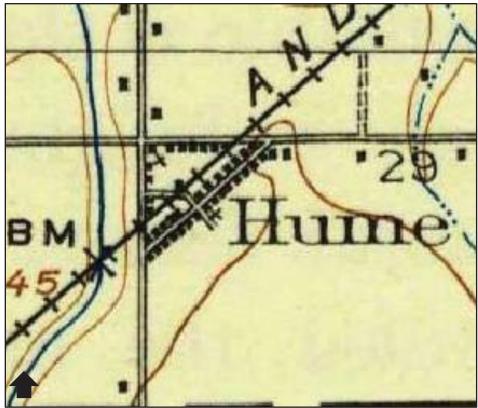


Figure 26: Portion of the *USGS 15-Minute Series (Topographic) Lima, Ohio Quadrangle (1906, reprint 1943)* showing the community of Hume in Allen County, Shawnee Township

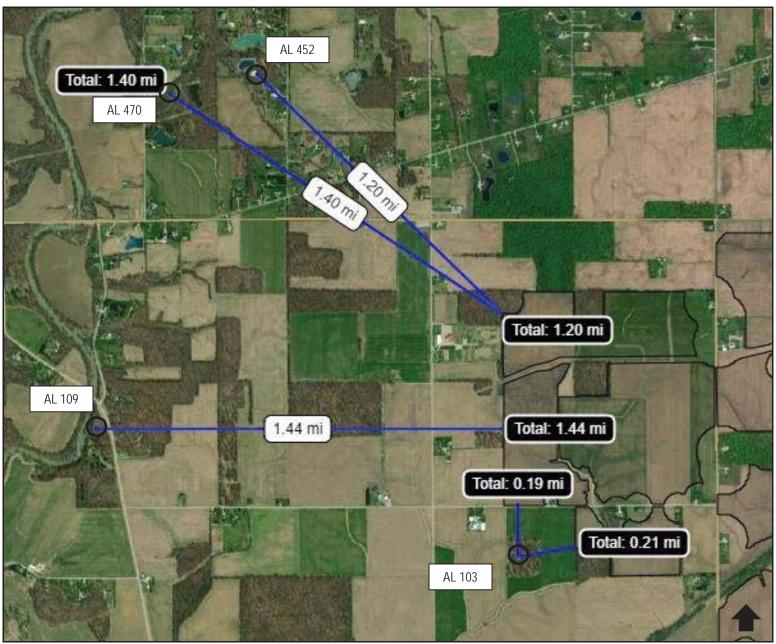


Figure 29: Image showing the unevaluated architectural locations (AL 103, 109, 452 & 470) in relation to the nearest proposed solar arrays

The building has its original exterior metal walls and original metal frame windows. The windows are divided into an upper section of four lites and a lower section of two lites. It appears that one of the sections may be operable and the other section fixed. There are seven symmetrically placed windows on the long sides of the building. The north-facing doomed end has a centered, sliding, metal door. To the right of the centered entry is a single window. To the left of the centered entry is a hinged, metal, pedestrian entry door. Above the centered entry are three, grouped windows. As observed from the public right-of-way, it appears that there are no additions or substantial alterations to this building.

43. History and Significance

The Quonset was a building type developed for use by the US military during World War II (WW II). After the war, surplus Quonset buildings were sold to civilians. Often times, the buildings were modified and adapted for use as agricultural or commercial buildings. Since WW II, there have been numerous variations of arched/doomed buildings developed for private, agricultural and industrial uses. But, the original military design remains unique.

Cowin and Company, Inc., a contractor to the US government, designed a larger warehouse type Quonset called the Cowin Hut (or Steeldrome) which measured 36' by 60'. Like the Cowin Hut, ALL-00721-07 is a larger design, about 36' by 60'. Additional inspection and research is necessary to determine the actual design/manufacturer of ALL-00721-07.

ALL-00721-07 is located at the southeast corner of Norfolk St. and S. Wapakoneta Rd. (SR 501) in the unincorporated community of Hume. ALL-00721-07 is the only building on the lot.

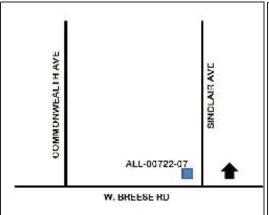


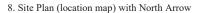

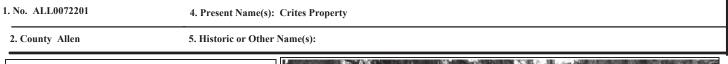

The exterior of the 1.5-story building is clad in horizontal wood siding and the roof is clad in asphalt shingles. The south facade has a steep, front-facing peaked gable extended over the protruding front entrance. The building's east side has a steeply pitched cross gable extended over a bay window. 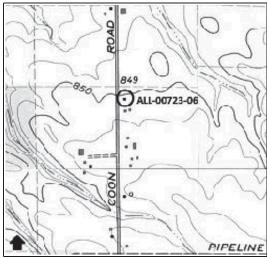

ALL-00723-06 is a Gabled Ell type house likely constructed between 1860 and 1880. The building, which has a cross-shaped plan, is two stories in height. The building has a stone foundation and brick exterior walls laid in a stretcher or running bond pattern. The window openings contain replacement windows, but the openings maintain their original size. The window openings also retain their original sandstone sills and lintels with stone brackets. The eaves retain their original wood molding. There are two, open porches. There is a front porch in the southwest corner of the building and a rear porch in the southeast corner of the building. 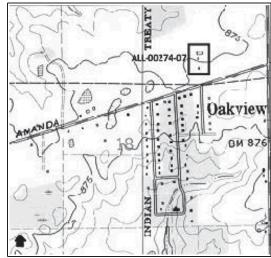

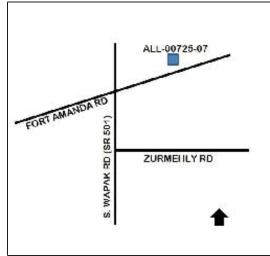

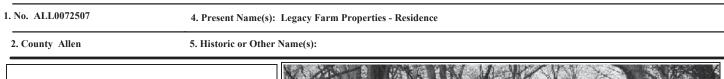

The majority of buildings in the area lack stylistic details and many have lost integrity of materials, design, and workmanship due to alterations and additions. By comparison, ALL-00725-07 is a unique example of relatively unaltered buildings with a mix of stylistic elements.

44. Description of Environment and Outbuildings (See #52)

Associated with the house is a detached garage. Although only partially visible from the right-of-way, the garage appears to be constructed at the same time and with the same elements as the house. Located at the rear of the property is a chicken coop which retains its original design and materials including its 6/6 windows.

42. Further Description of Important Interior and Exterior Features

ALL-00726-07 has the characteristic elaborate portico, a 2-story wrap-around porch, a porte cochere, large double hung windows with shutters, Palladian windows, and fanlights. The 2-story building has a T-shaped plan. The exterior walls are clad in vinyl siding and the roof is clad in asphalt shingles. The building appears to be set upon a concrete block foundation. On the east elevation is an exterior, brick chimney. The south elevation is not visible from the public right-of-way. The building's distance from the street makes if difficult to determine if the building materials are original or replacements (e.g. the windows and the porch columns).

43. History and Significance

ALL-00726-07 is a farmstead with a Colonial Revival style residence and a Three Bay Barn. A building appears in this location on the 1880 atlas upon the property of Mary C. Bowsher. The Allen County Auditor provides a generic construction date of 1920 for the existing building on this property. The Colonial Revival style did not become popular until about 1895 and remains a popular style even today. Consequently, it is unclear whether the existing residence replaced a previous building on this location, or whether an original building at this located was altered to the existing Colonial Revival style. Regardless of a specific age, as existing, ALL-00726-07 is a significant example of Colonial Revival style.

44. Description of Environment and Outbuildings (See #52)

The associated Three Bay Barn has only one, small, shed roofed addition; otherwise, the barn maintains integrity of materials, design, and workmanship. Also associated with ALL-00726-07 are two, detached garages. View of the garages are limited from the right-of-way; although, the buildings appear to be in good condition.

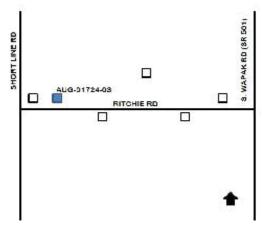
Atlas Allen County, Ohio: From Records and Original Surveys (Harrison 1880)

42. Further Description of Important Interior and Exterior Features

This is a Four-over-Four type building with Italianate elements such as tall, narrow, segmental arch window openings and wide-overhanging eaves. The exterior walls are brick laid in a common bond pattern. The foundation is made of limestone, and the side-gabled roof is clad in asphalt shingles. The windows are 1/1 with stone sills and arched brick lintels. The south facade has an original, centered entry door with side-lights and a transom. The center entry door has two windows to the right and two windows to the left. The south facade has five, symmetrically placed windows on the second story. The symmetrical east elevation has two windows on the first story and two windows on the second story. Attached to the northwest corner of the house is a 1-story, wood-framed, side-gabled addition clad in wood single siding. In the southwest corner created by this addition is a 1-story, hip roofed porch with wood posts on a wood deck. The porch has decorative wood brackets and spindles. From the east side, a 1-story, shed roofed, wood-framed addition is partially visible at the rear of the house. The rear of the house is not fully visible from the public right-of-way.

43. History and Significance

In 2010, this property was determined eligible for the National Register under Criterion C as a result of a survey for a nearby wind turbine (SHPO Project #2010-AUG-13562).

The Auglaize County Auditor indicates that AUG-01724-03 was constructed in 1857. According to the Atlas of Auglaize County, Ohio: From Records & Original Surveys (Howland 1880), the house existed in 1880 on a 154.32-acre parcel owned by George Romshe. A Justus Romshe is identified as owning the 100-acre parcel east of AUG-01724-03; and, upon Justus Romshe's parcel is a family cemetery. The Crawford-Romshe (Wheeler) Cemetery (OGS #759), at the southwest corner of Ritchie Road and S. Wapakoneta Road (State Route 501), contains less than two-dozen headstones.

The Atlas of Auglaize County (Walsh 1898) states "George William Romshe, a son of George and Mary Romshe, was born December 13, 1859, on the farm in Duchouquet Township, where he now resides." George William Romshe married Alice Winget and they had four children. George William Romshe was engaged in agriculture.

44. Description of Environment and Outbuildings (See #52)

Located at the northeast corner of the house is a 1.5-story brick outbuilding which is probably about 15 feet by 12 feet and has a front-gabled roof clad in standing seam metal. The roof extends beyond the building's front facade and almost touches the main house. The building's south side has one small, 4-lite window. The building may have been a summer kitchen.

Located about 80-feet northwest for the house is a 1.5-story, wood-framed, rectangular shaped building which is likely an early residence. The building has a side-gabled roof clad in standing seam metal. The exterior of the building is clad in beveled siding. The south facade has two entry doors. Attached to the west side is a 1-story, hip roofed addition. Much of this building is not visible from the right-of-way.

Also associated with the house is a detached, wood-framed, side-gabled, 2-car garage clad in beveled siding.

The Fort Amanda picnic shelter is a 600 square foot picnic shelter. Although lacking windows and doors the shelter's boundaries are determined by a continuous wooden slab going around the perimeter. The foundation of the picnic shelter is a poured concrete slab. The plan shape is rectangular. The construction of the picnic shelter is similar to a braced frame, although there are no solid walls. Although there was no battle at the site, many soldiers died of battle wounds and disease here at the fort hospital. Former Governor of Ohio James M. Cox approved the appropriation of \$4,500 for the monument and appointed the commission. The importance of the historical site was not fully recognized until William Rusler called together a group of historical societies to form a Fort Amanda commission in 1913. President of the commission was Jacob B. Sunderland, whose grandfather was one of the earliest settlers of Fort Amanda. This commission's need to show the significance of Fort Amanda led to the construction of the Fort Amanda Monument in 1915.
