Gov. DeWine, trolled by Trump, says he'd take endorsement

COLUMBUS — Republican Ohio Gov. Mike DeWine, trolled by former President Donald Trump for acknowledging the legitimacy of President Joe Biden's election, has said he'd accept a Trump endorsement for his second gubernatorial run.

"Well, sure," DeWine said when asked about the possibility during a recent forum at the City Club of Cleveland.

"Endorsements are interesting but ultimately people make a decision who they want to be their governor or their senator," DeWine said. "I'm not sure endorsements play such a huge role."

Asked if he stood by that position in light of the Jan. 6 storming of the U.S. Capitol by a mob of Trump supporters, DeWine called it "a horrible, horrible day," especially for someone like him who served 20 years in the Capitol as a congressman and senator.

Trump "should have done more," DeWine said.

DeWine has long avoided criticism of Trump, frequently saying it was important for Ohio that he have a good relationship with the White House. An exception came the day after the breach, when DeWine said Trump "poured gas on the fire" ahead of the siege at the U.S. Capitol.

Trump returned DeWine's longtime loyalty by hinting in a tweet last year that DeWine needed a 2022 primary opponent.

The tweet came a day after DeWine said on CNN that Trump should begin a transition to Biden.

DeWine's not alone in harshly criticizing Trump over the Capitol assault and then turning around and supporting him.

"The nominee of the party? Absolutely," Senate Minority Leader Mitch McConnell said Feb. 25 when asked if he would support Trump if he secured the Republican nomination in 2024.

Shortly after voting to acquit Trump at his second impeachment trial, McConnell denounced Trump, calling him "morally responsible" for the attack on the U.S. Capitol. In turn, Trump called McConnell a "dour, sullen and unsmiling

Also, DeWine defended the decision by Ohio Republican Congressman Anthony Gonzalez to vote in favor of impeaching Trump. Many conservative Republicans called on Gonzalez to resign.

"He was voting his conscience. He made that call. That was his decision," DeWine said. "I think he's been a good member of Congress. He should not resign."

Chief justice wants inmates' abuse allegations investigated

COLUMBUS — Allegations of abuse toward inmates by prison guards, including the use of racial slurs, have been forwarded by Ohio's top judge to a legislative prison oversight committee, according to a Friday court ruling.

At issue were complaints by two inmates at Madison Correctional Institution in central Ohio. In a complaint filed with the court last year, one inmate alleged he'd been assaulted by guards multiple times, and also threatened, harassed and subjected to "racial slurs and derogatory comments."

The court dismissed the complaints Friday over procedural issues, but the dismissal indicated that Chief Justice Maureen O'Connor had forwarded the complaints to the Correctional Institution Inspection Committee, The Columbus Dispatch reported.

If the allegations are true, "there is a very serious problem in the Department of Corrections," O'Connor wrote in a letter to the prisons committee last week, *The Columbus Dispatch* reported.

The fact the court can't rule on the complaints doesn't mean the "allegations have fallen on deaf ears," Justice Michael Donnelly noted in Friday's ruling.

The inmates' allegations are being investigated, JoEllen Smith, a Department of Rehabilitation and Correction spokesperson, said Friday.

"Allegations of use of force or inappropriate supervision are taken very seriously," she said, adding the agency will cooperate with the prisons inspection committee.



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

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

said, Scott followed her into the shower at the house where she lived and raped her.

The woman said she tried to tell her parents about the assaults, but they didn't believe her because of their relationship to Scott. Along with the fear of not being believed, the woman said she was afraid to come forward with her account because Scott threatened her family and she was afraid it could hurt her reputation.

The rape accusations came to light in 2019 during a separate investigation, Sidney Police Department Capt. Jerry Tangeman testified. After hearing about the allegations, he approached the woman, and she then agreed to cooperate with police.

"Sadly that occurs a lot," Tangeman said of the allegations going unreported for more than a decade.

Because of the time elapsed since the assaults, no physical evidence was available during the trial.

Laura Waymire, Scott's attorney, said he and the woman had a consensual sexual relationship when the woman was approximately 18 years old. She

was married at the time, Waymire said, and made up the rape allegations to cover up her infidelity.

"None of it adds up because it's not true," said Waymire, who also sought to discredit the woman's account because of inconsistencies in the timeline she offered about the assaults.

Prosecutor Tim Sell said the woman had no reason to make up any allegations against Scott. If she was trying to hide an affair, she simply could have denied everything when Tangeman approached her, Sell said.

"She had no reason to come forward and cooperate with the detectives," the prosecutor said. "She had no reason to come and testify to you if what she said wasn't true. What possibly would be the rationale to subject herself to this sort of thing if it wasn't true?"

The jury initially wasn't able to come to a consensus about the charges. However, after seeking more guidance from Judge James Stevenson, they unanimously found Scott guilty on both counts.

The next step in the case is a presentence investigation. Scott's bond was continued until then.
