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ALJ SANDOR: The Ohio Power Siting Board has scheduled for public hearing at this time and place Case No. 20-1405-EL-BGN, which is captioned In the Matter of the Application of AEUG Union Solar, LLC, for a Certificate of Environmental Compatibility and Public Need.

My name is Matthew Sandor, and I am one the administrative law judges in the board's legal department assigned to hear this case. Presiding with me this evening is Greta See, another administrative law judge from the legal department, as well as the chair of the Ohio Power Siting Board, Ms. Jennifer French.

There are also staff members from the board assisting us with the hearing tonight as well as individuals from the public affairs department. You likely passed them on your way in this evening. But they are the individuals wearing PUCO/OSB badge or shirt. They are available if you have questions concerning the board's process, if you need assistance in accessing any of the documents submitted in this case or if you just have general

1 questions about the hearing tonight. 2 At this time, I would like to take the 3 appearances of counsel on behalf of the parties. 4 Counsel for AEUG Union Solar, LLC. 5 MR. SETTINERI: Thank you, Your Honors, 6 Chair. On behalf of AEUG Union Solar, LLC, Michael 7 Settineri, Mark Hylton, for the law firm of Vorys, Sater, Seymour and Pease, 52 East Gay Street, Columbus, Ohio, 43215. 10 ALJ SEE: Mr. Settineri, at this time, if 11 you have someone here that can answer questions about 12 the project, can you also introduce them, please. 13 MR. SETTINERI: Thank you for the 14 reminder, Your Honor. Also with us tonight is Brian 15 Dunneback in the orange shirt. If anyone has questions after the hearing, please feel free to ask 16 17 him any questions. Thank you. 18 ALJ SEE: Thank you. 19 ALJ SANDOR: Counsel for any other parties 20 present this evening that would like to make an 21 appearance at this time? 22 Thayne Gray, Assistant MR. GRAY:

Prosecuting Attorney here on behalf of the townships and Union Soil and Water Conservation District.

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1 ALJ SANDOR: On behalf of York Township; 2 is that correct? 3 MR. GRAY: Yes. 4 ALJ SANDOR: Okay. Mr. Gray, could you 5 come down and sit in the front, please? Thank you. 6 The subject of today's hearing is an 7 application filed by AEUG Union Solar, LLC, for the purpose of constructing a solar powered electric 9 generation facility of up to 325 megawatts in 10 Washington and York Townships in Union County. 11 The application was filed on December 23 12 and 24, 2020. I would also note that the board staff 13 filed a report of investigation on May 19, 2021. 14 This report is a recommendation of the board's staff 15 and does not necessarily reflect what the board's 16 final determination in this case will be. 17 The purpose of this evening's public 18 hearing is to receive additional testimony regarding 19 the application from persons in the local community 20 but who are not parties to the case. Tonight's 21 public hearing will not be treated as a 22 question-and-answer session, but rather, an 23 opportunity to let the board know what you think 24 about the proposed project.

Tonight's public hearing is only one aspect of the process in this case. A public hearing was previously held on June 3, 2021. If you offered testimony at the last public hearing, we ask that you not testify again. Your prior testimony is already part of the record of this case, and we would like to hear from other individuals who are waiting to offer their views to the board tonight. You may supplement your testimony by submitting written comments to the board.

An evidentiary hearing will be scheduled to occur at the board's offices in Columbus in the near future. The purpose of the evidentiary hearing is for the parties and the board staff to provide testimony and other evidence regarding the project.

Tonight's hearing is being transcribed by a court reporter. If you plan to testify, please speak clearly so that the court reporter can accurately reflect your comments on the record.

Also, if you have prepared a written statement, it would be helpful if you provide a copy to the court reporter for reference to ensure the transcript is accurate.

After I finish with this introduction, we

will begin by inviting individuals on the sign-in sheet to speak about the proposed project. Each person who signed up to testify will be permitted to speak once about the proposed project. Before you present your testimony, we will ask you to take an oath or affirmation that what you're about to say is the truth.

We'll also ask you to state your name and address for the record. You will then provide your thoughts on the proposed project. The parties to the case and Judge See and I will be permitted to ask you questions about your statement. The testimony that you provide tonight will be considered part of the official record in this case, and it will be reviewed by the board before a final decision is made on the application.

A couple of other notes. If you decide that you do not want to testify when we read your name from the sign-in sheet, you can merely pass to the next witness. If you decide that you'd prefer to file written comments in the case docket, the board staff can answer your questions about how to do that. Also, once you finish testifying or if you're just here to observe, you may leave the hearing at any

And, of course, the one thing I haven't

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heard addressed is that the power has to go somewhere, either overhead lines or it's going to go underground. So that is going to affect people miles from the solar panels. They're going to be possibly across your property. I think that's -- people haven't thought about that probably. And there's many other problems, you know, such as the fact they're not recyclable. I think they need further development before they put thousands of them out there.

Lights all night. You know, I don't live in the country to see bright lights. If I wanted bright lights, I would move to the city. So, you know, they're going to keep the weeds down. Well, they're not going to use sheep to keep the weeds down. That's stupid. People don't raise sheep hardly at all. It takes a special person to raise sheep.

So they're going to be spraying them all the time probably, and we don't need more chemicals dumped on the ground. Of course, there's other problems, tile. Every acre of Union County that's farmed has tile in it. Tiles run for miles. Explain to me. Am I supposed to crawl underneath a solar

I appreciate the views of the rural 18 community, the waves of corn and beans in the summer 19 and the trees, along with nature. I view this and 20 other industrial projects an eyesore, the appearance 21 of which never change. 22 I also feel farmers are the backbone of 23 the country. They feed, fuel and clothe the world. 24 Taking ground away is essentially undermining that

foundation, also choking out the small family farms. With the erratic weather around the country, for example, the large hailstorm taking out a large field of corn in Iowa of unknown acres, they need other farmers help more than ever.

If projects such as this continue, we will get to the point where we may be saying we didn't know what we had until it was gone. If other countries have control of our supply chain, we would become an option, not a priority. I feel we could be smarter with the energy we produce currently.

Now on to the problems I see if this project goes through. Having seen videos of operational sites, the transformers they are hooked to make a constant and annoying whine, almost like a cicada that will never stop. Also chemical runoff such as PFAs, or polyfluoroalkyl, substances cited from an article from the Observer August 7, 2021.

We all have well water. What if that contaminates our drinking water supply? Also, erosion, if nothing is planted there and trees are removed, that of which seems wasteful and damaging to the current ecosystem. Furthermore, there are other placement opportunities that should be explored

SMITH: I'm giving testimony against 6 the approval of this project. My name is Jovonny 7 My wife and I raised two children and Smith. currently live on Miller Road in York Township very 9 near both Union Solar and the Cadence Solar projects. 10 I grew up in York Township and watched my 11 father, as a York Township trustee, advocate for 12 zoning regulations. While some see zoning 13 regulations as a thorn in their side, I see them as a 14 mechanism to ensure township residents know what will 15 happen in their community. 16 When we wanted to build our home 25 years 17 ago, we had to get a zoning permit. When someone wants to start a business, in a residential property, 18 19 they have to get a zoning permit. It disturbs me 20 greatly when a huge industrial solar company can be 21 built in our community with no regard for the 22 township's regulations. 23 There has been some recent Ohio 24 legislation that may help with that, but the

legislation does not apply to these two projects that are already underway or in progress. In this case, the Ohio Power Siting Board has the authority to decide if an industrial solar complex can be built.

The OPSB website has the following statement: Before construction can begin on a major utility facility or economically significant wind farm within the state of Ohio, a certificate of environmental compatibility and public need must be obtained from the OPSB. But that -- but that seems to have been waived for Acciona's Union Solar project as documented in OPSB staff report of investigation, dated May 19, 2021.

There was a recommended finding in there that said: The staff recommends that the board find that the basis of need as specified under the R.C. 4906.10(A)(1) is not applicable to this facility as the facility is neither an electric transmission line nor a gas pipeline.

It seems the only need for this project is for a huge international corporation to make a lot of money. Also, a few landowners will make some money since they are leasing property that is supposed to be used for agriculture to this huge corporation for

at least 30 years. I have nothing against the landowners doing what they want with their land if it is within the current zoning regulations. But in my opinion, a huge industrial solar complex is not agriculture.

County, has no jurisdiction over the industrial complexes, what organization will ensure all of the promises made in their application to OPSB to not disturb neighbors, not disrupt water drainage, not to cause pollution, not to adversely impact wildlife, et cetera, are kept? If neighbors to this industrial complex have complaints, I understand Acciona will provide a phone number to call to make a report.

What if Acciona does not address the complaint? Who will advocate for the neighbors? Is the only resource a lawsuit against a huge corporation that none of the neighbors, township or county can afford?

There are a lot of "we anticipate" and "we don't expect" type of statements in Acciona's application to the OPSB for the Union Solar project. That should not be acceptable. Over the past several months, I have witnessed how Acciona operates. The whole process has been very secretive until they

have -- until they absolutely had to go public.

Initially Acciona seemed to want to get along with
the residents being impacted by the huge industrial
complex by asking how they could help the residents
be happy neighbors. All Acciona did with our input
was to explain it away, that they didn't have to do
it.

Simple things like Acciona planting appropriate trees, bushes, shrubs as screening or using black fencing were no longer up for discussion. In fact, Acciona stopped meeting with the neighbors totally. This behavior concerns me, that Acciona will not be a nice neighbor as the construction starts and operation begins. Acciona already indicated they will sell the project after it is operational, and who knows how nice that huge corporation will be.

There are other reasons that some might call subjective as to why I do not like having an industrial complex next to my residence. The unsightly view of row after row of solar panels out my front window and reduced property values are a couple. However, the biggest fear that I have is that they will not be a nice neighbor and fulfill

ALJ SANDOR: So you do not reside in the project area?

MR. WELCH: So I'm here on behalf of the carpenters union. I just wanted to -- I did a little research before I came. We currently have over 150 members who live in Union and surrounding counties, member of the carpenters union, most of which are working outside of these counties. A lot of them work in Columbus. This is a great opportunity to bring some of those guys home so they can work close to the house. They don't have to get up early and fight that traffic.

I researched that the average income in Union County for a resident is about \$28,000 a year. Our first year apprentices start out at \$18 an hour,

1 so an annual income of \$36,000, which is going to 2 help out the counties with tax revenue. This project 3 should take somewhere between 180 and 120 first year 4 apprentices. 5 This would be a great opportunity for 6 people in this area to get their kids, their grandkids a really good career with the carpenters 7 Once they become a member of the carpenters union, we put them to work anywhere.
