- Q. Could you please state your full name for the record one more time.
 - A. It's Trooper Rodney Daniel Ramps, last name is R-A-M-P-S.
 - Q. Thank you. Where are you employed?
- A. For the Ohio State Highway Patrol, the
 Warren District Licensing and Commercial Standards
 Section. I'm assigned to the Ohio Turnpike.
- Q. Okay. You are good at this. How long have you been with the Patrol?
- 16 A. 22 years almost.
- Q. Okay. And what are your duties in that capacity in your job?
 - A. Nowadays it is simply traffic enforcement and commercial motor vehicle inspections that occur on the Ohio Turnpike.
- Q. Okay. And do you have any specific training in that area, any continuing education, certification?
- 25 A. When I first started this 10 years ago,

in my section we spent about six weeks in Columbus being trained on all the aspects of the inspection process. We have annual training that takes place on a yearly basis every single year, and I have close to 9,000 inspections under my belt, if that means anything for training purposes.

- Q. Great. Okay. Are motor carrier inspections conducted to protect the safety of the Ohio traveling public?
 - A. Yes, sir.

- Q. And I think you might have touched on this, but how many inspections on average do you say you perform in a normal year?
- A. Anywhere between 800 to a thousand depending on what the day brings.

- Q. And is this a Patrol record?
- A. I believe this is the Public Utilities

 Commission's version of the inspection that I

 generate.
- Q. Okay. But the information contained in it is --
 - A. It's identical, yes, sir.
 - Q. Okay. And it is kept in the ordinary course of business?
- 11 A. Yes, sir.
 - Q. And so the information in this document is an accurate reflection of the report you filled out on July 31, 2019, following the inspection of Bryan Pettiford?
- 16 A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Do you recall why you stopped
- 18 | Mr. Pettiford?
 - A. The inspection, as old as it is, I'm inferring this, but in the regular course of my duties when I stop someone for an obvious violation, which I did in this case, the violation that exists in the report that reflects that is the fact there were no company markings on the truck. So I can only infer that would have to be the reason for which I

pulled him over in this case.

- Q. Okay. And can you read the first violation listed on Staff Exhibit 1.
- A. Yes. "Driving a CMV while CDL is suspended for a safety-related or unknown reason and in state of driver's license issuance."
- Q. And how did you come to the conclusion that that violation had occurred?
- A. Every driver that we stop we run them through Ohio LEADS as well as the federal side of it which is the CDLIS program. In this case the driver would have had a Class D -- non-CDL Class D, so we only run them through Ohio LEADS where he comes up suspended.

- Q. And this shows the system that you used to determine Mr. Pettiford's CDL was suspended?
- A. Yes, sir. The first photograph is of the Ohio LEADS entry on my MCT. The second one is the prescreen entry on the Aspen program by which we perform our inspections.
- Q. Okay. And you commonly, as part of your job, whenever you do an inspection check to make sure a CDL is valid and not expired?
 - A. Yes; yes, sir.
 - Q. Okay. Okay. Let's move on. If you look back at Staff Exhibit 1, the second violation listed there.
- 19 A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Can you go ahead and tell me what that is.
- A. Yes, sir. The driver had no logbook.

 The violation is no record of duty status when one is
 required with an ELD not being required. The driver

 made statements to me during the stop that he, in

fact, did not have a logbook.

- Q. Okay. And if you look at inspection notes on Staff Exhibit 1, can you read that last sentence for me.
- A. "Driver stated he knew he was suspended, and that he did not complete a logbook."
- Q. Okay. So is it your professional opinion that Mr. Pettiford was in violation of the rule requiring him to have a record of duty status?
 - A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Is there anything else important to note for the record today?
- A. Those are the two major out-of-service violations, probably the most specific pertaining to why we are here. The only other offenses were the warning that the driver received for his address not being correct on his license, the markings violation for which I pulled him over for, the fact that his carrier had not paid their UCR fee for that current year, and the fact his license plate light was missing.

- Q. Okay. Can you explain how the Commission determines the amount of a given forfeiture?
- A. Sure. The violations are divided into groups. The mechanical violations are divided into groups based upon their likelihood to cause a crash and then there are driver authority and insurance violations that are in a separate group. Those always have a fine. Mechanical violations only have a fine if they are marked as out of service by the inspector.
- Q. And the Commission applies this process uniformly to everyone?
 - A. Yes, sir.
- MR. SHEPPARD: Your Honor, may I approach the witness?
- 17 EXAMINER WILLIAMS: Yes.
- MR. SHEPPARD: I would like to have
 marked as Staff Exhibit 3 a document dated August 2,
 20 2019, the Notice of Apparent Violation and Intent to
 Assess Forfeiture.
- 22 EXAMINER WILLIAMS: So marked.
- 23 (EXHIBIT MARKED FOR IDENTIFICATION.)

 - A. Correct.
- Q. Okay. Is the document that you see a Commission record?

- A. I really don't know how that happened because really our whole system is automated, so I'm not sure.
 - Q. Okay. But at some point then presumably the address -- the recognition that the address was different than what was provided the Trooper contained in the incident report.
 - A. Yes. We realized it was not correct.
 - Q. And then tell me for my further understanding or repeat understanding the obligation generally of drivers to keep their addresses current.
 - A. Well, I don't know that I can quote state

law. I believe they have 10 days to notify the Bureau of Motor Vehicles of an address change.

- Q. And you are not aware of any information regarding any updated addresses beyond what we have here.
- A. We did not get any updated information.
