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

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The Birch Solar project will create significant new revenue that will stay local and bring \$2.7 million of additional dollars each year to schools and other community services. Lightsource bp has committed to a \$500,000 Community Fund to help support local needs.

Most important to me and my family are the 400 direct jobs along with an additional 400 indirect jobs, during 12+ month construction, with a minimum of 80% local labor.

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





Dear Board:

I am writing to the Board in opposition to the subject solar project. I am an appointed person of the Board of County Commissioners, Allen County, Ohio assigned the responsibility to oversee and manage the Allen County, Ohio Sanitary Sewer District in accordance with the statutes of Sections 6117 and 6103 of the Ohio Revised Code. One of my primary duties is to facilitate the development and expansion of our public sanitary sewer infrastructure providing for the ability to expand residential, industrial, retail and commercial development within our County Sewer District.

Our mission and goal as a County utility is to ensure that potable water supplies and sanitary sewer disposal service are available to support development through the planning established within long range planning of water and sewer utilities. In order for the County to cost effectively facilitate infrastructure development providing service to current residents with failing private on-lot treatment systems and future land development initiatives it is paramount to support land use that will provide for residential, industrial, retail and commercial development. This will ensure that centralized potable water and sanitary sewer facilities are able to be constructed in a fiscally feasible manner. Utility systems are initially planned, developed and constructed in a manner taking into account an economy of scale with growth and consolidation of utility systems.

The construction of the Birch Solar 1 Project as presented would eliminate the ability for the County to expand its sanitary sewer collection system within the Shawnee Sewer Sub-district due to the loss of developable land and making it extremely difficult to serve current residents in economically feasible manner. This project would be constructing a virtual wall along our current southern border of the Shawnee Sewer Sub-district collection system making it financially impossible to complete further expansion south of the County's water and sewer infrastructure.

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

Dear Governor DeWine:

We, Ohio medical professionals, have responsibilities to care for our patients' immediate health concerns. We know that the welfare of our patients depends on having access not only to excellent healthcare, but also to healthy food, water, and air. For this to happen, our elected officials need to accelerate our state's transition to a renewable energy economy.

Ohio is among the top ten energy consumers in the United States. Currently, the majority of our power supply comes from over 20 coal and natural gas power plants. Due to these power plants, high emission industries, and our transportation infrastructure, Ohio ranks sixth in carbon dioxide emissions in the US. Air pollution-related to fossil fuel combustion, including sulfur dioxide, surface ozone, and fine particulate matter, causes a host of health harms to Ohioans, especially to our children.

The Asthma and Allergy Foundation of America's 2019 report on the Top 100 Asthma Capitals ranked Akron, Cleveland, Dayton, Toledo, Columbus, and Cincinnati among the most challenging places to live for people with asthma. Over 250,000 of Ohio's children have asthma, and African-American and Hispanic children are disproportionately impacted. Air pollution both causes and exacerbates asthma, and also contributes to poor birth outcomes such as premature birth and low birth weight, both of which are risk factors for infant mortality, a public health crisis in our state. Moreover, a study conducted by Cincinnati Children's Hospital Medical Center found that children exposed to traffic-related air pollution showed reductions in brain size and cerebrospinal fluid (the fluid cushioning the brain), leading to various developmental and physical delays. Even prenatal exposure to air pollution affects kids' learning, cognition, attention, and sleep. These are a few of many examples. The list of studies highlighting harmful health effects of our current energy sector is growing each day.

Even though the health harms of fossil fuel burning have been documented extensively, too little has been done at the state level to advance clean, renewable energy, and sustainable, equitable transportation. One of the most recent examples is the passing of House Bill 6, which rolled back renewable energy standards and energy efficiency programs, while subsidizing two coal-fired power plants. Fortunately, many Ohio cities—like Cleveland, Cincinnati, Columbus, and others—have stepped up to help fill the void of state leadership, and have used aggregation to commit to 100 percent renewable energy. These communities are serving as an example of what can be done to commit to improving air quality and ensuring a healthy environment for our citizens, and it is time for the state of Ohio to follow their lead

As health professionals living and working in Ohio, we ask the state legislature and governor to immediately reinstate Ohio's renewable energy standards and energy efficiency programs, to invest in public transportation and improve electric vehicle infrastructure, and to set concrete goals to transition fossil fuel-based power plants to renewable energy by 2050. The health of Ohio's families---especially our children-depends on it.
