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MR. WILLIAMS: We're on the record. Good evening, everyone, and welcome. The Public Utilities Commission of Ohio has assigned for public hearing at this time and place, Case Number 21-595-WW-AIR, which is captioned "in the matter of the application of Aqua Ohio, Inc. to increase its rates and charges for its waterworks services. And also Case Number 21-596-SC-AIR, which is captioned: In the matter of the application of Aqua Ohio Wastewater, Inc. to increase its rates and charges for its wastewater service.

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My name is Michael Williams and I am one 12 13 of the two attorney examiners assigned by the 14 Commission to preside over this hearing. With us 15 tonight are two of our commissioners. We have vice 16 chair, Beth Trombold. We have commissioner, Larry 17 And I'd invite if you'd like to make any Friedeman. 18 comments to make comments prior to the proceedings.

19 MS. TROMBOLD: I just want to say thank you for 20 coming tonight. This is one part of a large process 21 that this case is going through. And we will 22 certainly take your comments into consideration as we consider the final decision in the case. 23 So 24 thank you for being here today. I am here to 25 listen. And we're two of the five commissioners

that will be making a decision, a final decision on the case in the coming months.

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MR. FRIEDEMAN: Thank you. To echo Commissioner Trumbold's comments. A rate case is an in-depth process. That being said, the testimony that you guys provide today is really valuable to the commissioners in the decision-making process. So thank you very much for showing up and we look forward to listening to your perspective.

MR. WILLIAMS: Thank you, commissioners. There are also members of the commission staff here tonight. Jill Cokier is there in the blue blazer. And you might have encountered Brad Berner, who's with the service monitoring and enforcement department. He's in the hallway, I believe.

PUCO staff members are available to you if you have any questions regarding general utility matters after tonight's event. At this time I would like to take appearances from the parties in this case beginning with the company.

MR. MILLER: So, Your Honor, thank you. Christopher L. Miller and Nicole R. Woods with the law firm Ice Miller, 250 West Street, Columbus, Ohio 43215.

MR. WILLIAMS: Thank you. I also note that two

parties have intervened and I'll invite their 1 2 appearances as well. Is anyone here for Ohio 3 Consumers' Counsel. Seeing none. Is there anyone 4 here from the City of Marion? 5 MR. RUSSELL: Yes. Mark Russell, City Law 6 Director on behalf of the city of Marion. 7 MR. WILLIAMS: Thank you, Mr. Russell. 8 The subject of today's public hearing 9 are the separate applications of Aqua Ohio, Inc., 10 which I'll refer to at times as Aqua, and Aqua Ohio 11 Wastewater, Inc., which I might refer to as AWI. То 12 increase rates for waterworks and wastewater 13 services. 14 On June 28th, 2021, Aqua filed an 15 application for an increase in rates. Aqua is requesting to increase its annual revenues by 16 17 approximately \$8,290,405, or 12.1 percent. Also on June 28, 2021, AWI filed a 18 19 separate application for increase in its rates. AWI 20 is requesting to increase its annual revenues by 21 approximately \$454,404, or 12.77 percent. 22 Relative to Aqua's case, staff filed its 23 report of investigation on February 11th, 2022. 24 Staff recommends lowering Aqua's increase to a range 25 between \$2,264,605 to \$4,119,595, which is between

3.28 percent and 5.97 percent above current rates. 1 2 Staff's report is a recommendation only, and the 3 final decision will ultimately be made by the 4 commission. 5 Relative to the AWI case, staff filed 6 its report of investigation on February 11th, 2022. Staff recommends lowering AWI's increase to a range 7 8 between \$167,839 to \$256,662, which is between 9 4.72 percent and 7.21 percent above current rates. 10 Again, staff's report is a 11 recommendation only and the final decision will 12 ultimately be made by the Commission. 13 The local public hearings scheduled in 14 this matter are only one aspect of the process. An 15 evidentiary hearing is currently scheduled to convene at the Commission's offices in Columbus on 16 17 the May the 9th, 2022. 18 The purpose of tonight's hearing is to 19 receive comments from the public regarding the 20 company's application. This evening is not a 21 question-and-answer session. Representatives from 22 the companies and staff may be able to speak to any 23 concerns after the hearing ends. Tonight's hearing 24 is being transcribed by a court reporter, and any 25 testimony given will be incorporated into the

official record of this case. And it will be reviewed and considered by the Commission in making their final decision on the applications.

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If you do plan to testify, please speak clearly so that the court reporter can accurately reflect your comments on the record. If you decide you do not wish to testify, you may submit written comments under Case Number 21-595-WW-AIR and/or 21-596-ST-AIR on the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio's website or by mail.

In just a minute I'll begin calling 11 witnesses from the list of people who have signed up 12 to testify in this matter. Before you give your 13 14 comments, I will swear you in and then ask you to 15 state and spell your name for the record and state 16 your address. After you testify, you can have a 17 seat or you're welcome to leave whenever you are 18 ready. Should you decide that you do not want to 19 testify, when I call your name you can merely pass 20 to the next witness.

Again, the Commission appreciates your participation in tonight's hearing. At this time I'll be begin by calling witnesses. Our first registered witness is Joshua Feliciano.

MR. FELICIANO: Pass.

MR. WILLIAMS: Our second witness is Mark 1 2 Russell. 3 MR. RUSSELL: Good evening again. 4 MR. WILLIAMS: Mr. Russell, I'm going to swear Do you swear or affirm the testimony you're 5 you in. 6 about to give is the truth? 7 MR. RUSSELL: I do. 8 MR. WILLIAMS: Thank you. Could you please 9 state and spell your name for us? 10 MR. RUSSELL: Mark Russell, M-A-R-K, 11 R-U-S-S-E-L-L. MR. WILLIAMS: And your professional address? 12 13 MR. RUSSELL: 233 West Center Street, Marion, 14 Ohio. 15 MR. WILLIAMS: Thank you. Please proceed. Thank you. Appreciate the 16 MR. RUSSELL: 17 opportunity to speak with you this evening. And my 18 attendance is not to offer testimony but just to 19 thank you for traveling to Marion, Ohio. As you 20 indicated earlier, the city of Marion has intervened 21 in the case and as a participant in the process 22 going forward before the Commission. I just wanted 23 the opportunity to thank you for traveling. It's 24 important for you to hear from our consumers 25 locally, and it has great meaning. And I appreciate

that. Thank you.

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MR. WILLIAMS: Thank you, Mr. Russell. Our next registered individual is Joanne Brooks. Next I have Terry Cline.

MR. CLINE: Geez. Come on, people. If I'm going to be the only one. Come on.

MR. WILLIAMS: Good evening, Mr. Cline. Could you raise your right hand. Do you swear or affirm the testimony you're about to give is the truth?

MR. CLINE: I do.

MR. WILLIAMS: Thank you. Would you please state and spell your name for us?

MR. CLINE: Terry Cline, T-E-R-R-Y, C-L-I-N-E.
MR. WILLIAMS: And your address, sir?
MR. CLINE: 400 East George here in Marion.
MR. WILLIAMS: Thank you. Please proceed with
your testimony.

18 MR. CLINE: Aqua, about 2010 they scared the 19 hell out of the community. They wanted to take 20 chlorine out of the water and use ammonia because it 21 was cheaper. There was no public relations 22 whatsoever. They snuck behind closed doors with the 23 mayor and the county commissioners. It came to 24 light finally when there were public hearings about 25 it. But they literally scared the hell out of

people, because they did not extend the courtesy of saying, "Hey, we're the new water company. Here's what we are doing."

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Not too long ago they had a rate increase. I believe I think it was 2017. But as Mr. Russell mentioned to me earlier, there is a little clause in the law that if they do upgrades they can increase the rates. Well, they acquired the system from Ohio American. I'm concerned what kind of company is this that buys a company knowing there needs to be serious upgrades. As I recall, that was the reason they wanted the first increase back in '17.

Why doesn't the leadership of Aqua cut 14 15 their own salaries, show a leap of faith, put their money where their mouth is and try to contain those 16 17 costs and get other people's money instead of the consumers and the citizens of Marion. 18 The customer 19 service at Aqua leaves little to be desired. When 20 calling, it's a nightmare. You might as well as be 21 trying to call someone at IBM. That's how 22 ridiculous their customer service is. That to me is 23 an indication of what management at this company how 24 they treat their consumers. They don't care. 25 Otherwise, they would have a good customer service,

and you can talk with people. And those people at the other end of the line would instill confidence in you. They don't. They're poor at doing this. The rate increase. If they can't run their own system, work within their own means, just like the consumer has to in these wonderful economic times, too bad. Maybe they should sell to someone else who can do it. If they get their increase, my understanding is a gallon of water will be a dollar

29. You can go to the grocery store and buy a gallon of water for a dollar 29 and sometimes less.

I think it boils down to an issue of trust. Do we trust Aqua? How in good conscience can the citizens of our community trust Aqua?

Furthermore, in light of PUCO's San Randazzo and Larry Householder, how can the citizens of Marion trust PUCO? Thank you.

MR. WILLIAMS: Thank you, Mr. Cline. Next we
have Patricia Franklin. Good evening Ms. Franklin.
MS. FRANKLIN: Good evening.

21 MR. WILLIAMS: Would you raise your right hand. 22 Do you swear or affirm that the testimony you're 23 about to give is truth?

24 MS. FRANKLIN: Yes.

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25 MR. WILLIAMS: Could you please state and spell

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your name for the record?

MS. FRANKLIN: Patricia, P-A-T-R-I-C-I-A, A-N-N, Franklin, F-R-A-N-K-L-I-N, 150 Spencer Street Marion, Ohio 43302.

MR. WILLIAMS: Thank you. Please proceed.

MS. FRANKLIN: And I just wanted to just go on record to voice a complaint against the rate hike. I'm retired so. I'm on a, I know you've probably heard this million times, fixed income. Which when I was in customer service years ago we'd hear that complaint all the time and I didn't -- I didn't think that much about it till now I am on a fixed income. And any little rate increase like this, the way I understand it, it would end up being a total of like \$10.58 combined for the water rate and the sewer rate. And if that, my water bill goes up that much then I'm going to have to try to cut back somewhere else. And with food prices the way everything is going up nowadays, it's gonna -- you know, it will make a little bit hard on all of us senior citizens. And I just wanted to voice my complaint against it. And if there was some way that if they do have to make a rate increase, I think the city would want them to do it by half -half of what they're asking. And if there was some

way to give the senior citizens a break, like they give us a break on our property taxes. I just wanted to request that. And that's about -- that's about it. Only it does worry me when I hear about what Mr. Cline was saying, because then I start to think, well, how long has it been since they haven't done anything about water pipes and stuff like that. And then I think all the problems they had in Detroit with the lead. So now that makes me wonder what condition are our pipes in here in Marion. Because I've known had several problems with my I've had to have that replaced several sewer line. And I think -- I'm wondering what shape the times. water pipes that are coming in and the water I'm drinking, if I'm getting any lead. So I just wanted to voice my complaints.

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17 MR. WILLIAMS: Thank you for coming out this 18 evening. Thank you for taking the time to testify. 19 I want to make sure that everybody is heard from who 20 would like to be heard from. So Joshua Feliciano? 21 No. Okay, thank you, sir. And then one more time 22 for Joanne Brooks. She left, okay.

That's all the testimony that we have signed up to hear tonight. So I want to thank everybody for coming out this evening. This will

conclude this evening's public hearing, and it will be submitted on the record for the Commission's consideration in this case. Staff will be here for a little while in case you have any questions about the commission's process or how to file written comments in this case after tonight's hearing, should you chose to do so. Otherwise I want to thank you everyone again, and encourage you to have a nice evening. We are off the record. (Hearing concluded.)
