Could you tell me about that?

- A. I have taken the North American classes. There is a Part A and a Part B which goes over -- it's a Federal test and classes that it's for standardization so that the way I inspect a truck or a driver is the same as somebody in Utah would inspect a driver and a truck also. So it's a uniform system of training.
 - Q. Is there any ongoing training?
 - A. Once a year we have an ongoing training that we will come up to Columbus up to the Academy and it will be one to three days worth of training.
 - Q. Thank you. And I am getting back to the document that I have just handed you. And how did you describe that, was is that document?
 - A. It's a typical inspection report.
 - Q. Is this document in the same condition or substantially as it was when you created it?
- 21 A. Yes, ma'am.

- Q. What is the reason for you producing this report in the inspection of Mr. Berhe's motor vehicle?
- A. Well, this would have been prepared

- Q. What is Staff Exhibit 2?
- A. This is the inspection from
 the State of Kentucky that their inspector did
 the same job that I do and he did an inspection
 and found that the driver didn't have an ELD
 turned on and he didn't have any paper logs.
 - Q. Anything else listed in that report?
- A. He didn't have a copy of his medical card. No periodic inspection, didn't have

insurance card. Driver's license wasn't in his possession. And he an IFTA violation.

- Q. So then he would have been placed out of service in Kentucky; is that correct?
 - A. Correct.
 - Q. And then he moves on to Ohio.
 - A. Correct.

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- Q. And we didn't see any ELD, no log books. So there was no way to verify that he had done his out of service time. Is that what we are talking about?
- A. Well, in order to become legal when you are put out for not having an ELD and paper logs, you have to serve your 10 hours, yes, but then you have to become legal to move on, which you either have to have your ELD turned on and fixed, or your paper logs, and filling them out as you are going. Without that you can't move.
 - O. And he had neither of those?
 - A. Correct.

21 MS. BAIR: Okay. I have no further 22 questions of this witness, your Honor.

EXAMINATION

- Q. Inspector Johnson, a question. Did this driver have in his vehicle and ELD that could have been turned on?
 - A. Possibly.

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- Q. Possibly.
- A. Because they are typically on their phones, and then there is a box that plugs into the OBT port so then they Bluetooth and talk to each other.
- Q. So it's not really a device that's like in the cab itself or something else?
- A. Yes. There is a box that talks to the computer on the truck. And then you can easily download and buy a program for your cell phone or tablet or a hard wired product.
- Q. So, you don't really know if the driver even had an ELD?
- A. Correct

- A. And according to what I wrote on here it says ELD turned --

 - Q. And what are your duties as Chief?
- A. Specifically related to this, my duty is to administer the civil forfeiture process for the Transportation Department.
- Q. And before you did that what was your background?
- A. I spent nearly 30 years with the Ohio State Highway Patrol. My last position with them was the District 6 Commercial Enforcement Coordinator. I have training in North American Standards Parts A and B, cargo tank, hazmat, and general, and bulk hazmat and also motor coach.
- Q. Okay. And could you please take a look at what has been marked as Staff Exhibit 2?

 Do you recognize this document?

- Q. Did you review this document in preparation for the hearing?
- A. I did, yes.
- Q. Is this document kept in the regular Commission records?
- 20 A. Yes, it is.
- Q. Can you explain how the civil
- 22 forfeiture in this case was derived?
- A. Sure. All violations that are
- 24 listed on inspections are once they are uploaded
- 25 they come into our system. Our system is

automated for non-hazmat inspections and non-hazmat violations.

So in this case it was not a hazmat inspection. These violations were handled by the quote-unquote computer.

Our violations are broken down into different groups depending upon the severity of the violation. For mechanical violations they are divided into groups 0, 1, 2 and 3. Zero Group violation never get a fine.

Groups 1, 2 and 3 get a fine if they are marked as out of service violations.

And then Group 4 violations are driver behavior violations along with insurance and authority related violations.

In this particular inspection there were two violations that were assessed against the driver. The 395.13 for violating an out of service order always has a fine amount of \$3,174, considered a very serious violation.

And the 395.8A ELD since it was marked as out of service on the inspection, that generated a \$100 fine which is the amount it generates on every inspection when it's marked as such.

- Q. And is this penalty consistent with the recommended fine schedule and recommended civil penalty procedure adopted by the Commercial Motor Vehicle Alliance?
 - A. Yes, it is.
- Q. And what is the total forfeiture amount?
 - A. The total amount is \$3,274.
 - Q. And do you believe this is a correct forfeiture amount for this case?
- 11 A. I do, yes.

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- Q. Would you recommend this amount to the Commission?
- A. I would. And I would also add that
 that particular violation, violating the out of
 service, that fine amount is specifically
 enumerated in the Federal Motor Carrier Safety
 regulations. It's not -- that is the amount
 that we have to fine somebody for that
 violation.
- Q. In other words, it's applied uniformly?
- A. It is. Not just uniformly applied within Ohio, but that is the fine for anybody who has a violation anywhere in the country.

YOHANNES BERHE

called as a witness, being first duly sworn, testified as follows:

2.1

DIRECT TESTIMONY

ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Well, Mr. Berhe, then go ahead and explain any disagreements you have with what the alleged violations are, or why you think they are not violations.

MR. BERHE: My objection is -- my perspective as I state to the facts, when I initially got pulled over -- so this incident began in Kentucky, and began with the officer doing a roadside inspection.

During the inspection I did lack documents in regards to my IFTA, my insurance, registration. That was because the company said they were going to e-mail it to me because they had just begun the company and I just began working with them as well.

So during the inspection I was asked for these documents. I did not have them. But I said I could have the company send it via phone. But he was not willing to accept that. I understood.

Then went on to my out of service

documents, proof of my drive time. I told him that my ELD system is not currently working, it's malfunctioning. And my company advised me that I can use my log for 15 days until they fix the ELD system.

EXAMINATION

By the Attorney Examiner:

- Q. Did they advise you to use the logbook? You mean paper logbook?
- A. Yes. So, unfortunately, the State
 Trooper blatantly lied and said I did not have
 logbook, which I do and I have it on me today as
 well.

Your Honor, I know maybe it's hard to swallow, maybe it's hard to believe a citizen over a State Trooper, but the State Trooper did blatantly lie and say that I did not have the logbook when in fact that I did have the logbook to show him where I came from, and where I was going.

- But, he said that I did not have a logbook. And I did.
- Q. You are describing what's going on in Kentucky?
- A. Yes. Because this grew to -- and I

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am sorry if I am not supposed to do that. If
you want me to just stay --
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- Q. No, that is okay. So you are describing, I am looking at the Kentucky inspection report that started at 6:00 P.M. and ended at 7:30 p.m.
 - A. That's correct.
- Q. So you have addressed the matter of the -- you are saying that when you were in Kentucky then actually with paper logbooks?
- 11 Q. Yes.

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- Q. You had completed?
- 13 A. Yes.
- Q. And that wasn't taken into account.

 Okay.
- 16 A. That is correct. Yes, sir.
- Q. Okay. All right. And really
 the other violation on here that was of
 significance as far as Kentucky it says driver
 failed to retain previous seven days record of
 duty status, no log, not current.
- And again you are indicating you did

 have a current log and it was a paper log?
- 24 A. Yes, I did, your Honor.
 - Q. Okay. Then I am assuming also that

since this inspection ended at 7:30 p.m. that finished your day, you didn't proceed after that. I am correct?

A. That is correct. And, your Honor, I brought today with me, basically you are able to see exactly my being put out of service. I did my 10 hours, and you will see on the logbook that there is no way that I can make it to see him the next day unless I did 10 hours. It takes four hours and 45 minutes to go from London, Kentucky to Butler, Ohio where I was pulled over.

You have to do 10 hours in order to make it to Butler, Ohio. In other words, I did my 10- hours, did my paper log. And the same incident occurred with him. He pulled me over.

- Q. You are referring to Inspector Johnson in Ohio?
- A. That is correct, yes. When I saw
 him as well it was the same matter. He claimed
 that I don't have a logbook when I in fact that
 I did have a logbook.

Your Honor, they were after me, just to let you know, they were after me. For whatever this is worth, I must say that I

understand we must stay on the facts, but I just want to let you know this was an intentional premeditated thought on their behalf.

And I say that because the minute that I was pulled over in Kentucky the State Trooper made a comment saying that he said you have several violations in the past for out of service. And he said it's always the same excuse, ELD malfunctioning.

And, your Honor, I do have several violations in the past. And I want to let you know there has never been an intention to drive more, or rather be bullied by companies to keep going and to my arm being twisted at times and having to use logbook, ELD and not having enough knowledge to conduct myself throughout my six years of driving.

So I racked up those violations. I am just being truthful. But nevertheless on this particular incident the State Trooper was motivated by the several past violations to put me off the road as if I was, No. 1, doing it intentionaly. No. 2, this particular day I had everything proper. I had my logbook, I had everything that was needed for him not to put me

out of service in regards to my driving hours.

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And I brought my logbook, the same logbook with me that I had with him and also with the State Trooper Johnson here today as well. So I just want to let you know there was a motive behind this action.

But nevertheless, I just want to let you know I had my logbook in Kentucky, I had my logbook in Ohio. And there is no way that I can make it to Ohio without doing 10 hours. As you can see the time line, I did ten hours and met Mr. Johnson at 10:00 A.M. the next morning.

- Q. So what you are telling me again is that you are admitting that your electronic or ELD was not operating, was not working either in Kentucky or Ohio?
 - A. That's correct.
- Q. And you are saying that you did though at the recommendation of your employer have a paper logbook when you were in Kentucky as well as when you traveled through Ohio?
 - A. Which is legal, yes, sir.
- Q. And did you show the paper logbook to Inspector Johnson here in Ohio?
- A. (Nods head).

They was standing on 22 the side of the highway. There was several 23 trucks behind, several trucks behind me, in

front of me. I was in the middle.

- 20 By the Attorney Examiner:
- Q. Wait. Before you go, you said you
- 22 | had the paper logbook. Do you have any other
- 23 | documentation at all today?
- A. I have all the documents. As I
- 25 | mentioned to you as far as no registration, the

company being new, by the way, the company new, they was just getting their stuff together, but I made a statement saying I lacked a few documents, but I just want it to be known they had a registration, they had insurance, they had everything that was needed.

The case against me in Kentucky was dismissed, and I brought that document as well. That was dismissed because I was able to prove that the truck had insurance, had a logbook, and that sort -- I brought every document to prove as to what I am saying with regards to my logbook, in regards to the insurance, in regards to -- so everything was good on the truck and on my hours of service that day, your Honor. And I brought all the documents needed.

ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Well, let's pause for a moment. Let's go off the record just for a minute.

(DISCUSSION OFF THE RECORD)

- Q. Mr. Berhe, you said you had the paper logbooks?
 - A. Yes.

Q. And you are saying what neither inspector in either state wanted to see

the logbooks even though you offered them to the inspector.

- A. They saw the logbook, but they did not -- they saw the logbook is what I am saying. And I know in my heart they blatantly lied, your Honor.
- Q. Now, you are also saying that there was some sort of letter from the State of Kentucky that wiped the slate clean and even though you had a violation in Kentucky during that inspection?
- A. That is correct, yes, sir. Yes.

 The charge that the initial officer, I had to go to court for that in London, Kentucky. I was able to show proof and the case was dismissed.

Now I stand with you again to plead my case and to let you know whatever may be needed in regards to my -- and I want to let you know, your Honor, I am not here trying to beat any system, I am trying to -- I just want you to know the officer blatantly lied in regards to me having a logbook.

Now, as to their -- as to why they would be unprofessional that way, I cannot answer for that. All I know is, your Honor, I

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had my logbook in both incidents. Did my 10
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     hours and you will -- if you will see, if I did
     not have a logbook would I do 10 hours?

And the proof is in the pudding that there is no way that I can meet up with him the next day unless I had done 10 hours. And as you can see the Google map that I pulled up shows exactly, precisely, precisely without a shadow of a doubt that I did 10 hours to be at the scene the next day. Exactly as 10 hours.

So, I just wanted to make that last

35 comment and say please take that into 1 2 consideration with regards to the conclusion of 3 this matter ATTORNEY EXAMINER: All right. Thank 4 5 you. Please take your seat. MR. BERHE: Yes, your Honor. 6 Thank 7 you. ATTORNEY EXAMINER: You are welcome. 8 9 And, Inspector Johnson, come back up here. You 10 have already been sworn in. - Q. Okay. That is what it says in the report, turned off or malfunctioning.

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- A. I don't even know any State Troopers
 in Kentucky.
- 10 Q. So you have never contacted a State
 11 Trooper in Kentucky?
- 12 A. No, ma'am.
- Q. Has a State Trooper in Kentucky contacted you?
- 15 A. No, ma'am.
- MS. BAIR: Thank you. I have
- 17 nothing further.
- 18 EXAMINATION
- 19 By the Attorney Examiner:
- Q. Inspector Johnson, I have a question
- 21 for you.
- 22 A. Yes.
- Q. You indicated here, and, of course,
- 24 the major fine is driving after being declared
- 25 out of service.

Help me out. When you conducted the inspection in Ohio then you placed the driver, Mr. Berhe, out of service because he did not have -- am I correct you placed him out of service because he did not have either an electronic or paper logbook.

Am I right? Or what was the reason for placing him out of service just so I understand?

- A. In Kentucky he was placed out of service for not having an ELD or paper logs.

 So, with that being said, you have to take your 10-hour break, and then you can deliver the load he is on, which was running from somewhere in South Carolina to Hebron, Kentucky, according to the Kentucky report.
- Then you cannot drive again until you have an ELD.
- 19 Q. Or paper log?
- 20 A. No, no.

2.1

- Q. You have to have an ELD?
- A. Because he was driving without an
 ELD or paper logs in Kentucky. You are allowed
 to deliver the load you are on.
- Q. After doing out of service in

Kentucky.

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- A. Ten hours, you can deliver the load.

 And then you are out of service again until you get an ELD.
- 5 Q. Until an ELD or some other form of logbook?
 - A. No.
 - Q. It's required now --
 - A. That is an ELD required truck. So when he got to Hebron, Kentucky and delivered his Amazon load he had to stay there until his ELD was working again.
 - He then left Amazon in Hebron and was heading to the Amazon in Monroe, Ohio to pick up another load. So at that point he can't be on the road. And that is part of the ELD hours of service violation that he is placed out for.
 - Q. Okay. Now I understand. So you are indicating that when he traveled into Ohio and you did the inspection --
 - A. That entire time he could not be driving without an ELD.
- Q. And you confirmed that by checking, during the inspection you found no ELD?

A. Correct.

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- Q. Okay. Be it on his cell phone or anywhere else?
 - A. Correct.

5 ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Okay. Mr.

6 Berhe, you had a question?

MR. BERHE: Yes, your Honor.

He just blatantly contradicted himself. He said initially, when he was on the stand before, he said once a person is put out of service, after that their option is to either have a working ELD or have a logbook.

And now he is saying they can only have an ELD. So I just wanted to insert that in there.

He blatantly said, I believe, said, do you remember when he said that? I don't know how you can rewind and looking back, but he said the person can have a logbook or ELD.

So I am asking a question as to why
is he contradicting himself?

22 ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Mr. Johnson, can 23 you respond to that?

24 THE WITNESS: I am not

25 contradicting myself. That is a completely

different kind of out of service. If you are placed out of service for certain things you have to comply with certain rules.

2.1

When it's an ELD out of service for not having it, at the end of it you can drive on paper logs to your very next delivery, the one that you are currently on. You can't go further. You have to have an ELD after that.

After you made your delivery.

ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Okay. But you are indicating that is because the kind vehicle it is?

THE WITNESS: No. It's because of the type of out of service he was placed on.

Because he was placed out of service initially for not having an ELD or paper logs.

Because if you have a malfunctioning ELD you can drive 8 days in a 30-day period. But he chose not to go that route.

Initially if he had been stopped in Kentucky with paper logs he can have them for 8 days in a 30-day period. And he has to mark on there saying malfunctioning ELD. And then his company would also send him his previous seven days.

ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Previous seven 1 2 days on paper, I assume? 3 THE WITNESS: Via e-mail of or some sort so that he would had have proof saying this 4 5 is what I have done in the past. And then from 6 that point he can do 8 days on paper. 7 But he never did any of that. He just either it was turned off or was 8 9 malfunctioning ELD and driving without a paper 10 log at all. 11 ATTORNEY EXAMINER: So when he got 12 to you, to the inspection in Ohio, he needed to 13 have an ELD that operated? 14 THE WITNESS: Correct. 15 ATTORNEY EXAMINER: And you are 16 saying at that point paper log wouldn't have 17 been enough? 18 THE WITNESS: It wouldn't have been 19 an option. It had to have been an ELD. 20 Because he had already made his delivery from 2.1 the previous day where he was placed out of 2.2 service. 23 MR. BERHE: I have one more 24 question. 25 ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Mr. Berhe.

MR. BERHE: If possible.

2 ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Do you have a

3 | question?

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MR. BERHE: Yes.

CROSS-EXAMINATION

By Mr. Berhe:

- Q. In regards to never having communication with other State Troopers, you say you never contacted, spoke to any Kentucky State Troopers; correct?
 - A. Correct.
- Q. I wanted to ask you how is that

 possible? When DOT stations, and I am just

 asking -- first I want to mention, all DOT are

 Federal police officer -- State Troopers. And

 having driven six years and every year there is

 an event that you guys conduct, which is

 periodically to check for drivers on the road.

And are you saying that you -- a next door neighbor state, you never had any -- you never had any -- you never conducted any operation with other DOT inspectors?

- A. Other DOT inspectors, yes, but never from another state.
- Q. Okay. Is it because it's not legal

or just not a custom?

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- A. Because it's another state.
- Q. Is it bazaar or abnormal to contact another State Trooper in another state? You are adamant in saying never contacted anybody in Kentucky.
- 7 A. I would have no reason to contact 8 another state.
- 9 MR. BERHE: I have no further 10 questions, sir. Thank you.
- 11 ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Any further 12 questions, Ms. Bair?
- MS. BAIR: Nope. Just want to make sure I get my three exhibits moved into evidence.

This gentleman and that officer as

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well blatantly lied and are lying today as well and blatantly saying this gentleman did not have a logbook.

- Q. If you had to be out of service for 10 hours, 7:30 would take you to 5:30 that you are supposed to be out of service; correct?
- A. That is correct. Correct. That day
 that I was pulled, I did my documents as
 presented with my hours, with my clock. I don't
- 19 know what clock he used, but my clock, I
- 20 recorded my record by my clock, and I was
- 21 | finished at 7:00 P.M. with him.
- 22 Q. Why does it say 7:30?
- A. Are you talking about his document;
- 24 correct?
- 25 Q. Yes.

- A. I do not know what his clock said, ma'am. My clock said 7:00 P.M. so I put exactly 7:00 P.M.
- Q. So you are claiming that he didn't tell the truth about looking at your log books and he also didn't tell the truth about completing his own report that the thing ended at 7:30?
- 9 A. No. As to why he put 7:30, no.
 10 Are we fighting over 30 minutes?
- Q. I am not fighting, I am just asking why does it say 7:30?
 - A. Because I don't know, maybe his clock reads 30 minutes past mine. I don't know. But I just know this: I was finished at 7:00 with him, and I did my ten hours properly.
 - Q. What time did you get to Hebron?
 - A. Hebron, Kentucky?
- 19 Q. Yes.

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- A. London, Kentucky? I was pulled over in London, Kentucky. Roadside inspection,
 London, Kentucky.
- Q. Right. And your destination was
 Hebron, Kentucky; right?
- 25 A. That is correct, yes.

- Q. What time did you get there?
- A. So as you can see on my documents,

 it says coworker came and exchanged trailer

 because I was put out of service, a coworker

 came, took my trailer, and I was given an empty
- 6 trailer.

- So when I met up with him as you can see on the document I had an empty trailer.
- 9 I had a loaded trailer with the Kentucky one,
- 10 but I had an empty trailer with him.
- 11 ATTORNEY EXAMINER: With him you are
- 12 referring to Inspector Johnson in Ohio?
- THE WITNESS: That's correct, yes,
- 14 sir.
- 15 ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Okay.
- Q. Okay. Speaking of this log, the one on the 16th, when did you complete that log?
- 18 A. I am sorry. I am sorry.
- 19 Q. When did you complete the log on
- 20 6-16 regarding that day? When did you write
- 21 this?
- 22 A. When did I write --
- 23 Q. This.
- A. The same day.
- 25 | Q. You did that on 6-16?

A. Just to make sure I understand your question, are you asking me -- say that question again. I am sorry. I didn't understand the question.

- Q. Okay. This Driver's Daily Log book that we are discussing, and it says 6-16-2021, I am just curious when you created this?
- A. To answer the question, this was done on the 16th as you can see the document.

 It's a Federal document.
- Q. Okay. And did you present this to this officer when you were stopped?
- A. Yes. To both of the out of state officers who lied today, yes, ma'am.
 - Q. And also not only have they lied today, you are saying, but they also have inaccurately completed their reports, in other words?
 - A. If that is what the conclusion is, yes, ma'am.
- Q. Could I ask you please to look at
 Staff Exhibit 1? That is the Driver's
 Examination report.
 - A. May I grab it?

 MS. BAIR: I got it.

- Q. What time did this inspection start? The upper right-hand corner.
- A. I just want to see. So this is the inspection with Mr. Johnson?
 - Q. Yes.

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- A. The inspection started at 10:05 A.M.
- Q. Okay. And you would agree with me that down on the 17th when you did your logbook you accurately showed that you were not driving at 10:00 o'clock? Would you agree with me?
- 11 A. I am sorry.
- Q. Okay. On your logbook on page
 6-17-21 you indicate that you were not driving
 from 10 to 11; is that correct?
- 15 A. On the 17th?
- 16 Q. Yes.
- A. I didn't understand the question.
- 18 I am so story. Please, what's your question so
- 19 | I can understand it?
- Q. Okay. Happy to repeat it.
- 21 A. Okay.
- Q. When you look at the 17th --
- A. Right.
- Q. Maybe it's 10:15. When do you
- 25 indicate that you are on duty, not driving?

What time is that? You have drawn it down and across. What time is that?

- A. On the 17th?
- O. Yes.

- A. So, it's my understanding and experience that, especially when an officer pulls you over, you go to the nearest dock because how the time line is set in your logbook.
- Q. Yes, I get it. So what time does it look like you were on duty, not driving, in that 10:00 o'clock hour to you as you interpret your own logbook?
 - A. Yes, ma'am. So as recorded on my logbook, I stated that I was driving to 10:15, and went, started the road inspection at 10:15, and that is only because that logbook does not give me a 1 or 2, 3, 4-minute time line to indicate, only gives you an option of 15 minutes, 30 minutes, 45 minutes. So you have to go to the nearest minute. Does that make sense?
- Q. Okay. When did your ELD stop functioning?
- A. So, when I started with this
 company, the same day that I was pulled over, I

am sorry, in Kentucky, I was just starting in Charlotte, North Carolina that day. When I started with them, when I started with them, I got in the truck and they had the proper plugs for the truck.

Never the less, as I was given the truck, I was given the proper plugs, but the plugs were not working or connecting. So when I started with them the plugs were not working.

So just to start over again, I am sorry, I didn't know if you were listening to me.

Q. I heard you.

2.1

A. Yes, ma'am. So when I began, the day that I began with this company, they were proper plugs, the black box as well, to connect to the truck.

When they gave me the truck they gave me the box, and as I attempted to operate it it wouldn't work through my phone. And they used Key Tracking App. So they gave me everything I needed, but it wouldn't work.

So I called my boss. I said it does not work. What should I do? So, via phone he attempted to try to fix it.

After attempting to try to fix it we concluded, me and him concluded, that it's not working. But I do have a load for you, you are legally able to use logbook until we fix the ELD.

EXAMINATION

By the Attorney Examiner:

- Q. If I can stop you for a minute, sir. When you say your employer gave you the box, you are referring to the ELD device?
- A. Yes.

Q. Okay. And you are saying that you had difficulty plugging it in or getting this ELD device, getting it to operate and connected into the cab.

You are also saying that you attempted to get the equivalent of this box, this ELD box, on your cell phone and that didn't work either.

- A. That is correct. It would not operate properly.
- Q. And you are saying that after knowing all that your employer authorized you to go ahead and start to carry a load anyway.
- 25 A. Legally, correct. By using a

- 1 | logbook that I have today with me.
- Q. Okay.
- A. And it's my understanding as well that we can use a logbook.
- Q. When your employer authorizes you to do that, then were you recording on paper logs, or what were you doing exactly?
- A. The minute that I began my load, my new load, I started my logbook from Charlotte.
- Q. So you are referring to this was on June 16th of 2021?
- 12 A. That is correct, yes, sir.
