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MS. SEE: The Ohio Power Siting Board has scheduled for public hearing at this time and place Case Number 22-151-EL-BGN, which is captioned in the matter of the Application of Blossom Solar, LLC, for Certificate of Environmental Compatibility and Public Need to Construct a Solar-powered Electric Generation Facility in Morrow County, Ohio.

My name is Greta See, and I am an administrative law judge in the Board's legal department, and I have been assigned to this case. The passage of Senate Bill 52 provides for a new opportunity for county commissioners and township trustees to participate in the siting of solar projects in their community.

County commissioners may choose one commissioner or designee. In addition, township trustees may choose one trustees or designee to serve as their ad hoc board member representative. Tom Whiston will be the representative of the county commissioner. Unfortunately, Mr. Whiston is unable to attend the hearing tonight.

Joining us on behalf of Washington Township

is Washington Township trustee Dona Kochman. Would you please stand? Thank you.

There are several other board staff members assisting with the hearing tonight. They are the individuals wearing a badge or an Ohio Board t-shirt, and the two ladies here at the front at the table as you came in the door. They are available if you have questions concerning the board's process, if you need assistance in accessing any of the documents submitted in this case, or if you just have general questions about the hearing tonight.

At this time, I'd like to take appearances of the parties on behalf of counsel for -- strike that. At this time, I would like to take appearances of counsel on behalf of the parties. Counsel for Blossom Solar, LLC.

MS. SANYAL: Thank you, your Honor. Anna Sanyal from the law firm of Vorys, Sater, Seymour and Pease, 52 East Gay Street, Columbus, Ohio, 43215.

I also have with me from Blossom for Blossom Solar project Patrick Buckley. He's the project lead. He's very tall, you can't miss him, and he and other members of the project are here to answer any questions. They also have a badge that says Open Road Renewables. So after the hearing, if anyone has any questions, they

1 are here to answer those questions.

MS. SEE: Thank you. Counsel on behalf of the Ohio Farm Bureau Federation? Counsel on behalf of the Environmental Council?

MS. NORDSTROM: Karin Nordstrom with the Ohio Environmental Council, located at 1154 Chesapeake Road, Columbus, Ohio, 43212, and I have with me Chris Tavenor, Associate General Counsel for Ohio Environmental Council.

MS. SEE: Thank you. The subject of today's hearing is an application filed by Blossom Solar, LLC, an affiliate of Open Road Renewables, for the purpose of constructing a 144 megawatt solar power electric generation facility on approximately 1,073 acres in Washington Township, Morrow County.

The application was filed on May 27th, 2022, and supplemented and amended in accordance with data responses filed by Blossom -- I'm sorry, data responses filed by Blossom. The Board staff filed its report of investigation on October 31st, 2022, recommending that the Board approve the application to construct, maintain, and operate the facility, subject to 41 conditions.

This report is a recommendation of the staff and does not necessarily reflect the Board's final

decision in this case. Indeed, the Board is not bound to the recommendation. The purpose of this evening's public hearing is to receive testimony regarding the proposed project and application from persons in the local community.

Tonight's public hearing will not be treated as a question and answer session, but rather an opportunity to let the Board know what you think about the proposed project. The public hearing is only one aspect of the process in this case.

An evidentiary hearing has been scheduled to commence on December 19th, 2022, at the Board's offices in Columbus, Ohio. The purpose of the evidentiary hearing is for the parties, the applicant, Blossom Solar, Ohio Farm Bureau Federation, Ohio Environmental Council, and the Board's staff to provide testimony and other evidence regarding the proposed solar project.

Tonight's hearing is being transcribed by a court reporter. If you plan to testify, please speak clearly so that the court reporter can accurately reflect your comments on the record. Also, if you have a prepared written statement, it would be helpful if you provide a copy to the court reporter for reference to ensure the transcript is accurate.

After I finish with the introduction, we'll

begin by inviting individuals on the sign-in sheet to testify. Each person who signed up to testify will be permitted to speak once about the proposed project.

Before you present your testimony I will ask you to take an oath or affirmation that what you are about to say is the truth. We will also ask you to state your name and address for the record and indicate if you work or reside in the project area.

You will then provide your thoughts on the proposed project. Counsel for the parties to the case and I will be permitted to ask you questions about your statement. The testimony that you provide tonight will be considered part of the official record in this case, and the transcript will be reviewed by the Board before a final decision is made on the application.

A couple of other notes. If, when your name is called from the sign-in sheet, you decide that you no longer want to testify, you can say that you pass, and we'll move to the next witness. If you would prefer to file written comments in this case, approach one of the Board staff members here tonight and they will provide you with the instructions on how you can file comments in the case.

Once you finish testifying, or if you're just here to observe, you may leave the hearing at any

time you wish. I only ask that you do so quietly while the hearing is in session.

The Board appreciates your participation in tonight's hearing, and we want everyone who has signed up to testify to have the opportunity to do so. For that reason, please keep your statement to a reasonable length of no more than five minutes.

If you have not finished your testimony within five minutes, I'll give you a sign to wrap up your comments and move to the next speaker. I'll hold up a sign that you have 30 seconds left, and then I will also let you know you need to wrap it up. Again, these time limits are so that everyone who would like to testify has the time to speak.

I remind you that anyone may file a public comment in this case at any time before the Board issues its order. Also, if you have any questions, Board staff -- which is here at the door, and there's a gentleman in the back -- will be happy to answer your questions about the process.

Are there any questions about how we will proceed tonight? Okay. With that, I'll move to the first name on the sign-up sheet. First person to offer testimony tonight is Andrew Murray. Let me also ask for your forgiveness now in the event that I mispronounce

I cannot stress enough how important it is to protect
landowner's rights. This project will be an important
stream of income to the landowners who will be
participating. Projects like the Blossom Solar offer
landowners freedom to make the money off their land
without selling it all.

Our school system is very dear to us, which is why I am excited that the Blossom Solar project can provide \$500,000 annually to the Northmor School System and many other county systems.

With the panels being so close to my home, I was worried how they would affect us. However, Open Road Renewables was committed to providing good information that swayed me in favor of the project. They made sure the neighbors have a choice and are considered in the process.

Their care for neighbors is shown by the setbacks they put on the project. It's shown by how they screen the project with trees planted around the panels. They don't make noise. They don't smell. Solar panels make a fine neighbor, especially when they are hidden behind trees.

Sarah and I have seen many solar farms in our travels. This includes trips to Florida, Iowa, and

2	turbines in every state. The solar farms are less

MS. KINCAID: Thank you for the opportunity to testify in support of Blossom Solar. My name is Jeanette Kincaid, and my family owns land in the project area.

My roots run deep in Morrow County, Ohio.

My maternal and paternal grandparents have all farmed in this community, and I now enjoy the privilege of raising my family in Morrow County.

We raise beef, chickens, and the standard Ohio crops such as corn, soybeans, hay, and wheat. As I'm sure you are aware, the cost of crop production has dramatically increased in the last 12 months.

According to an article produced by the OSU Extension office in May of this year, the cost of corn production will be 44 percent higher in 2022 than in 2021. Likewise, soybean production cost has risen by 40 percent, and wheat production cost has increased by 50 percent. This has a significant impact on small farms such as ours.

Open Road Renewables approached us in 2021 to lease our land as a solar farm. This project provides numerous benefits to our land and our economy, and Blossom Solar's investment in our youth and the local community. Along with the much-needed upgrade to

our county and township roads, our school district will receive over \$500,000 annually.

The Blossom Solar project would give an immense amount of resources and opportunities that could be given to future generations at no extra cost to direct residents. Blossom Solar's support continues through opportunities provided at vocational schools and numerous jobs generated during the construction of the solar project.

This project creates up to 400 direct jobs during construction, along with the road use and maintenance agreement with the county. This will strengthen and upgrade roads to current or better condition after construction.

While the benefits to my community are important to me, being able to provide for my family while preserving our land for future agricultural use tops my list of pros. Having the peace of mind of a guaranteed income to support the rest of our farming endeavors is priceless.

For our small farm, the solar project will not erase our entire agricultural footprint. Still, it will improve it so we can upgrade our equipment and facilities to continue providing quality beef for our local consumers.

MR. KINCAID: Good evening. Thank you to the Ohio Power Siting Board for being here tonight in Morrow County to hear from the community. I am here to offer my support of Blossom Solar and ask you to approve this project.

My name is Nathan Kincaid and I am a third-generation family farmer. We raise beef, chicken, row crops such as corn, soybeans, hay, and wheat. Our farm has been a part of our family since 1965. My father became an active farmer while I was young, and I added farm ownership to my main responsibilities many years ago.

I've seen and felt firsthand the time,

dedication, and love it takes to keep a farm running.

Like many other small farmers, I have a full-time job,

as does my wife, my father, and we tend to farm

responsibilities with the remaining hours of the day.

Many of those hours are spent tending fields, which is

weather dependent, thus potentially limiting time to

plant or harvest crops. Often dinner and sleep are

sacrificed to ensure that the farm continues to

function.

Some may say, why do you do that to yourselves when there is no guarantee of a good outcome? I get to work side by side with my children and spend time with my wife. I get to take care of the land that I love.

When Open Roads Renewables proposed their solar project to us, I recognized the opportunity to preserve and improve my family's land so that it could continue to provide for my children and my local community.

The community benefits include road maintenance and school and county funding, along with providing township and county EMS with training and any needed equipment, partnering with vocational schools, and funding for training for scholarships.

There are many other advantages to having solar in our community. It improves air quality by having pollinator-friendly plants between the panels, which also has health benefits and increases crop yields. With solar panels, there is no odor or air pollution, dust, discernible movement, quiet, not operating at night, minor traffic, and a low profile will also be screened with landscaping.

Providing jobs to our area is greatly

needed, as many cannot afford to travel to large cities to find gainful employment. Open Roads Renewables is also committed to maintaining and improving vegetation habitats around its projects, so our community can continue to enjoy the benefits of hunting and various tree products.

Also, what is rarely shared but everyone should know, is that solar projects leave the land in a better place than pre-construction -- higher organic matter and better tilth. There is little to no long-term impact on the ground. Thirty years in solar is similar to USDA's Conservation Reserve Program -- CRP.

In conclusion, I can literally and figuratively breathe easier knowing that my lease land will be well cared for as I focus on the remaining aspects in our farm. I look forward to investing more time in my children's academic and agricultural education with the peace of mind that this solar project will provide.

Thank you for the opportunity to share how vital the Blossom Solar project is to my family and me. We are all planning for the future as best as we can, and this will be a step in the right direction for our community. Thank you.

I moved into the home in 1996 with my two children and husband. We have 30 acres and I lease half of this for farming. I favor the solar project mainly due to providing a renewable, clean energy source and not using more fossil fuels.

Right now, Ohio has three percent renewable energy, whereas the county average is 20 percent renewable. As a nurse, I know that fossil fuel sources of energy create bad air quality. We need to rely on more renewable energy for our energy needs.

And also, the project will make our community healthy by reducing farming fertilizers and other chemicals that impact our streams and water. In the summers, when we moved here, we would have to run into the house when they would spray the fields because the wind in the area is constant, and so I feel like reducing pesticides will help with our air quality and the soil.

Another reason I support the Blossom Solar is to use the limited herbicides that I already said. The project's landscaping will enhance the area's air and water quality and health, in contrast to farmers working the fields season after season.

The Blossom will plant pollinator bee and butterfly-friendly plants and trees and shrubs. We used

1	to have the field full of lightning bugs when we first
2	moved in the area, and in the past years they've gone 90
3	percent away. So you can see a real impact on our
4	pollution in the area.

When comparing coal and solar energy, coal produces 59 percent of CO2 emissions for all of the power generation in the U.S. Solar power, however, only produces 50 grams of CO2 every time it was produced. There are almost no emissions or pollutants, other than the process of producing the panels themselves, that are going to be recycled at the end of the project. The metal rods they use, too, to place the panels can be easily removed, so the land will be usable in the next 40 years.

Something else I personally enjoy is that they use native plants under and around their panels. Having large areas of native plants help our pollinators. While bees are a primary pollinator, secondary pollinators rely on a native and diverse ecosystem.

This product will not only help us by making clean energy with little emissions, but it can also help

21	hope is that these funds are allocated wisely for the
22	future.
23	I do not have a position on whether or not
24	this project should be approved by the Board, but wanted
2.5	to highlight an area of potential concern.

While I am speaking on my own behalf this evening and not as a representative of any organization, I do have applicable experience. I have worked on renewable energy projects as a developer, was previously employed by the Ohio Power Siting Board, and also worked at the Ohio Department of Natural Resources, which is a voting member of the Board.

Staff Recommendation Number 38 addresses the potential existence but unknown location of a previously plugged oil and gas well, identified as API number 34-117-2-3593-00-00. Recommendation Number 38 would require the applicant to observe a minimum setback of 25 feet between all project infrastructure and the well. In my experience, a 25-foot setback is woefully inadequate and should be expanded.

The Division of Oil and Gas Resources

Management, which has sole and exclusive authority to

regulate oil and gas in Ohio, keeps record of all wells

drilled and plugged since the implementation of

regulation in the state of Ohio.

Notable for this discussion is that these regulations were first put in place after the oil boom that occurred in this county in the 1960s. The Division records show that Well Number 3953 was drilled in 1985 and plugged in the same year by the Texas Gas

Exploration Corporation.

2.1

While there should be no issue with the plugged well, if an issue were to arise -- and they do -- a 25-foot setback would significantly limit options to remedy the issue. Moreover, should the well require maintenance work, the work would likely be conducted by the Division of Oil and Gas's Orphan Well Program.

Since the state may bear the financial responsibility for any future work that could arise from the now abandoned well, the state -- the same entity that is considering the amount of the setback -- Would be wise to increase the distance.

Although plugging rigs have been placed in gymnasiums, on lake slopes next to nuclear power plants, and in tight areas, a little prevention could save headache and significant dollars down the road.

I would also note that the Ohio Farm Bureau Federation and the Ohio Environmental Council, both who have intervened in this case, are keenly aware of the challenges that come when an abandoned oil well requires work and is located in tight access.

It is in the state's own best interest to observe a larger buffer. Thank you for allowing me to provide this input.

In any event, in addition to that, I have served as the chairman of Peco II Power Equipment

Company in Galion, Ohio. We were a power conversion for the telecommunications industry. So again, part of that background in electrification.

And I also serve as a trustee of the North
Central State Community College, and part of the work at
the Community College is workforce development, training
these new jobs for the future. So I'm trying to look
out over these new jobs, and how do we educate those
people? So that's a big part of what we're doing today.

Again, I'm working with, also, the Ohio Environmental Council on their programs here to make the pledge, the Ohio 30 by 30, so 30 percent reduction in our carbon footprint by municipalities. And as I talk to mayors about it, where they get their power from, and sources like solar fields in the future could be part of that mix -- so how about that? That's 30 percent by 2030. President Biden is 50 percent by 2030. These

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projects will help.

I'm a big proponent, because I live here, of landowner rights. Number one, landowner rights. And this project offers the landowners their rights. And I want to go on record, that's the most important to me as a person here.

You've heard of the economic benefits.

They're impressive. They're impressive. We're learning all about that.

Again, as we look forward to the future, electrification is the future. I am training the workforce for it. I just came from the Ohio Energy Conference today. Again, learning about how we have to change an entire grid is coming down.

When I was the Peco II guy, we made battery chargers. I wish today I was making car chargers.

That's the future.

In any event, thank you for allowing me to give my testimony in support of the Blossom Solar project.

MS. SEE: Any cross examination?

Sir, you mentioned Power Clean Future Ohio's 30 for 30 pledge, which is an affiliate of the Ohio Environmental Council. You do not work for the Ohio Environmental

costs have made life difficult for every business and individual, and farmers are no exception. With increased operating costs, it's becoming increasingly difficult to operate a farm.

Projects like Blossom Solar can preserve family farms by providing a predictable income for farmers. It allows farms to weather the ups and downs of grain, livestock, and milk prices. Solar projects allow small farms to continue farming to keep that land in agriculture for future generations.

I know for us the solar project means we can continue growing corn, soybeans, and hay on one part of our farm, while the other part of our farm generates clean energy from the sun for our community and region.

Solar projects like Blossom actually preserve the farm land itself with a full decommissioning process that allows the land to return to its current state at the end of its operating life. That means that land that has solar panels now can be farmed in the future.

Solar can also improve soil quality by reducing or eliminating chemicals that are used on fields every year and reducing the runoff from those chemicals.

It's my sincere belief as a farmer that

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solar is an incredible use of farm land. If every county in the state had just a few solar projects like Blossom, we can make enough local energy to power the majority of our homes and businesses.

Blossom Solar will provide over 100 megawatts of clean, local, renewable energy to the local community and region, but equally important is the investment in the communities that projects like this can bring.

The PILOT program that's part of this project allows the community to generate revenue every year for the Northmor School District, Washington Township, and Morrow County. These projects give back to the community while they also create local jobs and local energy.

Ohio is well behind many other states when it comes to clean energy. We need cleaner, local energy sources to supplement the energy we already produce as our population grows. Without cleaner energy, our environment will suffer, and our future generations will not be as fortunate as we are. The sun can provide us with unlimited energy and we have the technology and know how to make that happen.

Solar projects like Blossom are good for family farms, local communities, and the entire region.

What I am hearing tonight -- Blossom Solar did their homework, and a lot of what I'm hearing from a lot of these people are the rote answers that I heard when they came and talked to our family. I'm hearing what they want us to hear to make this happen. I do not feel that all of these are truths.

I grew up in this area. I farm in this area. My question to everybody is, do you eat? And where is your food going to come from when that farm ground is gone?

I am not opposed to solar. I do not have anything against it. I do have a problem with it being on farm ground. We rely on that for our food, and where are we going to get our food from when that is gone?

We lose thousands of acres every year in this country to different kinds of structures and building things, and losing it to this is not acceptable to me. Farm ground is precious. We need that to provide our food for us.

To me, solar energy is unreliable at best.

It is not storable. Sunshine is limited. We have had several days where there is none. When that sun is not out and we cannot have that solar energy running, it's not storable. So we have to kick in the fossil fuels,

and fossil fuels get kicked in and out a lot with that.

It's not a reliable source of energy. Maybe at some point in the future it will be, but right now it is not, and losing the farm ground around here is not worth that.

Everybody is talking about the jobs that are going to get lost -- or, the jobs that are going to get made, but I am going to tell you about the jobs that are going to get lost for the farmers. Farmers depend on this ground. This is how they make their living.

Yes, farming costs are up. They are up tremendously. But they depend on this ground to farm, and they depend on this ground to have the money to keep doing it, to keep food on the table for their families and keep the lights on and bills paid.

The ground here is highly erodible. I hope that you drive these roads and you check this ground that they have signed up and that they have lined up.

These farms are hills, and they are highly erodible. We fight with the erosion on these farms every year.

We have had to work with the ASC offices and Soil and Water and all of those offices to get things so that we can farm those grounds and keep the ground from being eroded away. Farmers do their best to make sure those things are done.

Tile is expensive. Taking care of washouts and things like that -- it takes money. Sometimes it's hard to get your landowners that you're renting off of to help work with you to get that done. It's a group effort. It's things that need to be addressed. Unfortunately, it is expensive.

I have issues with Blossom Solar. They have promised to restore the ground when they are done. We are talking about long contracts here with them. A lot of people that are signing up won't be around when those are done. They won't be here to make sure that that ground gets put back the way it was.

And once you tamper with that topsoil on top, you can't put that back the way it was. This ground will not go back the way it was when this is done. The loss that we are going to take in the farming community and the topsoil is not worth it.

That's pretty much all I have to say about it, and I will type something up for you and send it to you to the same effect, because I do not have anything at the moment.

MS. SEE: And that's fine. I want you to understand, the things you have said are being transcribed by a court reporter and it will be part of the record in the case.
