We're going to start by calling each

What I want you to do is state, spell your name, state your address and after that, why you think the request should be granted or not, so, Mr. Diller, we'll start with you.

RANDY DILLER,

Being first duly sworn/affirmed, testified as follows:

JUDGE DAVIS: Please state and spell your name for the record.

MR. DILLER: Randy Diller, R-A-N-D-Y, D-I-L-L-E-R. I'm the Village Administrator for Fort Recovery, 201 South Main Street, Fort Recovery, Ohio, 45856.

JUDGE DAVIS: Thank you.

MR. DILLER: As stated in the original petition letter, our number one reason for requesting the upgrade crossing exception is safety.

As a reviewer/inspector has stated in his report, this crossing is along an embargoed area of the rail, which means it's not being used and can't be used for safety purposes, and they have no future plans at this point to make any improvements to said rail, which, in itself, lends it to being exempt.

The location of the crossing is such that it is on a 55-mile-an-hour speed limit area, which is coming into town. Although it is located in town, the speed limit does not drop until after you cross the rail crossing. And there's also the issue of having a curve and an elevation change when approaching from the north.

It is also very near the intersection of Railroad Street, which handles a large daily traffic count, specifically trucks, because it is an industrial area with a lot of employees and it's also the daily path for a lot of local tanker companies, both fuel, propane, and even some chemicals for industry.

And lastly, and not least, is a lot of school buses cross that. The school bus fueling station is located along Railroad Street, meaning every bus has to go out there and typically has to come back into town by turning off of Railroad Street onto 49 heading south, which then they have to make an immediate stop for the crossing.

they can get even across the yellow line completely before they have to stop for that crossing grade. So it can be very problematic for a lot of reasons, but certainly due to the fact that it's a 55-mile-an-hour speed limit, vehicles are coming and they're trying to get out, then they have to stop, so it becomes an issue.

We can say that we have had no serious accidents at this crossing for at least the past 20 years. I know there's been a death there and accidents there when trains were using it, but since it hasn't been used, there have been none.

But we have had a lot of reported near-miss issues there mostly from traffic coming into town from the north, not seeing the traffic

stopped at the railroad because of either a bus or a tanker and the vehicles backed up behind them, and they've had to leave the roadway to miss the vehicles in front of them. We've had those reported. Who, again, I don't know. But we've not had anything serious happen there in many years, but we'd like to avoid that.

Obviously, by exempting that crossing for the buses and tanker trucks, we eliminate the need for them to stop and back up traffic and being able to not create that safety issue.

It also should be noted that the crossing signal on that rail crossing has been missing on the southbound lane for a number of years. There's not even a railroad crossing signal and it's been down for two to three years anyway, if not more, which obviously means they have no intentions of using it for trains.

In my capacity as the Village

Administrator, I've heard from various local fuel companies and other industry with trucks that use this location that don't have to stop and still say what a problematic area this is for all traffic because of the buses and because of the tanker trucks that have to stop and people trying

to get on and off of Railroad Street and people coming into town at a higher speed, so it's just been an issue that has been a problem.

I've received substantial feedback over the years and more recently from the bus drivers who have to do that because they, obviously, look in their rearview mirror and see what's coming up behind them and it can be scary.

So at this point, I guess, from the Village of Fort Recovery's perspective and for public safety, I do not see any reason that approval of this exemption request would create any issues for the railroad, obviously, for the Village, or the traffic using this area -- only make it safer for everyone.

So thank you to the PUCO for consideration in this matter.

JUDGE DAVIS: Thank you very much for your testimony.

With that, that concludes the testimony of the witnesses that we have here today. I thank you for attending and for actually providing your testimony.
