MS. SEE: Let's go on the record. Scheduled for hearing tonight at this time and place before the Public Utilities Commission is Case Number 23-23-EL-SSO, captioned, in the Matter of the Application of the Ohio Power Company for Authority to Establish a Standard Service Offer, pursuant to 4928.143, in the form of an Electric Security Plan, and Case Number 23-24-EL-AAM, which is captioned, in the Matter of the Application of Ohio Power Company for Approval of Certain Accounting Authority.

My name is Greta See, and I am one of the attorney examiners assigned to the case by the Commission. Also with us tonight is Commissioner Dennis Deters. Commissioner Deters, did you want to say a few words?

MR. DETERS: Yeah. I just wanted to say hello and thank everyone for being here tonight. These hearings are an important part of our process, AEP's electric security plan. Obviously, very thankful that our staff at the PUCO who made it here, and Judge See for conducting this hearing. So thank you all for coming out.

MS. SEE: Thanks. Additionally, you met the

staff members as you came in the door -- Matt, who is at the table, and Jill, and they are members of the Ohio Power -- the Public Utilities Commission Public Affairs Department. If you have questions about how to access the Commission's website or questions about service or concerns about service or other utilities matters, you can approach them and they will try to help you.

At this time, I'd like to take appearances of counsel on behalf of the parties, and we'll start with AEP Ohio, or Ohio Power.

MR. NOURSE: Thank you, Your Honor. On behalf Ohio Power Company, Steven T. Nourse. With me is -- I'm VP of legal for AEP Ohio. With me is Lisa Kelso, vice president of finance and regulatory for AEP Ohio. We've got Michael Travis, and a brand new person, Jennifer Porter, Brett Schmied.

So we're all here to answer any questions people have as well. If they want to talk afterwards, or have questions about their bill or anything else about us, we're happy to stay and talk. Thank you, Your Honor.

MS. SEE: And on behalf of Ohio Consumer's Counsel?

MS. O'BRIEN: Good evening, Your Honors. On behalf of Ohio's Residential Utility Consumers, Angela

O'Brien with the Office of the Ohio Consumer's Counsel,
65 East State Street, Suite 700, Columbus, Ohio, 43215.
Thank you.

MS. SEE: Thank you. In addition to Ms.

O'Brien with Ohio Consumer's Counsel, there are a number of parties that have also filed to intervene in this case who represent various interests, including environmental organizations, industrial organizations, and other low income residential organizations.

Ohio Power, also known as AEP, filed this application on January 6th, requesting authority to establish a standard service offer in the form of an electric security plan for the period commencing June 1st, 2024, and continuing through May 31st, 2030.

The local public hearings scheduled in this case are only one aspect the process. In addition to the hearing tonight, there are four additional hearings at -- local public hearings scheduled at various locations in April and May, as well as a virtual hearing option.

If you would like information on these other public hearings, please speak to either Matt or Jill, and they can give you the information you need to attend or to access the hearing. The evidentiary hearing in this case is scheduled to commence on July 10th, 2023,

at the Commission's offices in Columbus.

In AEP Ohio's application, the company is proposing an electric security plan that, among other things, is intended to satisfy the requirement for the company to provide a default electric generation service, which we refer to as the standard service offer, while also addressing certain other aspects of distribution service and the continuation and or creation of certain additional riders.

The purpose of this hearing -- the purpose of the hearing this evening is to receive comments from the public regarding AEP Ohio's application. It's not a question and answer session, but it's your opportunity to put on the record things that you want the Commission to know about AEP's application.

It's being transcribed by a court reporter. If you plan to testify, please speak clearly and slowly so that the court reporter can accurately record your comments on the record, and if you have a prepared written statement, if you would provide it to the court reporter for reference. It does not become part of the transcript in this case.

Additionally, if you do not wish to testify at this time, there's the opportunity to file written comments with the Commission via the Commission's

website	or	by	mail,	and	be	sure	to	use	the	case	number,

When you arrived you were afforded the opportunity to sign up to testify. Once we get started I'll call the witnesses forward. At this point we only have one individual who has requested to offer testimony tonight. When you come forward, you'll be sworn in, asked to give your name and address, and then you can proceed with your testimony.

Given that there's only one person that signed up so far, we'll use our first witness as an example. I believe the first witness on the list is Mayor of Zanesville, Don Mason. Mr. Mason, if you'd please step forward. Would you please raise your right hand?

DONALD MASON,

first having been duly sworn to testify to the truth, testified as follows:

- MS. SEE: Please state and spell your name for the record.
- MR. MASON: Donald L. Mason, M-A-S-O-N.

1 MS. SEE: Go ahead with your testimony.

MR. MASON: Thank you. And I'll abbreviate it, but I'll send a full electronic. It actually was interesting; after hearing you talk, I realized there was more I should have probably added. I do want to thank you for holding the hearing in Zanesville, Ohio.

As you're aware, AEP is requesting a 2.2 billion dollar rate hike beginning in June, 2024 through 2030. The ESP also includes such things as distribution system, grid modernization, economic development, and job retention. Again, I'm going to skip through a little bit so I don't read it word for word.

But I appreciate that electricity security plans are used for determining pricing of supply generation for customers who remain on the standard service offer rate. With the distribution electricity utility, ESPs can also include the investment in the distribution system, grid modernization, economic development, and job development. But this looks much, much more like a Christmas tree filled with presents.

I don't believe this is the right time for AEP to go along with locking in prices related to the ESP, and I ask PUCO to not entertain loading up the ESP with things that are not directly related to security or reliability.

The market for electricity has experienced a dramatic and unprecedented increase over the last few months. I believe that locking in prices when the market is volatile and high is not prudent. For example, the recent auction clearing prices are expected to increase bills for AEP standard service offers by nearly 30 percent in June -- by June of 2023. I think PUCO needs to view these requests in total, along with other increased costs that consumers are facing, such as gasoline, groceries, healthcare, and mortgage rates.

And I want to make it clear at this time -and this is what I wish I had added -- so in Zanesville,
our median income is \$32,500, according to the 2020
census. That's \$32,500. The median income for the
State of Ohio is around \$53,000. So the point is,
Zanesvillians really are making three-fifths what's
being made across the State of Ohio.

More troubling, I see that there are -- in addition to the ESP, there are five new charges, riders, extending and modifying existing charges. These charges include the Energy Efficiency Rider, the Customer Experience Rider, the Rural Access Rider, the Ohio First Rider, and again, the Governmental Aggregation Standby Rider.

You know, the Smart City Rider Charge looks

like it will increase from 24 cents to 59 cents over the term of the ESP. I think the marketplace should be used to determine the factor of who is building EFV charging stations. The cost causer should be responsible for the cost, not the cost avoider. Let the owners of the Teslas pay for the charging station, using our traditional fuel -- excuse me -- because we're using traditional fuels, and those should not be saddled with the socialized cost.

Again, I don't think the Economic

Development Rider Charge -- even though it's not scheduled to be increased, I think it should be eliminated, and AEP does have the sole discretion of when and where to use those funds. It's unlikely that Zanesville residents would see any benefits of these riders. These costs should be borne by shareholders and not regulated.

I'd like to also say, the Total Enhanced
Service Rider, vegetation management, expense is going
to go up from June of '24 through 2030 by \$539,000,000.

I just think this is way above and beyond those charges
that are already in the rate base. I would like to see
more attention spent on where the best practices are
being used on vegetation management, because quite often
we see a lot of the same vegetation addressed year after

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year after year, and probably should be eliminated at the very beginning.

Again, I don't think AEP should keep the energy efficiency plan in place. I think it should actually be removed, because residential customers are already paying a high cost, and it's the rise in electricity prices which will -- and the increase of new technologies which will reduce demands.

So new technologies, whether it's LED lights, water softeners, are all using classic energy, and a high energy price causes people to be more prudent. So I think those should be the tools we use for energy efficiency.

I really don't like the Customer Experience
Rider. It's designed to recover capital investment
expenses associated with existing customer information
system, and as I view that, the Customer Experience
Rider is really replacing what human people used to be,
used to do, and I believe AEP has already captured those
costs, really, in another line-item.

AEP proposes an electric vehicle transportation plan. I believe the budget is about \$99,000,000 for the ESP in term, or 16.5 million annually through that time period. That includes administrative costs of just under a couple million

dollars. Again, residential customers pay 6.3 million annually, plus a portion of research and development costs and education and outreach. I think this is the same as choosing winners and losers by subsidizing one mode of transportation over another.

There is no evidence -- there's been no evidence of the impact on the distribution or the transmission grids by increasing EFVs in our community. And again, I don't think Zanesville consumers should be charged for any of the net costs above and beyond what's available in federal funding.

AEP proposes a Government Standby Rider, and I'll just segue -- this appears to me when certain aggregators failed to perform their fiduciary duties. I believe AEP is proposing a placeholder standby charge for aggregators to pay an insurance premium for customers returning to default service. I just think a performance bond would be better when aggregators are picking up customer load.

Frankly, and lastly, I don't agree with the idea of having Rural Access Riders to fund fiberoptics projects. Costs are estimated \$94,000,000 capital, and \$20,000,000 operating expenses. There are many state and federal funding sources for broadband in rural areas, and urban areas like Zanesville do not need these

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kind of socialized costs. We're already served with
broadband. Actually, we have spectrum, and Horizon is
coming through the area, so we have at least two
well-working fiberoptics services. But it does seem
like AEP is revisiting the issue of 20 years ago, when
they looked at broadband through the power lines.

But then, once again, I want to thank the PUCO, and actually all the people attending here, for being in Zanesville, and again, I ask you to stop by Tom's Ice Cream Bowl or one of our restaurants to help our economy.

But also, on a serious note, we're very pleased. I saw Mike was here; we have a great working relationship with AEP, so this isn't anything personal about AEP, the service, the linemen who work here and live here. We appreciate them.

MS. SEE: Any cross examination for this witness? Mr. Nourse, Ms. O'Brien?

MR. NOURSE: No, Your Honor.

MS. O'BRIEN: None.

MS. SEE: Thank you. Is there anyone else present that wishes to offer testimony tonight? Okay. We'll go off the record.
