1 Thursday Morning, 2 April 20, 2023. 3 4 ATTORNEY EXAMINER LYNN: The Public 5 Utilities Commission of Ohio has assigned for 6 hearing at this time cases 22-136-TR-CVF and 7 22-931-TR-CVF, Markeith Spriggs Notice of Apparent Violation and Intent to Assess 8 Forfeiture. 9 10 I am Jim Lynn, the Attorney Examiner 11 assigned to hear this case. And at this time we 12 will have the appearances of the parties. We 13 will start with the Ohio Attorney General's 14 office. State you name and address, please. 15 MS. WENK: Good morning. I am 16 Ashley Wenk on behalf of the Transportation 17 Staff of the Public Utilities Commission of 18 Ohio. Attorney General Dave Yost. Our office 19 is 30 East Broad Street, Columbus, Ohio. 20 ATTORNEY EXAMINER LYNN: Thank you. 2.1 And, Mr. Spriggs, your name and address, please. 22 MR. SPRIGGS: Markeith Spriggs. 23 My address is 6147 Saint Regis Road, Baltimore, 24 Maryland 21206. 25 ATTORNEY EXAMINER LYNN: Thank you.

6 All right. We will start with the case brought 1 by the Attorney General's office. And Ms. Wenk, 2 who do you want to have as your witness first? 3 MS. WENK: Thank you. I would like 4 5 to have Trooper Lauper, please. 6 (WITNESS SWORN) 7 TROOPER JEFFREY A. LAUER 8 called as a witness, being first duly sworn, 9 10 testified as follows: 11 DIRECT EXAMINATION 12 By Ms. Wenk: 13 Q. Mr. Lauper, could you please state your full name for the record? 14 15 Α. Yes. Trooper Jeffrey A. Lauper. 16 Q. Where are you employed? 17 I work out of general headquarters. Α. 18 98 is where it is, Post 98, but it's actually 19 the District 4 assignment. So I work out of the 20 Warren District which covers the seven counties 2.1 in District 4. Q. What was your position prior to this 22 23 one? 24 Α. Before I worked here I was a Road

unit at the Ravenna Highway Patrol Post which is

- Q. And what are you duties and responsibilities with the Ohio State Patrol?
- A. Currently I am a commercial motor vehicle inspector through the State Patrol. I am still a Trooper, so I still do the normal road things, but I am a commercial motor vehicle certified. So I inspect trucks on the side of the road.
- 10 Q. Thank you. What training do you 11 have in that area?
  - A. I have been through all the trainings in Part A, Part B and hazmat courses to be certified to do roadside inspections on commercial motor vehicles.
    - Q. Could you say that again, how long you have been with the Patrol?
    - A. On the 11th of April this year it was 21 years.
- Q. Thank you. I want to direct your attention to November 24th, 2021. I am sorry.

  Were you on duty that day?
- 23 A. Yes, I was.
- Q. And are motor carrier inspections
  conducted to protect the safety of the Ohio

traveling public?

- A. Yes, they are.
- Q. About how often do you perform inspections in a year? Or how many on average?
- A. For the total for the entire year is approximately a thousand give or take depending on the year and other training they send us to.
- Q. Do you complete an examination report when you do an inspection?
- A. Yes, we do. Any commercial motor vehicle inspection we do here in Ohio we do what's called an Aspin Report. And it's a separate thing on our computer where we go in and we enter all the vehicle information, driver information.

And then depending on what level of inspection we are doing, or why we are doing the inspection, we enter in the notes from the violations that may occur during that inspection.

- Q. On November 24th, 2021 did you have the opportunity to inspect a vehicle that was being operated by Markeith Spriggs?
- A. Yes.
- Q. Do you have an independent

recollection of this inspection?

- A. I have a copy of it in front of me, and I do remember the inspection.
- Q. And with regard to that copy in front of you, that is the copy Marked Staff Exhibit 1, correct, the inspection from --
- A. It's the one that you sent me.

  MS. WENK: Thank you. And if I could, your Honor, if I could distribute that exhibit.

ATTORNEY EXAMINER LYNN: Certainly.

MS. WENK: Thank you. Along with

that exhibit I would like to distribute the

other exhibits I will be using today for

ATTORNEY EXAMINER LYNN: Thank you.

- Q. And then bringing your attention to that report, there are several violations cited. Could you explain the reason that you came into contact with Mr. Spriggs?
- A. Yes. At the date of this stop I was actually assigned to the Mahoning County area.

  The way it works in my district is actually we are low manned right now, that we have, each

  Trooper is assigned a county out of the seven

counties for the day. During that time frame each Trooper works that general area, whatever county you are assigned. And you have specific areas.

2.1

We have what's called high crash areas in Mahoning County. So on this day I was working in the Mahoning County which is the Austintown Corp area.

I stopped Mr. Spriggs for a speed violation first. When I pulled up he had -- I set stationary. So when Mr. Spriggs passed my location at the time I had been using laser to check speed and radar. And then as he passed he had a violation on the trailer that was what we call an obvious violation, a noticeable violation that can been seen by the human eye as, you know, as I set stationary there.

The license plate on the trailer was actually mounted in an improper location especially when there is a load on the vehicle. It was -- almost all states have a law on visibility of a license plate or registration plate. They have to be visible to the -- like when you are driving or when you are stationary up to a certain amount of feet.

When this went by this vehicle was actually -- and vehicles on board and the plate was mounted up underneath the vehicles on the frame rail that's under the trailer in between the two ramps. It was not on the rear of the trailer where it's supposed to be mounted with a license plate light.

- Q. Thank you. And is there a code on this report that indicates that it was an obvious?
- A. When you go down throughout my report you will see there is four violations listed. The first one was the speed I was just talking about. I list in my report usually what section from not only the CFR 49 but also the Ohio Revised Code.

So the speed violation would have been 4511.21D4, which is for 70 mile an hour speed limit.

And then the license plate was the bottom violation on the actual inspection report. And that is 4503.21 which is a failure to display registration plate and in the proper location.

It's also a 392.2. Both of those

violations fall under 329.2 traffic section of CFR 49.

- Q. Thank you. And then after Mr. Spriggs was pulled over what was the type of inspection that took place?
- A. We did a Level 3 inspection. And that's where we check -- so Mr. Spriggs can provide us with his logs. We ask for the logs, we ask for the registrations of both vehicles, their inspection reports for the annual, meaning that they check their vehicle for the annual for the company. That kind of thing.

And then we ask for the log books, registration for the vehicles, we ask for the driver's license, their medical card. Just to make sure they have all their stuff up to date.

And then when we run it through the system we verify everything that's on the paperwork they gave us with what we find when we run all the information for the vehicles and the driver's license.

Q. Thank you. Going back to the first page, I am looking at a violation that appears to be in bold, 395.8A-NON-ELD. Could you describe that violation, please?

A. Yes. That's an ELD violation or an hours of service violation. 395.8 covers the different sections within anything that has to do with hours of service for some one that is operating a commercial motor vehicle for commerce on highways.

At this time Mr. Spriggs was operating from a cellular device and I wrote in there that he was using what's called a Keep Trucking app. That no longer exists, it's now called Motive. It's a different -- it's the same company, they have changed their name recently, their software.

But at the time he had the logbook on his phone, but it was non-operational at the time. He at that time was logged into what's called an electronic logging book which is the same as having a paper log book. That means everything is done manually.

So it means it's not operating like -- so it's not connected to the vehicle itself. So, and I believe at that time he had two separate -- I think he might of had both of them on his phone; that he was logged into the wrong one the day of the stop.

## EXAMINATION

- Q. I just want to clarify Trooper, so when you say both of them on the phone, what are you referring to again?
- A. The ELD, the application for at that time it was called Keep Trucking. So then there is two different versions of Keep Trucking at the time.

You can get a manual version which is an electronic logbook, and then you can get the ELD which is the one that actually connects to the interface that is mounted under the dash that actually monitors. So even if Mr. Spriggs is using a truck for personal use it will monitor mileage and all that. Then it will be his responsibility to, you know, clarify that he is off duty.

- Q. Now, on the inspection report it says ELD not required. So, and I will note for the record that's electronic logging device, I believe.
- 23 A. Yes.
- Q. Okay. So, you are telling me that
  Mr. Spriggs was not using an ELD which would

automatically log what he was doing.

A. Correct.

- Q. He was using what was it called again?
- A. It's still Keep Trucking is the company name, but it's still an electronic log book.
  - Q. Which he could enter things in manually.
- 10 A. Yes. So mileage has to be entered

  11 in by the driver, the location has to be. If

  12 it's done by an electronic logging device which

  13 is hooked into the interface of the vehicle

  14 actually tracks GPS location in a 10-digit grid.
  - Q. So the issue with Mr. Spriggs here was then that, help me out again, he was using --
  - A. An electronic logbook which is the same --
- Q. Should be using an electronic logging device.
- 22 A. Correct.
- Q. I was a little confused because it said here on the inspection ELD not required. It sounds as though really, under the

- circumstances he was operating the vehicle and the ELD was used.
  - A. Correct.
- Q. So that part of the inspection report is a little unclear. But you are saying ELD was needed, he should not have been using a logging -- electronic logbook where he enters the information manually?
- 9 A. Correct. Because he is outside 150
  10 air miles from the start location and all of
  11 that.

- Q. So that is bolded on your report.

  And I see in the center at the top of the

  violation section there is an OOS. Can you

  explain the OOS, and then the significance of
- 20 the Y?
- A. You mean on page 2, ma'am?
- Q. I am looking at the I think it's
- 23 | Page 1 of the violation report, the Vehicle
- 24 Examination Report?
- A. Yes. OOS. I see what you mean.

- The column. So the OOS column means that the violation is considered an out of service violation.
- Q. Thank you. And the Y there next to the --
  - A. That just means, yes, that the driver, not the vehicle, let me clarify, Mr. Spriggs, was out of service, not his truck and trailer.
- Q. Thank you. So would it be correct to say that on November 24th at 1:50 P.M. Mr. Spriggs was out of service?
- A. Yes.

- Q. He was a driver placed out of service?
- 16 Yes. Mr. Spriggs was actually 17 escorted to a Love's truck stop. So this 18 traffic stop, as I stated at the beginning, was 19 in Mahoning County, which is one county away 20 from where he was placed out of service. 2.1 actually moved across the county line on 2.2 Interstate 76 to a brand new Love's truck stop at State Route 225. And that's where he was 23 24 parked for his 10 hour out of service.
  - Q. Thank you. So just to confirm, he

was escorted to Love's with the understanding that he would cease driving at that point in time.

- A. Yes. He was placed out. We do not make a habit of placing someone out on the side of the road due to the obviously safety. And we also need to make sure that before placing someone out of service whether they have livestock or anything else that they have a place to use a restroom and a safe place to sleep in their vehicle.
- Q. Thank you. And how long was Mr.
  Spriggs placed out of service?
  - A. If you flip to Page 2, it's an out of service violation for a log, it's for ten hours.
- Q. What was your communication to Mr. Spriggs regarding this violation?
- A. I use the same communication on
  every single person. So, when I escort them,
  Mr. Spriggs was very cooperative with me
  the entire time. He was not -- he did not give
  me a hard time, nothing like that.
- 24 He was very cooperative. I escorted 25 him to Love's, I explained to him that, you

- know, after the 10 hours he was free to leave.

  So once the ten hours was up, the 10 hours goes

  from the last date that is listed right at the

  top of the inspection report where it says end.
- You have ten hours from that time. Once that ten hours is over you are free to go and

continue on with the load you have.

- Q. And for the record could you repeat that time, please?
- 10 A. The top of this report is end at
  11 1:50, meaning the inspection reported ended at
  12 1:50. That's when I terminated the inspection.
  13 And then from that point he has 10 hours from
  14 that point to continue on.

- Q. Trooper, I have a question for you. You said after the ten hours that Mr. Spriggs can continue on his way with his load. And under those circumstances then he would be permitted I suppose until he delivered the load, finishes, to use his electronic logbook?
- A. Well, he can use the paper logbook

  if it qualifies. But after the 10 hours, during

  this time he knew what the different -- those

two different apps.

- Q. What I am asking is this. Continue after the 10 hours, what sort of logging is he supposed to use?
- A. He has to fix it during the 10 hours, and then you can continue on with an electronic logging device.
- Q. So, therefore, for the remainder of his trip, or at least until he delivers the load he was supposed to, somehow get the ELD working?
- A. Right. And if that is unable to get the ELD he can continue until the end of the load he currently had. Once that load is delivered that paper log cannot be used. He has to get an 8-day exemption from Federal Motor Carrier showing that after 8 days if there is like some kind of malfunction that it wasn't working for Mr. Spriggs he has to have a letter showing that he is authorized to go on paper.

ATTORNEY EXAMINER LYNN: Thank you.

That gives me a better idea of what all was
happening. Thank you.

FURTHER DIRECT EXAMINATION

Q. Is there anything else important to

note that we have not discussed that you would like the Commission to note for the record?

A. I was told later in the day that he was stopped a second time within the 10-hour window that he was supposed to be out of service.

And then as just when I was reviewing the inspection report, what I do is during an inspection I will go through and check like previous history for that driver to see if they have repeat offenses. And the only thing he had, Mr. Spriggs, he had a violation for license plate prior I believe it was in Pennsylvania where he received a violation for the same license plate violation that I had spoken to him about.

I did give him a warning on it the day I stopped him. I didn't feel it was necessary as a traffic citation. So actually I believe if you look at my report he was given a warning on everything except for the mandatory out of service.

MS. WENK: Thank you. Your Honor, nothing further. I would like to reserve Mr. Lauper for rebuttal.

1 ATTORNEY EXAMINER LYNN: Certainly. 2 And, Mr. Spriggs, did you have any questions for Mr. Lauper? You can ask questions if you wish. 3 MR. SPRIGGS: Do I get to go up 4 5 there and talk as well? - Q. About how many inspections on average do you perform in a year?
- 9 A. 750. Sometimes less due to scheduling.
- 11 Q. I want to direct your attention to

Marked as 6 7 Exhibit 3. ATTORNEY EXAMINER LYNN: Thank you. 8 9 Ο. And what caused you to stop Mr. Spriggs? 10 11 I saw the vehicle go by. I say an 12 ID lamp out on the trailer. There was a couple 13 other things which I noted in the notes. But 14 the window tint was heavy. And I also didn't 15 see the license plate. 16 Q. Did you take any photographs that 17 day? 18 A. I should have. 19 Q. And what occurred following the stop 20 for the license plate or --2.1 I just did a Level 3 inspection 22 since we were on the side of the road, and it 23 was sort of in a bad spot, so I didn't want to 24 do a full walk-around of the truck. 25 So I just did a Level 3 inspection

and while doing the Level 3 I saw that he had already be placed out of service by another Trooper that day.

- And turning your attention to Staff Exhibit 3. You mentioned the driver only inspection. Could you elaborate on what that entails?
- A level 3 driver only inspection is just checking credentials, logbooks, operating authority, things that are not physical to the truck's equipment.
- 12 And what did you find as a result of Ο. 13 the Level 3 inspection?
  - That he had recently been placed out of service.
  - And specifically how did you find Ο. that information?
- In the FMCSA portal where you Α. actually run the driver's information there is a 20 past inspections hyperlink. You click on the 2.1 link and bring up the driver's previous inspections within the last year. And there was 2.2 23 one from Trooper Lauper.
- 24 And do you recall the day of that Ο. 25 inspection?

- I believe it was November 24th, 1 Α.

- 3 That's correct. Thank you. And Q. referring to Staff Exhibit 3, what was the time 4 5 of your stop?
- I have it in front of me. Was it Α. 6 7 3:31 P.M?
  - Ο. Yes, it was. And what was your understanding as to the violation that he received from Mr. Lauper?
- 11 That he was placed out of service at 12 the Love's for having no ELD.
- 13 Q. And how long was he placed out of 14 service?
  - Α. Out of service manual says 10 hours from the end time of the inspection.
- 17 Q. And when you advised Mr. Spriggs of 18 your findings through the portal what was his reaction? 19
- 20 Α. If I recall correctly he said that 2.1 he was letting him go home for the holidays, but 22 I believe the next day was Thanksgiving. So I -- do you want me to continue? 23
- 24 Yes, please. Ο.
- 25 Α. So just because I could -- just to

make sure that was true I ended up calling

Trooper Lauper. I think he was off duty at the
time, but he did answer. And I advised him of
the situation, and he said, no, he placed him
out of service at the Love's for 10 hours.

- Q. So, could you discuss your violation on Staff Exhibit 3?
- A. So, because he had already been -had all those other violations on the previous
  inspection I just did the state code for driving
  after being declared out of service.
- Q. Thank you. And what code section is that?
  - A. 2-5 -- I don't have the inspection in front of me. I just use to the drop-down arrow to find the correct one.
  - Q. And are your forms consistent with other inspection forms where OOS designates out of service?
- A. Yes. We all use the Aspin report which OOS is out of service.
  - Q. And Y indicates yes?
- A. Yes. That designates, yes, out of service.
- MS. WENK: Your Honor, may I

- 1 | approach the witness with the Exhibit 3?
- 2 ATTORNEY EXAMINER LYNN: Yes. Go

- 5 to the first page, the State Information from

the Transportation section. My duties are to oversee the compliance section officers. I am in charge of enforcement and also shepherding cases through the civil forfeiture process.

Q. Thank you. And what are your qualifications for this work?

A. Prior to joining the Public

Utilities Commission I spent 26 years as an Ohio

State Trooper. Ten years of that was in the

crash reconstruction and analysis unit where I

had several training courses on commercial

braking, commercial enforcement and

reconstruction courses.

After that I spent two years with
Patrol License Commercial Standards unit where I
was trained in North American Standards Part A,
Part B, hazmat, other bulk, passenger, school
bus, cargo tank.

And upon arriving at the Public Utilities Commission I spent seven months on on-the-job training.

- Q. Could you please describe how forfeitures are calculated for violations of the Motor Carrier Safety regulations?
- 25 A. Sure. For non-hazmat violations,

once a roadside inspection is completed they upload that into a system, that system then returns that inspection to our Salesforce program. So it pulls it out of Safety Net into Salesforce.

2.1

2.2

Once it recognizes that it's a non-hazmat violation it breaks down the violations into one of five groups. Zero through 4.

These groups are based on the potentiality of causing a crash, severity based. Those groups zero, 1, 2, 3 are all equipment or minor violations.

1 through 3 are most likely to cause a crash, in reverse order. So one being more severe, most likely to result in a traffic crash, 3 being less severe.

Group 4 violations are usually driver behavior violations or out of service violations, authority violations, insurance violations.

So once our system sees what violation it is it puts it in one of those groups. If it's a group zero it never receives a fine. If it's a Group 1 through 3 it only

receives a fine if it's marked out of service by a roadside inspector.

This is a Group 4 violation. Group 4 violations always receive a fine. And those are based on the severity of the violation.

Those violations are also based off of recommendations by the CSA, Commercial Safety Alliance.

- Q. Thank you. Does the Commission apply this process uniformly to everyone?
- 11 A. We do.

- Q. Thank you. And how did you
  determine the amount of forfeiture for this
  case?
  - A. Again, it came into the system, recognizes it was a Group 4 violation and applied the recommended forfeiture amount to it.

    And it was verified.
  - So \$3,174 is the recommended violation amount for the violation of an out of service order.
- Q. I want to call your attention to Mr.
  Lauper's report and the violations assessed by
  Mr. Lauper. What was the result of that
  violation within the Commission?

MS. WENK: Your Honor, may I approach the witness with State's Exhibit 6?

ATTORNEY EXAMINER LYNN: Yes. Go ahead, please.

MS. WENK: Thank you.

- A. The first inspection generated a forfeiture amount based off of the out of service and what was found to be a Group 1 violation at the time for the ELD violation. He was assessed a \$100 forfeiture amount. That case went through and was paid and processed closing that case effectively.
- Q. So that case was closed. The initial inspection and stop by Mr. Lauper and the forfeiture amount was paid, and that is closed.

Is it your understanding that when a forfeiture amount is paid the case is closed?

A. That's correct.

MS. WENK: Your Honor, I would like to mention Ohio Administrative Code Section 4901.2-7-22 B, it's our understanding that when the forfeiture is paid that that is the result of an admission. And it's the Commission's belief that payment is proof of admission.

Q. Mr. Long, if I could direct you to the violation there that was paid, that particular forfeiture. What was that violation that was admitted to and paid?

A. That was the out of service, no ELD violation. That's the only Group 1 violation on the inspection.

ATTORNEY EXAMINER LYNN: Mr. Long, that was the violation that was the \$100 fine?

THE WITNESS: That is the one that was paid.

MS. WENK: So the \$100 fine for being out of service was paid. And we would like to make it clear on the record that it is our opinion that the payment does constitute an admission of that first inspection, the first violation, pursuant to Ohio Administrative Code 4901.2-7-22 B.

- Q. So, Mr. Long, just to wrap up here, it's your understanding that that initial inspection, that was an admission and that case is closed?
- A. Yes, it was paid and closed.

  ATTORNEY EXAMINER LYNN: I have a

  question as far as the exhibits go. Is there an

- exhibit that indicates, says Notice of Apparent
  Violation or Notice of Preliminary Determination
  for a \$100 fine?
  - MS. WENK: There is not an exhibit for that in particular because it was paid. I can let Mr. Long elaborate on that.

But it is our position that we are here today to discuss what we are going to bring in next, Notice of Apparent Violation and the NPD for this. We mentioned this -- Exhibit 6 was our indication that this was paid and admitted.

ATTORNEY EXAMINER LYNN: I just wanted to clarify for the record. That is all.

EXAMINATION

By Attorney Examiner Lynn:

Q. Mr. Long, because that \$100 fine was paid you are saying that was for the violation not having the right kind of logbook.

It actually was paid as part of the process at the Commission where there isn't even I guess a Notice of Apparent Violation.

A. So, initially after the inspection is brought in and the case gets assessed by the system, then a NIF letter is what we it, the Notice of Apparent Violation and Intent to Assess Forfeiture letter gets sent out to the Respondent.

If there is no contact with them after 30 days the system will generate what's called a NIFG. It's the exact same letter that went out the first time, only with the words second notice put above it.

If nothing is done then they proceed through the system into what we call show cause eligible. However, if at any point in time after that first letter is sent out they either pay the forfeiture that closes the case, or if they write in because that letter gives them instructions if they wish to request a conference, contest it or set up a payment plan they can contact the PUCO and we will set those things up.

On this case I believe there was a conference request submitted, conference was set up, they spoke with one of the compliance officers, because that is the process that has to happen before we get to the administrative hearing step.

If nothing is agreed on the conference then we send them what's called a Notice of Preliminary Determination letter.

That letter again explains what the forfeiture

Q. Okay. You were placed out of service on November 24th of 2021. And Trooper Lauper indicates that you were told at that time that you were out of service, you have to stay where you are for ten hours.

Did you understand those instructions? Are you familiar with what out of service requirements are?

A. At that particular time I was fairly new to the trucking industry because I had just started my business. I was probably like a couple months in. Not long at all.

But if he did tell me that I had to stay right there and I was out of service, he didn't make it clear. Because when he pulled off at the Love's gas station five minutes later me and Officer Lauper had a second encounter.

He pulled over on the shoulder by the highway, I pulled over on the shoulder on the highway behind him after the initial inspection.

He got out of the State Trooper vehicle, he walked to my vehicle. I said are you sure I am okay to leave. He said get home

safe to your family. And I pulled off.

- Q. Okay. So let me see if I understand this right. You were stopped because Trooper Lauper indicated I believe because of tail lights on the vehicle and so on. And you went the Love's truck stop.
  - A. He escorted me there.
  - Q. He took you there. And that's where apparently he wrote up the inspection report or examination report?
- A. Yes. Love's gas station was the initial inspection.
  - Q. And then at the end of the inspection at Love's what do you recall -- what occurred at the end of that inspection?
  - A. So it wasn't that I wasn't running my ELD, it was that I was running but I wasn't running it proper. So, the Officer gave me the chance to fix it right there on-site, which I did. It's called Keep Trucking and I fixed it on-site. And that was that.
  - Q. So, you are saying that the Trooper explained that you didn't have the right kind of logging?
- 25 A. Yes. He was telling me that I

wasn't running it the proper way.

- Q. And then you are telling me that you made the correction so that you did have what electronic logging device was working at the time that you left Love's?
- A. Yes. The way that he said that it needs to be ran, yes.
  - Q. So you are indicating that he took you to Love's, did the inspection and informed you what needed to be done.

I said okay. It was the day before Thanksgiving. I said, if I get stuck up here, I am stuck. I had an empty trailer. So he was being nice. He followed me like an hour away to Copeland so I could pick my load up. The second Officer, he followed me an hour away.

Q. Trooper Harrison. So, you are saying that he --

A. He did whatever he did, it was at a weigh station. We pulled into a weigh station on the side of the highway.

- Q. And you pulled into a weigh station, and he informed you that you were operating while out of service?
- A. Yes. He told me that the first

  Officer had put me out of service. That I was unaware of. I wasn't aware of it. Because if I was I never would have been driving.
- Q. All right. And then, just again for the record, is that what happened after he informed you of that? You are saying he escorted you to some --
- A. Yes. Escorted me to -- I can't remember where the address was because I am not familiar with the area. It was definitely like an hour ride.
  - Q. And that's where you say --
- A. That's where I shut down at after I picked my load up. Yes, sir.
- Q. Okay. All right. So, you are indicating now although you had been placed out of service that it was not made clear to you and that under those conditions that is why you

continued to drive again.

## EXAMINATION

By Attorney Examiner Lynn:

- Q. After escorting Mr. Spriggs to the Love's truck stop, and you did the inspection there, what's your response to his comments that as he left the truck stop with reentering Interstate 76 that he encountered you again, and that he pulled over, had a discussion with you and so on. What are your responses to that?
- A. First, this inspection was actually conducted on the side of the road in Mahoning County.
- Q. My mistake. So the inspection was roadside, but --

A. Not to correct you, but just making sure you are aware. This was at mile marker 56 on Interstate 76, Mahoning County.

2.1

- Q. My mistake. So then when the inspection was over you escorted him to Love's for the out of service?
- A. That is correct. I finished up my report. I actually usually when I have an out of service in our area, at that day there was another two guys working with me in that area also doing weights and measurements.

I let the supervisor know I was escorting Mr. Spriggs to the Love's at 225 because it was outside the assignment county that day. It was inside Portage County.

I escorted him to a truck stop in Portage County at 225 and 76. I drove him to the truck stop, I escorted him to a parking space.

He was handed a two-page inspection report which was entered as evidence today. I have the same practice for the last six years I have been a commercial Trooper. Any motor vehicle inspection that I hand to any driver no matter who it is, they receive an inspection

report with Page 2 and Page 1 there will be highlights.

2.1

If they have been placed out of service that is highlighted with a yellowish highlighter that I keep in my passenger seat, and then it says "Attention Driver." I also highlight that.

And then at the very bottom it says
"Motor Carrier Responsibility." I highlight
that. 15 days to notify the gentlemen at PUCO
with the corrections if they have corrections to
the report.

Once I do that I hand the report as well as all the paperwork. If I take photos on the side of the road I will take them there.

If I am taking him to a safe location sometimes I will take them at that location.

When I am finished with all that I gave all that information to Mr. Spriggs, and told him he was out of service. He says he doesn't recollect that. I don't make a habit of not telling drivers that. I have been doing this for quite a long while.

He was told ten hours out of service. And he was told he could make repairs

to the Keep Trucking app because it's a simple fix. If they have the wrong software that they are using, which now is called Motive as we stated earlier, but it's Keeping Trucking app.

Keep Trucking, if you call the 1-800 hot line and there is an issue and it's just software issue they will fix the problem for you right there on the side of the road.

That is after we put them out of service. That ten hours is still in effect even if those logs were out of service at the time of inspection. You have ten hours from that time at 1:50 when my report ended.

That, in reference to the second, I have no recollection of ever speaking to Mr.

Spriggs again after. The reason why I state that is because as I stated earlier I was in Mahoning County that day. So he is stating he got on from 225 and turned headed west on 76.

I would have actually been going in the opposite direction back to Mahoning County where I was assigned.

Q. Okay. All right. At any rate though when you placed Mr. Spriggs out of service, in addition to providing him with the

- examination report you also, you are saying you 1 2 typically tell drivers, and you did tell Mr. Spriggs, that you are out of service for ten 3
