CHAIR FRENCH: Thank you very much.

I just want to take a moment to thank everyone for being here today. We value public opinion and input at the PUCO, and our five in-person hearings and our one virtual hearing provide an important, really important opportunity for the

public to do just that, provide us with your input on this application.

So I want to thank everyone again for being here. We really appreciate it. Thank you.

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in today, you probably were greeted by Staff members, and they are here to help if you have any questions on how to access the case or have other questions about your utility service.

At this time I would like to take appearance of the counsel on behalf of the parties that are here today. Let's start with the Company.

MR. SCHULER: Good afternoon, your Honors, Chair French, Michael Schuler on behalf of Ohio Power Company, Senior Counsel.

With me today I have the pleasure of having a number of great people. I have Vice President of Regulatory Finance for AEP Ohio, Lisa Kelso. I also have Brett Schmied, Regulatory Case Manager. Also have a number of External Affairs. We have Nala Kovach and Renee Shumate and Michael Lascola from our External Affairs Department, External Affairs Managers. And also we have Clay Bullard and Nick Klepper who are Line Service -- excuse me, Line Crew Supervisors for AEP Ohio. And

we also have Matt Bennett who is a Manager of Distribution Systems.

EXAMINER SEE: Mr. Schuler, and representatives of AEP Ohio will be present after the hearing to answer questions, correct?

MR. SCHULER: That's correct, your Honor.

EXAMINER SEE: Okay. Thank you.

Counsel for Ohio Consumers' Counsel.

MR. SEMPLE: Good afternoon. Connor Semple here on behalf of the Ohio Consumers' Counsel Bruce Weston.

EXAMINER SEE: Okay. Is there counsel for any of the other parties here today?

Okay. Thank you.

Ohio Power Company, also known as AEP Ohio, filed this application on January 6, 2023, requesting authority to establish a Standard Service Offer in the form of an Electric Security Plan for the period commencing June 1, 2024, and continuing through May 31, 2030.

The local public hearing scheduled in this case is only one aspect of the process as Chair French indicated. In addition to the hearing today, there will be a hearing tomorrow evening at the Ohio

Historic Connection. There were also three local public hearings that have already been held in Findlay, Marietta, and Zanesville to receive public testimony. The evidentiary hearing in this case is scheduled to commence on July 10 at the Commission's offices.

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AEP's proposing an Electric Security Plan that, among other things, is intended to satisfy its requirement to provide default electric generation service while also addressing certain distribution service for the Company and the continuation or creation of certain riders.

The purpose of today's public hearing is to receive comments from the public regarding AEP Ohio's Application. It's not a question and answer session, but it is your opportunity to inform the Commission what you think about the Application.

The hearing is being transcribed by a court reporter. If you plan to testify, please speak clearly so that the court reporter can accurately reflect your comments on the record. Also if you have prepared a written statement, it would be helpful for the court reporter's reference if you would provide it after your testimony. It will not be included as part of the transcript, but it is for

the court reporter's reference only.

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Additionally, if you do not wish to testify at this time, written comments may be submitted on the PUCO's website by mail, and you need to make sure that you list the case number which is 23-23-EL-SSO.

When you arrived, you were offered the opportunity to sign up to testify. Once we get started, we will begin calling the witnesses forward in the order that they signed up. Before you give your comments, I will ask you to state and spell your name for the record and give us your address, and I will ask that you swear or affirm that the information you are about to give is true.

Your testimony will be considered part of the official record in this case, and it will be reviewed by the Commission before they make their final decision on the Application.

Again, we appreciate your participation in today's hearing, and we want everyone who wishes to make a public statement to have the opportunity to do so.

With that, Mr. Hicks will call the first witness forward.

FRANCES PANEK

being first duly sworn, as prescribed by law, was examined and testified as follows:

2.1

DIRECT EXAMINATION

THE WITNESS: Well, it's my understanding that AEP has acquired an ESP, this Electric Security Plan, to request extra money for new or existing projects. This ESP would raise rates steadily for a period of about six years. This increase is on top of another 25 percent increase in prices for Ohio's default energy product taking effect this summer and an increase to their fixed charges on the 2021 rate case where the increase justification was related to tree trimming.

The new request for 710 million additional dollars to prevent downed power lines from trees is on top of the process of collecting nearly \$154 million from taxpayers for tree trimming and removal from the current ESP term.

Even with the additional dollars, the

June 2022 statewide outages were very extreme,
especially in the Columbus communities inhabited
primarily by low income populations. Little has been
done to assist these people with viable solutions
such as the legislation that would put some power

back into the hands of the communities like the Community Solar Bill introduced in a previous General Assembly session.

People need to see progress. Most of us in the Ohio AEP customer region don't have an income of nearly 15 million yearly. Although AEP has been forward thinking about future clean energy operations, and I applaud them for that, they should also acknowledge their part in the slow response to phasing out the remaining dirty coal plants on their watch. The longer coal is the primary answer the further off is the welfare of AEP's Ohio customer base.

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MOLLY NICHOLS

being first duly sworn, as prescribed by law, was examined and testified as follows:

DIRECT EXAMINATION

THE WITNESS: Thank you. Thank you for the opportunity to speak. My name is Molly Nichols. I am an organizer with the Sierra Club. We're working on a campaign for lower utility bills and more renewable energy.

Thank you for the opportunity to address the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio. This is not the time for AEP to propose increased distribution charges on our electric bills. Due to the high and volatile gas and coal prices, electric prices are skyrocketing this summer. The average residential customer bill is expected to increase \$50, and in this Electric Security Plan case, AEP is asking for a 5 percent increase next year and 2 percent more each year until 2030. That's a total increase of almost 14 percent and over \$2 billion.

Meanwhile, AEP is generating millions in profit paying its executives tens of millions of dollars in salary and paying hundreds of millions in

dividends to shareholders and still asking ratepayers to pay higher distribution charges.

PUCO, please do not allow AEP to place this burden on ratepayers across Ohio. Instead of using ratepayer money for generators that AEP would own, especially in communities that need that support, funding should go directly to community-based organizations to purchase and maintain this infrastructure.

We're also asking you not to approve AEP Ohio's request for deferral of authority on the Ohio Valley Electric Corporation coal plants. We've already paid hundreds of millions of dollars to subsidize these plants that have operated at a loss for decades. According to the Ohio Manufacturers' Association, we are expected to pay \$850 million by 2030.

In this Electric Security Plan case before the Commission, AEP is asking for the option to secure even more funds from ratepayers. Enough is enough. We cannot be expected to continue to pay for these polluting, inefficient coal plants, especially at a time when AEP is seeking a massive rate increase.

Sierra Club does support the energy

efficiency program proposal in this plan. Not only are these programs a direct benefit to consumers, for every dollar spent on energy efficiency, over \$2 is saved on customers' electric bills. They also reduce the amount of energy that needs to be produced and give people more control over their electricity costs. This reduces the load on our grid and helps address the climate crisis.

These energy savings benefit Ohio's environment and economy, and we've been missing out on those benefits since the passage of HB 6 in 2019. The bill eliminated energy efficiency programs, and since then the PUCO has not approved any programs proposed by utilities and here is a chance for you to approve them.

DIRECT EXAMINATION

WILLIAM GORT

THE WITNESS: Yes. I am a Volunteer

Benefit Coordinator at Mid-Ohio Workers Association.

What we do is we go door to door and canvass in some of the poorest, most hard hit neighborhoods in Columbus. We canvass anywhere -- everywhere from Whitehall to Wedgewood. We go to the places that you hear about having high crime rates and high poverty on the news every night.

And one of the things we do for our members is that if somebody cannot afford to pay a utility bill, whether it's to Columbia Gas or AEP or to a third-party provider, we don't provide money to them, but we negotiate on their behalf to facilitate the process because it reduces the stress on them if somebody can sort through things.

And what we've seen is that every time rates go up or every time the economy goes down or even when electricity rates aren't going up but other

things in the economy are becoming more expensive, we find people, young -- young mothers with children, older people who are on Social Security, fixed incomes, who simply cannot pay for food and pay for health care and pay for their utility bills and pay for the rent.

And food prices and prices for everything people need to survive have been going through the roof in Ohio and throughout the country lately, and it's putting severe stress on people. Utility prices are going up. I know the explanation for the supply price increase is that it had to do with an auction, so it's not under your control, but it still has the same effect. It increases people's costs, and people can't afford it.

And then so I think given the fact that all of these things are happening that are increasing everything people have to pay for in order to survive and the people don't have a lot of income and don't have anywhere else to turn, I think it's important that you, the regulatory Commission that regulates all the utilities in the state, whenever you do have control over something, you not increase the rates, especially not at this time. Thank you.

EXAMINER HICKS: Thank you. Thank you,
