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## PROCEEDINGS

2 JUDGE MARCELLETTI: Good evening. will project. The Public Utilities Commission of Ohio 3 calls for a hearing at this time and place. Case 5 number 20-3-301-ELSSO. Caption, In the Matter of the Application of Ohio Edison Company, The Cleveland 6 7 Electric Illuminating Company, and the Toledo Edison Company for Authority to Establish [sic] a Standard 8 Service Offer Pursuant to R.C. 4928.143 in the Form of 10 an Electric Security Plan.

My name is Izzy Marcelletti, and with me is Megan Addison. We are the attorney examiners assigned by the Commission to conduct this public hearing tonight. Also with us this evening is Commissioner John Williams, who's one of the five commissioners of the Public Utilities of Ohio.

Commissioner Williams, would you like to make a few remarks?

MR. WILLIAMS: Thank you. Good evening, everyone. I would like to welcome everyone to tonight's public hearing, and thank everyone for taking the time out today to attend. For any members of the public that are here today, I would encourage you to come forward and offer any comments that you may have on the case that's before us. Thank you.

JUDGE MARCELLETTI: Thank you,

MR. KNIGHT:

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Commissioner. We also have some representatives of the commission's public affairs department, and service monitoring enforcement department in the hall that you passed as you walked in tonight. They are available if you have questions concerning the commission's process, if you need assistance in accessing any of the documents submitted in this case, or if you just have general questions about the hearing tonight. And at this time I would like to take appearances of the parties. First Energy?

evening, Your Honors, Commissioner Williams.

Appearing as counsel on behalf of Toledo Edison

Company, I'm Brian Knight. I have others with me this evening. Brandon McMillan, our Ohio manager of rates and regulatory affairs as well as Andy Shaffer for Ohio rates and regulatory affairs.

Thank Your Honors.

And another thing that the company's done is we anticipate that this evening there may be some in attendance who are customers of the company who may not have positions to express on the proposed electric security plan but may have questions relating specifically to their own bills or service or other issues of that matter, and to try to help those

customers, the company has, outside the hearing room, a table -- to distinguish from the commission's table, it has a blue tablecloth, and there we have employees of the company who are standing by and ready to try to help with any issues that customers may have here this evening.

The employees staffing the table include members of our customer experience organization. We have -- including our vice president of customer engagement, Mark Jones, vice president of customer care Ken Straw, and other members of that organization. In addition, it includes members of our regional external affairs organization. We have Dan Tompkins, our director of regional external affairs, Terry Killeen, our manager of regional external affairs, and Victor Coleman of our regional external affairs organization as well, and other members of that group that may be able to help with some of your questions.

So if you have something here that doesn't relate directly to the security plan but is particular to you and there's a way we might be able to help, please see that table, and they're there to try to help you this evening.

Thank you, Your Honors.

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JUDGE MARCELLETTI: Thank you, Counsel.

Are there any counsel on behalf of the intervenors

tonight?

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MR. FINNEGAN: Good evening, Your Honor. My name is John Finnegan with the Office of the Ohio Consumer's Counsel. With me I have Amy Carl. She's our director of outreach and education for this region in Ohio. She's available to help answer any questions that consumers might have about the plan or the process, and she'll be here throughout the evening and she can also follow up later if needed. So I would encourage anyone who might have a question to please come up, and she can help. Thank you.

JUDGE MARCELLETTI: Thank you, Mr. Finnegan. Are there any other parties that have been granted or have filed an intervention in this proceeding?

Seeing none, I'll just note for the record that while they're not required to attend this evening, there are a number of other parties that have filed for intervention in this case. Ohio Edison Company, the Cleveland Electric Illuminating Company, and the Toledo Edison Company, which we'll refer to collectively as First Energy tonight, filed this application on April 5, 2023, requesting authority to

establish a standard service officer in the form of an electric security plan for the period commencing June 1, 2024, and continuing through May 31, 2032.

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The purpose of this evening's public hearing is to receive comments from the public regarding an application that has been filed by the companies in this case. This is not a question and answer session, but it is an opportunity to let the commission know what you think about the company's request. Tonight's local hearing, as well as the other scheduled local hearing in Akron are only one aspect of the process. There will also be an evidentiary hearing for the parties who have been granted intervention to present their case to the commission. This evidentiary hearing is currently scheduled to commence on November 7th of this year, 2023, and it will be held at the commission's offices in Columbus.

Upon your arrival, you have the opportunity to sign up to testify. You have that sign-up sheet, and after I finish these introductory remarks, we will be begin by inviting individuals to come up and speak in the order that they signed up. Each person who signed up to testify will be permitted to speak once about the application. Before you

present your testimony, we will ask you to take an oath for affirmation that what you are about to say is the truth. We will also ask you to state your name for the record, and then you'll be free to make your remarks. We ask, for efficiency, try to limit it to under five minutes, and if you've prepared any written comments, please provide a copy to the court reporter there.

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What is said and heard by the court reporter will be introduced into the record in this case, and then counsel for the parties for this case, we will ask if you have any cross-examination for the witness as a group, so just speak up or signal to us. The testimony that you provide tonight will be considered part of the official record in this case and it will be reviewed by the commission before the final decision is rendered.

As counsel for First Energy already pointed out, should you have specific questions about the application, the representatives are here and certainly willing to speak with you, and again, our commission staff is available should you have any questions about the commission's process.

Other notes. If you decide that you do not wish to testify, when we read your name from the

- sign in sheet, you can pass it to the next witness.

  If you decide that you prefer to file written comments in the case docket, our staff can answer your question about how to do that in the hallway. Once you're finished testifying, or if you're here to observe, you may leave the hearing at any time you wish.
  - For anyone who does not wish to testify, you may also fill out our sheets in the back in support of or in opposition of the application.

    Again, our staff can assist you with that process.
  - Now at this time we will begin with our testimony.

Do you swear the testimony you're about to provide in this proceeding is the truth?

MR. SARANTOU: Yes.

JUDGE ADDISON: Thank you. Please state your name for the record.

MR. SARANTOU: I am George Sarantou, resident of the City of Toledo. I am also a Toledo city councilman at large, and wanted to basically say that we all understand costs have gone up for everybody, including the energy industry, and we understand that at this time, inflation is still very much a challenge here in the United States. Well, it's here in Toledo. I represent about 270,000 people, citizens of the City of Toledo, and we recognize that Edison has been a very good corporate citizen in our community.

However, I feel that the rate increase is enormous. I feel that it should not be as high.

Asking -- could be as high as \$200,000,000 per year for the next eight years. I feel that is excessive.

That residents of Toledo, like everyone else around Ohio, are hit with very high costs at the grocery

store, gas pumps, and just in raising a family.

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And I think that it's very important for the commission to consider all factors, including how much money Toledo Edison's making. How much money is First Energy Making? What are the profit levels? Because historically, people in northwest Ohio, in the city of Toledo specifically, we have paid very high electric rates.

And it has been a burden, and it's a burden of economic development in attracting employers and companies to come here and open up their shops and hire people. It is a negative, and we know that because as council people, we hear that from many people that have tried to do business here in Toledo and gone out to other areas, Wood County, Bowling Green, Ohio, as an example has a very low electric rate.

So we think that the commission needs to take this into total perspective and look at the total picture. Obviously we want to see rates that are not huge increases. Not only will seniors be affected and people that are raising children and people in our community of all ages, but we're also talking about the business community, and what does the business community do when you have higher

electric rates? They have to pass those rates on. If you have a diner, if you have a restaurant, if you have a machine shop, if you're an auto parts supplier, if you're a big company like Stellantis, the Chrysler plant here in Toledo, the General Motors plant, you really have to pass those costs on.

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So I urge you as a councilman to please carefully look at this increase. Please do not give them the increase that they're asking for. I think it's unwarranted and will place a huge burden on the citizens of Toledo. I thank you, Your Honors.

JUDGE ADDISON: Thank you very much,
Councilman. Any questions for this witness? Anything
from you, Mr. Finnegan? Thank you very much for your
statement.

That's a lot of years to be paying a lot of money on a monthly basis. It would add up very quickly. So I am totally against a rate hike when we just had one and it wasn't a small hike. It was huge. And I'm still crunching numbers as we speak.

2	because it doesn't do anybody any justice other than
3	First Energy and their greed mentality going forward
4	for an eight-year lock in. Thank you.
